

Are You A Defensive Driver? YOU ARE A DEFENSIVE DRIVER:

(1) When you accept your responsibilities to others and practice courtesy and safety as a habit on the streets and highways.

(2) By maintaining your vehicle in safe operating condition at all times through preventive maintenance, frequent inspection and regular lubrication service.

(3) If you have a clear mind, free from outside worries and problems as you press the accelerator.

(4) By knowing your State traffic laws and abiding by them at all times. Give proper signals-making certain the other drivers understand your signals.

(5) When you utilize your knowledge of the facts of nature by adjusting your speed to physical, weather, and road conditions. Keep safety in balance.

(6) Each time you expect the unexpected from drivers, pedestrians, wild life, or other moving objects.

(7) If you observe safe distances between your vehicle and those ahead and behind you. To follow at a safe distance—always being ready for a sudden stop. Use your rear view mirrors regularly and frequently to see the traffic pictures behind you and around you as well as in front of you.

(8.) By practicing the "Give" rather than "Take" rule when it comes to "Right of Way." Watch for parked vehicles which may be ready to pull out into your lane. Get in the proper lane well in advance to make turns. Give plenty of warning before stopping.

(9) When you refuse to drive when feeling drowsy, ill, nervous or mentally disturbed.

(10) If you can keep your vehicle under control. This means seeing the traffic pattern ahead of you at all times, to a distance within which you can control your vehicle, regardless of what the big picture shows. At 60 miles per hour, you must be able to stop, avoid collision, keep road stability, etc. by seeing the road picture 366 feet ahead. When your headlight beam reduces this distance, you slow down and scan the fringe of darkness ahead of your headlights. To avoid overdriving your headlights, drive at least 10 miles slower at night than you would over the same road in the daylight. Drive slower when visibility is reduced by fog, rain, smoke, etc. Total stopping distance required when traveling 50 miles per hour on a dry road surface is 243 feet.

Defensive driving is doing one's utmost to stay out of dangerous situations created by other drivers which may lead to an accident.

The M-60 machine gun weighs 30 pounds, uses the 7.62 NATO cartridges and may be fired from bipod or tripod. It was developed by Ordnance Corps' Spring-field, Mass. Armory, and is produced by Sacco-Lowell Shops Inc., Sacco, Me. The M-60 was designed to replace the air-cooled .30 caliber machine gun, the water-cooled Browning machine gun and the Browning automatic rifle. The soldiers are also equipped with prototype eye-armor goggles. The protective device is constructed of steel plate and has vision slots over each eye position. The goggles offer the wearer protection from explosive battlefield fragments.

However, this is a matter having to do with the safety and interest of this country, and it is my opinion that every possible opening for a Communist or Communist sympathizer or one subscribing to an ideology conflicting with ours to get into government employment should be closed. Contrary to the beneral belief,

the FBI does not issue clearances or non-clearances or express opinions regarding the suitability of persons for employment with the government. Nor does it make recommendations regarding the hiring, firing or retaining of applicants or employees of other Federal agencies. I must confess that for a great number of years I have been proceeding under the false impression that the FBI, the body charged with the internal security of this nation, made recommendations as a result of facts gathered by it concerning the employment or retention in employment of Federal employees. Having discovered the contrary, it occurred to me that under a true representative form of government, the duly elected officials of the people should have information on the subject. Primary responsibility for the preservation of the United States of America rests in the hands of the Congress. Unless that body has full access to information concerning the employees of this government, whether they be Civil Service employees, Foreign Service employees, or purely political appointees, this responsihility cannot be effectively carried out. As the matter presently stands,

the FBI gets together facts and submits them to an official of the appointed rather than elected and who, along with others, makes the partiiular individual is to be employed. H. R. 10977 simply permits the duly elected members of the Congress of the United States to know what is going on government, as well as the judiwith regard to employees. It will
