## Rains Over Entire Area Improve Outlook For Farmers And Ranchers

Rains the latter part of last week improved the crop and range outlook considerably and brought our moisture total for the year up more like it should be.

The official weather observer here measured 2.85 inches during the rainy spell which brought our yearly total to 8.17 and the monthly total to 3.49. During the first six months of 1963 we received 7.22 inches and the June total last year was 3.69.

During the current spell, W. D. Higgins reported 4.70 inches at Martin, C. C. Rich 5.55 at the Country Club; Willard Knox 3.36 at Lelia Lake and W. G. Johnson 5.50 at Hedley.

The moisture has been general over the entire Panhandle area which makes it more beneficial all the way around.

## Area Jaycees Fight Civil Rights Bill

The Clarendon Junior Chamber of Commerce today joined the national campaign against the Civil Rights Act of 1963, now in Congress.

The local Jaycees are circulating copies of the act and petitions against it throughout the area, as are other Jaycee organizations throughout the United States. The local group has endorsed a resolution opposing the act, and is sending completed petitions against the act to the Junior Chamber of Commerce in Macon, Ga., for transmittal to Washington. The Macon Jaycees originated the nationwide campaign earlier this spring.

"The means by which the purported purposes of the Civil Rights Acts of 1963 are to be enforced are contrary to the principles of the National Creed of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce," the resolution reads in part.

Local Jaycee president Hubert Kidd said, "We believe that government should be of laws, not of men. We believe that economic justice can best be won by free men through free enterprise."

The Jaycees initiated the drive because they were concerned with extension of federal executive power and the lack of understanding of the bill. National goal is 100,000 signatures.

Although the Jaycees are initiating the movement, they are asking all interested citizens to study the act and sign the petition, Hubert Kidd said.

from County ASCS Committee

### Cotton

The final date for bringing in proof of cotton production was Monday, June 15. This proof is being processed and when all work is completed, those of you who have proven your yield will be mailed an MQ-24, Upland Cotton Notice, on the revised yields and payment rates. Those who made regular appeals and did not bring in proof will be hearing from the County Committee as soon as they have reviewed the cases.

### Wheat

Several wheat producers have been in to inquire about whether or not they will receive marketing cards. Let us clarify this by saying that since there are no marketing quotas or penalties this year, there will be no marketing cards issued.

### Oats And Rye

If you have a wheat allotment on your farm and have harvested or will harvest any oats or rye for grain in 1964, please come into the office at your earliest convenience and give us your estimate on the acreage harvested. This information will be used as a factor in determining oat-rye bases for 1965.

### 164 Performance

We are in the process of preparing for the cotton, feed grain and diverted acres measurements. Actual work in the field is expected to begin sometime around the first part of July. As in the past, your continued cooperation with the reporters will be appreciated.

### ACP

Conservation is in the nation's interest. Conservation farming protects our natural resources. "Worn out" farms are restored and made productive through conservation farming. Farm ponds control erosion, protect vegetative cover, furnish stock water and provide wildlife habitat for recreational development. The problem of sheet erosion is met and contained through establishment and maintenance of permanent vegetative cover.

Registration data for all students of Clarendon Public Schools will be announced at a future date, stated K. D. Vaughan, Superintendent.

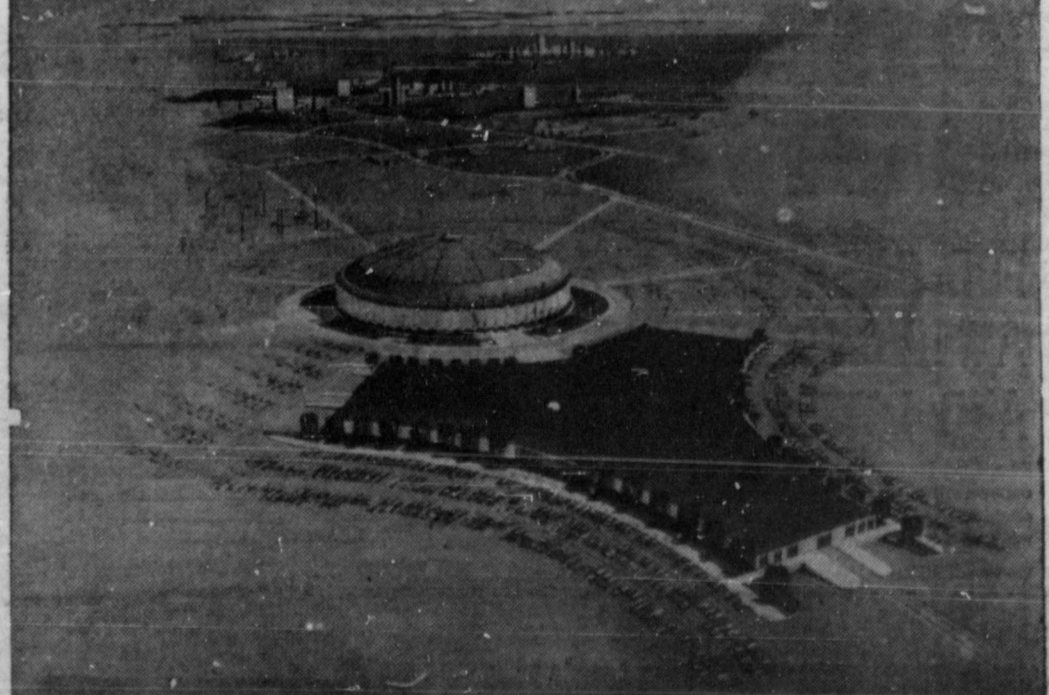
### Celebration To Be Featured On TV

HOME OF HOUSTON LIVESTOCK SHOW AND RODEO—The largest livestock exhibition building under one roof in the world will be the home of the Houston Livestock Show beginning in 1966. The air-conditioned building covers 12 acres and will have stalls to accommodate 1700 halter cattle, 600 horses, 1200 swine, 1200 sheep and goats, and a 208' x 80' livestock judging arena. It will provide separate sheep and swine arenas, an auction arena for breed sales and commercial cattle, facilities for poultry and rabbits and a milking parlor with observation facilities. The exhibition building is adjacent to the famed Domet Stadium which will house America's largest and wildest rodeo.

### TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18th DISTRICT

By Congressman Walter Rogers

#### Gas Regulation At The Crossroads

I urged my colleagues in the House and Senate this week to take a fresh look at Government policies regulating the natural gas industry — the Nation's sixth largest and certainly a keystone industry in our Panhandle economy. I addressed myself to the matter because this week marked the tenth anniversary of a decision by the U.S. Supreme Court that independent natural gas producers selling in interstate commerce are subject to the jurisdiction of the Federal Power Commission.

For ten years, the Federal Power Commission has engaged in experimental regulatory actions affecting the natural gas industry. The result has been confusion and uncertainty working to the detriment of the industry and to the consuming public.

Government, I reminded my colleagues in an address which appeared in the *Congressional Record*, cannot play games with business and expect business to survive, to grow, to expand in the future. The situation involving regulation of the natural gas industry today is the condition which destroys public confidence in our governmental process. It gnaws at the very vitals of Government because it demonstrates monstrous inability to govern.

The most significant action of this 88th Congress was enactment of the tax cut, a reaffirmation of the ability of our free enterprise system to provide capital and stimulus needed for economic growth. While Congress took this important step, surely one of the most historic in the field of economic policy since World War II, it continued to neglect steps to correct abuses in the area of regulatory policy.

Natural gas is assuming increased importance both in our daily lives and in our modern technology. Today, there are more than 25,000 industrial uses for natural gas and in many industries it is absolutely essential to operations. New uses are being developed constantly. And yet, the ten years of confusion over regulatory policy affecting natural gas has been accompanied by a decline in the ratio of natural gas reserves to production to its lowest point in history at the end of 1963. The price of natural gas at the wellhead has increased markedly under the wavering FPC policies. Consumers are paying the bill, just as they have paid for and are paying the bill for long and costly hearings and litigation which seeks to clarify the matter.

I believe it is essential that Congress take a fresh look at the role of regulation and its effect on the future of natural gas. We must create an effective, stable, sound policy which will serve the overwhelming public interest of adequate supplies at reasonable cost. It is time for new thinking and new action.

The "Festival of Gas" pavilion at the New York World's Fair is a dramatic example of research progress being made by the natural gas industry. The pavilion is heated, cooled, and electrically powered by a "total energy package." The gas industry is making it possible for large areas — industrial complexes, shopping centers, apartment houses, airports — to provide in one package all the energy needed for heating, cooling, and electricity. Scientists are now working on a "fuel cell" in which natural gas is employed in the chemical manufacture of electricity — and this research looks to a day when a householder, with a "fuel cell" in his basement or garage, could provide from that single unit all his power requirements.

Both the electric and gas industries have become so vital to the American economy, and competitive with each other, that we must seriously question whether policies affecting their future development should be left to the regulatory handling of a single Government agency.

Either the regulatory process must be divided to reflect today's realities, or Congress must spell out in detail a modern concept for natural gas regulation which will acknowledge all factors and pierce the artificial dam of confusion which now exists. I believe the objective of modern regulatory policy can be achieved.

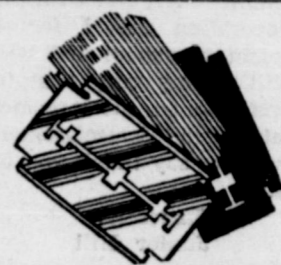

**FOUR RURAL ACCIDENTS CHECKED IN DONLEY CO.**

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated four accidents on rural highways in Donley County during the month of May, according to Sergeant J. W. Wilson Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for two persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$2,705.00.

The rural accident summary for Donley County from January through May of 1964 shows a total of 12 crashes resulting in two persons killed, 11 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$17,539.00.

The Sergeant expressed serious concern over the increase in fatal motor vehicle traffic accidents and deaths throughout the state.

"For the first five months of 1964, 1025 persons have died in traffic, compared to 871 for the same period of 1963," the Sergeant stated. "This 18% increase is very alarming and when you realize our heavy volume traffic months are still ahead, we must anticipate increasing problems in the accident picture. There is an increase in all types of accidents throughout the state and it is something that merits our greatest concern," he said.

"The driving public must assist in the reduction of this trend if we are to turn it downward. Otherwise our death count at the end of the year will far exceed the record number of 2,729 deaths in Texas traffic during 1963. If you are driving, your life literally is in your own hands, so won't you help yourself and others by resolving not to become one of our statistics!" the Sergeant asked.

**OAK-PRAIRIE NEEDS MORE DOE HARVEST**

Three drought years in the Texas' mid-coastal area has seriously reduced the range-carrying capacity and thus the physical condition of the deer, according to Parks and Wildlife Department biologists.

High deer losses due to starvation, reduced fawn crops and reduced numbers of bucks, they say, are the symptoms of too many deer with too little to eat. These conditions are especially evident in Colorado and Lavaca counties, and to a lesser degree in the other five counties of the Oak-Prairie Area.

In spite of the deer removed by hunting and starvation in 1963 this year expected fawn crop should increase the 1964 deer numbers by 16 percent over the 1963 populations. Again, as in the previous three years, it is expected that this population will exceed the range-carrying capacity. Even with normal rainfall and comparatively good deer food production, starvation losses, particularly of fawns, is still to be expected this year.

Biologists contend the only remedy to this overstocked situation is to continue efforts to reduce the deer numbers to the carrying capacity of the range.
