The first shipment of pipeline for the 73-mile Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority's project to furnish water to Childress and Quanah arrived in Childress last week. The pipe is 21 inches in diameter and is 32 feet long. They weigh 3,200 pounds each. The pipes were made in Dallas and Odessa and are made of steel with about an inch of concrete on the outside and inside. Construction of the pipeline to Lelia Lake Creek is expected to begin next week, according to authority president, Dr. Shell H. Townsend of Childress.

> committee and member of Class prescribing his powers and duties, purchase all merchandise, material and supplies needed by the City and may establish, if needed, a suitable storehouse where such supplies shall be kept and from which same shall be issued as needed; and to adopt such rules and regulations governing reqchasing agent and the heads of

> > It shall be the duty of the purchasing agent to give opportunity for competition on purchases and sales, except when the nature of the purchase or sale is such that competition is impossible or impractical. All purchases in excess of \$500, except of real estate, or rights or easements therein, shall be by contract to the lowest responsible bidder and all sales in excess of \$500, except of real estate or rights or easements therein, shall be made to the highest bidder after public notice and the receipt of sealed bids, unless the governing body, by ordinance, determines that it is impossible or impracticable to purchase or sell in such a manner. All sealed bids received shall be opened in public and thereafter shall be subject to public inspection.

To recommend to the governing body the salaries to be paid each appointive officer and subordinate employees of the City; and it shall be the duty of the governing body to pass ordinances or resolutions, from time to time, fixing rates of compensation.
