HUNTING AND FISHING BIG BUSINESS

There must be something to these outdoor sports of hunting and fishing, says Ed Cooper, extension wildlife specialist. According to a survey conducted recently by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, he says some 30 million people in the United States hunt and fish, and that fishermen outnumber the hunters by about 2 to 1.

About \$4 billion are poured into the American economy each year by these outdoorsmen, says Cooper. This money is spent mainly for equipment, transportation, food and lodging, lease fees and licenses. American fishermen spent about \$3 billion in 1960, while hunters spent lion in 1960, while hunters spent \$1 billion. Combined, they traveled 13.2 billion automobile miles.

The number of women hunters increased from 418,000 in 1955 to 860,000 in 1960, Cooper continues.

Considering these impressive increases in the amount of time, money and effort spent on hunting and fishing, Americans should look to the future and




