The Board had agreed tentatively to advance the money when needed and Monday's acment permanent.

Bids to build the pipeline will be received at a meeting at 10 a.m. the morning of September the District Courtroom at the courthouse in Childress.

Pumps in Lelia Lake Creek are expected to produce approximately four and a half million gallons of water a day which should be enough for Childress and Quanah until the entire project is completed which will cost nearly \$11,000,000.

Before the entire project can be completed it will be necessery for the Authority to secure permits to dam up the Salt Fork of Red River near State Highway 70 and Lelia Creek. Hearing for the permits has been set September 28 in Austin.

No hearing permit is necessary for the pumping of water granted when a permit to build a dam lower down on the Salt Fork of Red River was granted several months ago.

### SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Midland Bermudagrass is fast coming a fad in our country. Here's hoping it doesn't turn out like some of its predecessors, Sorghum almum and weeping lovegrass. From some of the success stories elsewhere which reflect nerits beyond compare, we may have an adapted profitable grass which will solve our one and only problem-cotton.

Setting aside sarcasm, this grass does look good for our country. Under proper mamnagement this grass will put out plenty of forage. The following reflect some of the better management practices of this grass:

1. Seedbed Preparation-It is very important to have a clean seedbed and to keep is as clean as possible until the grass has had a chance to cover the ground. 2. Care of sprigs-Keep the sprigs moist and out of the sun's exposure. Results of an experiment from George McBee, Pasture Specialist, Extension Service reflect the following:

No Exposure .. 0.0% reduction in germination 2 hrs. 9 AM-11 AM . 6.0% 4 hrs. 9 AM-1 PM .. 28.0% 2 hrs. 12 noon-2 PM .. 70.0% 4 hrs. 12 noon-4 PM 97.0% 8 hrs. 9 AM-5 PM Shade & Moist C.0%

The above data would indicate that we should avoid harvesting and sprigging during the hot part of the day.

3. Fertilization-Many observations this year have shown farmers following sprigging with 70ture mainly of nitrogen and phosprorus. This is actually doing the grass some harm due to annual weed competition. Actually the weeds get most of the fertilizer plus offering much competition to the bermudagrass.

A better means of fertilizer ap-plication would begin with 25-30 pounds per acre of nitrogen alone to give quick, growth but not offer the weeds so much nutrition. After the grass covers, then apply a heavier application of fertilizer and reap the pro-

4. Grazing Management-Start grazing the grass at an 8 inch height and never graze below 4 inches. The best grazing, both from a catle and grass stand point, will be between the 4-8 inch height.

Grazing should be rotated every 12-14 days depending on the watering frequecy. This should involve 3-4 plots which will be fertilized and irrigated behind each grazing.

5. Grazing should be controlled so that a height of about 4-5 inches will remain at the first frost. Also, a key point to conin woodgrain or antique with sider is having plenty of ground

A key to a sound range management plan includes a close analysis of the resources available and in turn the wise management of the resources. With out such an analysis, a rancher may to feed much more supplement feed than would be necessary otherwise.

Salting, placement of water

with proper distribution of water supplies, the salt can be placed near water supplies and still get the proper grazing on the grass.

Proper range use involves properly garzing the grass to obtain the maximum forage without haming the plant. A rule of thum is to graze no more than approximately 50% of the current key plant.

In summary, analyze the availability and use of your forage and carry out those practices which will benefit you most. For further information concernng proper range management, contact your local Soil Conservation Service Office.

There are many proviems in stablishing a livestock futures market because of the nature of the product. In live cattle trading, there is difficulty in estabishing specifications, carcass beef contracting isn't very apouvers and boneless beef normally doesn't have the price variation needed for attractive specu-

Early investigations show that live cattle contracts, combining carcass specifications might be the best solution.

Another problem with establishing a futures market is the large amount of educational work that must be done to insure a full understanding of the program by cattlemen.

However, eventually the difficulties will be worked out and the thing that couldn't work, a futures trading market on live cattle and beef, will be a reality, says Uvacek.

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
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


