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



THE UNSEEN "HIGHWAY"

There's a "highway", which amounts to one of the great transportation systems of world history, which few of us ever of intricately-laid underground petroleum and natural gas pipe-

ported more swiftly and effi-Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Joe Baten ciently than ever before, no matcently completed her maiden voyage, carrying a load of 20,-356,000 gallons of heating oil and gasoline from Texas to New York.

There has been comparable progress in land transport. A recent development is a "bulgen-the-middle" design for rail cars, which permits a shell capacity of 30,000 gallons per car, three times that of an conventional tank car. Yet the car is only a few inches over 58 feet long. And pressurized cars carry big quantities of liquefied petroleum gas.

The whole idea is to get oil and its products to the consumer as quickly, efficiently, and economically as human ingenuity allows.

INSECT CONTROL

The average service station price of regular gasoline (excluding tax) in 1960 was only 4.5 per cent above the 1950 level. By way of contrast, average retail prices for all items rose 23 per cent over the same period and in many cases were much great-

Moreover, price is not the only arbiter of value. Quality is a big factor. And the gasoline consumer has been getting a continually improving product at prices that have not reflected the quality advance. For instance, between 1950 and 1960 U.S. refiners improved the average octane rating of both regular and premium grade gasoline by about 8 points. The motorist today can buy regular grade gasoline that has a higher quality than the premium gas of only five years ago - and at a lower price. Incidentally, it now costs the industry an average of about \$200 million for each increase of one number in the octane rating.

Finally, it will be noted that the comparisons carry the phrase "excluding tax". And that's a very important matter. The federal gas tax is 4 cents a gallon, and that of the states runs up to 8 cents. So, on the average, the tax equals about half of the pretax service station price of the fuel. If gasoline really is overpriced, this extortionately high tax is the cause of it.


