That is far from an idle question. For, says the American Medical Association, there are 250,000 products in home use

which contain some form of poison. These serve necessary and desirable functions. But, on the debit side, 600,000 children manage to poison themselves each year, about 500 fatally.

These poisons include cleaning and polishing agents, detergents, cosmetics, paint, and a next-toendless list of other items. The best of all safety precautions is to keep them under lock and key. But that is not practical in many cases - so the AMA offers a number of precautions that should be kept eternally in mind: If your child takes something that is possibly poisonous, call a doctor at once - don't wait for developments. Never transfer poisons from their original, marked containers. Never leave a child alone when you're working with cleaners, polishers and other poisons - and wash contaminated utensils immediately. Give medicines only in a lighted room and discard old medicines no longer in use. When you get rid of hazardous materials, put them where children can't reach and rummage into them.

These rules are simple. They may prevent a terrible illnessand even death.

College Station - There are about ten million acres of land in Texas that should be producing forage for about one million head of grazing animals. G. O. Hoffman, extension range specialist, says this land can be found in the many abandoned fields that were once under cultivation.

If these old fields were put into forage production, it would mean a sizable increase in the income of many Texas farmers and ranchmen. In general, these old fields are producing only unpalatable weeds, brush and poor quality grasses, explains the specialist.

Getting these fields back into profitable production would require a certain amount of money and effort, but it would allow the operator to carry out a bet-

ter grazing and management program on other parts of the ranch or farm, points out Hoffman. Many of the abandoned cultivated fields are best adapted to only, adds Hoffman. Some may Generally, old fields west of the 30 inch rainfall belt should be
