Youth Football League team to host playoff games

The Clarendon Youth Football League teams will host two playoff games between the North and South zones on Saturday, October 24, 1998.

Early voting underway

Early balloting began Monday, October 19, for this year's General Election for local, state, and congressional offices.

Votes may be cast in the county clerk's office in the Courthouse Annex during regular business hours, Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 12 p.m. and from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m.

In addition, County Clerk Fay Vargas says her office will be open on Saturday, October 24, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. for early voting. This is for those who work out of town or cannot make it during the week, Vargas said. Early voting continues through October 30, 1998.

Local students to cast ballots in mock election

Clarendon CISD students will share their ideas about voting with the Secretary of State during a mock election held as part of a statewide election awareness program designed to reach Texas voters via their children.

The mock election is scheduled for Thursday, October 22, and is part of a two-month long statewide tour in which Secretary of State Alverto R. Gonzales, the state's chief elections officer, and Asst. Secretary of State Clark Kent Ervin will travel to more than 80 Texas schools to talk with students about the importance of voting.

The students in Clarendon are among the thousands participating in mock elections this season sponsored by the agency's Project VOTE (Voters of Tomorrow through Education).

The concentrated effort stems from decreasing voter turnouts in both primary and general elections, Secretary Gonzales said.

"We see voter turnout decreasing nationwide," stated superintendent Phil Barefield. "Project VOTE, under the direction of Lyndal Gillen at Clarendon High School, should increase student interest in this democratic institution."

Participating schools in the statewide student mock election will be reporting vote totals for the offices of United State Representative and Governor to the Office of the Secretary of State. Those mock election results will be posted on the Secretary of State's website on general election day, November 3.

Clarendon aldermen hold regular meeting

The Board of Aldermen of the City of Clarendon met in regular on October 13, 1998, at 7 p.m. in the Board Room of City Hall.

The board adopted a resolution authorizing a contract between the city and the Texas Dept. of Housing and Community Affairs for the sewer grant.

Triple L Utilities was awarded the bid for the sewer plant rehabilitation.

The need to replace two board members on the Economic Development Board was discussed, but no action was taken.

No bids were received for the Peabody Hotel.

In other city business, Jim Roberts reported on the clean up work being done in the drainage ditches and some wooded areas.

Thornberry honored as guardian of small business

WASHINGTON — The National Federation of Independent Business (NFIB) today named U.S. Rep. Mac Thornberry, R-Clarendon, a winner of its 1998 Guardian of Small Business Award. NFIB presents the award every two years in recognition of outstanding legislative leadership on behalf of small business.

NFIB President Jack Faris praised Thornberry for "taking a stand" for small business, citing his 100 percent NFIB voting record. "The record shows that when the roll is called, Rep. Thornberry has been a true and consistent friend of small business,"

Faris said.

NFIB's voting record tallies 13 key small-business votes in the House taken during the 1997 and 1998 sessions. Issues included range from legal reform measures, to regulatory relief, to a variety of tax cuts. Among the latter supported by NFIB were bills to reinstate the home off ice deduction, lessen the "death tax" levied on family-owned businesses, and allow the self-employed to deduct their health care costs.

In all, NFIB will present Guardian awards to 229 representatives and 55 senators who voted fa-

vorably on key small-business issues at least 70 percent of the time during the 105th Congress.

"The 105th Congress was small-business friendly," said Faris. "We had some key legislative victories because these lawmakers understand the needs of small-business owners."

The nation's leading small-business advocacy group, NFIB represents 600,000 small and independent businesses nationwide. The organization determines its position on all legislative issues through majority vote of its members.

Texas Beef Council names local rancher as board chairman

Jay O'Brien of Amarillo, a Donley County ranch owner and longtime national and state beef industry leader, has been appointed chairman of the Texas Beef Council for its fiscal year beginning Oct. 1 by TBC's board of directors. O'Brien, a cow-calf, stocker and feeder operator, represents Texas Cattle Feeders Association (TCFA) on TBC's board.

As chairman, O'Brien replaces Jim Williams of Boling, the representative of the Texas Purebred Alliance. Williams remains on the board as past chairman.

TBC's board also appointed Bill Tullos, a cattle rancher at San Angelo, as vice chairman. Tullos represents the Texas Farm Bureau.

O'Brien, Tullos, and Williams will join dairyman Danny Evans of Sulphur Springs and rancher Hilmar Moore of Richmond on TBC's executive

committee. Evans represents the Dairy Farmers of America and Moore represents Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association (TSCRA).

TBC's board also seated two new directors. They are John E. Dudley of Comanche, representing TSCRA, and Mary Prudhomme of Tyler, representing Texas Cattle Women.

O'Brien started his cattle operation after graduating from Yale University in 1967. Today, he is managing partner of Corsino Cattle Co., which has a small herd and runs yearlings on leased wheat, grass and in feedyards in the Texas Panhandle, New Mexico and Oklahoma. The main ranch is north of Amarillo. He also is managing partner of JA Cattle Co., which operates the JA Ranch in Donley, Briscoe and Armstrong counties, as well as a ranch in Douglas County, Colo. Individually, O'Brien also owns a ranch in Donley County.

O'Brien served as president of TCFA in 1991. He also has served on TCFA's board of directors and chaired several of the association's committees.

On a national level, O'Brien has served on NCBA's board of directors since 1986. His current committee appointments include NCBA's long range planning committee and beef operation's operating committee.

O'Brien, his wife, Susie, and her two sons, Wables and Hamilton, live in Amarillo. He has two grown daughters, Emily and Jane.

TBC's board of directors is made up of 18 beef producers who are appointed by the nine beef and dairy organizations in Texas. The TBC chairman also may appoint two at-large directors to assure regional and industry-specific representation.

College technology students providing services

Clarendon College Computer Technology students are repairing area schools' computers for the cost of parts.

"The schools need the repair work and the students need the experience," says instructor Lee Rippetoe.

Second year students Todor Boinovsky of Bulgaria, Cheri Floyd and Elizabeth Stepp of Clarendon, Dianna McCoy of Pampa, and Rodney McQueen of Memphis have already begun to provide repair work this semester for Clarendon ISD and for the

college. First year students will be available for this type of work beginning in January 1999.

Lynette Barefield of Clarendon ISD noted that she could have done the necessary repairs, but finding the time with all of her other technology duties at CISD would have been difficult.

"Getting the work done here at home instead of having to take the computers to Amarillo saved the school a lot of time and money. We're pleased the Mr. Rippetoe's students

have asked to work with us."

Students respond to other needs of the area nonprofit agencies as well. Ms. Stepp, for instance, has provided technical support for the Donley County Senior Citizens in setting up their new computer with appropriate software

Clarendon school trustees hold regular meeting, accept bids

The Board of Trustees of the Clarendon Consolidated Independent School District met in regular session at 7 p.m. in the Administration Building.

Dr. Mick Stevens gave a presentation on district goal setting.

The board accepted the low bid for insurance from HRH Insurance of Amarillo.

On the sale of the GMC Pickup, the board accepted the high bid from Robert Tolbert.

Presentations were given by Larry Jeffers, Marvin Elam, and Mike Word on English-As-A-Second-Language programs.

The board recognized receipt of the TIF Technology Advancement Grant of \$88,000. Appreciation was

expressed to Lynnette Bairfield and Marva Thomas for their efforts in obtaining this grant.

After an executive session, the board accepted the resignation of Lynnette Bairfield effective 12/31/98.

Larry Jeffers, Mike Word, Marvin Elam, John Taylor, Mark Howard, and Phil Barefield gave administrative reports.

Howardwick board appoints Davis to be new mayor pro-tem

The Howardwick Board of Aldermen met in regular session on October 6, 1998, at 7 p.m. in the Howardwick City Hall.

County Judge Jack Hall gave a report as to the need for replacing the radio system in the sheriff's office.

Nancy Davis was appointed to fill a vacant seat on the board of aldermen, and she was also selected to be the mayor pro-tem.

Two bids were received for repairs needed on the roof of City Hall. Two aldermen voted for Lanny Edwards, and two voted for Crawford Roofing. Mayor Margaret Pettit broke the tie with her vote for Crawford Roofing.

Dean Arnold asked if the city would be interested in selling the topper shell. The board voted

unanimously to sell the topper to Dean Arnold.

On October 13, 1998, the board of aldermen met in a called meeting at 1:30 p.m.

The board approved a resolution authorizing the submission of a contract between the city and the Texas Dept. of Housing and Community Affairs.

Clarendon CISD to conduct survey to set goals for district

Clarendon CISD is involved in a study designed to provide direction for developing goals for the district. The district has contracted with Dr. Michael Stevens of West Texas A&M University to assist in developing and completing the study.

An integral part of the study will include conducting a survey of students, staff, parents, and community members. Results from the survey will provide a valuable insight into the perceptions about the effectiveness of the district.

"It has been six years since the last extensive study of the community perceptions about the needs of the district and the effectiveness of our programs," stated Phil Barefield, district superintendent. "A lot of things change in this time period, so we need to check our focus to see if it may need some changes."

Dr. Stevens will meet with members of the Clarendon CISD staff to administer the survey. Students in grades 7-12 will be surveyed to gather their perceptions on a variety of different topics.

A survey of community members

will be conducted by placing survey forms at the post office. Community members will be asked to complete the surveys and place the completed forms in a box that will be available. The completed forms will be shipped to Dr. Stevens for tabulation and analysis.

The parent surveys will be mailed to the parents by the school district. A stamped envelope addressed to Dr. Stevens will be supplied for parents to mail the completed surveys to his address.

Following the tabulation and analysis of the surveys, Dr. Stevens will meet with the board and administration of the district to begin the process of developing goals for the district. The goals will be designed to provide a common direction for the district, to focus effort in the most effective method possible, and to meet the needs that are found through the survey.

"The school board is hopeful that every citizen will take this opportunity to comment about the district through the survey," stated Barefield. "The school district should be a reflection of the community."

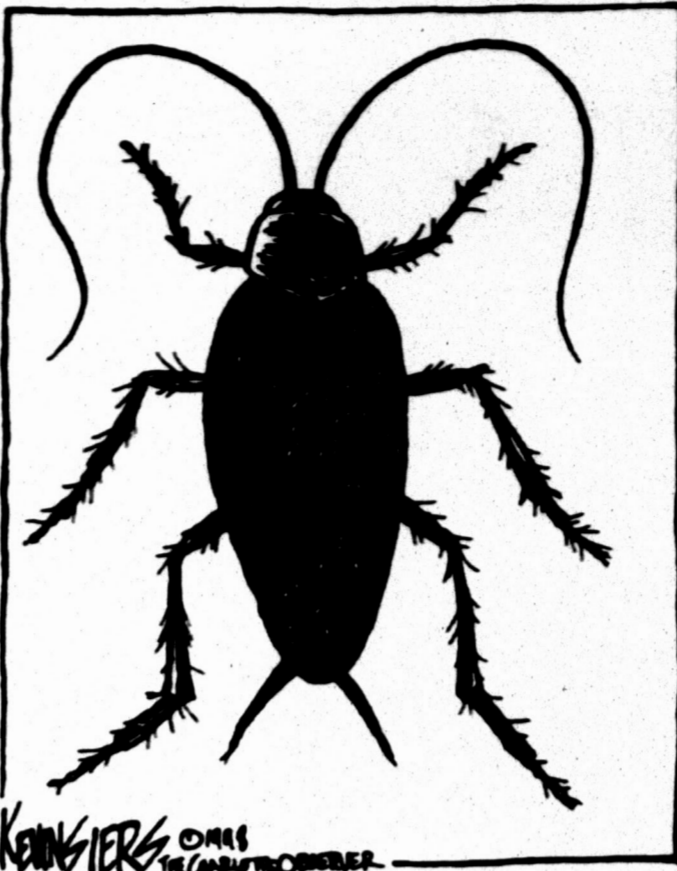

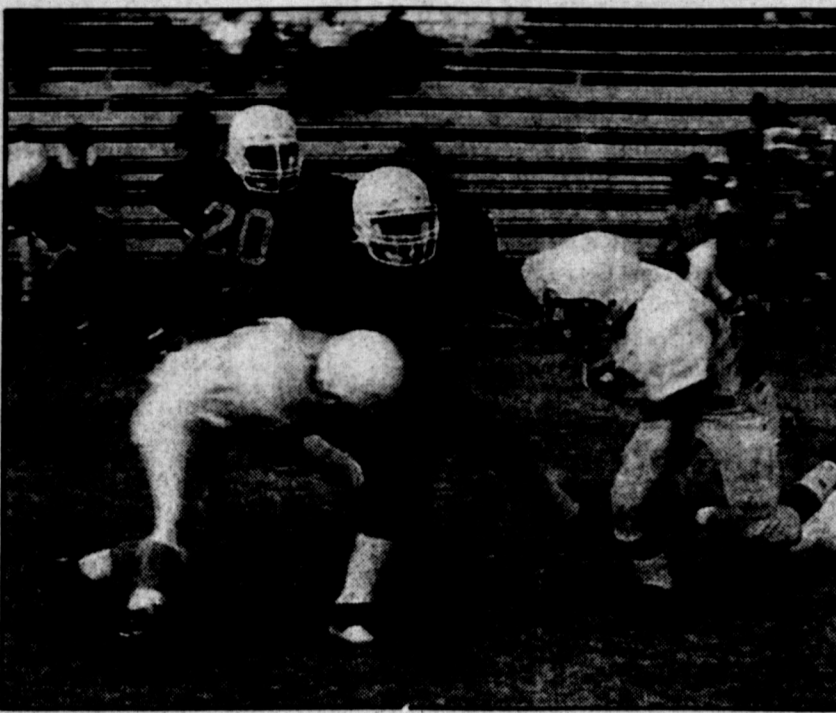

Massage therapy important aid for recovering from injuries

HOUSTON - Massage isn't just for sore muscles anymore.

"Massage has become an important component of rehabilitation programs for patients recovering from a variety of injuries, including broken bones, joint replacements, and back problems," said David Brennan, an exercise physiologist in the Dept. of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation at Baylor College of Medicine. "Massage increase circulation, decreases muscle spasm and allows muscle and tissue to recover more quickly."

Typically used as part of a physical-therapy regimen, massage is designed to complement, not replace, traditional rehabilitation. It can also be used to ease the pain of arthritis and treat migraine headaches.

Different types of massage therapy target specific problems. The nature of the patient's complaint can

help determine what type of massage will be most beneficial.

"People with lower-back pain, for example, shouldn't have a deep-tissue massage," said Brennan. "This type of massage could actually do more harm than good. A Swedish massage, which involves light, soothing strokes, is more appropriate for these patients."

For patients experiencing muscle spasms, massage that zeros in on "trigger points" has been successful. This technique pinpoints sensitive areas in the muscles that lead to the spasms.

There are other types of massage approaches, but virtually all center on a common objective: manipulating and heating the muscles to increase blood flow to the affected spots. This helps heal muscle and tissue.

"While massage might look easy to perform, the techniques are very detailed and require hours of training,"

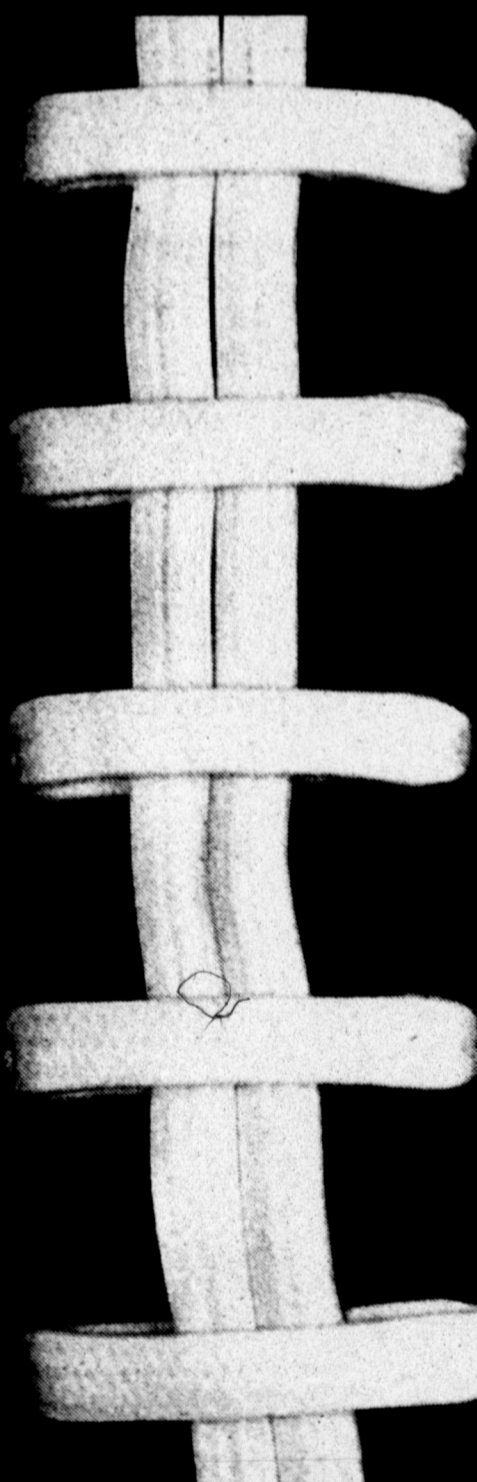

The Wellington 8th grade Firecrackers came out fired up for their second meeting with the Colts this season.

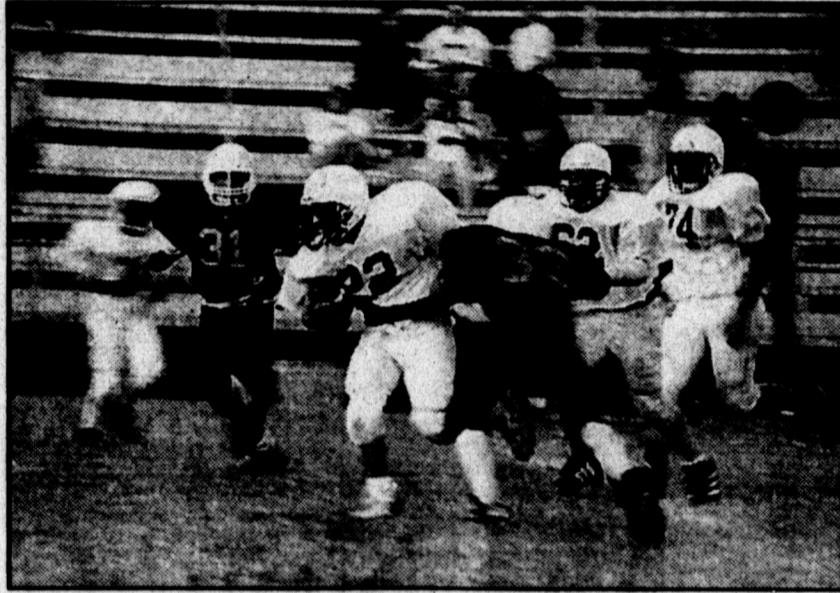
