Bronchos rally to beat Shamrock

For the second week in a row, the Clarendon Bronchos rallied from behind to win in the 4th quarter. Trailing the Shamrock Irish 14-13 with 4:30 left in the game, Nose Guard Bret White intercepted an Irish pass to give the Bronchos offense one more chance. Facing a 3rd and 10 from the Irish 32 vd. line Byron Howell hit Johnny Gaines with a perfect pass with 3:11 to play to seal the Broncho victory 20-14.

The contest was the first District game this season and improved Clarendon to 6-0 and 1-0 in District play. Shamrock dropped to 2-3-1 and 0-1 in the District race

The Bronchos began the game looking as if it would be another high scoring offensive show. The first three Broncho possessions produced two TD's in the 1st quarter. After holding the Irish on downs the Bronchos took over and immediately went to work. On the Irish 36 vd. line behind the running of QB Dyron Howell, Glenn Weatherton, and Rodney Smith the Bronchos moved the ball to the 20. The Bronchos jumped to a 7-0 lead on a 20 vd. TD_scamper by Glenn Weatherton and the extra point by Arlis Thomas.

The Broncho defense again held Shamrock on downs and forced a punt. The Broncho offense took over on the Irish 39 vd. line. With Rodney Smith covering 31 vds. on three carried the Bronchos scored again, this time Rodney carrying the final 4 vds. for the TD. The extra point attempt failed and the Broncs led 13-0 at the end of the 1st quarter. -

But Shamrock controlled the scoring from that point. The Irish recovered 4 Clarendon fumbles (something the Broncs have not been bothered with this year) and used the first one to set up their first score.

That came in the second period on an 8 vd. TD pass from RandalLHugg to Ed Luna. The pat kick failed, and Clarendon led 13-6 at halftime. Shamrock took the lead in the 3rd quarter when Hugg connected with Jamie Knoll on an 11 vd. pass play, then Rick Walden ran successfully for 2 extra points.

That point production put the Irish ahead 14-13 setting up Clarendon's final scoring heroics late. in the contest.

Rodney Smith led the Broncho attack, rushing 21 times for 172 yards. Glenn Weatherton also added 67 yards on 11 carries. The Broncho offense produced 291 vds. total offense while holding the Irish attack to 181 total vards. The Bronchos defense limited Shamrock to only 63 yards rushing.

The Game-Panhandle is in town

After a very shallow game with Shamrock, the Broncs were never in a more flat state of being, which all boils down to the same state of the mind as the schools, townspeople, area people and even the coaches. Looking Ahead -- Wanting to play Panhandle Panthers.

The 'Cats are ranked No. 1 in some polls, No. 2 in others and No. 3 in others. This ranking has several effects on the teams that Panhandle plays. It frightens some teams, it intimidates others and like Memphis (Panhandle beat them 20-0) it brings out a inner feeling of wanting to play even harder.

The effect that these rankings will have on Clarendon is unknown to many other teams. It is a feeling that we want to get after Panhandle, not because of it being higher than our ranking but the fact that Panhandle has one of the best programs in this area.

Panhandle defeated the Bronco's 49-7 Jast year and their fans were wanting more. There is a feeling in the air when Panhandle and Clarendon do their thing. Clarendon may not be a rival as one of the Panhandle coaches stated but the Bronchos will want to prove they are a better team than what the score 49.7 indicated last year.

The game is a match-up of 2 undefeated, highly explosive offenses and stingy defenses with very balanced kicking games.

The offenses are scoring at a 34 ponts per game for Panhandle and Clarendon 32 p.p.g. The defenses are average 2 pts. per game for Panhandle and 6 points per game for Clarendon.

Panhandle is led offensively by a very big set of back and probably the fastest in the state. Stacy Rust 6'2" 190 lb. TB who anchored the state champion 1600 meter relay last spring. Wes Wood 6'2" 185 lb. FB who may be the most versatile athlete in the state. Tadd Lamberson a 6'2" 200 lb. quarterback who threw the shot 52 feet last spring and is a four year starter as are the other two backs. Kevin Powers is the best receiver in the district. He is the main man that Lamberson will go to on a passing down.

The Panther offensive line does an excellent job of opening holes for the backs and are just as effective when protecting the passer.

As good as they are offensively, they are better defensively. The quickness, strength, and physical aggressiveness makes them very hard to beat.

There are ten starters that go both ways and handle all of the speciality teams responsibility. So if a team is truly outstanding, then the Panhandle Panthers are in that class. On the other side of the field, we have the under dog - the Bronchos. They are not that heavily ranked, not that big, not that fast but they are a team that must be recknoned with. The intensity is of the same degree as the 'Cats. The desire to excell is greater, the self-discipline is greater and the fact that the Bronchos have that one thing the 'Cats don't, won't or know about -- "MAROON MAGIC".

Roaring 20's Reunion October 15 and 16



DRUGS CAUSE CONSTIPATION

Although most constipation. is probably due.to insufficient fiber in the diet, some constipation may occur with use of certain drugs. Drugs taken for short periods of time as well as long periods of time may cause constipation. Both prescription and nonprescription products have been implicated.

am-containing antacids are a chief. offender particularly among the elderly. To help prevent constipation, manufacturers often combine this medicine with magnesium hydroxide to reduce constipating effects.

Atropine-like drugs cause a reduction in the movement of the intestines and, hence, can produce constipation. Many of the drug products used to control stomach spasm are related to atropine and may cause constipation.

Antidepressants and drugs used to control. Parkinsonism have side effects similar to atropine and, therefore, may also cause constipation.

Narcotic pain relievers such as codeine and morphine cause a reduction in-movement of the intestines and frequently produce constipation. (Narcotics are sometimes used to control diarrhea due to this side effect.)

MISTRAL'S DAUGHTER by Judith Krantz, on and off the best seller list since publication earlier this year, may be described as merely a good book in comparison with her scintillating first novel, SCRUPLES, and her glittering star-quality second novel, PRINCESS DAISY

. No one today is as good a story teller about women, clothes, fashion, houses and designers, little shops, big stores, drop-dead parties, places to eat, Hollywood, TV productions and the horse, yacht and jet set. She is similar to a friend returning from a world unknown to yourself and relating all the things you have wanted to hear about, but didn't know anyone to ask.

. Krantz, who.lives in Beverly Hills, deserves all the good fortune that is coming her way. For years she practiced her craft by being a free lance writer for many of the national magazines. When her second and last son left home for college, she started her first novel. Her husband Steve, is a movie and television producer and encouraged her to write.

MISTRAL'S DAUGHTER is a novel about three women and one man. Three generations of women in one family loved Mistral, a genius artist who is oblivious to everything but his canvas, paints and brushes. the story begins in Paris in the Twenties. The French Impressionists, Chanel, New York City, Ford and Powers. modeling agencies, fashion photographers, WWII, ancient Jewish ruins in France, tourist sites in France and Italy and Parisian high society are all in the book. The ruins and sites should have been omitted. the story definately drags here and those readers use to the fast pace of the author's style begin to get really bored. One felt as though ruins and family roots and the French countryside were being force fed us since apparently the author spent a pleasant vacation there and was determined to put it all in her book. Fause's anger at her father seems contrived. After all, she had accepted his actions towards her grandmother and mother without even a trace of ambivalence

In an interview after PRINCESS DAISY publication_rights to paperback and movie companies were sold for millions, Krantz said that she always wrote everything she knew in each book. She went on to say that she was completely

drained of all thoughts and ideas by the_time it was completed. Perhaps, she rested and napped a little in several places in the book while writing MISTRAL'S DAUGHTER, but two blockbusters and a boom in three years is plenty good.

Do check the book out at the library and read_it. It is enjoyable and a good story. You may nap and rest right along with the author and snap to attention when she does.
