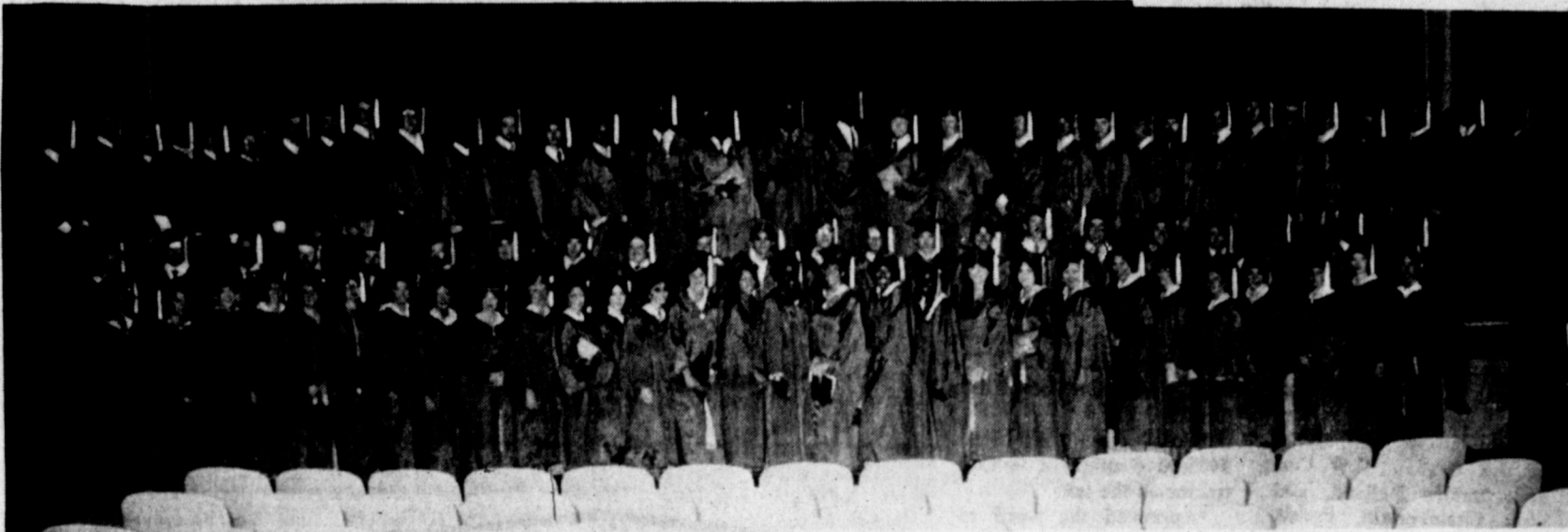

THE CLARENDON FIRE DEPARTMENT may have averted another tragedy by responding swiftly to a call about noon on Tuesday. A travel home belonging to Mr. and Mrs. Hodges of Chandler lost their gas tank, spelling

gasoline all over the highway. The Hodges were travelling with Mr. and Mrs. Tom Sullivan from Jacksonville on a four month vacation to Flat Head, Montana fishing. The fire department washed down the highway keeping the gas from igniting.

Fire Department telephone number has been changed

With arrival of the new telephone books, Clarendon residents will notice that the Fire Department number has been changed from 874-3755 to 874-3533. The old phone number will soon be disconnected and local residents should make note of the new number immediately and begin to use it now.

With this new change, all calls will be coming into the Donley County Jail and will be dispatched through there

radio. This number is also the same for the Sheriff's Department and the Highway Patrol. It should also be used to request an ambulance as they have the capability to dispatch EMS personnel via pagers directly from the jail. The number at the funeral home will not be disconnected but Clarendon folks can get used to having one number for Fire, Law Enforcement, and Emergency Medical Services.

This change should greatly simplify things and will eliminate the need for persons to have three or four numbers by their phone. It should also eliminate the need to make a decision on the specific service they need and has the advantage of eliminating multiple requests involving several agencies such as occurs in an accident, for example, where law enforcement, EMS, and Fire Rescue are all required. With just one call, all of these can be dispatched simultaneously.

This change affects Clarendon only. Hedley and Howardwick residents should look up their emergency numbers in the front of their directories and know them.

Callers should be ready to

provide the following information when calling: Name, address and/or location, nature of the problem, the phone number they are calling from, and any other information the dispatcher requests. Please do not be impatient. The dispatcher is trained to obtain certain information and in many cases, an extra 30 seconds to one minute on the phone will not

cause the problem to become any worse and can save personnel a great deal of time in trying to locate the problem. Please try to stay calm and do not hang up until told to do so.

Remember to note the new changes. In Clarendon for Law Enforcement, Fire, Rescue, and Emergency Medical Services the number is 874-3533.

Irish Dexter Cattle

In 1912 the first Irish Dexter cow stepped off of a ship onto United States soil. Since then, few have bred this exciting little cow because it seems so small to make money. However, since it eats 1/3 the amount of feed and takes less space to keep one and produces more milk, it seems that their small size would not make much difference.

These little cattle stands about 39" tall and a cow will weigh 650 lbs. while a bull will weigh as much as 800 lbs. They are short of leg between the knee and fetlock which accounts for much of their smaller size.

Irish Dexter cattle are very healthy and can tolerate great extremes of temperature and winter well on roughage. They are remarkably free from tuberculosis and mastitis. The first calf can be produced within the second year with eight calves the average, however 14 offspring are not uncommon.

They were originally a mountain breed for small plots in Ireland. They need only 3/5 of the same amount of food required by an aver-

age 1,200 lb. dairy cow. Twice as many Dexters can be carried on the same area as animals of a larger breed.

They are very placid and easily managed. In fact, they were used aboard ships to furnish a supply of fresh milk to many immigrants.

Cecil Munden swears that they are also housebroken. "I've had mine five months and keep them in the barn. They just won't mess up their barn, they go outside."

The bull is as gentle as a lamb and easily managed.

They are excellent milkers averaging a yield of 400-600 gallons a year. They would be ideal for those with small acreage who want a milk cow but don't have space or are afraid of wrestling with cattle. They are gentle enough that they wouldn't bother children or pets if kept in a large yard. They could easily produce the families milk, keep the garden in fresh manure, keep the grass and weeds down and be a great pet. You could probably train them to pull a cart in the July 4th parade.

Bonds Passed

Among the flood of bills passed by the Legislature and sent to the Governor during the final hectic week of the session was a landmark measure authorizing the issuance of tax-exempt "Agricultural Development Bonds" to fund low-interest loans to farmers wishing to build facilities to process and market their own agricultural products.

The proposal was developed and drafted by Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower and introduced by Sen. Ted Lyon (D-Rockwall). Rep. Bruce Gibson (D-Godley) sponsored the legislation in the House.

Hightower made it clear during the session that he considered the proposal a top priority. "A decade ago, farmers were getting 37 cents out of every dollar consumers spent for food," he said. "Today, our farmers are getting just 28 cents out of that dollar. Between the time an agricultural product leaves the farm and when it arrives on our dinner table, the middlemen take that other 72 cents for processing, packaging, marketing and transportation. If our farmers can start moving into those areas of the food chain, they can start pocketing some of that 'value added' money and recapture a bigger share of the consumer food dollar. And we're hopeful that this legislation will help farmers all over Texas do just that."

As examples of the type of projects that might be funded by the bonds, Hightower pointed to two producer-owned chili pepper processing plant that makes chili powder and paprika. Additional possibilities include plants to turn grain into fuel alcohol for use in gasohol, a plant to turn the farmer's 8c/lb. onions into \$1.39/lb. packages of onion rings, rancher-owned slaughter facilities and meat markets, and grape grower-owned wineries.

"Right now, there is very little food processing done here in Texas," Hightower said. "processing facilities like these will generate a profit for our hardpressed farmers and keep those value-added dollars here in Texas."

The Lyon/Gibson bill allows county authorities to issue the bonds. They would not be backed or guaranteed by the state, but the tax-exempt status will make development loans available at below-market interest rates, Hightower said.

PINEAPPLE APRICOT CONSERVE

A rich, thick conserve that's delicious on toast, as a topper for ice cream or an accompaniment to roast pork loin.

Perfect for gift-giving—make this conserve early in the fall and seal in pretty containers ready to use as a gift on the spur of the moment.

1 pound dried apricots
2 cups water
3 medium-size oranges
1 can (20 oz.) Dole Crushed Pineapple in Syrup
2 cups sugar

Simmer apricots in water until soft and most of water is absorbed, about 20 minutes. Grate 3 tablespoons peel from oranges. Peel oranges, removing white membrane. Cut fruit in sixths and remove seeds. Purée apricots and orange pieces in blender. Turn into large kettle; add undrained pineapple, orange peel and sugar. Simmer over low heat until thick, about 6 to 8 minutes, stirring frequently. Spoon into jars, cover and

refrigerate (or seal in sterilized jars). Makes about 2 quarts.

Senator Sarpalius successfully fought against a bill which would have brought most farmers and ranchers under the state's Worker's Compensation Law. The Senator filibustered against the legislation for more than two hours Monday night. Senator Sarpalius filibustered for more than nine hours Friday night, when the bill was first introduced in the Texas Senate, by Senator Hector Uribe of South Texas.

Senator Sarpalius opposed the legislation despite strong lobbying efforts to pass the bill and despite Agricultural Commissioner Jim Hightower's support of the bill. Proponents of the legislation said the bill would affect a small percentage of Texas farmers. However, a large number of Panhandle farmers, who would have been affected by the bill, disagreed. "The bill would have hurt at least 30 to 40% of all Texas farmers," Senator Sarpalius said.

The Senator's filibuster forced final defeat of the bill. "I'm happy the farmers of this state won an important victory Monday night. If the bill had gained approval, it would have forced some Texas farmers out of business," Senator Sarpalius said.




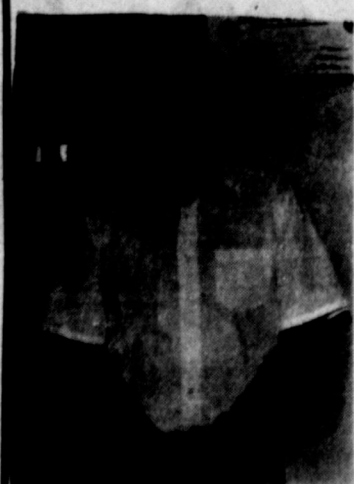

Over 30 million Americans experience difficulty digesting milk and milk products. Milk contains lactose... a sugar which is normally broken down in the intestines by an enzyme called lactase. Many people lack this enzyme or do not produce a sufficient amount to break down the milk sugar. This condition is known as lactose intolerance.

Lactase deficiency is usually inherited.. It is relatively common in Orientals, Blacks, Indians, and people of Mediterranean origin. Lactose intolerance is characterized by abdominal swelling, cramping, a bloated feeling, gas, and diarrhea.

Symptoms can be prevented in one of two ways. First, dairy products can be eliminated from the diet, or eaten in small quantities. The amount of dairy products in baked goods, for example, often produces no ill effects. Second, a commercial preparation of lactase enzyme may be eaten.. The enzyme may be added to milk and refrigerated for 24 hours thus causing the lactose to be broken down. Or the enzymes may be added directly to food or simply swallowed via capsules.. Lactase enzyme preparations may be purchased without prescription and enable individuals with lactose intolerance to eat dairy products with no ill effects.

Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum

"Here Come the Brides," an exhibit of bridal fashions, opens at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum on Saturday, June 11.

The exhibit will use the Museum's collection of wedding dresses, groom's clothing, trousseau items, and accessories to interpret wedding attire and customs over the last hundred years, according to JoAnne Arasim, the Museum's Curator of Textiles.

"The bridal exhibit will feature typical wedding fashions from 1876 through

1983," said Arasim. All of the clothing is from the permanent historic fashion collection of the Panhandle-Plains Historical Society, she added.

The exhibit cases in the Museum's Hall of Historic Fashions have been redesigned to reflect decades in the past hundred years of fashion history, said Carol Cline, the Museum's Curator of Exhibits. In addition to bridal clothing, each case contains period furniture and decorative arts illustrating the interior styles of each

era. All of the art, furniture, and artifacts are from the Society's collections, Cline said.

The wedding dresses are all examples of typical attire in each decade, said Arasim. "For instance, one of the outstanding examples of bridal fashions in the 1890's is the dress that was worn in 1897 by Grace Dow Bugbee. A good example of 1920's fashions is the dress worn by Oliver Rea Eakle Barfield, who married in Amarillo in 1925. This dress was designed in Paris by the House of Worth. It's embroidered in silver beads and pearls," she said.

"The 1940's is represented by Ruth Moore's dress, which was handmade by the groom's mother, who was a dressmaker in Raton, New Mexico. It's typical of the '40's because of the slender silhouette, the peplum ruffle around the hips, and the points on the sleeves," Arasim said.

One case is devoted to trousseau items from the 1892 wedding of Susan Rector to James Rutherford. The entire trousseau--shoes, dresses, hosiery, handkerchiefs, and so forth--is displayed.

A groom's case contains men's full dress suits, one worn in 1911 and one worn in 1929. Another case is devoted to brides' second day or "going away" dresses of the 1880's, 1920's, and 1940's.

The new exhibit will also deal with some of the little-known facts about the origin and meaning of several bridal traditions, said Arasim. "Some of the earlier gowns were in color, rather than white," she said. "Mrs. Austin's dress, for instance, is brown silk and velvet. She was married in 1876. Also on display is a dress from 1886, which is maroon satin and velvet." Arasim added that that white wedding gowns became traditional after



1900. "Here Come the Brides" Museum in Canyon and will continue through the summer. Museum hours are 9 to 6 Monday thru Saturday and 2-6 Sunday.
