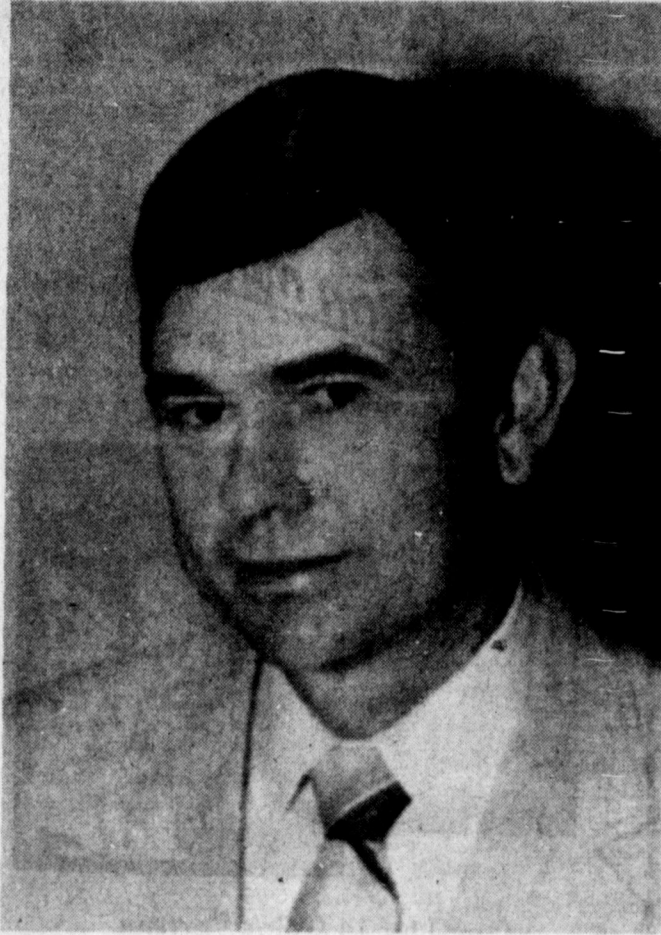

Ronald Gooch Receives Honor

Ronald Gooch of Clarendon, Donley County Extension agent for the past 18 years, has been named to receive the Distinguished Service Award, the highest recognition given by the National Association of County Agricultural Agents (NACAA).

The award is presented annually to county agents throughout the nation who have made outstanding contributions to agriculture and improved living, says Wood County Extension Agent Johnny Gates, president of the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association (TCAAA).

Gooch is one of eight county agents with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, to receive the award. Others (and their counties) are Gordon L. Ford, Hopkins; Johnnie Cooper, Fort Bend; Sam Kuykendall, Menard; Glenn Huddleston, Anderson; William L. Schumann, Comal; Richard A. Spencer, Fisher; and Robert D. Adamson, Hansford.

Texas award winners will be recognized at the TCAAA annual meeting August 7-10 at Wichita Falls. Actual presentation of awards will be at the NACAA meeting October 8-13 at Wichita, Kan.

Gooch began his Extension career in Wheeler County in 1962 and later served in Moore County. Several years later he transferred to Harrison County and then was appointed to his present position in 1965.

While in Donley County he initiated many educational programs in brush and weed control, cotton insect control,

crop varieties, soil fertility and beef cattle selection.

Gooch was instrumental in organizing an annual farm tour which highlights his crops demonstration program. Numerous pasture and range field days and tours also have been held to show results of weed and brush control, new grass varieties, grass fertilization and rotational grazing systems.

He was responsible for organizing a goldaster weed control task force to provide leadership in research and result demonstration work regarding this range weed.

The county agent also has developed a strong 4-H program in Donley County and helped create the Donley County 4-H Parent-Leader Association. An outstanding 4-H livestock program has flourished under Gooch's leadership, with numerous 4-H'ers exhibiting award-winning steers and heifers at major livestock shows.

Gooch holds a bachelor's degree in animal science from Oklahoma State University and a master's degree in agriculture from West Texas State University.

New Title and registration fee

Senate Bill 288 has posted the following increase in title and registration fees. Effective date of the bill is September 1, 1983.

The fee for obtaining a Duplicate License Receipt is increased from \$1.00 to \$2.00.

The title application fee is increased from \$3.00 to \$10.00 of which the first \$5.00 shall be retained by the County and the remaining \$5.00 shall be remitted to the State.

The fee for issuing a transfer registration receipt is increased from 50c to \$2.50, and delinquent transfer penalty for failure to apply

The fee for procuring a Certified Copy of the Original or Duplicate Original Texas Certificate of Title is increased from 25c to \$2.00.

The annual \$10.00 registration fee for Parade License Plates has been eliminated.

for transfer of title and registration within 20 working days is increased from \$5.00 to \$10.00. The County shall retain one half of the transfer fees and penalties and remit the remaining one half to the State.

10th Annual 4-H Congress

Theme of the 10th annual congress is "Celebrate Citizenship."

A special 75th 4-H Anniversary Celebration the last evening will conclude the Congress program.

Donley County earning title of Shorthorn Capitol of the Southwest

Donley County is quickly earning the title of Shorthorn Capitol of the Southwest. The breed is certainly on the move westward at this time and with its economically desirable traits much in demand by cattlemen.

July 6-11 Texas Shorthorn breeders hosted the National Junior Shorthorn Heifer Show and Youth Conference in Amarillo. This was the first time ever the National Junior Heifer Show had been held west of Kansas City, Missouri. Junior exhibitors from 12 states made the journey with top heifers of the breed to exhibit in Amarillo. They traveled from as far away as Oregon and Washington to the west, to South Carolina and Kentucky in the Southeast and Wisconsin and Indiana in the north-east.

Wednesday, July 6th, 7M Irish Shorthorns owned by James McAnear Jr and family hosted an open house tour and hamburger supper to around 200 of the junior exhibitors and their families. On display was Senior Herd sire AF Deerpark Dividend 79 "Explosion". This full Irish Bull is owned jointly with Alden Farm, Hamilton, Mo. who raised the bull, 7M-The McAnear Family and Greenbelt Shorthorns owned by Ronald Gooch.

He is twice All American with 3 of his first calves being nominated as All Americans. His first bull calf 7M Explosion Pirate was named 1982 All American and is owned by (David McAnear's DJW Irish Shorthorns and Savell Farm, Ferris, Tx. with a semen interest retained by 7M. He was also on display along with 7M Explosion Shane owned by Monte McAnear's Strawberry Shorthorns and 7M Explosion Winsom Jo owned in partnership with Don Robinson. 7M had two calves nominated for All Americans

in 1983, Junior herd sire 7M Tomahawk Paddy who was Reserve Grand Champion Bull at Amarillo and Ft. Worth and 7M Explosion Susie exhibited by Rodney McAnear was again nominated for the second year in a row. Dyrone Howells Greenbelt Irish Lady an Explosion daughter was also nominated.

Several Clarendon families with Junior exhibitors spent the week in Amarillo taking part in the National event. Clarendon youths exhibiting were: Shane and Jason Klinnert, Ginger and Kevin McAnear, Traci Burch, Leland and Dyrone Howell, and Rodney and Laura McAnear. National competition is very tough but they placed several in the top part of the class.

Rodney McAnear and Dyrone Howell represented Texas in the National Showmanship Contest with Dyrone making the top 6 finalists of the nation, James and Pat McAnear and Ronald Gooch were given Honorary Memberships to the American Junior Shorthorn Association in recognition for their service to the juniors. Rodney was elected to a 3 year term as National Junior Director at the Youth conference. Kevin McAnear proved a top showman at the tender age of 6 and was photographed for a national advertisement by the American Shorthorn Association to publicize docile disposition of the Shorthorn Cattle.

Sunday was the Texas Junior Preview Show. Nugget Bland joined the group with his steer. Christi McAnear took 3 firsts, Rodney one, and Nugget placed his steer first. Christi won Reserve Champion Showmanship for the Junior level.

Dyrone Howell was elected to Texas Junior Association President in their annual meeting and Traci Burch was

chosen as Texas Lassie Princess to represent the Texas Panhandle.

This active group of Shorthorn enthusiasts is having a busy summer. They traveled to Plainview the last of June for the Panhandle Parade of Breeds Show and helped to make it the best breed show out of 14 breeds. Christi McAnear exhibited Champion Shorthorn Heifer and was chosen Champion Junior Showman in both the heifer and steer show. Dyrone Howell represented the Shorthorns in Showmanship against all the breeds.

The group will be traveling to Guymon, Okla. July 29-30 to exhibit in the Five State Junior Preview Show.

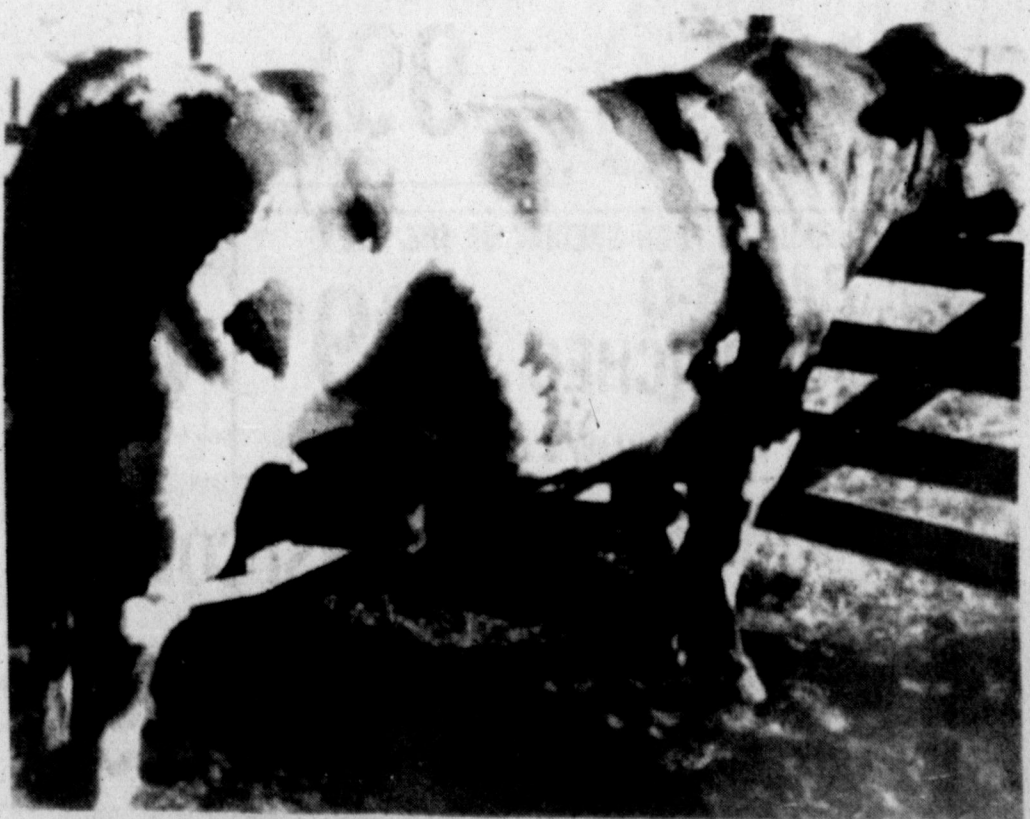
All Stars end season

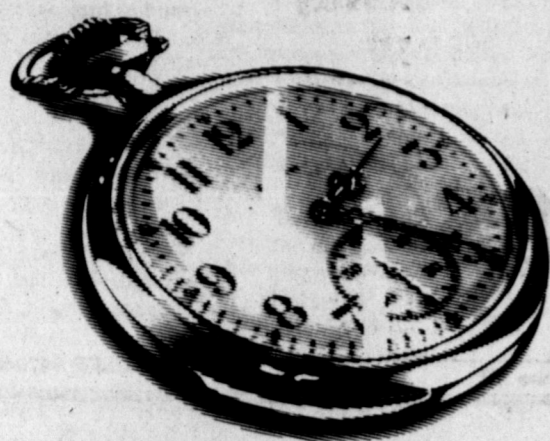

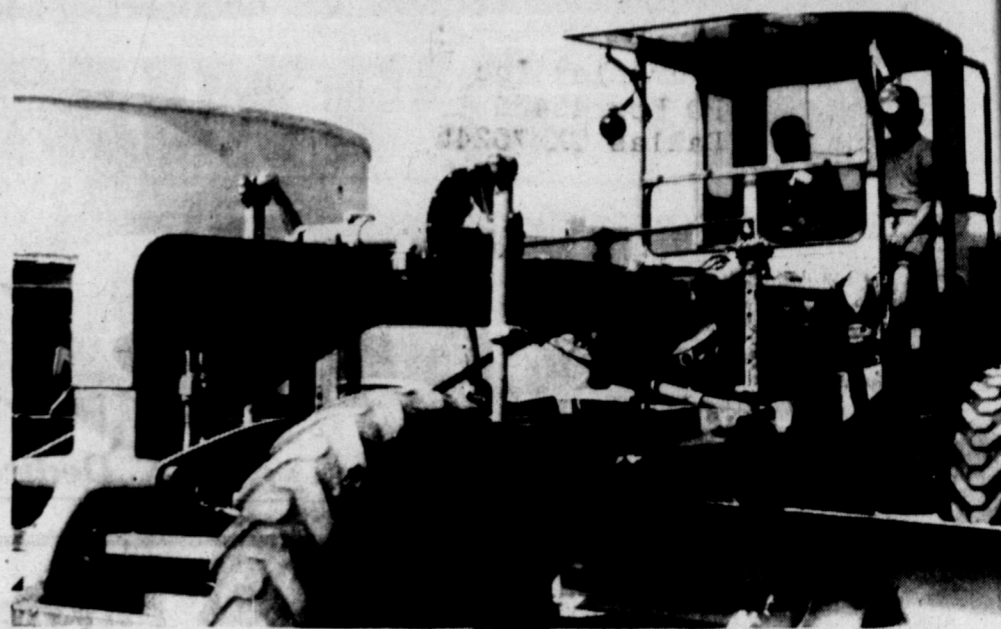

City Minutes

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Clarendon met in regular session on July 28, 1983, in the Board Room, City Hall at 7:30 p.m.

Members present were Mayor James Kuhn, Aldermen Richard Bell, Lloyd McCord, James Sharrar and Gene White.

Member absent was Alderman J.G. McAnear.

Others present were City Secretary Donna Edwards, Jim Roberts, and Mark Winsor and Steve Morath of Lone Star Gas Company.

Minutes of the June 14, 1983, meeting were read, and approved.

Mark Winsor explained to the Board the details involving the 2.61% rate increase proposed by Lone Star Gas

Company. Mr. Winsor and Mr. Steve Morath, Lone Star Gas Rate Specialist, answered questions pertaining to the increase to satisfaction of the Board. Motion was made to accept the proposed rate increase to become effective July 29, 1983, and to pass an Ordinance as follows:

ORDINANCE

An ordinance fixing and determining the general service rate to be charged for sales of natural gas to residential and commercial consumers in the city of Clarendon, Donley County, Texas; providing for the manner in which such rate may be changed, adjusted, and amended, providing for surcharge; and providing for a

schedule of service charges. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Clarendon, Texas:

Section 1. Effective with gas bills rendered on and after thirty (30) days from the final date of passage of this ordinance, the maximum general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Clarendon, Texas, by Lone Star Gas Company, a division of ENSERCH CORPORATION, a Texas Corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as set forth in Item A, in the Attachment hereto which is incorporated herein.

Section 2. The residential and commercial rates set forth above shall be adjusted upward or downward from a base of \$4.3934 per Mcf by a Gas Cost Adjustment Factor expressed as an amount per thousand cubic feet (Mcf) of natural gas for changes in the intracompany city gate

rate charge as authorized by the Railroad Commission of Texas or other regulatory body having jurisdiction for gas delivered to the Clarendon distribution system, according to Item B, in the Attachment hereto which is incorporated herein.

Section 3. Company shall also receive tax adjustments according to Item C, in the Attachment hereto which is incorporated herein.

Section 5. Rate case expense is not included in the calculation of proposed rates. If rate case expense is incurred in this current case, it is the intention of Lone Star Gas Company to recover the current and any prior rate case expense through a surcharge designed for a six-month nominal recovery period. The surcharge per Mcf would be calculated by dividing the rate case expense to be recovered by one-half of the adjusted annual sales volume to residential and commercial customers. If there is no current rate case expense. When a surcharge is applicable, monthly status reports will be provided to account for the collections.

Section 6. In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations in effect. The service charges set forth in Item E, in the Attachment hereto which is incorporated herein are approved. Services for which no charge is set out in Item E may be performed and charged for by Company at a level established by the normal forces of competition.

Section 7. The rates set forth in this ordinance may be changed and amended by either the City or Company in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.

Section 8. It is hereby found and determined that the meeting at which this ordinance was passed was open to the public, as required by Texas law, and that advance public notice of the time, place and purpose of said meeting was given. PASSED and APPROVED on this the 28th day of June, 1983.

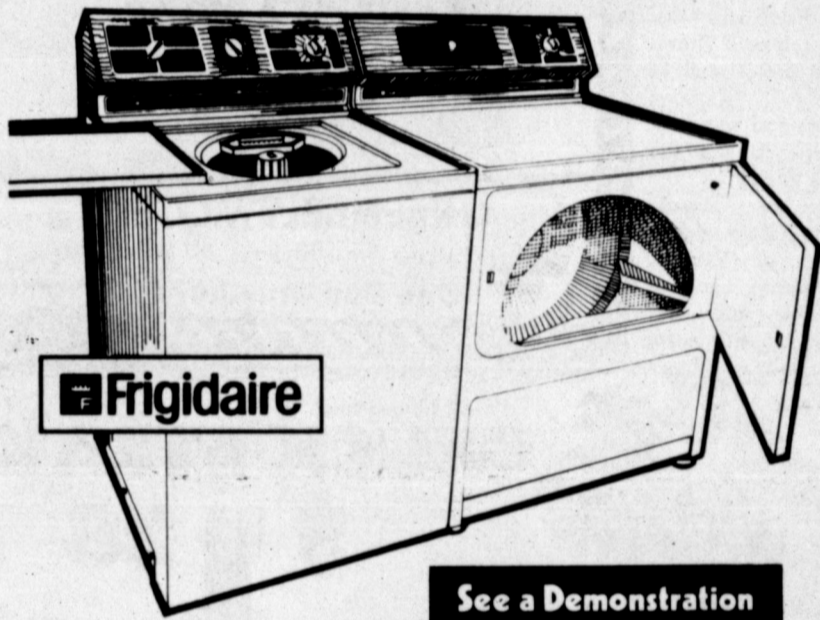

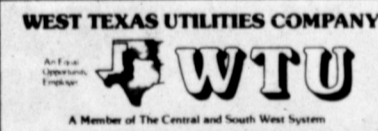

Wayne, as everyone knew him, was born December 25, 1921, to Carl and Dana Naylor at their country home outside Lelia Lake, Texas. He was one of three Southern Baptist Ministers born to the couple.

He attended schools in Donley County, Clarendon Junior College, and he was graduated from Howard Payne University in 1948, Brownwood, Texas. In 1949 to 1951 he attended Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Ft. Worth, Texas. He took graduate work at Eastern Montana College in Billings, Montana.

Wayne married the former Maxine Behrens of Voca, August 27, 1946. Their children are Wes of Clarendon, Barry of Lolo, Montana, Dale of Billings, Montana, Garry of Vernon, and Shelly of Brady and six grandchildren.

Wayne was ordained to the ministry in 1946 at Melwood Baptist Church in Brownwood, Texas and he had served churches in Texas, New Mexico, Wyoming, Montana and Idaho.

After suffering from a heart attack and a light stroke, Mr. Naylor resigned his pastorate at Hedley. He continued to supply pulpits every opportunity he got. He preached both morning and evening services at Central Baptist Church in Brady, the Sunday just prior to his last illness.

Wayne felt it was important to share his testimony. He kept his prayer life and Bible Study up to date, he always made Christ the center of his life, testimonies and messages and he kept his messages short and to the point.

Pioneer Missions was dear to his heart. He served 19 years in that work beginning in 1955. He helped organize 2 churches in pioneer areas and served other places that did not flourish. He was Hi-Line Associational Moderator in Montana in 1968, Boise Valley Associational Moderator in 1975 in the Utah-Idaho Convention; Second Vice President of the Utah-Idaho Baptist Convention in 1975. Frontier Associational Moderator in 1977 in Wyoming which is affiliated with the Northern Plains convention. Wayne was a member of the Baker, Montana Toastmasters, the Caldwell, Idaho Chamber of Commerce and he had been a member of TSTA, ATPE, NEA, and MEA. He was a Fraternal Observer to the Home Mission Board in 1975 for the Utah-Idaho Convention, and he was a member of the Hedley Lions Club. Wayne was a Radar Operator in World War II for forty months, taught school for 15 years as bi-vocational pastor; and he pastored for thirty one years. Wayne enjoyed writing a weekly article for the Clarendon Press.

Other survivors are Betty Vick of Panhandle; Calvin Naylor of Amarillo and Joe Tom Naylor of Dyersburg, Tennessee.

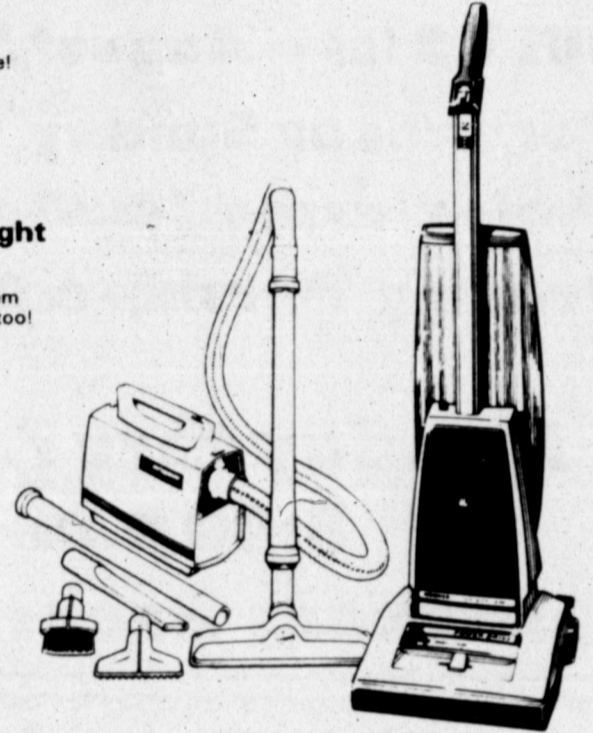

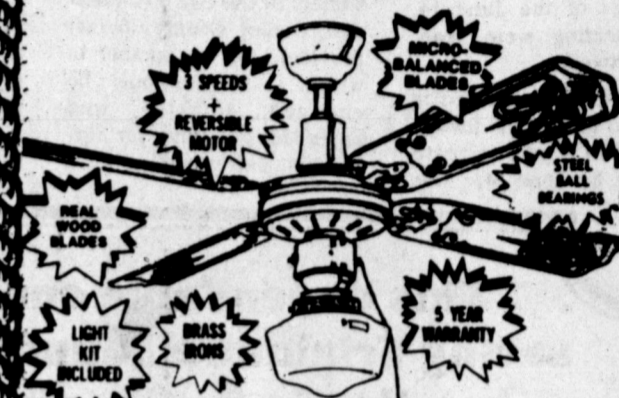

ALZHEIMER'S

Shrinkage in size and weight of the brain is an inevitable consequence of old age for most people. With this shrinkage comes some loss of memory and intellectual function (known as senile dementia when severe). When this same process occurs before the senile period, it is known as Alzheimer's disease - named after the researcher who described the condition.

The individual with Alzheimer's may eventually become apathetic, socially withdrawn, and unable to speak or move about. There is no known cause for this irreversible brain disorder. Several drugs have been used in attempts to reverse the progression of the disease and to restore intellectual function.

Naloxone, a drug used to treat narcotic overdoses, has been the topic of recent news stories concerning the treatment of Alzheimer's. Researchers reporting in The New England Journal of Medicine found that naloxone helped restore partial intellectual functions in afflicted persons. Unfortunately, naloxone must be given by injection several times daily. Use of this drug on a routine basis to treat Alzheimer's is far from a reality. Naloxone use in this condition is a research breakthrough, but the drug's practical application is probably far off.

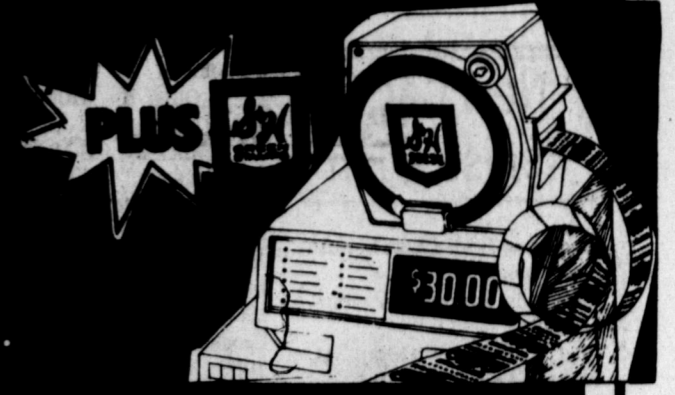
