



# 13.2% of Donley County voters turnouf in amendment election

Unly 13.2 percent of the 2691 registered voters in Donley County exercised their right as Americans to vote in the Tuesday, Nov. 8 election of 11 constitutional amendments Statewide 10 of the 11

amendments passed, but in Donley County only four of the 11 carried. They were 1, 5, 6, and 7.

No. 1, to allow counties with less than 30,000 population to have fewer than the four justices of the peace now required. Voters in Donley County voted 219 for and 122 against.

No. 2, replacing the \$10,000 limit on urban homestead exemptions with a one acre limit, was voted down 127 for, 212 against.

No. 3, authorizing the Legislature to allow commodity boards to collect product assessments to help promote the commodity was voted down 140 for, 194 against.

No. 4, to establish a system that would keep the Legislature intact after an enemy attack was voted down, 151 for, 180 against. No. 5 would permit the

Legislatire to take money from the Available Fund. which is the interest earned on the Permanent School Fund, to guarantee local school bonds. Voters in the county voted, 199 for, 139 against. No. 6, allowing garnish-
