Bulls Bring Fair Price In Annual Rolling Plains Sale

Sixty-seven bulls sold at the sixth annual Rolling Plains Bull Sale held in Clarendon December 2nd. There were forty-six Hereford bulls, 11 Angus bulls, and 10 Galloway bulls. Tommie Potts, president of the organization, said that bidding was a little slow but considering the price of cattle, the bulls sold fairly well.

E. L. Sitter of McLean, Texas took a clean sweep of the individual honors in the Hereford class. He won both Grand Champion Hereford sale bull as well as the reserve champion sale bull. The Herefords were judged by H. H. Reeves of Shamrock, Texas. Thirty-seven single Hereford bulls sold for an average of \$300 per head. The Grand Champion brought \$430 and sold to V. V. Bentley of Lela, Texas. The reserve champion sold for \$435 to Mrs. Vera Dickey of Memphis, Texas. Clyde Magee of McLean, Texas won first on his pen of three weaner bull calves and they sold to W. H. January of Claude, Texas for \$275 per head. Bob Newton of Lark, Texas won first on pen of two bulls and they sold to Craig Morris of Clarendon, Texas for \$205 per head.

In the Angus division, T. W. McAnear of Clarendon won the Grand Champion sale bull and George Saunders of McLean the reserve champion. The Grand Champion sold to David Hudgins of Lakeview for \$300 and the reserve champion sold for \$360 to Butch Brown of Groom, Texas. The 11 Angus averaged \$297 per head.

In the Galloway division, H. A. Green and Cap Morris had the champion sale bull and Hugh Castleberry of Alanreed, Texas had the reserve champion. The champion sold to Joe McMurtry of Clarendon for \$305 and the reserve champion sold to G. C. Applewhite of Lockney, Texas for \$295. The average for the ten head was \$281.

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

PROPER PASTURE USE

This is the time of the year we must be concerned with grazing management on our pastures. The correct definition of pasture is: establishing adapted species of perennial, biennial, or reseeding forage plants and applying some needed cultural treatment after establishment. Grazing pasture should be done at a rate that will maintain grasses of high quality by adjusting the stocking rate or season of use to favor maximum growth and survival. Do not graze a seeded pasture until it is well established. This is the most important factor to be considered in establishment of a pasture. Proper use of pasture grasses is best determined by observation of some of the following factors: 1st. During the growing season graze no more than 50% of the current growth of dominant plants by weight. 2nd. Maintain enough leaf surface to manufacture plant food for quick regrowth and provide food for storage in root system. 3rd. Grazing should be normally discontinued prior to dormant season to allow for a three or four week regrowth period to allow for maintenance of plant vigor. 4th. After frost, enough residue should be left to maintain adequate protection or soil from erosion and maintain organic matter.

Proper Pasture Use is good management on any operating unit, and it pays to use this practice as it will mean more dollars to you by producing more beef per acre.

Your local SCS technicians serving the Donley County Soil Conservation District stand ready to assist you in better Pasture Management.

WATERWAYS

There is a great need for the establishment of permanent sod waterways to dispose of excess water without causing erosion to cropland. Runoff water is carried to safe points of release with a minimum of erosion. Waterways may be used in connection with

terrace systems or field diversions, for safe disposal of storm, or for protection of natural floodways through farmland.

Generally, a cover of perennial vegetation is the most satisfactory cover for waterways and should be used to protect them against erosion. Perennial grasses are seeded in a dead litter established by drilling fibrous rooted annual sorghums. Alfalfa may be seeded in broad flat waterways that slope less than one foot per hundred feet. Bermuda may be sprigged without establishing dead litter cover if there is available irrigation water to hasten complete coverage with solid turf. On very gentle slopes, usually less than one percent, and a velocity of two feet per second or less, waterways may be planted to drilled annual crops. These may be wheat or rye or could be close spaced fibrous rooted sorghums. Usually, the channel and inside berms should be seeded to perennial grasses of turf forming varieties.

For recommendations as to engineering design contact your local Soil Conservation Service Office.

Gould 1. These were dug where the water table is high and the springs or seepage furnishes the needed water for livestock.

Standard large ridge terraces were constructed by Earl Fox, Claude Moore, Ansil Adamson, Tommie Potts, Granville Simmons, and Harold L. White.

Dennis R. Lindley, A. J. Rowell, Harold L. White, Roy Jewell, Richard Finch, Luther Petty, W.

H. Cooke III, and H. A. Harrison Sr. constructed diversion terraces to divert excess water from cropland. This reduced sheet erosion and prevented gullies from forming on valuable cropland.

ACP Program cost share assisted A. J. Rowell to construct a permanent sod waterway and

Ralph Britten completed more than twenty acres off irrigation land leveling with assistance under this program.

Reorganizing farm irrigation systems to conserve water and give better distribution of water has been quite popular this year. Harvey Shaw Jr., Lacy Noble, and Leo Smith have installed

their systems underground. James A. Shields, Hall S. Hardin and Finis L. Hill plan to install underground irrigation pipes in the very near future to conserve water and improve distribution of irrigation water on the cropland that has been watered less efficiently for the past several years.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

A post-election review of state-wide voting totals shows that only 89 per cent of the 3,100,000 Texans who were qualified to vote actually made it to the polls on November 3.

Total number of ballots cast—2,760,788.

Not all of those who went to the polls voted in all the races. In Travis County, for instance, 3,461 of the 67,419 who cast ballots failed to vote in the presidential race. Elsewhere around the state, 52,304 Texans who voted in the governor's race did not vote in the lieutenant governor's race, which placed next on the ballot.

Highest vote getter, in this election in Texas history, was Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr. He racked up 1,901,038 votes. Gov. John Connally was next with 1,877,137. Lt. Gov. Preston Smith was third, with 1,833,747.

LAWMAKERS TAKE OATH—All 42 freshmen in the 150-member House of Representatives already have taken the oath that makes them State officials. They started drawing their \$4,800 a year salary the day of their oath-taking.

Thirty-three took the oath jointly in the special swearing-in ceremony. Lt. Gov. Preston Smith participated, along with House Speaker Byron Tunnell and Secretary of State Crawford Martin.

Freshmen legislators who did not come to the Capitol were sworn in at home by local judges. Many did so for sentimental reasons.

TRAIN HEARING SET—Right after the order was issued allowing the Texas and Pacific Railroad to discontinue two passenger trains that ran between Fort Worth and El Paso, the Gulf,

Colorado and Santa Fe Railway Company filed a request with the Railroad Commission to discontinue two trains in West Texas.

Company said it wants to stop service of passenger trains Nos. 77 and 78 between Brownwood and San Angelo because Railway Post Office service was halted on them September 26. Company said government's failure to renew the postal contract will increase the railroad's already substantial net annual "out-of-pocket deficit" by more than 75 per cent.

Hearing on the application will be held in the Tom Green County Courthouse on January 14.

COTTON GRADES DROP DUE TO WEATHER

The USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service in Memphis reported cotton classed for growers during the week ending December 4th was again lower in grade, staple length, and micronaire readings than in the preceding week. The weather and method of harvesting accounted chiefly for the lower quality. Sample receipts during the week were the largest of any week this season.

Based on the samples classed this week, white grades decreased from 40 percent to 30 percent, and light spotted and spotted grades increased from 60 percent to 70 percent. Strict low middling was the predominant grades in white cotton and Middling light spotted prevailed in the colored cotton.

Cotton prices, the latter part of the week, were slightly lower than last week. Average prices for cotton having a mike reading of 3.5-4.9 were 27.15 to 26.85. Cottonseed prices remained steady and ranged from \$45 to \$47 per ton at gin points.

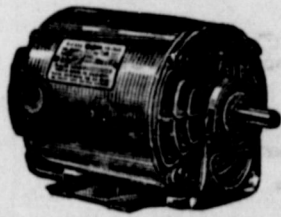

POLLED HEREFORD REGISTRATION UP

A record 70% more cattlemen registered Polled Herefords this past year than any year in history, according to the fiscal year-end reports from the American Polled Hereford Association. Orville K. Sweet, Executive Secretary, announced 19,398 breeders throughout the United States recorded Polled Hereford calves during the 1963-64 fiscal year that ended August 31, 1964. This record shows 8,043 more breeders recorded Polled Herefords than the previous year's record of 11,355.

"This is an unparalleled increase in numbers of new breeders and owners," Sweet said. "When any breed or segment experiences such an impressive increase in numbers of breeders recording cattle, it reflects a positive upward swing in popularity and demand for Polled Herefords, in this case."

Sweet correlated the sizeable increase in numbers of breeders and owners with the fact that during the past two years new annual record numbers of Polled Herefords were sold at public auctions and in private treaty sales.

Nearly one-fifth more Polled Herefords were sold this past year than the year previous to establish a new annual record of transfers of ownership. There were 89,282 animals sold this year which is 13,663 more than were sold last year, or an 18.1% increase over last year's previous record.

Earlier it had been announced

a new record number of 175,045 Polled Hereford registrations were issued during the 1963-64 fiscal year period. More than 2-million Polled Herefords have been registered in 63 years since the first 11 head were recorded, and 68% of the total have been registered in the past 10 years.

"These encouraging gains in numbers of breeders and owners of Polled Herefords are reflections of the universal acceptance of Polled Herefords in every area of the cattle industry," Sweet added. "More new herds of purebred Polled Herefords have been started in the past few years than ever before, and we see every reason to believe this trend will continue. Sales of Polled Herefords have been excellent."

He said that indicative of the fact so many herds of Polled Herefords are being started is that in the immediate past year there were 14,995 breeders that recorded from 1 to 10 head of Polled Herefords. This compares with 8,275 in the same category the year previous.

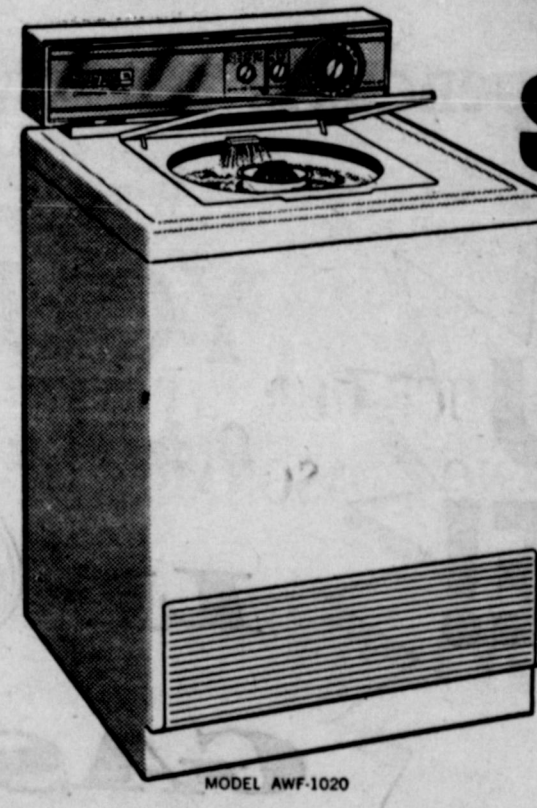

Your governing body has recently employed me as your City Administrator and I would like to say a few words to the Citizens of Clarendon. 1965 WHEAT PROGRAM

There is no penalty for overplanting the 1965 wheat allotment; however a producer who overplants will NOT be eligible for diversion payment on the overplanted OR ANY OTHER farm. Also, the wheat will not be eligible for CCC loan.

1965 COTTON ALLOTMENTS

Cotton allotment notices for 1965 upland cotton were mailed last week to all cotton producers. The normal yield for each farm was shown on these notices.

SUPPLEMENT TO THE 1964 ACP HANDBOOK

Practice E-3-b has been added as a supplement to the 1964 ACP Handbook. This practice reads as follows. Contour listing, contour chiseling, cross-slope chiseling, pit cultivation, or listing or chiseling not on the contour for wind erosion control—Cross slope chiseling or listing not on the contour will be approved only on those areas where it is impractical to list or chisel the land on the contour. Contour listing or chiseling must follow level guidelines at not to exceed twice the terrace interval, or must follow terraces. Cross-slope chiseling must be performed as nearly on the contour as is practicable. Pit cultivation must be done with an implement that will dam the furrows at regular intervals, and pits must occupy at least 25 per cent

of the land. Furrows must not be more than 4 feet apart and must be at least 4 inches deep. Operations which are a part of normal farming operations will not qualify.

Cost-sharing will be limited to land from which cotton has been harvested during 1964. Federal Cost Share: \$0.75 per acre.

library friends who give new books and current magazines to the library the readers do appreciate your kindness.

Did you all know of the 44 counties that make up the Texas

Library Association's District 1 six have no public library services? There are still a lot of people who do believe that man can live by bread alone. The Hogg Foundation For Men-

No. 8 FS14. 111:8 "Infant Care" is still away ahead of the list of most ordered as it has been almost from the time it was first published way back in 1914. Of course it has been revised countless times to keep it up to date.

Another sign that folks are becoming more interested in later and probably better ways of helping children physically as well as mentally is the fact that for the fifth year, Dr. Spock's "The Common Sense Book of Baby and Child Care," heads the list of best sellers in the paperback edition.
