

We want to remind wheat growers that the Wheat Stabilization Program applies only to the 1962 crop of wheat. Wheat price support is available only to those wheat producers who participated in Wheat Stabilization program and who stays within their farm, allotment.

The 1962 wheat program also increased the marketing quota penalty rate as well as the amount of wheat subject to penalty, and extended the quota program to many small farms which were previously exempt from quotas.
