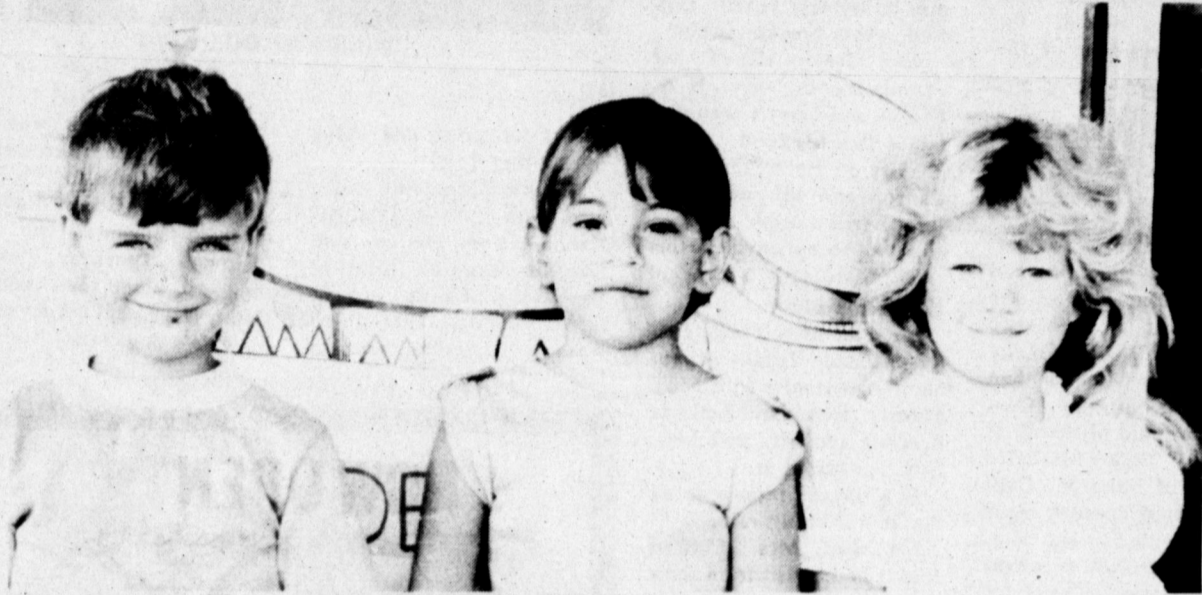

Special emergency grazing

Because of the sweltering drought Donley County farmers and ranchers are praying for rain and pleading for federal aid.

Since mid July, Clarendon has registered 13 days of 100 degrees and over with the rest of the days registering into the mid-to-upper 90's.

Last week fire units from 9 towns battled a grass blaze between Memphis and Quail which blackened 100's of acres of grassland. Sunday night the Clarendon department contained a grass fire which burned some 40 to 50 acres of land southeast of Clarendon. The dry conditions make it extremely hazardous, and the fire department asks that motorists be ever aware of this and be careful of sparks from exhausts or cigarettes. One Hedley rancher stated that they had over 100 degrees for 8 days in a row.

In his news conference in Austin on Friday, Governor Mark White brought two beakers, one containing approximately 2 inches of water in it, representing the total rainfall for West Texas, while the other was almost full, representing the amount of rainfall on U.S. Secretary of Agriculture John Block's Illinois farm received. Block had turned down the governor's request for federal aid to drought-stricken West Texas.

The Clarendon ASCS office last week asked for approval for emergency grazing of conservation use acreage. Tuesday morning, Genella Eads, acting County Executive Director mailed out the following information to area farmers and ranchers telling them that this request had been approved and they must apply to the following rules:

Special Emergency Grazing of Conservation Use Acreage: Due to the severe drought, Donley County has been approved for special grazing of CUA. This approval is for grazing only. These acres cannot be hayed or harvested in any manner. The following rules will apply:

1. Only livestock owned by the applicant on August 1, 1983, may be grazed on CUA during the remainder of the 6 month non-grazing period.
2. Only CUA in which the applicant has an interest may be grazed.
3. Acreage designated as wildlife food plots may not be grazed.
4. Grazing shall not remove the cover to the extent

that the acreage is not protected from weeds and from wind or water erosion.

5. No livestock purchased or leased after August 1, 1983, may be grazed on CUA under this special emergency designation.

Lone Star files

for rate increase for Hedley

Lone Star Gas Co. Manager, Mark Winsor, August 9 filed an application for a rate increase which would raise the average residential customer's monthly bill in Hedley about \$1.72 in the winter and \$(.88) in the summer.

Based on Lone Star's rate application, a residential customer who uses an average of six thousand cubic feet of gas a month paid \$35.58 for gas service in the winter. Under the requested rate, that same customer would pay \$37.30.

Commercial gas customers' rates would also increase under the requested rate schedule.

"Our customers are accustomed to dependable natural gas service," says Winsor. "This rate is necessary to continue a high performance level and for other necessary expenses, such as maintaining and improving the local pipeline distribution system, which are vital to dependable service."

Lone Star's last rate increase in Hedley became effective April, 1982.

"Since that time, every business, including Lone Star, has experienced increased operating expenses," says Winsor. "And, of course, unlike other businesses that can raise their prices as expenses go up, we must apply to the city council for a rate increase. No one likes rising prices, but any business must earn enough money to meet operating expenses and still achieve a reasonable profit. Even though our expenses have gone up, Lone Star still has one of the lowest average operating costs per customer when compared to any of the other major gas utilities in Texas."

CCC has announced that it will allow producers, who request an extension, until January 16, 1984, to obtain a loan or redeem a loan for PIK. The written request must be filed at this office before December 1st. CCC will discontinue making storage payments on the wheat December 1, 1983.

Let us remind you once again that your CUA must be protected from wind and water erosion and WEEDS MUST BE CONTROLLED. We are now checking these acres and we have received some complaints from neighbors. Please take care of this land so you won't be penalized or complete lose all benefits.

Due to the dry weather, some of you may be thinking of plowing up some crops. Be sure to come by the office and file an application for disaster credit before doing so. This is necessary for history purposes and spot checks.

The 10% withholding tax law repealed

Local and area banks will not withhold 10 percent of their customers' interest and dividend payments now that the withholding tax law has been repealed. President Ronald Reagan signed into law legislation repealing income tax withholding on interest and dividends late last week.

Reagan had opposed legislation and at one time threatened to veto it. That probably would have been futile, though, as the measure passed both the House and Senate by margins wide enough to override a veto, after a massive lobbying campaign by the banking industry.

About six weeks ago, Jack Hightower's office reported he had received 13,500 letters from his constituents in the 13th Congressional District concerning the tax with-

holding law. Sharon Brown of the First National Bank of Amarillo is a member of the American Bankers Association Marketing Committee which was instrumental in organizing bank customers for a letter-writing campaign to their legislators.

"Part of the reason for the campaign was to inform the public and let them know about the tax," Brown said. "We also wanted to give them the opportunity to respond to their legislators." "We didn't expect the response to be as great as it was, but we knew it would take broad consumer response to get the bill repealed," Brown said. "I think it is important for the public to understand that if they will speak out, their representatives in Washington will listen."

Hedley school adopts \$401,728 budget

The Hedley CISD Board of Trustees held its budget hearing for the 1983-84 school year. The board

adopted a budget of \$401,728.

The Board also set the tax rate needed to finance this

budget. The overall rate of \$.67 per \$100.00 valuation was set. The general operating fund would receive \$.54 per \$100.00 valuation. The sinking fund would receive \$.13 per \$100.00 valuation. The rate represents slightly less than a three percent increase in the effective tax rate. The effective tax rate for the school district is \$.67299 per \$100.00 valuation.

In other Board action, lunch prices for the new school year were also set. Student lunches will cost \$.80 each and student breakfasts will cost \$.40 each. Students may also apply for free or reduced price meals. If the family qualifies according to federal income standards, the students will be eligible to receive either free or reduced price meals depending upon the total amount of family income.

Reduced price meal charges were set at \$.25 per meal. The following guidelines apply for free and reduced price eligibility:

Children from households with incomes not exceeding the family size and income specified below are eligible for free or reduced-price meals.

Outdoor Entertainment Association Donates to EMS

The Clarendon Outdoor Entertainment Association recently made a generous donation to the Clarendon EMS. They purchased a portable suction to be placed on one of the ambulances like the one which had been previously purchased by Greenbelt Water Authority. The cost of the unit was \$375 and the OEA made an additional donation of \$50 to be used toward purchase of other equipment to obtain

ratings as Mobile Intensive Care Units on both local ambulances.

Until recently, both ambulances had built-in suction units but had no way to suction the patient unless they were in the ambulance. With addition of the portable units, patients can be suctioned in a residence, in a boat, while trapped in a vehicle, or anywhere else since the units have a one hour running capability on their own rechargeable power source.

Suctioning of patients, especially those who are unconscious, is most important if they are to survive.

When secretions of mucus, blood, etc. block the airway on an unconscious patient, they are unable to swallow or cough and the material can be sucked into the lungs causing the patient in effect to drown or suffocate. This procedure must be performed immediately and that is the reason a portable suction is so important to their survival. The portable

suction is one of the new required items under the new Texas Dept. of Health guidelines.

The Clarendon EMS is getting very close to meeting the new requirements to be certified as MICU on both ambulances. Very few towns of our size will be able to certify all of their units as MICUs but due to the tremendous generosity of Donley County citizens, we will have equipment and training that is second to none.
