

WHO AND WHAT Meet the Faculty by Ann Weatherly

Mrs. Velma Weaver, head of the Fine Arts Department, is a busy and talented woman. She is a native of this area, claiming Hedley, Memphis and Clarendon to be the towns where she has spent most of her life.

Mrs. Weaver attended high school at Hedley, and took her B. A. degree from West Texas State University at Canyon in the fields of Art, Industrial Art, and Speech. She also earned her Master of Arts degree from West Texas State U. in the fields of Education and Music. She has taught school for twenty-seven years, the last thirteen of which have been spent in Clarendon. She has also taught in public schools at Skellytown, Stinnett, and Dumas. Mrs. Weaver is currently teaching classes in art, speech, choir, and music education and theory.

She and her husband, J. N., are active members of the local Baptist Church. She is also a member of the Texas State Teachers' Association, the Junior College State Teachers' Association, and the Texas State Music Teachers' Association, and an associate member of the 1926 Book Club. But the organization which claims most of her spare time is that of Delta Kappa Gamma ,International Organization of Women Teachers. She has at some time held all the offices in the local chapter, including that of President in 1958-60; she was State Music Chairman in 1961-63, and is currently a member of the State Program Committee. She is one of five area directors with 37 chapters under her supervision. In addition to these activities she teaches piano to private pupils.
