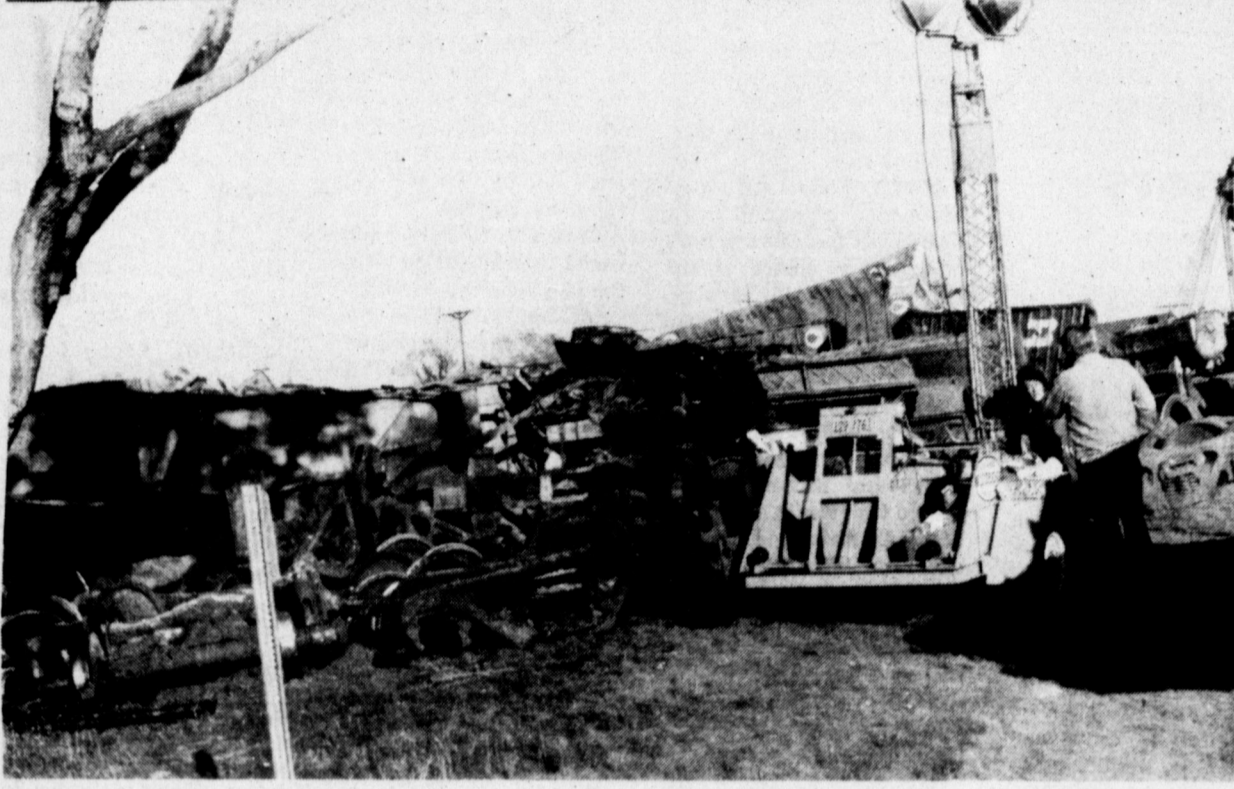

## 77 of 105 train cars derailed - no injuries

A southbound train derailed about midnight Saturday approximately 5 miles east of Goodnight. A half mile of Burlington Northern railroad track was ripped up when 77 of 105 cars, and 4 locomotive engines derailed. A spokesman at the site told the Clarendon Press,

there was approximately \$3 million in equipment damage. The train was traveling about 51 miles an hour when the accident happened. There were no injuries. The train was carrying mixed freight, but no hazardous materials. Wrecking crews from

Oklahoma City, Abilene, KS and Amarillo were working Sunday afternoon trying to clean the tracks, which spokesman estimated would be repaired by Tuesday.

## 'God's Prison Gang' film to be shown at First Baptist Church Nov. 20.

"God's Prison Gang," a newly released film featuring Al Capone's getaway driver, the last member of Bonnie and Clyde's gang and two other notorious criminals who have become Christians will be shown at Calvary Baptist Church, Highway 287 and Jackson on Sunday, November 20. The showing is scheduled to begin at 7:00 p.m.

The film, shot behind the walls of New York's Attica prison, is hosted by Art Linkletter. It tells the story of how the work of International Prison Ministry is accomplishing what more guards, higher prison walls and greater financial ex-

penditures have failed to do - keep released inmates from returning to lives of crime.

Telling their stories in the 44-minute film are George Meyer, Al Capone's favorite driver; Floyd Hamilton, (Public Enemy No. 1) the last of the Bonnie and Clyde Gang; Jerry Graham, the "robber king" of California; and Ted Jefferson, convicted of crimes from drugs and robbery to murder.

Also featured is "Chaplain Ray," whose Dallas-based International Prison Ministry has changed the lives of thousands of inmates over the past 18 years.

The Reverend Gary L.

Pinion, pastor of Calvary Baptist Church, said he hopes all citizens concerned

about the problem of rising crime will attend the free screening of the film.

## 13.2% of Donley County voters turnout in amendment election

Only 13.2 percent of the 2691 registered voters in Donley County exercised their right as Americans to vote in the Tuesday, Nov. 8 election of 11 constitutional amendments.

Statewide 10 of the 11 amendments passed, but in Donley County only four of the 11 carried. They were 1, 5, 6, and 7.

No. 1, to allow counties with less than 30,000 population to have fewer than the four justices of the peace now required. Voters in Donley County voted 219 for and 122 against.

No. 2, replacing the \$10,000 limit on urban homestead exemptions with a one acre limit, was voted down 127 for, 212 against.

No. 3, authorizing the Legislature to allow commodity boards to collect product assessments to help promote the commodity was voted down 140 for, 194 against.

No. 4, to establish a system that would keep the Legislature intact after an enemy attack was voted down, 151 for, 180 against.

No. 5 would permit the Legislature to take money from the Available Fund, which is the interest earned on the Permanent School Fund, to guarantee local school bonds. Voters in the county voted, 199 for, 139 against.

No. 6, allowing garnishment of wages for child support, passed with the highest county vote, 259 for 89 against.

No. 7, allowing the Veterans Land Board to issue \$500 million in state bonds to establish a Veterans Housing Assistance Fund, was the last of the amendments to pass in Donley County, 231

for, 106 against.

No. 8, which would provide for taxing units to exempt for taxation property of certain veterans and fraternal organizations was the only amendment which failed statewide. County voters also disapproved 122 for, 216 against.

No. 9, authorizing the

Legislature to allow probate court judges to substitute for county judges in probate matters failed 128 for, 200 against.

No. 10, which would authorize cities to relocate or replace sewers on private property, lost 92 for, 240 against.

No. 11, giving the Board of

Pardons and Paroles the exclusive right to determine which inmates should be paroled and taking the final authority away from the governor was the last of the amendments. It lost 165 for, 172 against in the county.

The total votes cast in the election in Donley County were only 352.

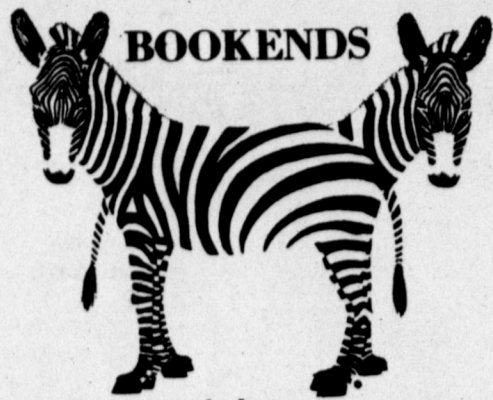

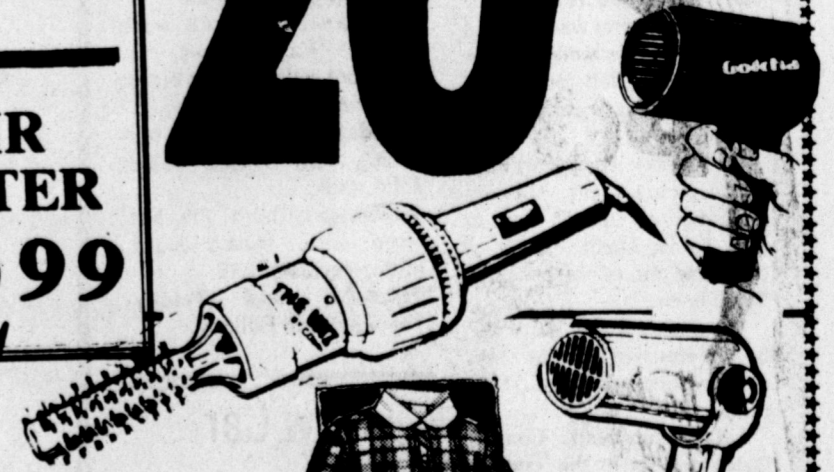

# "Pick a Phone, Any Phone?"



**Just because a phone will plug into your wall jack, it doesn't mean that it will work.**

**Why?**

Well, for instance, let's look at a phone that will be used on a party-line. Since customers share a common line to the telephone company switching office, each

phone has its own special ringing-cycle setting which allows the phone to know when it should ring on the party-line.

**Even if you have a 'Private Line', you still may have problems.**

Single-line customers may also have special dialing or ringing requirements that are not apparent. So, they purchase a new phone and sadly discover that it won't work. This is especially true for customers who may be

considering a cordless telephone or even a universal dialing telephone, a clock radio that offers telephone access capability or any other special telephone service.

**Trading in your dial phone could be asking for trouble.**

The joy of owning your very own 'Touch Tone' phone could turn into tragedy if your phone line is designated for a dial or pulse phone. A pushbutton 'pulse' phone will work on most lines, since it also duplicates the signal of a regular dial phone. However, a

'Touch Tone' phone emits a 'beeping' tone that requires special equipment to recognize the signal. Some dial phones, even if you have Touch Call Service, are not compatible under certain circumstances.

So, if you decide to buy a new telephone, take the time to stop by your neighborhood GTE Phone Mart and see if your particular line has any special limitations. It could possibly save you a lot of frustration and money.

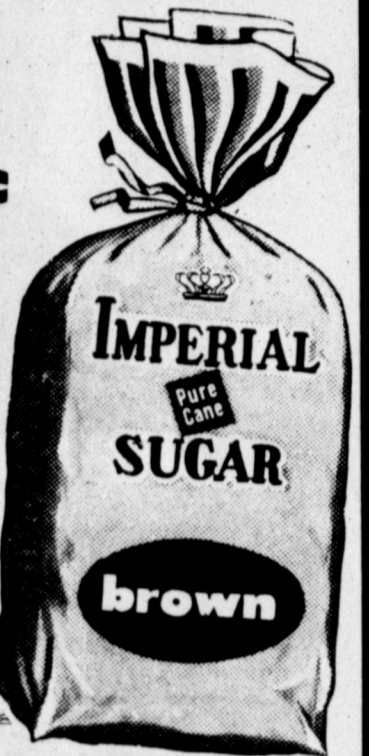

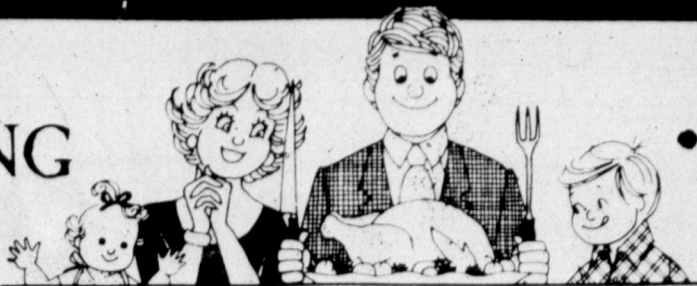

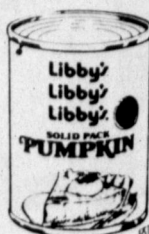

matron of honor. Terry Hilton, Sharon Bright, Deanna Bright and Sheryl Carter served as bridesmaids.

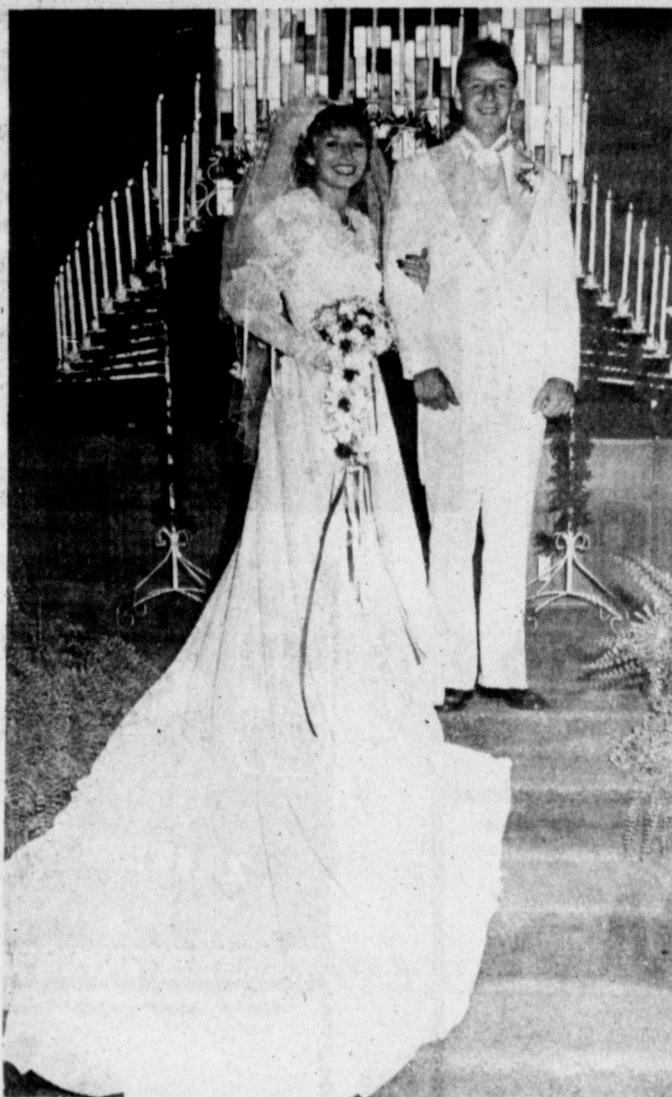

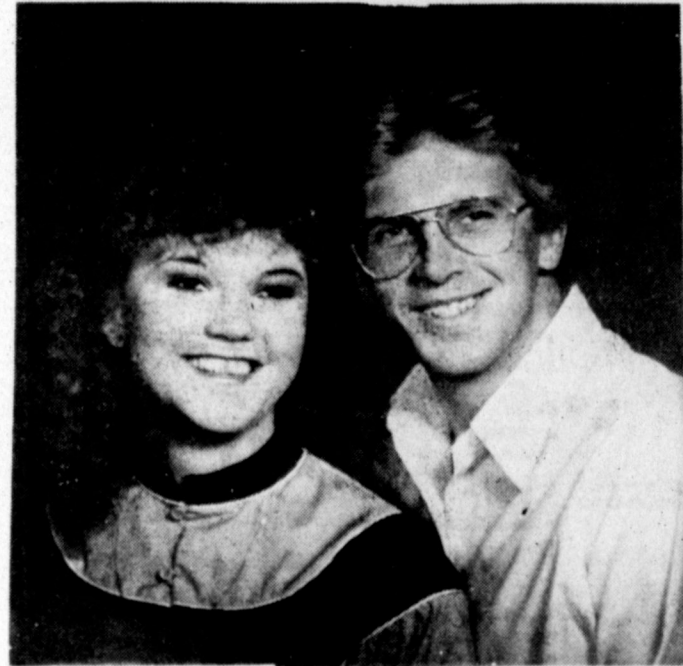

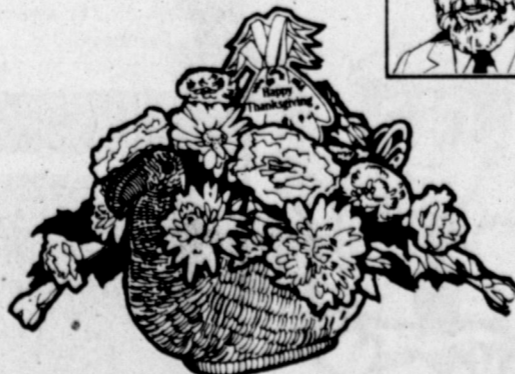

## Robertson attends conference

Patrick Robertson, of Robertson Funeral Directors in Clarendon was in Dallas, Texas on Thursday, November 10 to attend a conference which was a first in the funeral service industry.

The conference was a four hour videoteleconference which was broadcast live via satellite to more than forty cities in the United States and Canada. At the Dallas site there were over sixty funeral directors in attendance and over two thousand nationwide. A highlight of the conference was several call in periods where those in attendance could call in on a WATS line and have their questions answered by the panel. The teleconference began at 11:00 a.m. and ended at 3:00 p.m. and was held at the KERA-TV studios in Dallas. The program originated in Indianapolis, Indiana and had a panel of several funeral directors and experts in other fields such as lawyers and a representative of the Federal Trade Commission in Washington. It was sponsored by the Indiana Funeral Directors Association in cooperation with National Selected Morticians and the Order of the Golden Rule.

The conference covered several aspects of proposed new changes affecting the funeral service industry. Several years ago, the Federal Trade Commission began to become involved with regulations affecting the funeral service industry and what resulted were regulations designed to protect the consumer from questionable practices of some funeral homes. There were a few funeral homes and funeral directors whose practices and ethics were causing the consumer to have to pay exorbitant prices for funerals and the consumer had no choice because they did not know what options were available to them. The new regulations were designed to make the consumer more informed of his choices regarding funeral arrangements by requiring a funeral director to tell the consumer of these choices. The law also provides substantial penalties for those who do not comply. The FTC rule is scheduled to go into effect on January 1, 1984. The funeral service industry has challenged a part of the law which would drive up funeral prices and it is now in a court of law. If it is not overturned, it will go into effect April 30, 1984.

"The conference was very interesting and educational" stated Robertson. "It is interesting to note that none of the complaints received by the FTC came from this part of the country. Basically, the Texas State Board of Morticians has always been excellent policing any questionable tactics on the part of Texas Funeral Directors and our requirements have always exceeded other states. We have been in compliance with the FTC rule for some time and even exceeded their requirements. I don't foresee any problems with the rule except for the mountain of paperwork it created. It won't affect prices like it will some other places who haven't complied. In fact, there will be little, if any change for us here in Clarendon. I was glad to be a part of this first in the funeral service industry and to be able to exchange ideas with the other funeral directors there. I am always glad to learn anything which will help Robertson Funeral Directors serve their families better."
