The number of newly classified pesticides is still comparatively small but is increasing rapidly. More of them will be used as the growing population requires more intensive use of U.S. land. Many of these products will not be intended to destroy offending birds, fish or other animals since some of these forms of life are injurious only in limited environments and under special circumstances. Repellants would be intended to move the offenders from areas where they will cause harm, thus preventing damage without destroying the offenders.

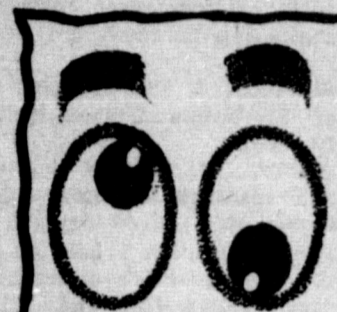
**PESTICIDE REGULATIONS ARE BROADENED**  
**COLLEGE STATION**  
Broadened regulations made effective recently bring under surveillance of the U. S. Department of Agriculture practically all chemicals and devices intended for destroying or repelling pests. An amendment to regulations for enforcing the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide and Rodenticide Act requires fully adequate labeling of several classes of chemicals which were not previously under the jurisdiction of the USDA.

Chemicals used to control many pests of animals and plants and certain viruses not formerly identified as pests under the law must now be registered. Manufacturers of these products must prove them to be effective and must label them adequately as to composition, directions for use and necessary precautions before they can be legally registered and marketed in interstate commerce.

Manufacturers of products already on the market but not previously regulated may apply for

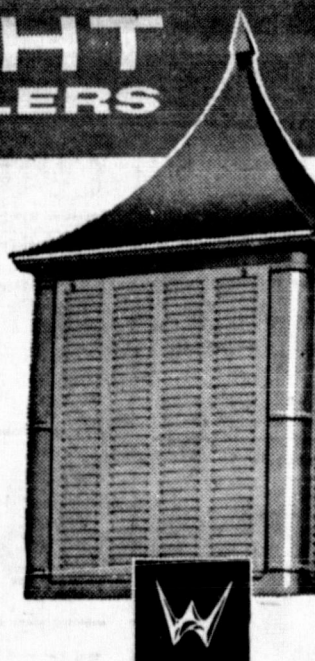

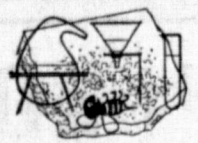

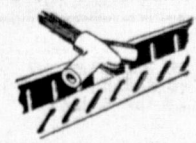

## Two Year Colleges Assuming Major Role In Higher Education

The two-year college is rapidly assuming a major role in America's system of higher education.

A generation ago, there were only a handful of junior colleges scattered across the country. At that time the combined enrollment of all of them was less than that of one medium size state University.

There are now about 700 fully accredited two year colleges within the United States. The total enrollment of the two year institutions has gone well beyond the 1,000,000 mark, or one out of every four students attending college this year are attending community junior colleges.

Around the turn of the century when the first junior colleges were established, they resembled regular four year liberal arts colleges in every respect except that they offered only freshmen and sophomore years of study. They were more or less private residential schools.

The early type of junior college still constitutes an important segment of the total educational system, particularly in the East. Of the nearly 700 junior colleges now operating in the nation, less than 300 are private institutions, a large number of which are fashionable girl's schools which can match prestige (and tuition) with any four year college.

However, the type of two year school which has grown most rapidly in recent years — and which seems destined to play an ever more important part in American education — is the so-called "community college".

The typical community college is a tax-supported public institution, which charges a very modest tuition (and in some states no tuition at all). Its stu-

dents live at home and commute to their classes. It has no dormitories or fraternity houses and frequently — no football stadium. It is more concerned with an adequate parking lot than with rolling acres of elm-shaded campus. Its entire plant may consist of one or two large classroom buildings.

One of the important elements behind this fantastic growth of community colleges is the attractiveness economically to both the student and the taxpayer.

The most recent studies that have been made regarding the cost per student who attends a residential college have placed the average cost per student at \$2,000 a year at public institutions and \$2,700 at private institutions. This study was made and these figures arrived at by the U. S. Office of Education. Furthermore, the study showed that the trend in college costs is steadily upward.

The student who lives at home and commutes to class can pare that figure sharply. Since the tuition fee in the community colleges is nominal, the cost of attending a two year community college need be only slightly greater than that of attending a public high school.

Because of their utilitarian design, community colleges can be built or expanded at far lower cost per student than residential colleges. This is no mean consideration to the U.S. taxpayer, who is faced with the need to double the total capacity of higher education facilities within the next 15 years.

All two year colleges — public and private — offer freshman and sophomore courses for students who intend to transfer in their junior year to a four year college or university.

However, one of the most attractive and important features of many private and nearly all public community colleges is that they offer a "terminal" and

or "vocational" course to students who have no intention of going on to get a bachelor's degree. This function cannot be carried out by the four year residential college because of their very nature and purpose.

VOCATIONAL COURSES are of growing importance, especially in community colleges which attract a large number of adult students. Many of these adult students are trying to prepare for skilled occupations or sub-professional careers while working at a full-time job and supporting a family. For their benefit, the typical community college schedules many of its classes at night.

California is way out ahead of all other states in the development of a public community college system. It now has 65 such schools, all tuition free. They enroll more than 400,000 students.

TEXAS with 35 public two year colleges and 15 private two year colleges is in second place,

followed by Wisconsin with 31, New York, with 20, and Illinois with 17.

Since 1951, through 1961, the past decade the community college enrollment has increased 150 per cent in the state of Texas. Our area community college at Clarendon has kept well ahead of that pace and has increased its enrollment well over 200 per cent.

The cost to the state and the taxpayer for the education of this rapidly increasing college enrollment by the two year community college at the present time is running about 2/3 of the cost per student by the four year residential college or university. By the same token the cost to the community college is running about 1/2 per school year of what it costs the student matriculating in the state college or university.

THIS GAIN in two year colleges over the nation has taken

place even though for years no state support was given to the junior college because the representatives of the four year colleges and the legislators feared it would reduce aid to the universities, and even now the state supports the junior college program only about 1/2 as much per student as it does for each student in four year colleges in the state of Texas.
