Local Jaycees To Take Part In Run For The Money

The local Jaycee club will be taking part in the National Jaycee project "Run For The Money" which is a project all Jaycees nationally will be backing. Run For The Money is a means by which the Jaycees will attempt to raise a million dollars to be given to President Johnson for use by the Olympians.

The Olympians is supported solely by contributions and is always badly in need of money. A torch will be lighted in New York City September 1, 1964 and will be carried down Route 86 to reach Los Angeles September 28th by halftime at the U.C.L.A. football game when it is hoped that a check for a million dollars can be given President Johnson.

West Texas Utilities Announces Rate Reduction

A company-wide \$1,100,000 annual reduction in electric rates was announced today by West Texas Utilities Company. One hundred and sixty three towns and communities served by the Utilities Company will benefit from the rate reduction.

The revised schedule of electric rates was filed with the City by Mr. C. A. Pitts, WTU Local Manager. The new rates will be effective with meter readings made after August 31, 1964.

The new rate schedules result from a reduction in the Company's income taxes due to recent changes in the federal income tax rates and the increased usage of electricity by present customers, together with greater company operating efficiencies and economies.

"These rate reductions," Si Phillips, WTU President, said, "are evidence of our policy of reducing the cost of service to customers whenever we can. The \$490,000 direct reduction of new generating equipment we have recently put into service, as well as the new facilities now under construction, make it possible for us to pass on again real savings to our customers. Based on 1963 sales, the new rate schedule will represent a reduction of about 3 1/2 percent company-wide."

Approximately \$390,000 of the annual savings from the reduced rates will go to residential customers. Phillips said that with the new rates the average residential customer will get about one-third more electric service for his money than he did at the end of World War II.

In addition, the new rates will mean a saving of \$274,000 for commercial lighting customers. The cost of service to combination general power and commercial service customers will be reduced another \$221,000. Phillips said that churches, schools and smaller commercial customers will particularly benefit from this rate change.

Large light and power customers will have a saving of \$140,000. "All customers," Phillips pointed out, "will share in the \$75,000 saving resulting from lowering the fuel clause adjustment factor made possible by improved power plant efficiencies."

In addition to the general reduction which affects virtually all customers, the new rate schedules provide an extension of the residential and commercial electric space heating rate from four to six months. Presently WTU electric space heating customers buy electric heat at a base rate of 1c per KWH.

As of Tuesday noon, 76 students have completed their registration for the fall semester at Clarendon Junior College. This is the first time that a pre-registration period has been made available for those students who wish to enroll before the regular registration day. The pre-registration period included August 17 - August 26.

Regular registration will begin at 9:00 a.m. on Tuesday, September 8. Registration will continue through September 23 for both the day and evening classes. The last day to register for any class is September 23.

Regular classes will begin at 9:00 a.m. on September 9. All Freshmen students who are entering college for the first time are required to attend the Freshmen Orientation on September 4 at 9:00 a.m.

Voters of the Hedley Independent School District went to the polls last Saturday and approved a \$275,000 bond issue nearly two to one for the construction of a new school building for grades one through twelve.

The bond issue carried by a vote of 196 for and 106 against. Voters also approved a school maintenance tax of \$1.50 minimum per \$100 evaluation by a vote of 208 for and 98 against which was better than two to one.

First Bale of Cotton Brought In Tuesday

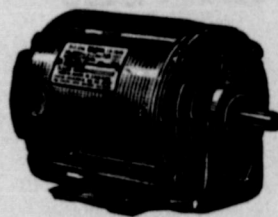

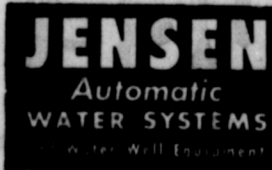

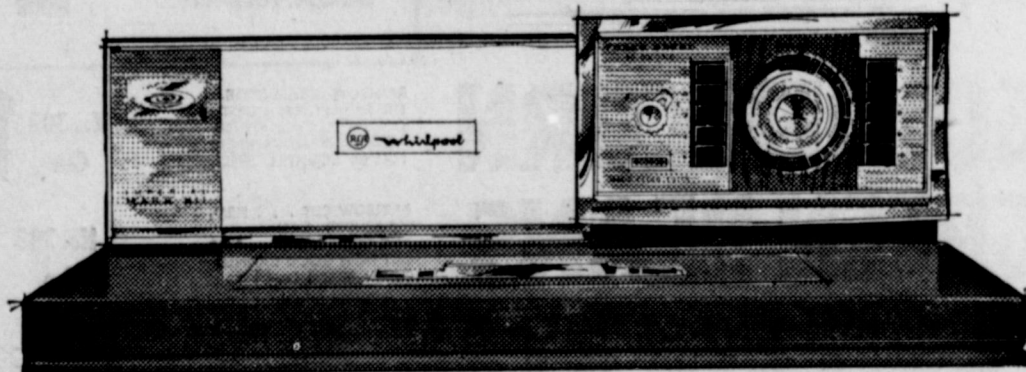

Local People Attend Canadian Tour

The Golden Spread Chapter of the Soil Conservation Society of America held an Agricultural tour at Canadian, Texas, August 7, 1964. Mr. Joe McMurtry, Jay Gould, Ervin Willard and Bright Newhouse of Clarendon attended the tour.

Dr. Leo Merrill of Sonora Experiment Station, E. H. McIlvain of Woodward Experiment Station and Wm. J. Waldrip of Throckmorton Experiment Ranch conducted the program in the morning.

Dr. Merrill pointed out results that they had obtained through rotational deferred grazing at Sonora. By using this system, their rangeland improved by running the same number of livestock while adjoining rangeland under continuous grazing gradually declined in range condition and production. Mr. Waldrip had experienced similar results at Throckmorton. Weaning weights of calves were increased 20 to 25 lbs. over a two year period. Further increases are expected as range continues to improve under this type of management.

Mr. McIlvain stated that results had indicated that chemical control of Sagebrush and Shiner Oak had made them more profitable than any other type of range practices applied at the Woodward Station. He added that it was economical to leave small amounts of brush for wildlife and to provide seed sources for desirable grass.

During the afternoon, a tour was conducted through the Dale Nix Ranch where a rotational deferred grazing program had recently been developed. Don Powell of Canadian explained to the group how the program will be applied.

The tour was concluded at the Gene Howe Wildlife Management

Area near Canadian. A. S. Jackson and Vernon Morse of Texas Parks and Wildlife Service showed the group range and wildlife management practices being applied to improve the wildlife population in the area.

JIMMY GRAHAM RECEIVES MS DEGREE IN AGRONOMY

James Carl (Jimmy) Graham, son of Mr. and Mrs. Doyce Graham, has received the Master of Science degree in Agronomy from the University of Wisconsin. Work toward the degree consisted of screening of various chemicals when applied to growing plants, reduced the amount of water lost by the plants, thus enabling them to make more efficient use of the available water. Title of his thesis was "Modification of Plant Transpiration with Various Chemicals."

Mr. Graham will continue study at the University of Wisconsin to obtain his doctorate degree in Agronomy and Bio-Chemistry. He was a graduate of Clarendon Junior College and a 1963 graduate of Texas Tech where he was on the Dean's Honor Roll.
