



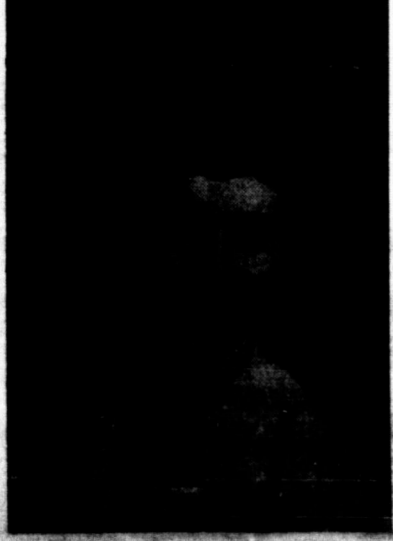
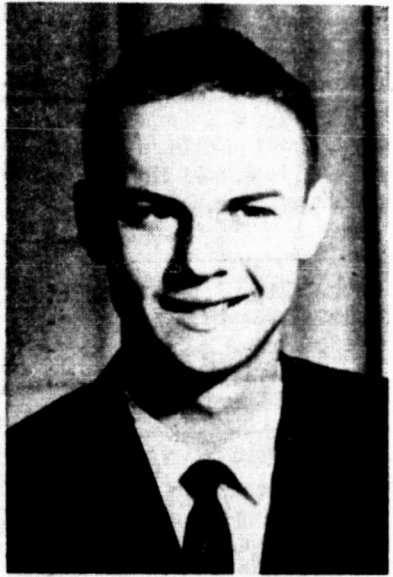

Send Information With Samples

Livestockmen sending larvae specimens to screwworm eradication headquarters at Mission are urged by County Agent Flip Breedlove to be sure the information sheet that should accompany the sample is filled out completely and accurately.

Eradication officials have reported that numerous samples are received with no information included. Some have been identified as screwworms.

Breedlove stated that prompt action is taken whenever an infestation is confirmed. In most instances, additional sterile flies are dispersed over the infested farm or ranch and livestock near the infested premises are sprayed at program expense.

"When samples are received with no information as to where it was collected, no action can be taken," the county agent said. "This could permit additional infestations to develop because no special sterile fly and spray treatment can be given to the area."

Eradication officials report less than 20 percent as many screwworm infestations have been experienced during the first four months of 1963 as during the same period last year. If livestock producers continue to inspect their animals at least twice a week, treat wounds and infestations, collect samples and report cases, officials feel there should be no recurrence of heavy infestations as experienced last year.

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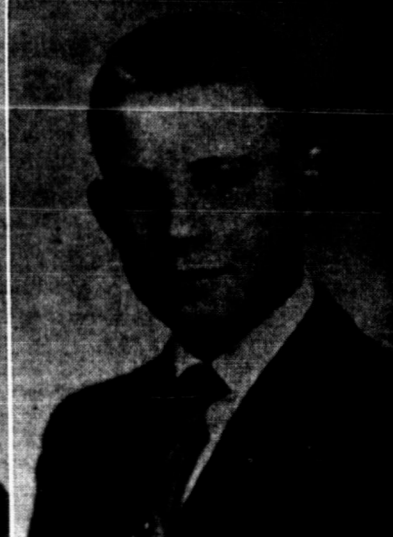

Dear Mr. Lohoefer:

We wish to thank you and your city officials for the cooperation given to our engineer during his inspection of the fire protection facilities of your city. The following recommendations

level as your present 150,000 gallon tank. Also, we strongly recommend that the 8-inch main be installed to this area as shown on the map.

If the water mains and fire hydrants are installed as shown on the map, charges totaling 5c may be removed from your key rate. The major item of importance besides the 8-inch main to the proposed 80,000 gallon railroad tank is the installation of the 8-inch main along Eighth Street. You are presently being charged for supply main deficient in size. If this 5c charge is removed from your key rate it will mean a savings of approximately \$1,400.00 each year to your citizens on their fire insurance premiums.

In connection with your fire department, we wish to commend the members on the fine work they are doing. Our engineer reports the equipment was clean and in good operative condition, as both pumpers passed the required in-service test.

Your 1927 Seagraves pumper is unreliable due to its age. We recommend that this truck be replaced with a new 500 GPM triple combination pumper when funds become available.

We strongly recommend that the number of volunteer firemen be increased to at least a minimum of 25.

Please see that the department is again represented at the Firemen's Training School at College Station this July 21-26.

If you have a minimum of either 15 fire phones or monitor radios, a 1c reduction may be obtained in your key rate. We are enclosing the specifications that must be met to receive this credit.

If you believe there are less than 75% combustible roofs in your residential areas, please follow the instructions on the enclosed survey blank.

Due to a recent revision in our Key Rate Schedule, your present \$100. Arson Reward must be increased to \$250. Please follow the instructions on the enclosed memorandum if you wish to retain the 2% credit for this item in your key rate.

Please notify our office prior to making any major changes in your waterworks system or fire department.

Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions," Mr. McCully concludes.

**COTTON FABRICS THAT DON'T BURN**

College Station — Fire resistant cotton fabrics made by a new chemical finishing treatment are being tested for military and civilian use according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The new treatment is one of many new finishing processes developed to improve cotton's position in the textile market, the Department says. Scientists of USDA's Agricultural Research Service at the Southern utilization research laboratory in New Orleans worked out the process in cooperation with the U. S. Army Quartermaster Corps and the National Cotton Council.

The process involves the treatment of cotton fabrics with a mixture of two organic phosphorus compounds, APO and THPC, which makes them flameproof and durable to laundering. The treatment does not greatly change the feel of the fabric and can be applied to cotton with conventional textile finishing equipment, the USDA reports. The APO-THPC finish is only one of four fire-proofing treatments developed at the New Orleans laboratory.

The new flame-resistant fabrics are being tested by the Department of Defense in rocket fuel handlers' uniforms and flight suits. Also, the U. S. Army is interested in the use of fire-resistant fabrics in combat clothing for field soldiers as added protection against incendiary weapons.

The USDA says that two large hospitals in New Orleans are testing the effectiveness of the treatment on bed sheets, pillow cases, and surgical gowns. The U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare is also planning tests of the new finishing process in actual use. After many launderings, sheets, pillow cases, surgical gowns and blankets will be evaluated for wearability, esthetic qualities, strength retention, and flame resistance.

Many fire departments are now testing flame resistant cotton garments. The District of Columbia Fire Department has equipped its firemen with treated coats as a result of successful tests under service conditions.

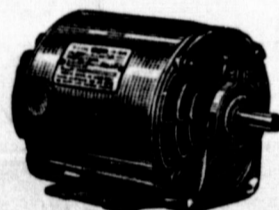

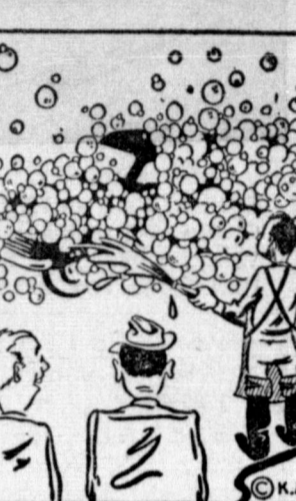

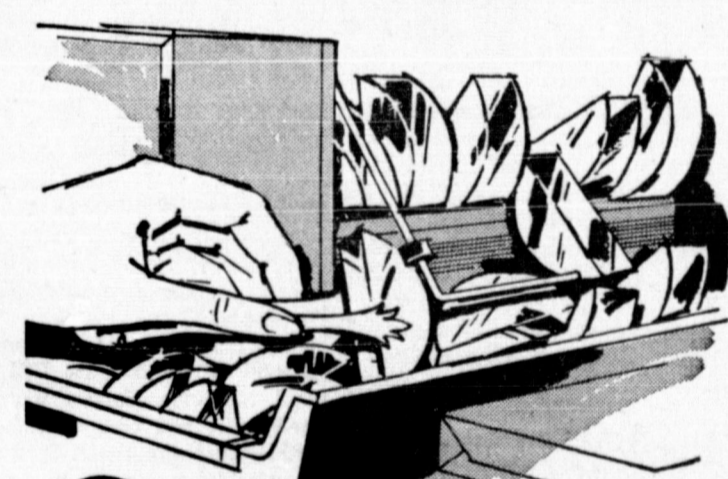

South A (beginning with the Roy Roberson farm), B, and C Communities will vote at the Donley County ASCS Office, North A will vote at the Fraser Elevator, D and E Communities at Pointer's Store at Lelia Lake, F & G at Wilson Drug, Hedley, East H Community at Bernard McClellan's home and West H will go to Ollie Hommel's home.

Let us remind you that you must vote in the Community in which you live.

## SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

### Guar Being Promoted As Cash Crop For Area

An effort is being made in this area to locate farmers interested in producing guar, a drought resistant legume that has been planted to varying degrees in Texas and Oklahoma for several years.

A government ruling that diverted grain acres must be planted to some type of soil improving crop, plus the fact that the General Mills plant in Kenedy is making an effort to get more acres of the crop seem to be the reasons for the unusual interest this year, according to a release from the Soil Conservation Service.

Not only does guar present good earning potential from the sale of the beans, but it is also considered an excellent land improvement crop, according to Bright Newhouse, work-unit conservationist for the Donley County Conservation District.

The new cash crop push for guar as a bean producing crop is based on a breakthrough in industrial processing techniques which minimizes the risk of crop damage from exposure to extended fall rains during harvest season. Bean color is no longer a critical factor in marketing so long as the beans are fully developed and plump.

Newhouse said that several farmers in the Donley County SCD at one time grew guar, but discontinued the crop due to the lower prices paid for the rain-damaged beans.

John W. Stewart, field representative for General Mills' guar plant in Kenedy, Texas, has been contacting farmers in the area

for the past several days to get them to devote a substantial acreage to guar.

The guar plant in Kenedy was established in 1951 and operates on a year-round basis. Not enough of the beans are produced in Texas and Oklahoma so that some are imported each year from Pakistan and India.

The Kenedy plants extracts vegetable gum from the beans. The gum is used in a number of industrial processes such as mining production, petroleum drilling and mud compounds, manufacture of paper, printing pastes and other specialized uses.

The major product recovery from guar bean processing is a 35 per cent protein supplement animal feed widely used by cattle feeders and feed manufacturers in Texas.

Farmers in the area who plant guar, can expect yields of from 400 to 800 pounds per acre. The crop will sell for \$4.00 per hundred, F.O.B. Kenedy, Grade No. 1.

Mr. Stewart said that one of the principle reasons guar has failed to produce sufficient beans in this area is because it has been planted too early. It should be planted in late spring.

The guar plant grows to about three to five feet in height and the beans can be harvested with a standard grain combine.
