MOISTURE TOTAL RISES AS RAINS CONTINUE TO SOAK AREA

Thunderstorms continued their daily and nightly visits to the area the past several days dropping light to heavy amounts over parts of the county with the heaviest rainfall being reported Tuesday night.

The Country Club area received the heaviest amount Tuesday night with Leonard Putnam reporting 3.45 at the Club and Houston McDonald reporting 1.75 just north of the river. Willard Knox reported 2.25 at Lelia Lake; Ben Lovell reported 1.02 west of Ashtola; 1.60 was reported from Hedley and 1.44 was recorded here in town. Hedley has caught a total of 7.43 inches for the month of July with 2.88 being recorded here in town for the month although the 1.44 Tuesday night was recorded Wednesday, August 1st, since the weather station here is operated on a 24 hour basis. Otherwise our total might read 4.32 for the month. As the official reading now reads, we have 1.44 to start the month of August. More rain is forecast for the remainder of the week.

Farmers west and northwest of town were needing the moisture that fell Tuesday night, but other parts of the county are ready for a let-up so they can get into their fields and work the weeds out.

SERVICES HELD FOR BROTHER OF LOCAL LADY

Funeral services were held July 19th at Portales for Harvey Monroe Ray, 74, brother of Mrs. G. C. Heath of this City.

Mr. Ray, a longtime resident of Portales, N.M., died in a Clovis hospital July 18th.

Other survivors include another sister and a brother.

FARM NEWS

from County ASCS Committee

LOAN RATES

The 1962 Grain Sorghum loan rate for Donley County has been set at \$1.90 cents per hundred weight, farm stored basis No. 2 grade. No. 1 grain sorghum earns a premium. Grain Sorghum producers who participate in the 1962 Feed Grain Program will be eligible for price support on their 1962 eligible grain.

ADJUSTMENT CREDIT FOR EXCESS COTTON, CORN AND GRAIN SORGHUM

Farms with excess cotton and grain sorghum to be plowed up to comply with the farm allotment must remember that adjustment credit can be given only for areas of regular shape with not more than four sides. One side or one end of the disposition area shall be parallel with the rows or field boundary when the crops are destroyed in a square, rectangular, or trapezoidal pattern. This restriction may be disregarded when the area in an entire field is destroyed. If the cotton is destroyed in a skip row pattern the destroyed area will count as one plot. If you need to adjust, you must within 15 days from the date of your notice, request a revisit to the farm and pay a fee of \$4.00 per farm plus \$2.00 for each additional plot. In most respects, the 1962 Feed Grain Program is similar to the 1961 Feed Grain Program with the exception of the diverted acre line on the notice will include diverted acres combined for wheat, barley, corn and grain sorghum for the farm. If you have any questions about the notice be sure to contact the county office.

Cotton Insect Meetings Held In County

Two cotton insect control meetings were held by County Agent Flip Breedlove on Monday the thirtieth of July.

The first meeting was held at the West Texas Gin at Hedley at ten a.m. Breedlove opened the meeting and then introduced Mr. John Thomas, Extension Entomologist who discussed all phases of cotton insects and their control. Cotton fields near the gin area were visited and cotton inspected for insects to show farmers where to look for cotton insects.

At two p.m. a meeting was held at the county agent's office in Clarendon. After a discussion by Mr. Thomas for about thirty minutes the group visited the Lloyd Risley field on the John Knorpp farm.

This year is extremely favorable for the boll worm and all cotton farmers are warned to keep a close watch for the boll worm and to start poisoning when the worm is very small and you have as many as five percent of punctured squares in the field. In boll weevil, the case is different and poisoning should start when fifteen percent of the squares are punctured. Fifty-five farmers attended the two meetings and Mr. Thomas showed the difference in boll weevil damage and boll worm.

The Community Facilities Administration has approved a loan of \$59,300 for preliminary planning of the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority, according to a wire received Tuesday from Senator Ralph Yarborough.

"This is what we have been waiting for to complete our preliminary plans," said Dr. S. H. Townsend, president of the Authority.

The loan is interest free but must be paid back to the Community Facilities Administration when the bonds are voted for the project.

Dam site for the project is located about two and a half miles above the mouth of Whitefish Creek and below Lake Creek on the Salt Fork of Red River north of Hedley.

Water from the project, when it is completed, will be used by Clarendon, Hedley, Memphis, Childress, Paducah and Quanah. Other towns may vote into the project if they desire. Towns that have considered the project are Wellington, Shamrock and Crowell.

"This is the last large supply of useable surface water left in this area and there will be a surplus over present use of all the cities that are involved or could be involved," Dr. Townsend said.

Following the preliminary planning, engineers should be able to give Greenbelt directors a more accurate estimate on costs of the project.

"Heretofore all estimates have been general and not definite," Dr. Townsend said.

GIRL IS INJURED IN ACCIDENT ON SJ RANCH

Margaret Mathers, 14 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Mathers of Miles City, Montana, and granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. R. Word, was seriously injured Friday afternoon in an accident at the SJ Ranch where she and other members of her family have been visiting several weeks.

There were six young girls horseback riding, including the four Mathers sisters and Bari Amsberry and Mary Louise Caldwell. As they rode by a plumb thicket a rattlesnake frightened the horses and Margaret's horse bucked her off, and as Margaret was thrown, the horse fell also, kicking her in the mouth. Her jaw was broken in three places. She was rushed to Northwest Hospital in Amarillo, where she still remains, but is greatly improved, and recovering satisfactorily. She was in surgery three hours.

AUSTIN — In an effort to "prevent confusion to occupants, mailmen and the public" when the second of two sleek, pink marble State Office Buildings on the Capitol grounds is completed soon, the State Building Commission re-named them after famous Texas patriots.

First State Office Building — generally referred to as "S. O. B. No. 1" — now is designated as the Sam Houston State Office Building; the second, called

"S. O. B. No. 2," was named after John H. Reagan, first chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission and Postmaster General of the Confederacy.

LICENSING STUDY SCHEDULED — House Speaker James A. Turman named Rep. Will Smith of Beaumont chairman of a new Committee to study operations of Texas' Examining and Licensing Boards.

Reps. Sam Collins of Newton, Ben Atwell of Dallas, Don Gladfield of Fort Worth and Travis Peeler of Corpus Christi will serve on the committee.

Study group was set up to effect "an even greater understanding between the licensing boards and the Legislature," Turman said.

Objects of their research will be the 23 State examining and licensing boards organized for the purpose of testing every prospective practitioner of plumbing, law, cosmetology, medicine, barbering or hairdressing and 18 other professions and trades in Texas.

TEXTBOOKS PUBLICIZED — State Commissioner of Education J. W. Edgar sent a list of 203 textbooks, offered for adoption by Texas schools, to all county and independent school district superintendents, and recommended that the list be publicized so the public will know it's available.

Textbooks are those which the State Textbook Committee is studying for the 1963-64 school year. Number must be sifted down to 82 by October. This approved list then will be turned to the State Board of Education. Between September 1 and 15, the committee will hear any objections private citizens may have to the books. Last fall, there were plenty of protests.

Major complaint was that the objectors didn't know which books were being considered in time to examine them fully.

STRONG VOICE SILENT — When the Texas Railroad Commission held its monthly hearing to determine the August oil allowable, representatives from the major companies and independents were heard, but the strong voice of Commissioner Gen. Ernest O. Thompson was missing.

As one oilman after the other went up to urge a low eight-day allowable, no member of the Railroad Commission challenged them. If "the General" had been there, he might have done so, but he was seriously ill in his home in Amarillo.

PROPERTY TAX STILL LOW — The State's Automatic Tax Board kept to the lowest legal minimum when it set the State ad valorem tax rate for next year at 42 cents on each \$100 valuation.

Tax boards have kept the State's property "tax take" down to the minimum for several years now. It was up to 77 cents per \$100 valuation before a 30-cent general revenue tax was abolished in 1951.

Coke and Tom Green counties and the Dallas County Flood Control District are the only exceptions to the new rate. Rate is 30 cents in these three areas.

The 42-cent tax rate will provide 35 cents for free public school purposes; two cents for

Confederate and Texas Ranger pensions and the State Building Commission fund; and five cents for the college building fund.

SHORT SNORTS

While many other state departments were recommending increases in the biennial budgets, the General Land Office decided to ask for an \$82,000 cut. Commissioner Jerry Sadler said new electronic accounting equipment could get credit for the proposed cut.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson collected a \$185,873 judgement from the U.S. government to cover cost of re-routing 3.7 miles of F.M. Road 184 in Coryell County, which the federal government wanted to develop Fort Hood.

Members of the Texas Water Commission and the Water Development Boards have been conferring with the Governor's Water Conservation Committee to map out plans for conservation storage if the Constitutional Amendment on that subject passes in November.

Attorney General's office received three contributions from independent oil operators this week to help defray the cost of directional surveys to locate illegally-deviated wells in East Texas. General Crude Oil Company of Houston donated \$2,500; Goldston Oil Corporation of Houston \$1,000; and Vaughn Petroleum, Inc., of Dallas \$200.

LIBRARY NOTES

EDITH BARNES

A memorial has been given to the library in memory of Mr. Dewey Hendrix.

"The Taste of Ashes" by Bill Stern should be a must for everyone to read who is old enough to know what the word drug addiction means. It might be a good idea to re-read it ever so often.

This is a story of the rise and fall and the rise again of a famous man.

It is a stinging indictment against not only a small town Teague doctor but specialists from Dallas, who through sheer wanton neglect and criminal neglect for their patient caused him to lose his leg. This was the beginning then Bill Stern had the added misfortune to go to a specialist in New York who because of a sadist streak and the love of money deliberately made him a drug addict.

Quoting: "Although Bill Stern was constantly before the public, no one knew that behind the scenes he was waging a relentless war against drug addiction. No one knew the pain and anguish he suffered following a leg amputation, nor the disillusionment and despair that preceded the crackup. This frank, outspoken autobiography, tells the whole story, including the shocking details of the medical origin of his addiction."

"It is a revealing account, too, of his public life. You travel a longside of radio's brightest stars, meet famous personalities, and witness big moments of broadcasting history."

One very young reader gave the library a whole stack of children's books. They are like new and are books the youngsters will read. A young teen-ager gave four technical books.

Alec Waugh has written a lot of books since he began in 1917. Most readers will remember him for his "Island In the Sun." In his latest novel, "Fuel For The Flames" Mr. Waugh has used the exotic Orient for his setting.

It is a long, many characterized story but his characterizations are so vivid that you have no

trouble keeping them straight. Quoting: "Mr. Waugh handles brilliantly his political plots and counter-plots, but always entwined are the personal dramas of love and fear, of cowardice and courage; of the crown prince daring to love an English girl. . . . of the manager of the oil camp married to a girl half his age." Of course there are many more.

The theme of the book is important but the author always subordinates it to dramatic action.

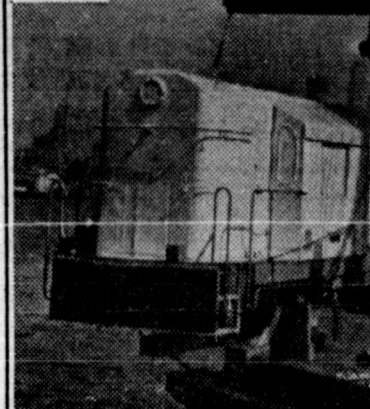

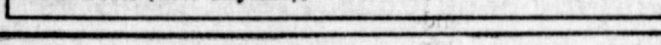

AMC Begins Operations

WASHINGTON (ANS) (AUG. 1, 1962)—The U. S. Army Materiel Command, under the command of Lt. Gen. Frank S. Besson, Jr., today assumed operational control of a nation-wide complex of military installations and activities engaged in developing, producing and fielding equipment and other types of materiel for the Army.

The Army Materiel Command (AMC) was established May 8, 1962 under the Army reorganization program. It is responsible for most of the materiel functions formerly performed by the Army's seven Technical Services, including research and development, procurement and production, storage and distribution, inventory management, maintenance and disposal.

AMC begins operations with a \$30 billion inventory and an anticipated annual expenditure of \$7.5 billion.

With headquarters in the Washington, D. C. area, AMC will operate through seven major subordinate commands and will direct the activities of depots, laboratories, arsenals, proving grounds, test ranges, procurement offices and transportation terminals throughout the continental United States.

Effective today, AMC assumed command of personnel and operations at these locations on an "in place" basis. All are expected to be phased into the new AMC organizational structure by 31 December 1962. Under the AMC concept of operations, AMC Headquarters will furnish over-all policy direction for AMC's far-flung operations, the major subordinate field commands will serve as the "mid-management level" to supervise performance, and the individual installations and activities will accomplish the actual execution of the Army's materiel program. AMC also will make maximum use of "vertical management" techniques, using project managers to expe-

dition development, production and delivery of selected major or critical weapons (equipment) systems.



In a message today to all AMC personnel, General Besson cited the establishment of AMC as "an unprecedented challenge and an unlimited opportunity."

"It is a challenge," General Besson explained, "because never before has it been so important that our Army have the finest possible weapons and equipment. It is an opportunity because never before has there been a single integrated organization specifically conceived and designed to provide the Army's weapons and equipment."

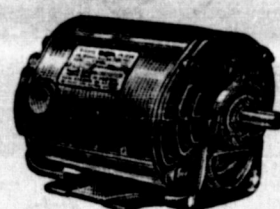

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

WHAT IS GPCP?

GPCP is the short for Great Plains Conservation Program. This program was created in order to help speed up conservation of soil and water in the 10 Great Plains States. These 10 states have designated counties and Donley County is one of them.

As to date Donley County has a total of 45 contracts which cover 94,289 acres. These acres are each receiving basic conservation treatment and are being treated within their capabilities. This represents about 16% of the total acres within the county. There are many more acres that need this basic treatment.

With the help of this program and other programs available we hope to obtain a more stable and better county in which to live. The purpose of the Great Plains Conservation Program is to help you as the land owner carry out a plan of operations that will help to minimize climatic hazards and protect your land from erosion and deterioration by natural causes. The program will help you solve difficult long-term land use and conservation problems on your farm or ranch. It will enable you to plan your farm or ranch operations so as to

minimize the hazards of weather extremes. It will enable you to make necessary changes in land use and shifts in types of operations. It will enable you to establish needed soil and water conservation measures with the help of Federal cost-shares that are guaranteed for a long period (up to 10 years).

You as a land owner or operator are eligible to participate in this voluntary program for the period needed to carry out a plan of operations.

The Donley County Soil Conservation District urges all land owners who have a need for this program to contact the local Soil Conservation Service personnel for a closer look at your problems, with the assurance of technical assistance in solving them.

Producers Benefiting From Screwworm Control Program

Although plans for the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program do not call for release of sterile flies in Donley County

at this time, Spencer Sitter, county chairman of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, pointed out that livestock producers already have benefited from fly release in South Texas and the real payoff will come with final eradication.

Flies are now being released within a 60,000 square mile area in Texas plus a 7,000 square mile area in southern New Mexico. This is below a line that runs from Del Rio northeast to Coleman, east to Comanche and Southeast to Port O'Connor.

"Producer funds are being used for eradication of this pest that has cost Texas producers \$100 million a year and not for a temporary control program," Sitter pointed out. "In order to free Texas of screwworms, cold weather must do the job outside the overwintering area of Texas and a concentrated release of sterile flies must do the job within the overwintering area, completed with the artificial barrier made up of sterile fly release astride the U. S.-Mexican border, and control of animal movement."

"Once screwworms have been eradicated from the overwintering area and the winter kills them back below this line, there will be no spread into Donley County," he added. "Eradication will come cheaper and quicker through this plan of operation."

"Although screwworms have spread over a large area of Texas, livestock producers in Donley County have experienced fewer cases this year due in a large part, to the work done in South Texas. Our livestock producers are already dollars ahead because their contributions made it possible to get the program underway last spring and to complete the production plant at Mission ahead of schedule," Sitter commented.

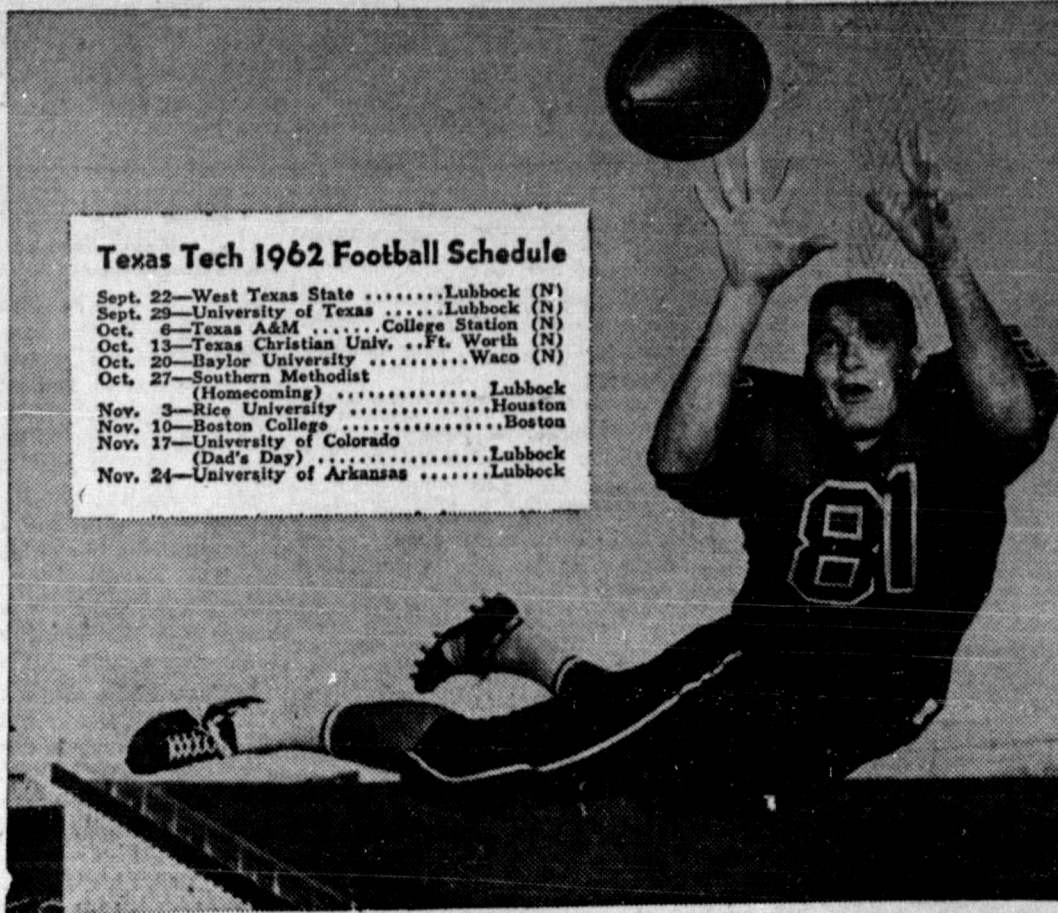
However, cold weather will dictate the size of the release area, but officials of the program,

which includes the Texas Animal Health Commission and the USDA's Animal Disease Eradication Division, believe that eradication can be achieved best by concentrating the release of flies within the overwintering area. Then it may be possible to extend the release area.

In the months ahead, it is even more important that producers in Donley County follow general screwworm management practices. This includes a regular spray program, close and frequent observation of all animals, pre-treatment of all wounds before they become infested with

screwworms, early and intensive treatment of screwworm infested animals and frequent retreatment. Producers also should continue to collect 10 worms from each wound for positive identification. These should be mailed direct to Box 969, Mission. You can get containers already addressed to that office by calling at the county agent's office.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section authorizing the creation of two (2) hospital districts in Brazoria County, one to include all or part of the West Columbia, Brazoria and Damon Independent School Districts and the other coterminous with the Sweeny Independent School District, providing for a possible consolidation of the two, providing a mode of funding and also authorizing construction, equipping, maintaining, and financing of a home for the aged in Titus County.

authorized and empowered to levy, assess and collect a tax not exceeding twenty-five cents (25c) on the one hundred dollar valuation of taxable property in said County in any one year for the purpose of paying the principal and interest on any bonds issued by said County for the purpose of constructing and equipping a home for the aged in the aged persons in said County and to pay the maintenance and operation expenses thereof, provided said bonds and tax shall have been authorized as a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas by a majority of the qualified electors of Titus County, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, voting at said election. This provision shall be self-enacting and no enabling legislation hereunder shall be required. Any bond issued hereunder shall be issued in accordance with the General Laws except as herein otherwise provided.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding thereto a new Section to read as follows:
"Section 10(a). The Legislature may authorize the creation of two (2) hospital districts in Brazoria County, one of which shall include all or part of the West Columbia, Brazoria and Damon Independent School Districts and the other coterminous with the Sweeny Independent School District, providing for a possible consolidation of the two, providing a mode of funding and also authorizing construction, equipping, maintaining, and financing of a home for the aged in Titus County. . . ."
Such districts, if created, may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed twenty-five cents (25c) on the one hundred dollar valuation of taxable property within the districts, provided no tax may be levied or collected by a majority vote of the qualified electors of the district, and the change of rate exceed twenty-five cents (25c) per one hundred dollar valuation. . . ."
The maximum tax rate submitted shall be sufficient to discharge such obligations, liabilities, and responsibilities, and to acquire, construct, maintain and operate the hospital system, and the Legislature may authorize the district to issue tax bonds for the purpose of the acquisition, construction, purchase, repair or renovation of improvements and initially equipping the same and such bonds shall be payable from said twenty-five cent tax.
(b) In addition to all other ad valorem taxes authorized under this Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas, Titus County is hereby

authorized and empowered to levy, assess and collect a tax not exceeding twenty-five cents (25c) on the one hundred dollar valuation of taxable property in said County in any one year for the purpose of paying the principal and interest on any bonds issued by said County for the purpose of constructing and equipping a home for the aged in the aged persons in said County and to pay the maintenance and operation expenses thereof, provided said bonds and tax shall have been authorized as a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas by a majority of the qualified electors of Titus County, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, voting at said election. Section 2. Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.
