WEEDS ON DIVERTED ACRES
This is to remind you that weeds must be controlled on diverted acreages throughout the entire year. Failure to properly care for this land can result in the loss of all 1966 program payments.

SOIL BANK FARMS
If yours is a soil bank farm, reporters from this office will measure your crops at no cost to you. You will not be required to certify to the acreages planted and/or diverted.

We ask your cooperation in going with the reporter who visits your farm. Please go with him to measure the crops, or if it is impossible for you to go with him, have a representative who can help him.

FINAL DATES TO REMEMBER

July 31 — Last day to redeem cotton now under CCC loan.

August 1 — ACP forage sorghum practices must be completed and reported.

August 5 — Final day to request measurement service. Don't let this date slip by. If you plan to take advantage of this service, come in as soon as possible.

September 1 — This is the last day to report your acreages of cotton, feed grain and diverted acres. If you do not come in and certify by this date, the farm will be considered out of compliance and ineligible for payment.

The President has proclaimed the week of July 24-30 as National Farm Safety Week. All families and others who are connected with agriculture are urged to apply full energy and determination to the vital task of reducing accidents at work, in homes, at recreation, and on highways.

GOOCH SAYS SPRAY FOR ELM LEAF BEETLE

The elm leaf beetle is doing a lot of damage to elm trees throughout Donley County, according to County Agent Ronald Gooch. The elm leaf beetle is one of the most destructive pests of the elm tree. This yellowish-green, 1/4 inch long beetle or the small yellow to black larvae can be found skeletonizing the leaves or crawling about on the bark of the trunk of infested elm trees.

This beetle can be controlled by thoroughly spraying the trees with one of the following insecticides; sevin, DDT, toxaphene or chlordane. Another application may be necessary for the second generation of the beetle, using this application several days after the first one. The addition of 3/4 teaspoonful of linseed oil per gallon of spray will help the spray stick to the leaves of the tree.

Gooch Recommends Close Watch for Insects In Cotton Fields

Make an actual count of harmful insects in your cotton to determine whether or not to spray, suggests County Agent Ronald Gooch. This eliminates guesswork and the hit and miss system of spraying. If you find 15-20 of the same kind of harmful insects per 100 stalks, the infestation is dangerous—and you should consider spraying. The best way to check a field is to count the insects on 25 plants in 4 different sections of the field.

The most common insects harmful to cotton and where to look for them are: **Boll Weevil**—Light infestations are being found now in the Hedley area, look on the squares for punctures. The boll weevils puncture the squares and bolls for feeding or for egg laying.

Fleahoppers — Inspect the top 2 or 3 inches of the cotton plant, look at the terminal bud in particular. They are about 1/8 inch long and pale green in color. They cause the small squares to fall off.

Bollworm — Look along the terminal leaves for signs of bollworm eggs and tiny worms. The eggs are about as large as the head of a common pin. They are white when first laid, turning brown just before hatching. Be sure to look on the bloom for signs of bollworms — their signs may show up anywhere up and down the stalk.

It's a good idea to carry along a paper, divided into columns with the names of various insects at the top when making the count. Then, as each insect is observed, make a tally mark under the correct heading.

For the right insecticide and dosage, ask for "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects," available free at the county agent's office.

ADVICE TO THE WISE WASHINGTON VISITOR: BE WARY

Washington, D. C., is one of the country's most celebrated tourist attractions — with the number of visitors increasing by more than 100,000 each year—but it is also becoming a mecca for shady characters from all over the United States. They come here to prey on unsuspecting, and of the more than 9,200,000 visitors expected in Washington during 1966 there will, unfortunately, be many whose trips to the Capital of their Nation will be spoiled by crooks and con artists of every description.

The wise visitor to Washington is a wary one, but sometimes it is not possible to anticipate the pitfalls, as the following account will illustrate:

Recently, a man who had never visited Washington brought his young son to see the sights. After landing at Dulles Airport, the man was refused his request to rent a car because his driver's license had expired, and from that point on his visit was haunted by misfortune. He and his son took a taxi for the 26-mile ride to downtown Washington and were astonished to find, upon arriving, that the tab for the journey was \$15 (which, incidentally, is outrageous.) Later, touring the city, while having a soft drink at the Smithsonian Institution, a pickpocket made off with the man's wallet and, of course, all its contents, including his cash and credit cards. Upon being informed of the theft, the management of his hotel agreed to let him sign checks for meals and to permit him to give his personal check for the bill at the end of their stay. However, the final blow came the next day when the man and his son ordered breakfast in their hotel room. The man stepped out of the room before the breakfast came, instructing his son to give the waiter a quarter tip and to sign the check

for their meal. However, the waiter informed the son that the proffered 25 cents was not acceptable—that the minimum was 15 percent of the check and the waiter would see that the percentage was added after the son signed the check.

The visitor, understandably, called his Congressman. "Get me out of this city," the visitor said. "And I'll never come back."

The Washington Convention and Visitors Bureau attempted to make the tourist's stay a happier one by providing maps and other useful information. Some of the material is misleading. For example, one tract states that "...No matter the season of your visit, ample housing is available in excellent air conditioned hotels and motels affording accommodations suited to your means." The phrasing is approximately correct so long as late spring, summer, and early fall are excluded. In those seasons, with so many individuals and conventions in the city, hotel and motel reservations are all but a necessity. While rooms abound in the winter months, the seasons of family travel bring so many visitors that accommodations are booked weeks in advance. Recently, it required sixteen telephone calls to locate lodging for a Panhandle visitor who found it necessary to make a quick business trip to the Capital. With the throng of visitors here, the criminal element beefs up its own forces, and efforts to protect visitors from them are not fully successful. The police of Washington are drawing criticism, not only because of the rising rate of general crime but because of the increase in thefts of money and articles from tourists, who are attractive targets for criminals because they come from far away and can't afford to return to testify against arrested suspects.

Years ago, Washington was a small and pleasant city with an easy-going manner. Since World War II, however, with the boom in government activity, Washington has grown into a sprawling metropolis with metropolitan dangers. A visit here can be very pleasant, but be wary.

HOT WEATHER CONTINUES WITH MERCURY PAST 100

The weather department is not cooperating a bit unless you are looking for extremely hot weather. The mercury has topped the 100 degree mark for several days now and the reading Tuesday of this week was a sizzling 103 again.

As far as rain is concerned, the extreme point has been reached with no moisture recorded here in town for the month of July. Only 11 days to go so we hope the moisture department makes a good showing before the last day of July rolls by.

HELICOPTER COUNTS SHOW MORE AOUADADS

The second Texas Parks and Wildlife Department helicopter count of aoudad sheep in the Palo Duro Canyon this year also pinpoints both sheep and mule deer, reports Biologist Phil Evans.

Helicopter observers in the northern portions of the Palo Duro Canyon four weeks ago saw 40 aoudad sheep and 116 mule deer. They also successfully marked 10 sheep with paint capsules fired from a CO2 pistol that splashes bright paint on fleeing animals.

The second count totaled 82 aoudad sheep and 64 mule deer in

the same census area.

Biologists surmise that a goodly number of aoudads and mule deer evaded their count since none of the sheep marked with paint last month were seen.

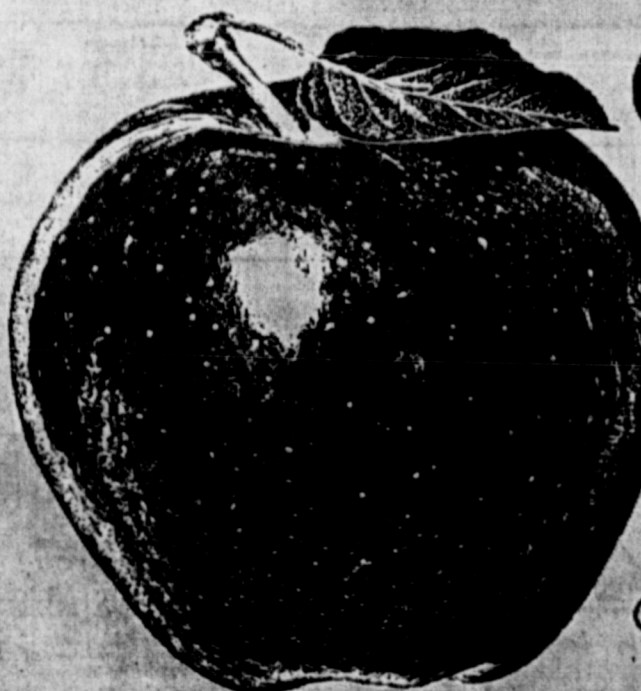

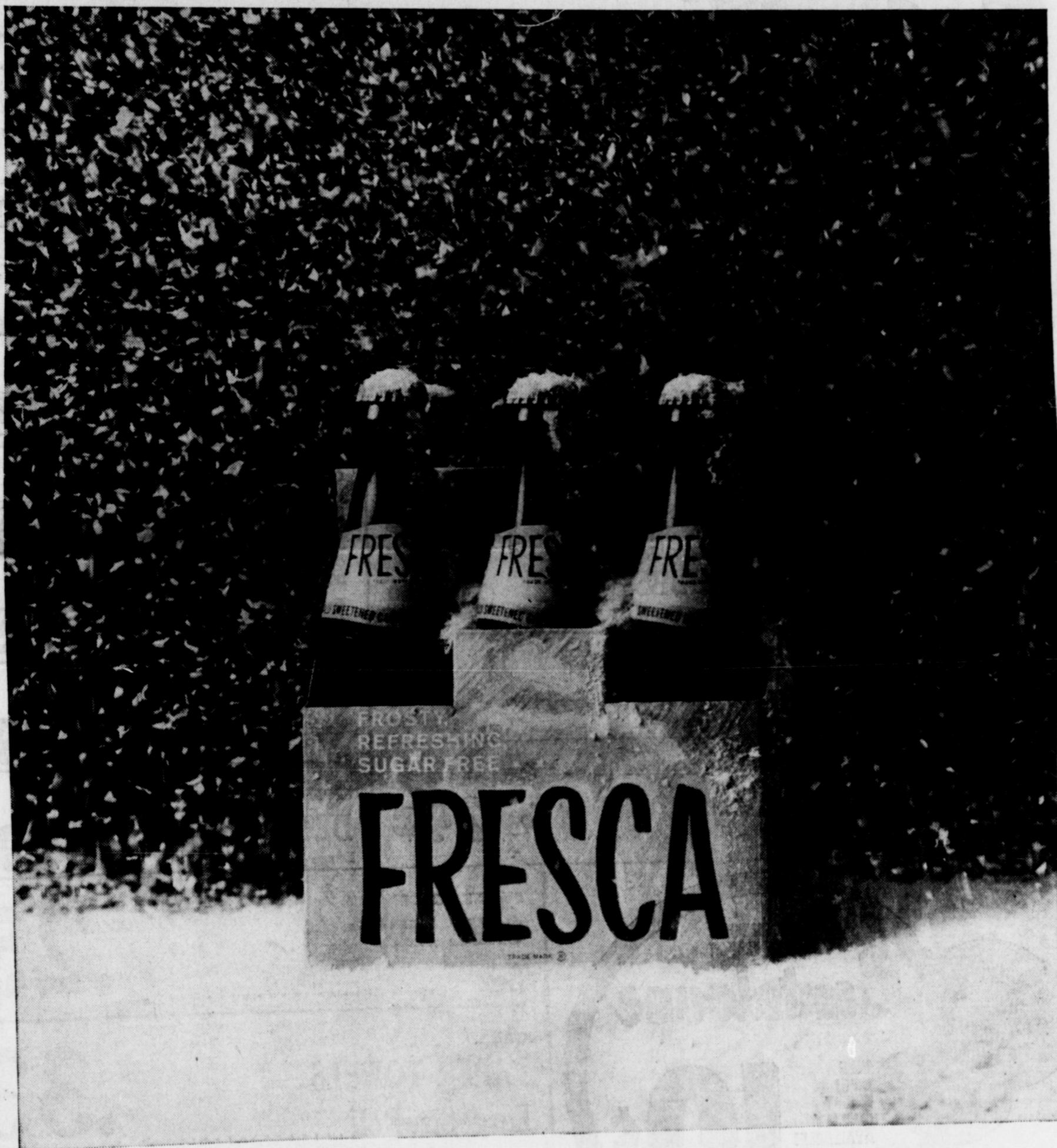

National Farm Safety Week Set For July 24-30

The Texas Safety Association urges Texas farm families to join in observing National Farm Safety Week, July 24-30. J. O. Musick, TSA General Manager, also urges all persons and organizations allied with agriculture to unite in the nationwide effort to reduce the number of accidents among farm families. Accidents kill some 8,200 farm residents each year and an additional 760,000 or more are victims of disabling injuries.

The 1966 farm safety campaign will place special emphasis on the prevention of highway accidents involving slow moving farm vehicles.

Farm residents are being urged to use the new SMV emblem on

all slow-moving vehicles, such as farm tractors. The emblem, a fluorescent yellow-orange colored triangle with a dark red reflective border about 14 inches high and 16 inches wide, is placed on the rear of a slow moving vehicle so it can be easily seen by other drivers, day or night, from a distance of 500 feet or more.

The motoring public is being urged to stay on the alert for the emblem.

"The average motorist does not realize how slowly the vehicle ahead of him is moving until it is too late to avoid a collision," Musick explained.

"Under normal conditions, recognition of the emblem would provide ample time for the motorist to safely reduce his speed."

SW EDUCATIONAL LAB TO BE SET UP

Kenneth Laycock of West Texas State University at Canyon has been named the Northwest Texas Area Coordinator for the Southwest Educational Development Laboratory. His appointment was announced by Dr. Edwin Hindsmann of Austin, executive director of the Laboratory.

Laycock will organize the Laboratory's task forces in the 51 county Northwest Texas area of which Donley County is a unit. The Laboratory is financed by a development contract with the US Office of Education, and by early autumn, projects should be ready in many sections of the two state area of Texas and Louisiana, all with the single objective of improving educational

opportunity for all students of the region.

Laycock will work with a 24 member Area Advisory Council composed of 8 representatives from elementary education, eight from secondary education, and eight from higher education.
