## Voting to take place Tuesday

Early balloting at the Courthouse Annex will continue until 5 p.m. this Friday, October 30.

## Local sales tax rebate up slightly

AUSTIN - State Comptroller John Sharp this month delivered a total of \$173.6 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,093 Texas cities and 118 counties, a 7.1 percent increase over the \$162 million allocated in October 1997. October's rebates include local sales tax collected on August sales and reported to the Comptroller in September by business filing monthly returns. "Consumer confidence is still up across the state, as spending in Texas shows no signs of slowing down," Sharp said. "Year-to-date, sales tax rebates to cities and counties are up 10.4 percent over last year." Sharp delivered at rebate of \$13,480.82 to the City of Clarendon, an increase of 0.15 percent over 1997. Hedley's rebate dropped 41.78 percent for a total of \$106.19, and Howardwick saw its rebate fall 35.64 percent for a total of \$730.12.

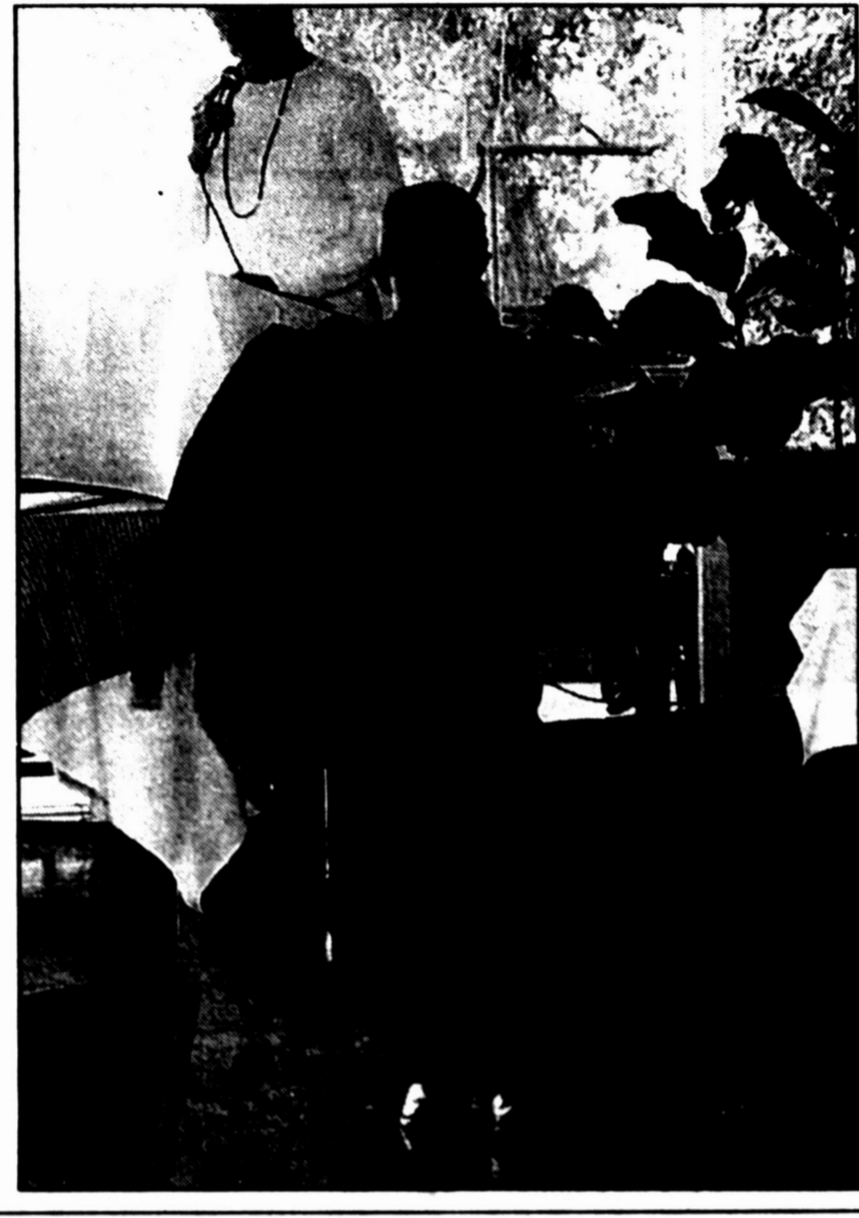

The Hedley Owls hosted their second home game and third district game of the season last Friday night against the McLean Tigers. In the first quarter, Jeremy Wells threw an interception to McLean's Ike Hanes. Minutes later, Hedley's Dustin Monroe also received an interception and ran for 40 yards to score a touchdown for the Owls. However, Wells' PAT attempt failed. Jeremy Wells also ran the ball in for a touchdown and made the PAT. But McLean's Ike Hanes ran the ball and scored with just minutes left in the first quarter making the score 14-6. In the second quarter, Jeremy Wells received and ran the ball 38 yards to score another touchdown for the Owls. Hedley then played strong defense and kept McLean from scor-

ing. However, with the ball in the Owls possession, Jeremy Wells threw another interception to McLean's Chris Hawk. ## Seedlings available for local windbreaks

LUBBOCK - Seedling applications for conservation windbreaks are now available to Donley County landowners through the Texas Forest Service West Texas Nursery or local Soil and Water Conservation District. Several varieties of evergreens and deciduous trees and shrubs are available. Each year, West Texas Nursery provides adapted windbreak seed-

lings, at cost, to assist producers in incorporating conservation windbreaks into their farming and/or ranching operation. "Windbreaks are trees and shrubs systematically planted adjacent to fields, homesteads, or feedlots as a barrier to reduce or redirect the wind," says Robert Fewin, Texas Forest Service forester, Lubbock. "And when properly planted, they

become a management tool that affects every aspect of the farm or ranch." Windbreaks create permanent, natural protection and habitat for wildlife, reduce erosion, and increase land value and aesthetics. Evergreens are sold in boxes of 30 for \$52 and the hardwoods in bundles of 100 for \$48. All prices include shipping and handling. Seed-

lings ordered this fall will be shipped or delivered in the spring of 1999. Wildlife packets for habitat establishment also are available. Each of the four wildlife packets contain 100 bare-root trees and shrubs which cater specifically to the habitat needs of quail and pheasant, deer, turkey or squirrel. Each wildlife packet is \$46. West Texas Nursery's primary objective is to produce and sell qual-

ity seedlings at a price landowners can afford, allowing them to plant large quantities of trees for windbreaks. Producers are encouraged to purchase seedlings this fall before preferred stock is sold out. To order windbreak trees or for more information contact the Texas Forest Service West Texas Nursery at (806) 746-5801.

## CISD tax rate among region's lowest

Out of 63 school districts in the Texas Panhandle, only 11 have tax rates lower than that of Clarendon CISD. "The average tax rate in Region 16 schools is \$1.32633," said Clarendon Superintendent Phil Barefield. "The lowest tax rate in the region is \$0.9757, and the highest is \$1.62. Clarendon has a tax rate of \$1.20." The Region 16 Education Service Center recently conducted a survey of school tax rates within the 26 counties of the Panhandle. Of the school districts responding to the survey, Clarendon CISD is at the 17.5 percentile. "Clarendon CISD has either lowered its tax rate or maintained the same rate for the last three years," Barefield said. "There have been no district tax rate increases since the 1995-96 school year. "From time to time we hear that Clarendon has high

taxes compared to other nearby areas. This study very clearly shows our rates are low compared to most other districts." Of the districts with lower tax rates, only two have larger enrollments than Clarendon does. Most of the districts with lower rates are very small districts, and some have classes only through the sixth grade. "While it takes money to run a school, we have provided excellent programs, maintained the facilities, and employed a great staff on a reasonable tax rate," Barefield said. The Clarendon public school district was recently rates as an "Exemplary" district by the Texas Education Agency.

The evening can pose special hazards for young tricksters and scare the daylight out of parents, Dr. Smith said. If you expect a gaggle of cowboys and princesses to haunt your neighborhood on Halloween night, make sure your yard is free of hazards, he suggested. "With a little foresight, Hallow-

een can be a safe and enjoyable holiday for both children and parents alike," Dr. Smith said. • Remove obstacles in the yard, such as hoses, sprinklers, lawn furniture and potted plants. Turn your porch light on to let children know they're welcome. • Keep lighted jack-o'-lanterns or candles away from the steps of the front door. A child's costume could possibly brush against the open flame and catch fire. • Pets, especially dogs, may become agitated with so many visitors. Keep your pets indoors or out of harm's way for a few hours. Continued on page two.

**Feds should look at USPS monopoly**

It looks like the feds are going to move ahead with this ridiculous anti-trust case against Microsoft.

It is simultaneously amusing and disgusting that the federalies are going after Bill Gates - a man whose company provides quality products at an increasingly affordable price - while they are protecting another monopoly - one which provides dismal customer service and increasingly cannot get the job done.

I am talking of course about the United States Postal Service. While competition from FedEx and UPS is giving the Post Office a run for its money in the arena of packaged goods, the USPS still enjoys its government-protected monopoly on the delivery of first class and periodicals class mail. It is that very monopoly which creates the postal service's lax approach towards its job.

While the postal service is spending millions of dollars on a television ad campaign called "Fly Like An Eagle" and while they lay out mega-bucks for a new Amarillo Post Office on Western Street, the simple fact remains that the USPS is a dismal failure at its primary mission - delivering the mail.

The most galling thing about the post office is that Americans continue to pay more money for less service. Earlier this month, the USPS raised the rates on periodicals (i.e. THE CLARENDON ENTERPRISE and other newspapers) mailed out of county. About this same time, one of our loyal subscribers in the far-off city of Amarillo, Texas, missed her newspaper for three weeks in a row.

They couldn't get one newspaper 60 miles down the road for three weeks in a row. When alerted to this problem, do you think the postal service refunded the money or apologized or offered to maybe find the missing mail? No, sir. In fact, the typical line from postmasters outside Donley County is that if THE ENTERPRISE doesn't make it to its intended destination, it must be the fault of the mailer and not the mail carrier. And now they want us to pay more for the privilege of being taken to the cleaners. Well, that's just dandy.

Before the government goes beating up on some innocent free enterprise like Microsoft, maybe they should take a long, hard look in the mirror. In the USPS, they would find true examples of poor customer service, terrible performance, and an arrogant attitude.

There may be some light at the end of the tunnel. According to REASON magazine, the new Postmaster General William L. Henderson recently told a conference of business customers that the Postal Service "needs to be deregulated, commercialized." He reportedly conceded that the mail monopoly will eventually end.

The end cannot come soon enough however.

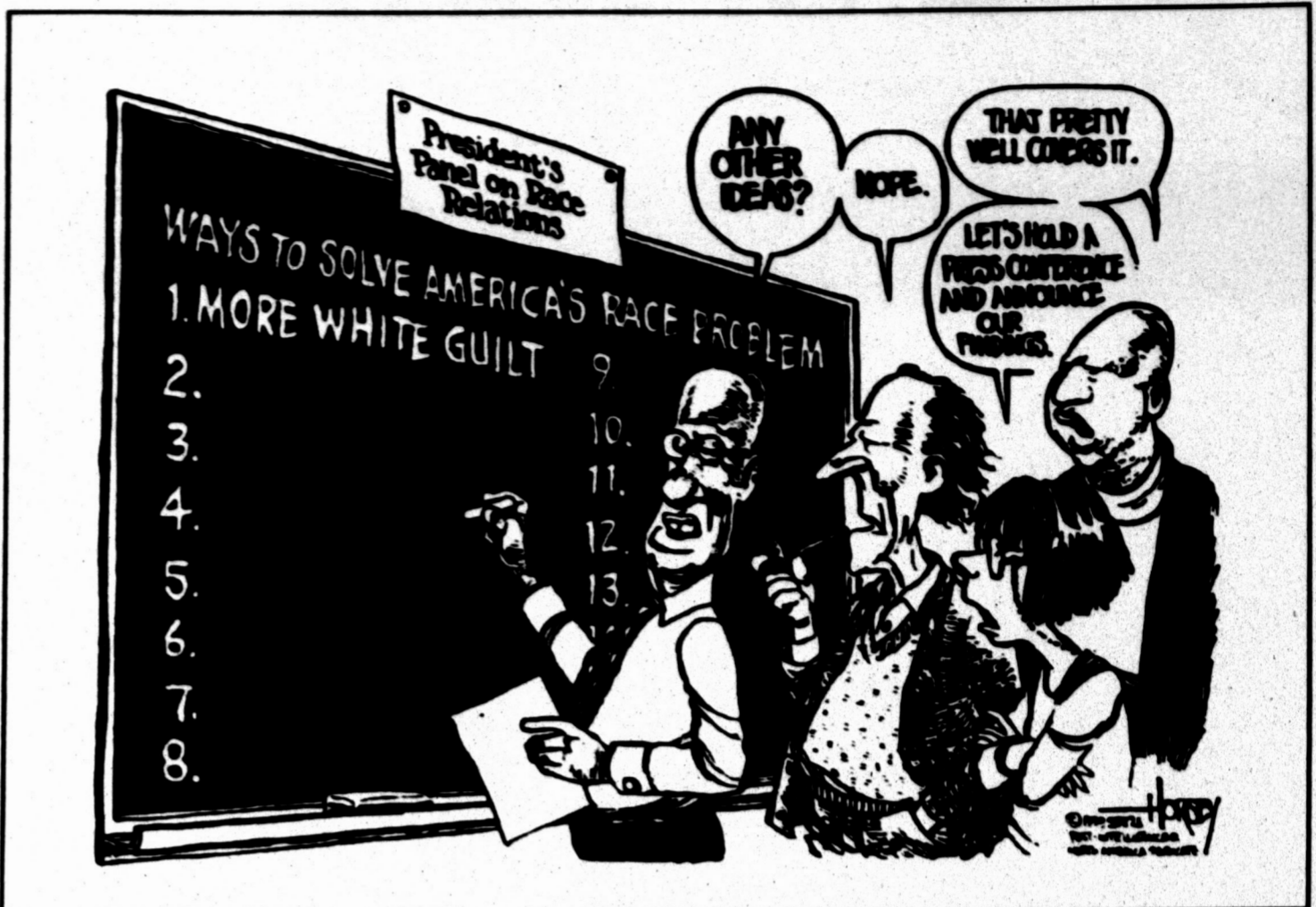
"The event was a success and our faculty and staff did an excellent job in promoting our institution," said Jaylia Bitner, Clarendon College's coordinator of admission and recruiting.

**Experts offer Halloween home safety tips: Continued from page one**

- Treats don't have to be full of sugar and fat. Consider giving healthy treats such as boxes of raisins, pre-packaged granola bars and sugar-free bubble gum. Some families give away pencils and colorful erasers for school. Obey traffic rules. Parents should emphasize traffic nighttime trek. "In the excitement of Halloween, some children forget the rules they have learned about crossing streets. Encourage youngsters to remember the traffic rules. Stress that they must obey the traffic lights even on Halloween," Dr. Smith said. These rules include:
  - Start treat-or-treating early while it's still light. Give each child a flashlight to carry no matter what the lighting.
  - Use seat belts and child safety seats while driving. In their excitement to go trick-or-treating, children may
- let their children hang on the back of pick-up trucks and ride on bumpers. Parents should accompany children on their haunting journeys or enlist the aid of a responsible older sibling who can serve as an escort.
  - Instruct children to go to only lighted homes and to avoid houses

## Check It Out

Is she amazing? You decide. In Burton Memorial Library's *May Owen, MD*, author Ted Stafford depicts the character of a woman whose goal and perseverance against many obstacles led her to become one of Texas' outstanding medical doctors. During a six-decade career, she experienced progress from simple folk remedies to highest technology.

May was born to immigrant parents in Falls County, Texas, in 1891. Her family farm duties began at age 2 when she gathered cook-stove wood. She loved and experienced almost every phase of farm life. She could break a wild horse faster than her brothers. Her mother died before May started to school, leaving more responsibility to eight children.

From the time May entered first grade, her greatest joy was learning and reading. Her family could not understand her intrigue for reading. The only book in the house was the Bible, seldom used except on special occasions. While still a young girl, she read from Genesis to Revelations several times. A teacher or neighbor occasionally loaned her a book. The County Vet furnished veterinary journals.

At age nine, May announced her desire to become a doctor at a time when women doctors were practically unheard of. Her father appreciated everything the country school offered, but never encouraged high school. He considered her dream of Medical School ridiculous and outrageous.

After arrangements made by her oldest brother, May, age 21, entered Texas Christian University in Fort Worth to receive her high school diploma. During the first fall at TCU, she traveled home on weekends to help with crop harvesting. Returning to school on Monday mornings, her desire for more education never faltered.

Dr. Truman C. Terrell became a

dynamic factor in May's life, assuring her of college completion, offering opportunity of work in his professional medical lab, and suggesting Medical School after graduation.

May received many Medical School rejections before she was finally accepted to Louisville Medical School. Assuming there would be other women students, she was surprised to find she was the only one. The male students, curious about a woman from Texas with medical aspirations, were not too pleased about her attendance there. None spoke to her after the first session. Readers will be amused at the circumstances in which they accepted May and would, later, admire her as an equal.

After valuable experience at Mayo Clinic, New York's Bellevue and Scott and White Hospitals, May returned to her beloved Texas, confident that she could deal with any situation in her specialty.

First Texas Medical Association Woman President and Texas Women's Hall of Fame induction are only two of May's numerous distinguished honors.

Her life was one of humility, modesty, determination, and generosity. Humble and modest because, always sharing credit an acknowledging others for successes, she never tried to become known because of her accomplishments. Determined because of love and devotion to Medical research to benefit others. Generous because of physical and financial aid willingly given to students. Almost 500 current doctors began their profession through Dr. Owen's personal efforts. The May Owen Irrevocable Trust for student loans which began decades ago is still active.

This exceptional lady Texan maintained alertness, working until the day before she died in 1988, three weeks before her 97th birthday.

## Report shows erosion decreases, then hits plateau in 1995

WASHINGTON - Total erosion on American cropland decrease by 42 percent from 1982 to 1995, dropping from 3.4 billion tons in 1982 to 2 billion tons in 1995, but has remained unchanged since then, according to a special study by the US Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS).

"We did this special study to monitor the impacts the 1996 Farm Bill had on conservation," said Perlie S. Reed, Chief of NRCS. "Despite the large gains since 1982, we found that progress in erosion reduction has remained flat since 1995."

Other highlights from the 1997 *State of the Land Update* include:

- The rate of erosion decreased by 35 percent, from 8 tons of soil loss per acre per year in 1982, to 5.2 tons of soil loss per acre per year in 1997.
- 1.1 million acres of cropland were taken out of production between 1995 and 1997. This land was converted to other uses such as pastureland

and some urban development.

• The average quality of the land converted to cropland between 1995 and 1997 was generally lower, with a steeper slope and more erodibility, than the average quality of the land already being used for cropland.

• In just one year, wind erosion control buffers increased by more than 15 percent. There were 320,900 acres of these buffers in use in 1997 - a 48,700 acres increase over the amount of wind erosion control buffers in 1996.

The special report provides data taken from 6,000 sampling sites across the country, supplemented by data collected in 1995 and 1996. It gives information on changes in erosion, cropland use, and conservation practices and is statistically reliable for national analysis. NRCS collected the data through aerial photography and the examination of the historical record of the land.

The full 1997 National Resources Inventory

(NRI) report, which will be released next year, after the statistical analysis is completed, covers 800,000 sample points and 170 data elements. Every five years, NRCS conducts the NRI to provide a progress report of the land on national, state, and local watersheds, or other substate levels. This report offers landowners, legislators, and policymakers a record of the accomplishments that have been made in conservation as well as the problems that still exist.

## GT class presents teleconference

Clarendon's Eighth Grade Gifted and Talented Class presented a program entitled "The History of the Panhandle and Clarendon" to the Region XVI Technology Conference held in Amarillo on October 20 and 21. The students worked from the Teleconferencing Center at Clarendon Junior High, and the program was received at sites throughout the Panhandle.

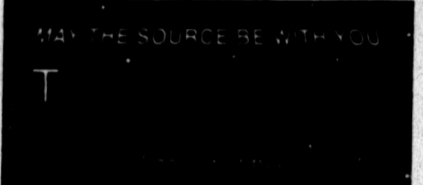

**Sharp announces new online filing for sales tax**

AUSTIN — State Comptroller John Sharp today announced a groundbreaking new service that will make sales tax filing easier for many Texans.

"With a few clicks, and a little typing, many sales tax payers can now file their returns on the World Wide Web," said Sharp. "WebFile allows certain businesses an easy, efficient, and fast way to file their sales tax return and avoid paperwork. It's easier for the taxpayer and more efficient for us."

It also puts the Texas Comptroller's Office in the lead nationally in using the World Wide Web for tax filing.

"As far as we can determine, we're the first state to do this," said Sharp.

The new WebFile Internet service follows the success of the Comptroller's TeleFile service, which allows taxpayers to file returns over a touch tone phone by calling 1-888-4FILING (1-888-434-5464). That ser-

vice began January 1, 1996.

During the last fiscal year, over 250,000 returns were filed that met WebFile criteria: short-form filers with no tax due and long-form filers who had no sales at any of their outlets.

Over 160,000 taxpayers now qualify to use WebFile, saving them postage, paperwork, and valuable time, and making it easier for the Comptroller's Office to process their return.

"We're always looking for ways to make the task of filing tax returns faster and easier," Sharp said. "This is another step in that ongoing process."

Those with Internet access can go to the Comptroller's Window on State Government Web page and file their return any time, 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

"Two years ago we did a taxpayer survey and found almost a fourth of our taxpayers had Internet access," said Sharp. "That figure is at least up

to 50% by now, so we've made it as easy as possible for them to send us their tax information."

The Comptroller's office is getting the word out to taxpayers to encourage them to use this new system.

"We'll be doing a stuffer in pre-printed returns later this year, letting taxpayers know about this in time for our big filing peak time in January," said Sharp. "We expect more will participate as they became aware of how easy it is to file."

Other services offered on the Comptroller's Window on State Government Web page include: the Certificate of Account Status, which allows citizens to check on the status of corporate taxpayers; downloadable forms; contact addresses; lists of field offices; extensive help pages; and much more.

Clarendon College's Joel Zehr was named recently the 1998 Women's Basketball Coach of the Year by the National Small College Athletic Association (NSCAA).

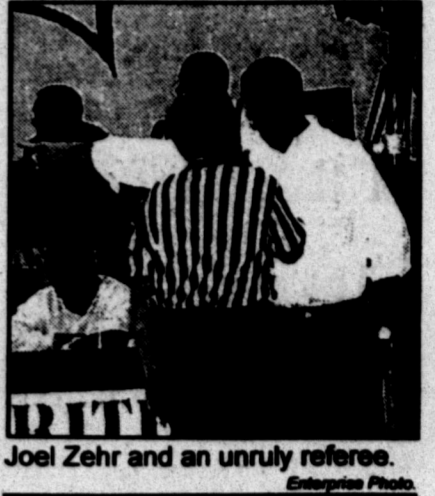
This is the second year in a row that Zehr has received this honor.

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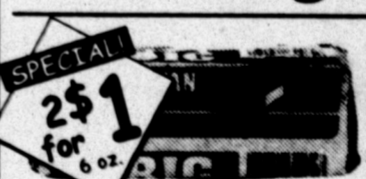

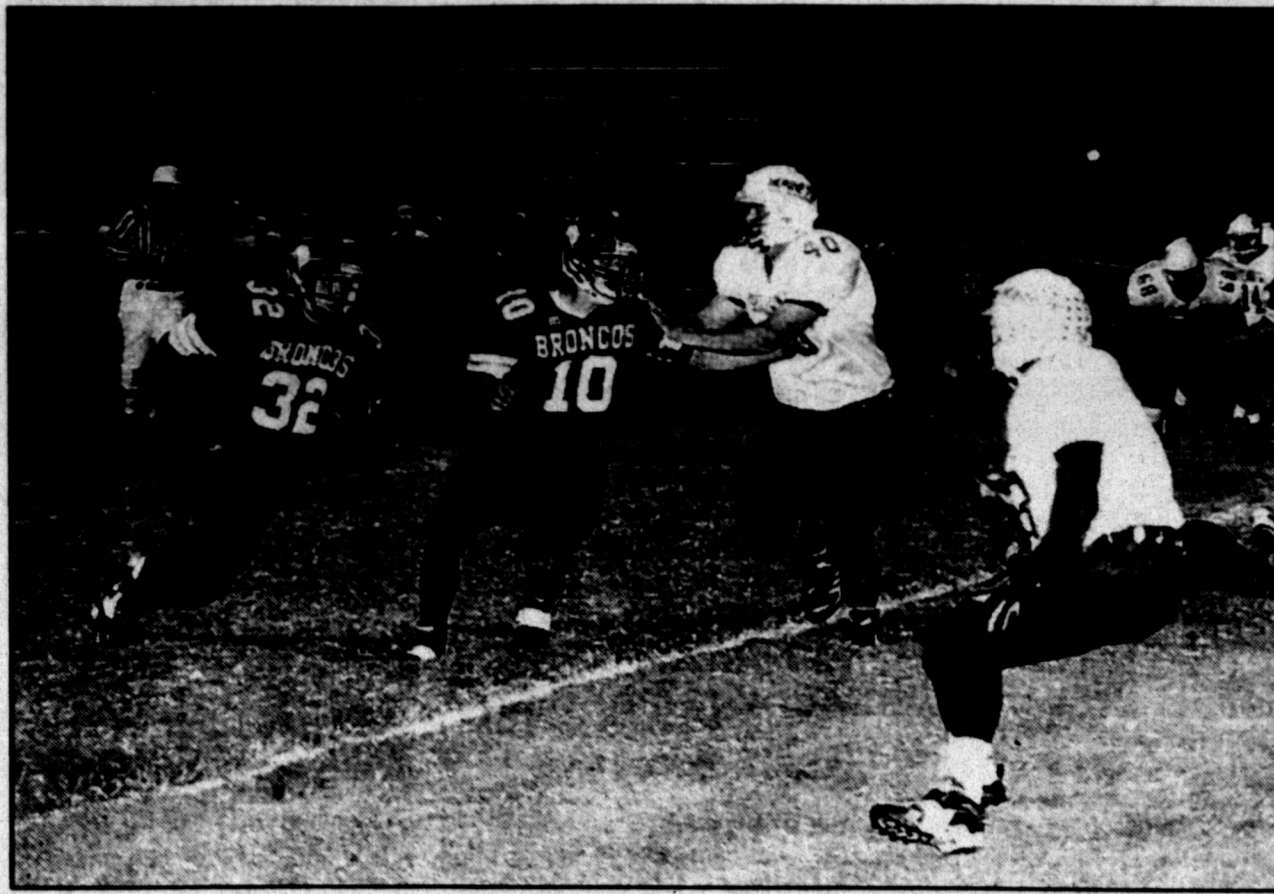
Thompson also scored a second touchdown for the Broncos on a five-yard pass from Floyd. Cael Shields ran the ball in for the two-point conversion.

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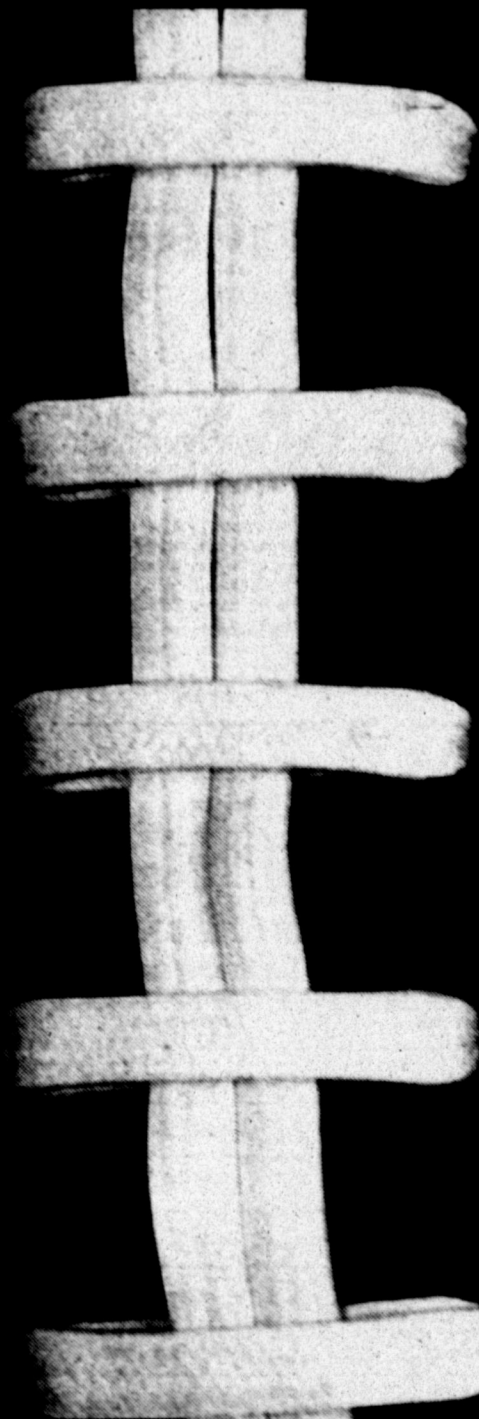
