# 51 deaths estimated Labor Day weekend

The Texas Department of Public Safety has estimated as many as 51 persons will be killed in traffic accidents during the Labor Day holiday. The estimate includes traffic deaths which may rural highways.

Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director, says Texas has about 14 percent fewer fatal accidents now than at the same time during 1982.

"We are hopeful the trend will continue downward for the remainder of the year. However holiday weekends always seem to bring higher death tolls than do other times of the year," Adams

The DPS reported 50 deaths during Labor Day last year. However, the inclusion of subsequent deaths due to traffic injuries received during the 78 hour period raised the final count to 57.

"During the 1982 holiday, 27 people were killed in accidents where DWI or speed was a contributing factor. This represented close to half of all the fatalities which occurred during that particular holiday." said Adams.

The DPS director called for sober driving, use of seat belts and a reduction in

speed. "We know alcohol contributes to about half of our traffic deaths, so it is obvious that a driver should not drink and drive. Also, we can prove the lifesaving effects of seat belt usage and our statistics show that slower speeds enhance one's chances for survival if an accident occurs." said

Adams. recent holiday, July 4th, was one of the most deadly

recorded in the past decade. "We had 55 persons killed during the Fourth of July and some are still seriously injured and will probably die before the year is over. This makes that holiday the deadliest 78-hour holiday since 1970," he said

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has approved Sept. 10-18, 1983, as hunting all species of teal

As in the past, the daily bag limit will be four teal in the aggregate; possession limit eight. Shooting hours will be sunrise to sunset statewide.

The special teal season gives waterfowl hunters the yield times the acres diveropportunity to hunt early- ted arriving teal which often pass through much of the state before the opening of regular waterfowl seasons.

Deputy Secretary of Agri culture Richard Lyng today announced provisions of the 1984 wheat program and set the signup period from Jan. 16 through Feb. 24.

Lyng said because Congress took no legislative action on a proposed freeze in the wheat target price before its summer adjournment, he is now putting into effect provisional measures perviously announced on July 29. The U.S. Department of Agriculture is required by law to announce the wheat program for the following year no later than

Aug. 15. The 1984 wheat program includes:

- A \$4.45 per bushel target

A \$3.30 per bushel national average loan rate. An acreage reduction

requirement of 30 percent. -No advance deficiency payments.

.. To be eligible for program benefits, producers must limit 1984 wheat planted acreage to no more than 70 percent of the farm's wheat base and devote to conservation use an acreage of eligible cropland equal to 42.86 percent of the 1984 planted and payment-in-kind (PIK) acreage.

The 1984 acreage base will be the average of the statewide season dates for acreage planted and considered planted to wheat in 1982 and 1983.

-Farmers participating in the acreage reduction program may divert an additional 10 to 20 percent of their wheat base and receive payment-in-kind equal to 75 percent of the established

-PIK program participants will not receive wheat from Commodity Credit Corporation stocks. Producers signing up in the PIK program will agree first to use regular CCC price support loans. Producers with no outstanding loans agree to harvest for PIK. Those producers with no outstanding loans and who are unable to harvest for PIK will not receive a PIK payment.

Land designated for conservation use must have been devoted to row crops or small grains in two of the last three years except for a summer fallow farm. Under summer fallow rules the land must be acreage that would have been planted to small grains or row crops in 1984 in the absence of the 1984 wheat program.

#### **EMT** course offered

Clarendon College announces that there will be a short-term health course in Emergency Medical Technicians. This course will take 120 clock hours, including 20 hours in a

This class will start Sept 6 and end Nov. 29 The class will meet Tuesday and Thursdays from 6 p.m. until 10 p.m. at Clarendon College

Instructors will be Pat Robertson and Phillip Yargas. This course is designed to provide training needed in Clarendon community and surround area for ambulance and emergency service personnel. Upon successful completion of the course the student will have completed the state requirements to become registered as an official emergency medial technician. The new curriculm issued by the Emergency Medical Service Division of the State Health Dept. will be taught. The class will be limited to 20 students.

The objective is to train the student in the overall role and responsibilities of the EMT in performing both the emergency care and the operational aspects of his job. To develop skill in diagnosis and all emergency treatment procedures short of those rendered by paramedical personnel. To develop skill in the use and care of all equipment required by the EMT.

In order to take this course, you must be at least 18 years of age. You may register the first night of class Sept. 6, tuition will be \$60.00 for the couse and approximately \$18 for books.



Projectors are not included and because of their cost users are mostly the schools, churches and other organizations... Medical Center Nursing Home uses a film every week! There have been 116 films used this year. Viewers have

Only one daily newspaper. The Amarillo Daily News is available. Subscriptions are expensive and costs were cut here. Anyone wanting to donate a subscription to the Clarendon Press, the Wall Street Journal or other large city daily is welcome to do so. The large reading area in the library is very comfortable and numerous people are in during the week spending a little time between appointments or waiting to pick up various family members.

Magazines are available for checking out or just glancing over in the reading room. Sixteen magazines are subscribed to by the library. Donations of current magazines are very welcome. Weekly magazines could be three or four weeks old and monthly ones could be three of four months old. There is not space to handle old magazines and if they are over one year old they are listed in Reader's Guide. Consequently their use as a reference is worthless

Kang, Moon Hee, whose new American name is Kimberly Rose, was met at the Oklahoma City airport Thursday by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Barry Phillips of Clarendon. In keeping with family tradition, Kimberly's middle name is Rose, after grandmothers on both sides of her family.

Kimberly's adoption was arranged by Children's Services a Tulsabased agency that has matched Korean children with deserving families since

The Dillon agency arranges its adoptions through the Eastern Child Welfare Society, Inc., one of four Korean agencies working directly with the U.S. intercountry adoptions programs. The Korean agency is responsible for caring for the child until it is brought to the United States. arranging and overseeing emigration and ensuring that all Korean legal requirements are met.

While the Phillips were preparing for Kimberly, their baby was being taken care of in Korea by a foster mother. The Korean foster mothers are especially protective of the young infants they are responsible for, and provide loving care in their homes until the baby can be escorted to the United States

Seniors and ribbons won include: Lesia Fuston, blue and Christina Leathers, red.



#### Green Thumb receives new grant

Farmers Union Green Thumb, an employment program for low-income senior citizens in Texas and 44 other states, has received a new grant of \$88,500,918 from the U. S. Dept. of

The grant is effective from July 1, 1983 through June 30, 1984. It provides \$4,113,951 for Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb, which has 952 of the 17,317 part-time job slots allocated to Green Thumb nationwide.

TFU Green Thumb currently operates in 108 counites, most in north, centeral and west Texas. The program's workers must be at least 55 years of age and meet income guidelines. They are placed with public and private non-profit organizations such as schools, senior centers, libraries, and museums, and furnish services that would not otherwise be

The sponsoring organizations ae responsible for day to day supervision of the workers, and TFU Green Thumb administers wages and fringe benefits.

'We are delighted that the Dept. of Labor has signed the new grant agreement," said Mike Moeller, president of Texas Farmers Union. "The grant money means that 500 rural agencies now benefitting from the services of Green Thumb workers can continue to do so for at least another

Green Thumb state director Diane Parrish of Waco said that even though the grant is based on 952 employment slots for Texas, the program s currently able to employ 1,047 older persons because of reductions in overhead on both the state and national levels

The overriding goal is to put as many older Texans to work as possible, Parrish said. "They need the work for themselves, and their communities need the dedication and conscientiousness that older workers bring to their jobs."



Andy (G.A.) Robertson was a 65 year resident of Donley County when he sold his home at 701 East Second in 1978 and moved to Amarillo to live with his daughter

Since February, 1978 he has been a resident of 2908 Eddy Street, Amarillo, Texas, the home of his daughter, Vivian M. Howe (Mrs. Joseph J. Howe).

Andy is enrolled at the Jan Werner Day Care Center, where he participates in the crafts program, painting plaster pieces, ceramics, making glass etchings, brass engraved etchings, wood finishing, and various other crafts. He is a member and attends Coulter Road Baptist Church and Adult 6 Sunday School Class there. He is also a member and regular participant in the San Jacinto Odd Fellows Lodge. Although he is now 83 years old (August 17th), he walks three miles every day (weather permitting).

Andy came to Donley County from Armstrong County when he was 13 years old with his mother and father, W.A. (Uncle Billy) and Edna Robertson. In 1922, he married Sallie E. Rattan, and continued to live in Donley County and farmed with his father until 1928. when he moved to Clarendon with his wife and two children, Vivian Maxine and

With the Depression well on its way. Andy worked in the North Plains wheat harvest, did maintenance work for the City of Clarendon, worked long hours at Knight's Dairy and any other work available.

In 1935, with two additional children a part of the family, Margaret (Vines) and Delbret, Andy moved his family close to downtown on Carhart Street, where the Church of Christ is now located, in order to be close to his work, that of building maintenance and custodial work at the First Baptist Church and Goldston Building, as well as that of contract postal carrier and express freight carrier.

In 1940 a fifth member made her appearance in the family, Georgia Nell (Speed). This was a short time before the family moved to 701 East Second, the Robertson home from 1945 until 1978.

Andy later went into the Venetian Blind business, in his own shop behind the garage which he also built himself. This may seem very ordinary except for the fact that Andy was born with a paralyzed spastic right arm and hand. In his shop he not only repaired, renewed, and painted blinds, but also manufactured by hand many, many new venetian blinds, custom ordered.

Andy's wife of 52 years, Sallie E. Robertson, died in 1974 at the Medical Center Convalescent Home in Clar-

After retiring from all custodial work and that of mail carrier, Andy continued to work mowing lawns and rototilling gardens in Clarendon and Howardwick, along with the venetian blind business; while at the same time assisting his son Delbret with cemetery maintenance and preparation of burial sites. This he did until



# **Bob Bullock** asks about natural gas policy

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said he has asked the Texas congressional delegation to take a close look at proposed changes in federal natural gas policy that could cost the state more than 100 million in lost natural gas

production tax revenue. The nation's largest gas producer, Texas produced more than six trillion cubic feet of gas last year and the state collected more than \$1 billion in natural gas production taxes.

Bullock sent a report to Texas congressman showing the Reagan Administration's gas decontrol proposal could cost the state \$56 million in lost gas production taxes during the next two budget years and about \$42 million the year after that.

"Effors to eliminate some **449** natural gas pricing problems are to be commended, but no one wants to cut off an arm to cure a hangnail," Bullock

> Bullock said that his report indicates Texas gas customers would not benefit significantly from the Reagan Administration proposal.

> "A second major proposal to deregulate natural gas, developed by the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee, would impact Texas less severly than the Reagan-backed proposal," Bullock said.







#### Social Security

Q: I understand that the Social Security tax is going up again next year. Is this

A: Yes. Social Security taxes are going up in 1984: however, employees won't really be paying a higher rate in. 1984 because they will receive tax credit equal to the increase in the Social Security tax rate.

This sounds more complicated than it actually is. In 1984, the total Social Security and Medicare tax rate will be increased from 6.7 percent each, for employees and employers (as it is in 1983) to 7 percent for employers and employees, but with a 0.3 percent tax credit for employees only. This means that employees won't actually see any tax rate increase in

O: I am 57 years old, and I've heard rumors that the Social Security law has been changed so that I won't be able to retire when I am 65. Has the Social Security retirement age really been raised?

A: The law has been changed, but you need not worry. You will still be able to retire with full benefits at age 656. The increase in the retirement age is a change that will be phased in very gradually, after the turn of the century, so that, for people reaching age 62 after 2022, the full benefit retirement age will be 67.
