





sporting goods stores have a definite place in fishing. But they are specialized tools and work only in certain situations. Knowing how to recognize these situations requires much experience. Most week end anglers simply

haven't encountered enough situations to pinpoint clues which will tell them which lures to In this respect water depth

is very important. Lures with metal lips are designed to run at certain depth. A lure built to run 10 feet beneath the surface will, for example, be halfway down in 20 foot water, near bottom in 12-foot water, but close to the surface in 40-foot water.

Unless the angler knows the depth of water he's fishing, this type lure will be practically useless.

But if he sticks with the top water bait or the bottom-bumper, the water depth is not as important. He'll still have his bait in the vicinity where bass hang out. Only within the past few years

have fishermen been able to apply this formula successfully. It used to be that the only baits which dug deep down most an where the big bass ar to be found, were those with long metal lips. These baits require a fast retrieve to make them dig deep, too fast to make them really effective on a lazy old bass.

Also they are not too effective at depths exceeding 30 feet, and often the truly big bass are found at extreme depths of 40 to 50 feet.







Lifelike lures made of limp plastic can be worked very slowly, crawled right along the bottom, yet they have enough action to tempt bass.

Many anglers carry two rigged outfits in their boats, one equipped with a top-water lure, the other with a bottom-bumping bait. They try one for 25 to 30 casts, and if by then they haven't inveigled a strike. they switch to the other outfit.

Often it pays off to try the topwater baits for the first couple of hours after daybreak when bass migrate into the shallows to feed on things found along the surface; then use the bottom-bumping baits during the remainder of the day when the fish have drifted back into deeper water.

As to the color of a lure it has been proven that the color shading is more important than the actual color itself. If a person stays with two basic type lures - topwater and bottombumping - and two basic colors, light and dark, he'll be right 99 times out of 100.

And in the unpredictable sport of bass fishing, those are pretty good odds, indeed.





Senate Weighs, House **Votes Fallout Shelters**

Armed Services Committee. Speaking for the Joint Chiefs of Staff, General Earle G. 

PUBLIC PIER - Parks and Wildlife Department will advertise a second time for bids for concession rights on the new State fishing pier at Port Lavaca. Only one person submitted a bid July 1 after 13 said they were interested.

The 3,200-foot-long pier, which replaced one destroyed by Hurricane Carla, is said to be the world's longest fishing pier. Access to it will be free to the public, but the department is trying to provide a source of bait, soft drinks and fishing gear via a concessionaire contract.

ANIMAL HEALTH HEAD CHANGE DUE - Texas Animal Health Commission will decide on July 27 on a new commission director to replace Dr. R. G. Garrett of Taylor who plans to resign.

Decision will be made at a meeting to be hosted by Chairman Ed Knolle of Sandia at his Knolle Jersey Farm in Jim Wells County. Knolle said there have been several "well-qualified" applicants for the post, but declined to list them. However, it has been rumored that a staff veterinarian with the commission, Dr. S. B. Walker, will be favored. BRUCELLOSIS PROGRAM

BLOCKED - Animal Health Commission postponed to September a decision on whether to let a Type II brucellosis control program be set up in one part of Brooks County.

Commission has been informed that many Brooks County producers want to organize a program, but the King Ranch which has 3,991 of the 16,000 head of cattle on county tax rolls does not. Approval of the owners of 75 percent of the cattle in a county is necessary so the proponents want to organize a program in just the soil conservation district which covers all of the county except King Ranch property. Commission said it lacked sufficient information for a decision at this time.
