The first shipment of pipeline for the 73-mile Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority's project to furnish water to Childress and Quanah arrived in Childress last week. 1964 AGRICULTURE CENSUS TO BRING STATISTICS UP TO DATE IN COUNTY

The 1964 Census of Agriculture, now being conducted by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, in Donley County, will bring up to date the farm and ranch statistics last collected in 1959.

Here are a few of the many facts recorded in the 1959 agriculture census for this County:

There were 450 farms and ranches in 1959, compared with 619 in 1954. The average size of farm and ranch was 1,037.9 acres in 1959 compared with 812.8 acres in 1954.

The value of products sold by the County's farmers and ranchers in 1959 was \$5,980,335. The value of all crops sold was \$2,272,336. The value of all livestock products sold was \$3,707,999.

The 1964 national Census of Agriculture is the 18th in a series which began in 1840. Because of the rapid changes American agriculture has been undergoing in recent years, Census Bureau officials regard the current census as one of the most significant ever taken. They ask every farmer and rancher to cooperate in compiling an accurate record of these changes by filling out the census form he receives in the mail and holding the completed questionnaire until a census taker calls for it.

Final work on the 1965 Cotton allotments has been completed and notices will be mailed as soon as approval from the State office has been received.

Any change in owner and/or operator of farms for 1965 should be reported to this office in order that the information will reach the right party.

ACP

We have a balance of \$6655 left in the 1964 ACP budget. If any of you have a Conservation practice that needs to be carried out on your individual farm or ranch, come into the office and talk with us about it.

Every person's future is linked with soil and water—the use, management and conservation of the Nation's agricultural resources. About two-thirds of the conservation work now being carried out is being done so with the public assistance programs bearing a part of the cost. The ACP is the largest such financial assistance program. ACP cost-sharing is used on about one and a quarter million farms a year.

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NEW CITY ADMINISTRATOR TAKES OVER DUTIES DEC. 1

The City Council met in called recessed session Tuesday night of last week with Aldermen Clyde I. Price Jr., Basil Smith, Gene White, J. G. McAnear, Chauncey Hommel, City Attorney, W. J. Lowe, City Secretary, Dessa C. Day, and Mayor C. J. Lohoefer, present.

Purpose of the meeting was to interview M. B. Mitchell of Tulia, Texas as a prospective City Administrator for the City of Clarendon. At the conclusion of the meeting, motion was made by Alderman Gene White that the City hire Mr. Mitchell at a salary of \$500 per month with his duties to begin Dec. 1, 1964. The motion was seconded by Chauncey Hommel. The motion carried with all voting 'Aye'.

Mr. Mitchell comes to Clarendon highly recommended. He is a native of Tulia, Texas and has been serving as City Tax Assessor-Collector and assistant to the City Manager. He is a retired Navy Veteran of 22 years service and had reached the rank of Lt. Com. before his retirement. He is a bachelor and plans to move his parents here at a later date if his service proves satisfactory.

The City Council met again Tuesday night of this week at which time an Administrator's Ordinance was passed creating the office of Administrator and prescribing his powers and duties.

The ordinance sets out that the Administrator shall be appointed for an indefinite period and shall be subject to discharge at the will of the governing body of the City.

The powers and duties of the Administrator includes: To devote all of his working time and attention to the affairs of the City, and be responsible to the governing body for the efficient administration of its affairs; to see that all laws and ordinances are enforced; with the advice of the governing body of the city, to appoint and remove all heads of departments. He shall have the power to appoint or remove all subordinate employees; to exercise supervision and control over all departments created by the governing body or that may hereafter be created by said governing body of the city; to act as Budget Officer and as such to prepare and submit to the governing body, prior to the beginning of each fiscal year, a budget of proposed expenditures for the ensuing year; to make a full written report to the governing body as soon after the close of each month's accounts as possible, showing the operations and expenditures, by departments, with the monthly allowances made for such departments in the annual budget; to act as purchasing agent for the City of Clarendon and to purchase all merchandise, material and supplies needed by the City and may establish, if needed, a suitable storehouse where such supplies shall be kept and from which same shall be issued as needed; and to adopt such rules and regulations governing requisition and transactions of business between himself as such purchasing agent and the heads of the departments, officers and employees of the City as the governing body may approve.

It shall be the duty of the purchasing agent to give opportunity for competition on purchases and sales, except when the nature of the purchase or sale is such that competition is impossible or impractical. All purchases in excess of \$500, except of real estate, or rights or easements therein, shall be by contract to the lowest responsible bidder and all sales in excess of \$500, except of real estate or rights or easements therein, shall be made to the highest bidder after public notice and the receipt of sealed bids, unless the governing body, by ordinance, determines that it is impossible or impracticable to purchase or sell in such a manner. All sealed bids received shall be opened in public and thereafter shall be subject to public inspection.

To recommend to the governing body the salaries to be paid each appointive officer and subordinate employees of the City; and it shall be the duty of the governing body to pass ordinances or resolutions, from time to time, fixing rates of compensation.

The full text of the Ordinance mentioned above may be seen at the City Office.

In actuality, Mr. Mitchell will be serving in the same capacity as a City Manager but is called City Administrator as a Manager form of government must be voted by the people. Under the Administrator form of government, the Mayor's powers have been further reduced whereby he is actually a figurehead, will preside over meetings but has no vote. Mayor Lohoefer stated yesterday that his resignation may be forthcoming within the near future as he ran for the office of Mayor in order to be able to serve the people of Clarendon in an active, efficient manner.

In other business Tuesday night, the City Gas Company asked for a raise in natural gas rates. The council tabled the request for future action.

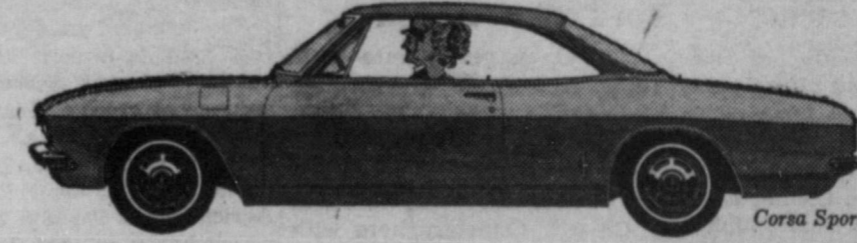

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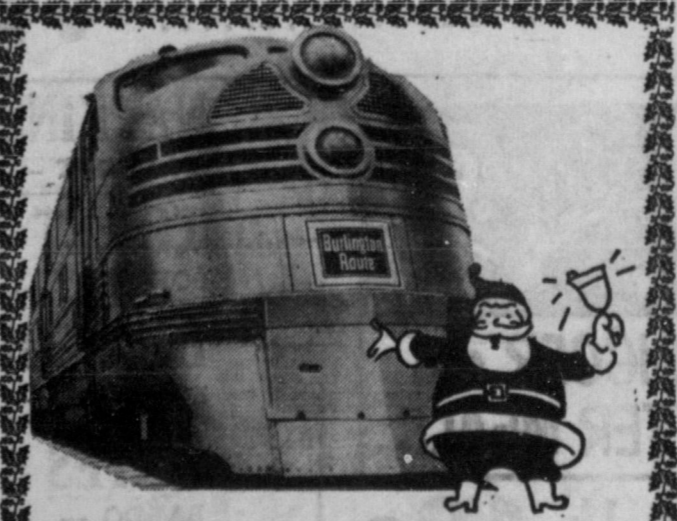

Some lawmakers were sworn in with the knowledge that many Federal workers in their districts stand to lose their jobs by U. S. Defense Department cutbacks. Operations will be cut out at James Connally Air Force Base at Waco and Amarillo Air Force Base and cut down at Dyess Air Force Base in Abilene and Eagle Mountain Army maintenance facility at Fort Worth.

San Antonio bases and Carswell AFB at Fort Worth stand to gain by the big shift. And that also will present new problems for State Representatives.

REDISTRICTING — Congressional redistricting, one of the major problems facing the 1965 Legislature, may cause a headache for legislators whose districts embrace bases.

Bob Johnson, executive director of the Texas Legislative Council, believes the Legislature could if it chose—leave out military and State hospital populations in deciding the "population"

of a county for redistricting purposes.

By State constitutional provision, persons in State mental hospitals cannot vote, nor can persons in military service who enlisted from other states. Therefore, they could be left out of population totals if the Congressional redistricting goal of "one man, one vote" is considered paramount.

However, Johnson conceded that the mathematics involved in paring down population in communities as heavily military as, say, Bexar County might become so complicated that the Legislature would choose to proceed on full population figures.

LBJ RANCH — Orders involving President Johnson's ranch home near Stonewall from the Parks and Wildlife Commission and the State Highway Commission raised the question of whether tourists from Texas and elsewhere ever will get glimpses of the President at his "little White House" as Washington, D. C., visitors enjoy at the big White House.

Parks and Wildlife Commission authorized creation of a Lyndon B. Johnson State Park directly across from the LBJ Ranch. Commission said the proposed

park — located on some 245 acres between Ranch Road 1 and Highway 200 — would be created in cooperation with Gillespie County. Commission does not have authority to condemn land for parks but the County does.

The question came up a day later when the Texas Highway Commission granted the U. S. Secret Service's requested authority to restrict traffic on that part of Ranch Road 1 when President Johnson is there—in the interest of Presidential safety.

The President returned home last Thursday and is due to remain on the LBJ Ranch until after Thanksgiving.

BORDER DISPUTE — Gov. John Connally, Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler and Attorney Wilson Fox of Taylor, members of the State School Land Board, filed a protest with Louisiana's Board of Mineral Development over the Sabine River border dispute.

Area in dispute is the western half of the Sabine River and Sabine Lake and a pie-shaped wedge of the Gulf of Mexico pointed at the mouth of the Sabine and widening sharply until it reaches the line three miles out where Louisiana's offshore boundary lies. Beyond that point the area extends to Texas' outer offshore boundary of 10.5 miles.

Controversy grew out of Louisiana's offer of two oil and gas lease tracts which lie in an area claimed by Texas, but also claimed by Louisiana. Governor Connally has requested Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr be brought into discussions, so he will be fully informed should the dispute travel to the U. S. Supreme Court.

INDUSTRIAL GROWTH — A study of UT's Bureau of Business Research's monthly reports on industrial growth from January through November shows that a total of 611 new plant locations and significant plant expansions were announced for Texas in those 11 months.

The Houston metropolitan area led all other areas with 126 new plants and expansions; Dallas with 81 was next; and Fort Worth followed with 65. However, there were dozens of little towns which boasted big industrial boosts.

COLLEGE FUND PLAN IS ADOPTED — Texas Commission on Higher Education has adopted a plan for distribution of \$311,700,000 in federal building funds among 90 junior and senior colleges in 1965.

Forty-five per cent of point allocated to schools under the system must be based on projected enrollment increases and utilization of existing facilities.

Formal applications of schools can be submitted after the U. S. Office of Education approves the state plan — probably about December 1. January 15 is deadline for applications.

RIO GRANDE WATER ESTIMATED—Texas Water Commission has estimated Rio Grande Valley has water supplies to irrigate up to 680,000 acres over the requirement for municipal and industrial purposes.

Commission figured 124,000-acre feet annually would be needed for municipal and industrial uses. Report was written for the attorney general who is participating in a giant lawsuit over Rio Grande water rights involving Starr, Hidalgo, Cameron and Wilacy Counties.

OIL ALLOWABLE — Texas Railroad Commission set December 31 allowable at 29 per cent of maximum for prorated wells, compared to 28.4 per cent in November.

Increase is expected to be 29,914 barrels a day higher than the estimated November average of 2,541,909 barrels a day.

TB CONTROL PLAN MAPPED—A sweeping new plan for tuberculosis control aimed at consolidating all TB services under one agency and providing treatment of patients close to home has been recommended by the Governor's Committee on TB Eradication.

Committee found the state's program, now divided among four agencies and costing some \$16,200,000 a year, not equal to the job at hand. It proposes placing all related activities in the TB Services Division of the State Health Department.

Recommended treatment procedures, calling for shorter hospitalization but careful at-home treatment after the infectious period is passed and a lifetime "follow-up", would cost more but would be more effective, the committee believes.

COURT SPEAKS — Third Court of Civil Appeals upheld most of a trial jury's verdict

against three East Texas oilmen penalized \$304,800 for slant well drilling. Court held that the productivity penalty was in error because the State and Railroad Commission had not established number of production days from the slanted well, and reversed that portion of a district court's ruling.

Supreme Court held lower courts were wrong in refusing Fort Worth an injunction to block an apartment structure in an area zoned for single and two-family dwellings.

Constitutionality of a 1963 law providing state regulation of Texas border liquor exporting firms was attacked in arguments before Third Court of Civil Appeals. Law set a stiff licensing fee and other requirements.

SHORT SNORTS Uniform shell dredging regulations for Texas coastal bays may result from a Parks and Wildlife Commission decision on an application by Heldenfels Bros. of Corpus Christi to dredge for shell in Copano Bay.

School Land Board may increase royalty charged producers on mineral leases which it has extended, Attorney General Carr held in an opinion.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler announced a December 12 Deadline for prospective lessees to submit nominations of tracts of State Permanent School Fund land to be leased by the state during the oil and gas lease sale on February 2, 1965.

State Health Department reports only six cases of paralytic polio in Texas this year, five of which were children four or under.

Parks and Wildlife Department is seeking men between 21 and 40 to fill 15 game warden openings, after completion of four-months' training at A&M University.

A study released by Texas Research League recommends a new finance building to house the State Comptroller and Treasurer and close cooperation between State and City of Austin in future capitol area planning.

City of Paris application to appropriate 61,610 acre-feet of water annually from proposed Pay Mayse Reservoir on Sanders

Creek in Lamar County has been set by Texas Water Commission for December 17.

MEAT PRODUCTION STEADY —Meat production under Federal inspection was 532 million pounds for the week ending September 26, and about the same as the previous week, but 10 per cent higher than for the same period last year. For the second straight week remained at a record 525,000 head, 20 percent more than a year ago. Sheep and lamb slaughter was 10 percent below the 1963 figure.

FEED GRAIN EXPORTS SET RECORD — A 10,000-ton shipload of U. S. feed grains every six hours, was the average rate that corn, grain sorghums, oats and barley left our shores, bound for foreign ports during the year ending June 30. This set an all time record of 16.1 million metric tons of grain, or \$850 million worth. Dollar market sales now account for 88 percent of total feed grain exports. Aggressive foreign market promotion, carried out jointly by the USDA and the U. S. Feed Grain Council, is credited with the over seas market expansion.

Boys and girls of many Texas 4-H Clubs are taking leadership roles in planning for the youth phase of National Farm-City Week participation in their local areas. Dates for the national observance are November 20 thru 26, and many groups will be joining in various phases of the annual program.

AT WORK FOR AMERICA

It is a privilege and a pleasure to be assigned to the House Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs because it could truly be said that this is the committee of the House of Representatives most directly involved in conserving and developing the natural resources of our country.

One of the oldest committees in the House (it was set up in 1805 as the Committee on Public Lands), the Interior and Insular Affairs Committee has served through the years to initiate some of the more significant and memorable pieces of legislation enacted by the Congress. In the 88th Congress, the Committee's accomplishments accounted in large measure for the complimentary name by which the whole 88th Congress may be remembered by history: "The Conservation Congress." In every field of its jurisdiction, the committee led the way to House passage of meaningful, substantial measures.

Again in the 89th Congress the committee is expected to be led by the gentleman who has served it so well as chairman through three preceding Congresses, the Honorable Wayne N. Aspinall of Palisade, Colo. Congressman Aspinall's knowledge, energy, and dedication to his work has earned him a well-deserved national reputation as a conservationist ranked with the great of American history.

The responsibility of the Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs involves considering, reporting on, and helping to bring enactment of legislative measures providing for the maximum utilization, management, and conser-

vation of the public lands, minerals, water supplies, forests, and other natural resources of the United States, legislative matters involving the government and administration of the territories and other offshore areas, and legislation affecting the Indians, Aleutes, and Eskimos of the United States and their lands and claims. During the 88th Congress, 862 measures dealing with these matters were referred to the committee. Of this total, 164 (representing a total of 357 of those referred) were reported to the House and 144 were passed into law. Approximately 20 per cent of all public laws enacted by the 88th Congress had first been cleared by the Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs.

The Subcommittee on Irrigation and Reclamation was extremely active during the 88th, in exercising initial jurisdiction over legislation relating to the Federal reclamation program and multiple-purpose development of the Nation's water resources, and legislation involving the Nation's water and power policies and saline water research program. Twenty-five bills enacted by the 88th Congress originated in this subcommittee.

Perhaps of greatest national importance was the bill which moved from the subcommittee through to enactment to provide for expanded water resources research in colleges and universities in each of the 50 states and Puerto Rico. The committees and subcommittees have properly been called "the workshops of Congress", for it is here that the proper foundations are laid for good legislation. Many great challenges will face the committee members when the 89th Congress convenes in January. Because of the great opportunity to serve not only present-day Americans but also our future generations, the men and women who are privileged to serve on this com-

mittee's distinguished and historic record.
