the all Sports Banquet. We need a lot of mothers present to help budget our money wisely to have a nice banquet for our children. Please make plans to attend this meeting.

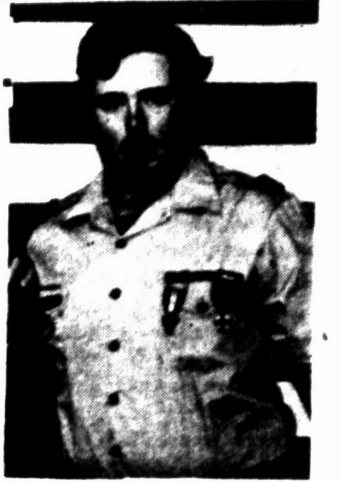

Thomas new Scoutmaster for Troop 433

James Thomas has accepted the position of Scoutmaster of Troop 433. He has been assistant Scoutmaster of the troop for six years. James earned his God and Country Award in 1972, Eagle Rank in 1974, was inducted into the Order of the Arrow in 1972, received his brotherhood in 1980. He has served as a counselor for the God and Country Program for 4 years for the First Baptist Church and has helped six young Scouts earn their awards in this program. Last month he was honored at an Appreciation Banquet in Pampa, where he was awarded the District Award of Merit. This is the highest honor that can be given in the Kiowa District to honor an adult Scouter.

James came from a Scouting family. He has three younger brothers, all of which hold the God and Country Award and all are Eagle Scouts. His father, Claude Thomas has served the troop many years as an assistant Scoutmaster.

Nationwide less than 1% of all boys who enter the Scouting program ever obtain the rank of Eagle. The percentage of boys who receive the God and Country Award is much less than those who obtain the rank of Eagle.

He takes over the Scoutmaster's post from Tommy Save, who had held that position for 23 years. Save stated, "James is a splendid example of what Scouting can do for a young man. He has served the unit faithfully in all Scouting activities. I have depended heavily on him. That much of the success of our troop has been through his efforts." Save will now serve the troop as the Institutional Representative for the First Christian Church.

James has lived in Clarendon since the first grade. He graduated from Clarendon High School, attended Hardin Simmons University, and Clarendon College. He is now employed by the Texas Highway Dept. James is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Thomas of Clarendon.

H.J. R. 19 passed the House on February 22. This will appear as a Constitutional Amendment for all citizens to vote on at a later date, providing the Senate passes the bill. If passed by the voters, the present Permanent University Fund held by the University of Texas and Texas A & M University could be expanded and spent on their satellite institutions in the same manner as the base universities. The other state-supported colleges would have a \$75 million fund created for their building needs. This battle has been fought since 1979, as to how this would be done. If the Senate concurs, the voters will make the final decision on this matter. This passed the floor of the House of a vote of 138-7.

A review of the status of the appropriation process - the Legislative Budget Board approved a budget for the State for the next two years in the amount of \$31.4 billion. After this was approved, Comptroller Bob Bullock has revised the estimate of revenue downward by about \$1 billion. This leaves the Legislative Budget Board's recommended budget about

one-half billion higher than Comptroller Bullock earlier estimated. This means the Appropriation Committee must cut a minimum of one-half billion out of the Legislative Budget Board proposed budget.

Today, we learned that Comptroller Bullock will come out with another revised budget that could lower the budget by another billion dollars. If so, the present Legislative Budget Board budget would need to be cut by the total of one and one-half billion. There would still be two and one-half billion more money for the next two years than was available for the past two years.

There is a new idea floating around the Capitol which deserves our study. Rafael Gonzales, Hays County Commissioner, is the one who authored the idea. The idea is labeled "Proposition Zero." Earlier press coverage did not clearly explain the idea. I have not verified the data presented on the Fact Sheet I am attaching, but the idea is what I would like to check out. Facts about Proposition Zero [The Residential Tax Relief Program]
THIS APPLIES TO SCHOOL PROPERTY TAX ONLY
 Proposition Zero is a proposed Constitutional Amendment. If passed by the Legislature and then by

the voters of the state, two very simple things would happen.

1. All Residential Property and all personally owned automobiles would be removed from the tax rolls. The Residential Property would include private homes, homesteads and residential rental property. This would reduce the local property tax statewide by \$930 million.

2. To make up this loss, the general sales tax and the motor vehicle sales tax would be increased by 1 cent and be collected statewide and redistributed to the schools on an ADA formula. The collection would amount to about \$1.191 billion or about \$430 per ADA (Average daily attendance). All schools would have a constitutional guarantee that the state tax collected would make up the losses incurred by the amendment. Based on the above figure, there would be \$261 million more collected for school districts to use in their local programs with no strings attached. This would include the supplementing of local salaries.

Farm Credit Loans

During calendar year 1982, Federal Land Banks with 667,000 loans outstanding took action resulting in 385 foreclosures. Production Credit Associations, with 378,000 members with loans outstanding, took action resulting in 870 farm foreclosures.

Farm Credit System loan losses were up in 1982, compared to 1981, but such losses still represent a small percentage of loans outstanding. On December 31, 1982, Federal Intermediate Credit Bank and Production Credit Associations had losses of \$160.4 million, or .75% of loans outstanding. Federal Land Bank losses on December 31, 1982 stood at \$1.5 million, only .003% of the Federal Credit Bank loans outstanding. [AFBF National Affairs Bulletin]

United Nations Cost
 The U. S. News and World Report, February 21, 1983, reported that the United Nations Budget for 1983 is estimated at \$719.8 million, compared to \$618.0 million 1980, \$168.4 million in 1970 and \$63.1 million in 1960. The current budget is shared as follows: United States 25%, Soviet Russia 12%, Japan 10%, Western Europe 27%, all others 26%.

Inflation
 The U.S. News and World Report, February 21, 1983, reported that the buying power of a 1900 dollar was only 9c in 1982 based on consumer price index. According to the article, the 1900 dollar was worth 50c in 1930 and 28c in 1960.

GTE update

"General Telephone, on an update for 1982, state they have not experienced an increase in telephone movement in the Memphis area during a period of continued economic hardship, soaring construction costs, mounting equipment prices and higher interest rates," stated Jimmy Bennett, General Telephone Memphis Operations Manager.

During the past year, the Company has not noticed an increase in telephone lines in the Memphis area. They did, however, note there was an increase in internal movement, i.e., change in type of service and change in service location.

Last year General Telephone's Western Division spent approximately \$1,540,300.00 on cable additions and replacements in the Memphis area. These dollars were spent in placing 640,000 miles of cable in the Memphis area. This included a new microwave system between the towns of Paducah and Ralls.

General Telephone continued its program of replacing and rehabilitating cable to improve service and reduce some of the costs in the Memphis area. The Company's cable rehabilitation and pressurization program is being stepped up. The cable pressurization program monitors points in the cable which all signal a control panel in the central office when a break occurs in the outer covering of the cable, thus allowing cable problems to be resolved quickly without serious damage.

An additional \$20,000 was spent in clean up after the recent ice storms in December and January which hit the Memphis area.

General Telephone opened a number of Local Service Offices and Local Service Agencies throughout the Memphis Operations Area. Twelve offices in all have been opened in the last year at a cost of approximately \$300 per month per office. These facilities provide customers with a convenient location to pay bills, handle service problems, place ap-

plications over the phone and have minor repairs on equipment handled.

The Memphis Operations Area employs 147 employees at an annual income of \$610,300.00.

According to Jimmy Bennett, "Quality customer service is our bottom line objective for the Memphis area, and GTE will continue to diligently pursue that mission for 1983 with continuing service improvements."

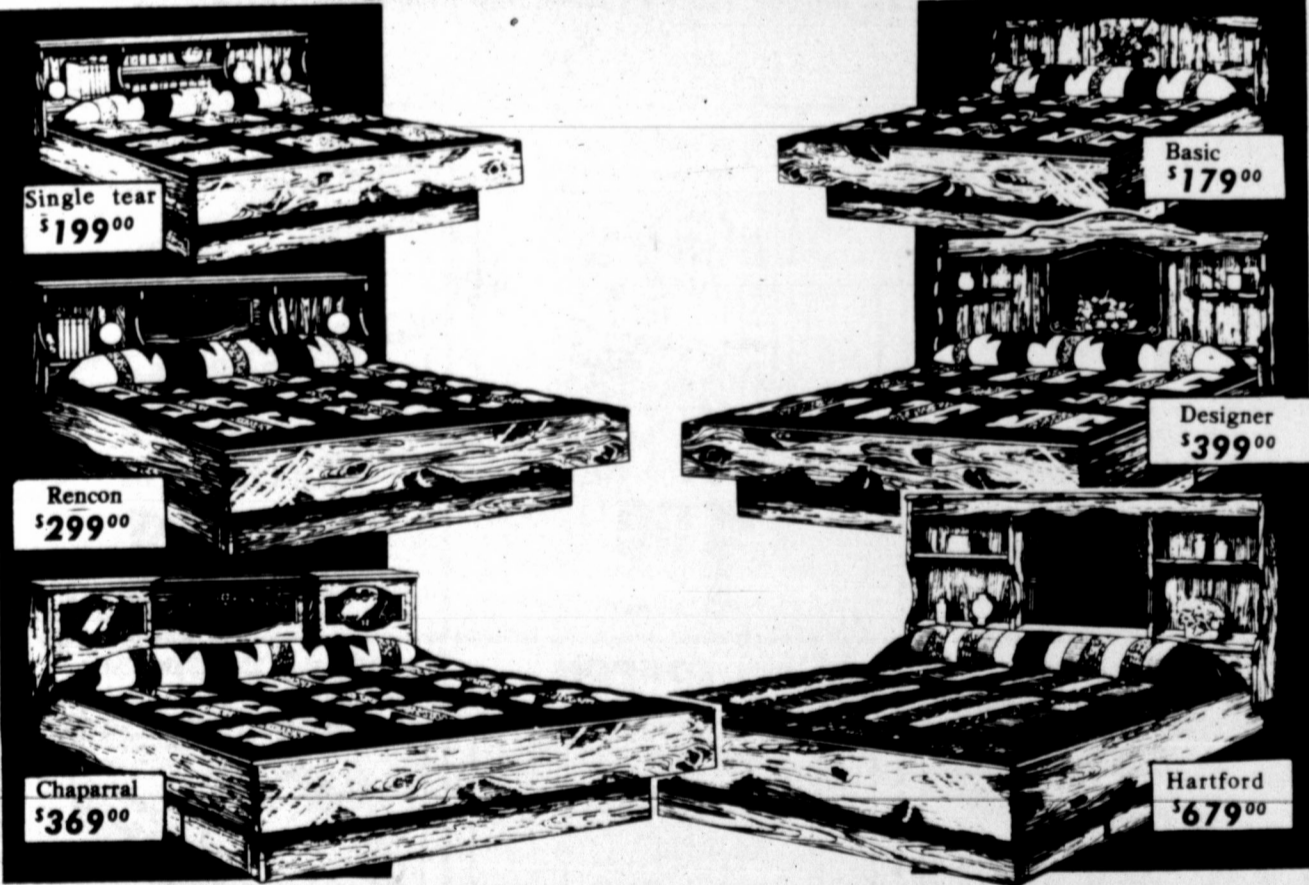

This Land Is Your Land

On Feb. 17th Governor Mark White, Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby, and House Speaker Gib Lewis publicly endorsed legislation sought by my administration on a constitutional amendment to create a Veterans Housing Assistance Program.

The program will stimulate the construction of 25,000 new homes and generate 45,000 new jobs within our economy. By creating this program to allow Texas veterans to borrow up to \$20,000 to purchase a home, we will give thousands of families who have been unable to purchase a home the opportunity to own their own home.

In endorsing the bill, Governor White said our proposal "holds great promise of stimulating the economy through new construction. I endorse this proposal as a jobs program and as an attempt to address the problem of a generation frozen out of the housing market."

The constitutional amend-

ment would allow the Veterans Land Board to issue general obligation bonds to help veterans make a down payment on home mortgages. The size of bond sales would be based on demand for loans and the prevailing interest rate in the bond market at the time of the sale.

The bill has 81 co-sponsors in the House and 22 in the Senate. It has the support of veterans groups leaders as well as representatives of the financial and home-building industries.

The Veterans Housing Assistance Program will be modeled after the successful Veterans Land Program. Over 80,000 veterans have taken advantage of this long term, low interest loan to purchase rural land. While the Veterans Land Program is still a good program, we need to meet the modern demands of our largely urban population. Under my proposal a Texas veteran can apply their loan toward the purchase of a home in either a rural or

urban area.

The legislation provides for the proposed constitutional amendment to be submitted to the voters following its approval by the Legislature. Upon adoption, Texas veterans will then be able to apply for a loan from the Housing Assistance Program which can be used as a down payment and loan to apply with their other mortgage from a private lending institution. The existing Veterans Land Program will remain unchanged.

The beauty of this program is that the benefit to the veteran and the housing industry is at no cost to the taxpayer. The program will be financed through a bond issue which will be repaid entirely by the veterans themselves.

The program is totally self-sustaining, no new state bureaucracy will be created, thousands of new jobs will be created, and will not cost the taxpayer one penny. This is the best kind of partnership

NELWYN, Ward, and Scott Hudgens



Donley County Feedlot Opens

Ward Hudgens, wife, Nelwyn, and son, Scott, have recently re-opened the Donley County Feedlot, located on the south side of Hwy 287, about ten miles east of Clarendon and three miles west of Hedley. Hudgens has been in the cattle/feedlot business all of his life, beginning feedlot operation work from the bottom of the ladder as a rider and working his way to the top as owner/operator of the new feedlot. The Ward Hudgens family plan to make Donley County their home.

Hudgens hails from the South Plains Cochran County area, Lubbock, and Deaf Smith county. He has worked in, for, and around feedlots to know that efficient management is the key to a successful operation for both the owner and the cattle owner.

"Our goal," Hudgens

said, "is to finish cattle for the investors. We want everyone to turn a profit. That's what this business is all about." His determination to slick up the plant has proven he is a good manager.

Within three months, Hudgens has cleaned up the 100 pens, cleaned up and furnished the little office building, repaired or replaced watering tanks and pumps, water heaters and chutes. He has done a major over-haul on the half million dollar mill and is currently awaiting first shipment of feed to test out the mill and make a balanced test mix of feed, then the cattle can arrive.

"People may not know it," Hudgens said, looking over the 18,000 head-capacity pens, "but we get cattle from Florida, the East Coast, and all of the southern states. Trucks drive right

past here on their way to the Panhandle everyday. We want to stop some of them and have them unload right here."

While the maximum number needed to operate the Donley County Feedlot is only a few personnel, the business will bring many thousands of dollars into our community from other labor. There will be vehicles to purchase; electrical, plumbing, and mechanical repairs to be made; and of course, the purchase of feed, supplies, medical needs, office supplies, and many other services. The trade that the truckers will bring will also help. If the nation's economy stabilizes, Hudgens feels that this can be a three million dollar operation.

Doctor Hollis Klett, nutritionist, will supervise and make periodic checks to insure that the cattle are receiving the correct and most nutritious mix. He is the consulting nutritionist for the Mexico Government and many large feedlots in Texas and the West Coast.

Donley County Feedlot boasts of one of the few covered hospitals. Most feedlot operations do not have the luxury for both men and beast as well as a covered hospital. This is the initial contact the cattle have with the feedlot. It's well-run, efficient operation is vital to the success of the cattle's growth.

When the trucks unload the cattle, they are driven to the chutes leading into the hospital. Here they are ear tagged with lot brands then taken to their pen. This also helps the operators to know what inoculations they have received. The numbered ear tag also helps identify the lot for the owner's records to identify the cattle to return to the proper pen, and is used, should the animal need to be returned for more medical attention.

The cattle are branded with an owners identification. They are given growth hormone implants and other treatments as needed. Then they are held in a pen nearby for fifteen days to see if any of the animals need further doctoring. Those without any reactions are taken to their home pens. Those needing attention are re-

treated and held another three days before returning to the home pen.

Cowboys ride the pens twice a day to look for sick cattle or those not responding to medication. They are pulled from the pen and taken to the hospital to be redoctored. From the first day of arrival until they reach peak condition to sell, the cattle may stay 180 days at the feedlot.

Local veterinarians, Dr. Charles Deyhle and Dr. Charles Deyhle Jr. are utilized should anything come up that the trained operators cannot handle. Since our veterinarians are world-known for their skills with cattle and horses, cattle owners can expect only the finest in veterinarian attention.

The operation of the mill is something of a mechanical masterpiece in nutritional engineering. The raw feed is air lifted up into the first 100,000 pound bin, sent through the shaker or cleaner acid treated, and elevated to 150,000 pound holding bin, through the rolls, picked up by air and lifted into specific bins such as corn or grain.

There is a large vat that contains animal fat. It is kept heated to a liquid. Next to it is a huge vat of molasses, kept liquid in the winter by a heater. Twelve percent moisture is added to feed and the fat, molasses and grain or corn is mixed into a mix that is funneled into a mixing ration and feeds the cattle on a regular basis. Each animal can consume as much as 3% their body weight, so the preparation of this balanced diet and distribution of it could be a never-ending operation. This is an automatic batch mix operation built in California and in excellent condition now that all of the repairs have been made. The ration is changed every ten days, depending on how well the animals are responding to the feed. The nutritionist establishes the batch mix and rotation times.

Some folks wonder what happens to all of that feed after it passes through the cow. It will take 18 months before the depth of manure will be enough to warrant cleaning out, but when that happens, farmers can purchase the manure and haul it away to their fields.

Hudgens feels that a feedlot located on the Rolling Plains of Texas has some advantage as compared to the High Plains feeding area. We have milder winters and a shorter duration. This can have a marked influence on cost of grain, also Hudgens thinks that the Donley County Yard has some added advantages of natural weather-protection. The yard has a great deal of natural drainage and sandy soil type of this area helps hold the mud problem to a minimum, as mud and continued long cold spells with very little protection, can cause the cost of gains to rise very rapidly.

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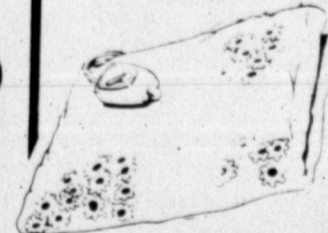
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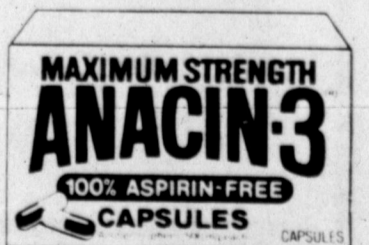

HEALTHY ADVICE

Questions for the Doctor

Q. I just had a baby. When can I safely resume a regular exercise program such as jogging?

A. Many women are concerned about incurring a prolapsed, or "fallen" uterus during strenuous exercise after pregnancy. According to the Journal of the American Medical Association, a prolapse, or downward displacement of the organ, is usually a result of uterine ligaments weakened in childbirth.

If you have not sustained any injury to the supporting tissues of the pelvis during childbirth, activities such as jogging will not be detrimental. Obesity and lack of good muscle tone probably contribute more to uterine prolapse than any form of exercise.

A gradual resumption of exercise is advisable after delivery. Proceed like any other beginner, starting with a 10- to 15-minute stretching routine before jogging. Avoid distance running until you are in better condition.

Q. Just how safe is aspirin for treating common ailments?

A. While aspirin is valuable as a nonprescription pain reliever, the side effects of the drug should be understood. Persons who take too much aspirin, perhaps because of chronic pain, may suffer stomach problems, heartburn, ringing in the ears and intermittent hearing problems.

Aspirin can cause an irritating effect in the stomach that can lead to internal bleeding. Because of this, the doctor may prescribe an aspirin suppository or coated aspirin to minimize the problem. Tablets also may be crushed in a small amount of liquid to be more easily absorbed.

Q. Do young people mature faster now? My children seem more advanced than I was at their age.

A. In the past 100 years, puberty in girls has occurred about four months earlier each decade. Boys and girls now reach adult size sooner than did their parents, and they are generally larger than their parents. Unfortunately, among the 27 million Americans between 13 and 19, approximately half are sexually active. Some experts believe this is partially because of earlier physical growth and maturity.

SUGARLESS SNACKS

Children love snacks. And much to the chagrin of the dental profession, they love snacks filled with sugar.

According to the American Dental Hygienists' Association, when sugar reacts with the bacteria in your mouth, plaque is formed on your teeth. The acid from the plaque causes tooth decay.

Research has shown that how often sugars are eaten, how long they stay in the mouth and the type of food eaten also play an important part in the decay process.

To help you combat tooth decay and satisfy your children's sweet tooth, the American Dental Hygienists' Association suggests the following snack recipes that do not contain table sugar, honey or syrups:

APRICOT CANDY

- 1/3 cup grated coconut
- 3/4 cup chopped peacans
- 1 teas. lemon juice
- 1 teas. lemon rind
- 1 teas. orange juice
- 3/4 cup dried apricots
- 1/3 cup water

Steam apricots five minutes in the water. Cool and mix with rest of ingredients in a blender. Form into balls and roll in coconut. Refrigerate several hours. Makes about a dozen.

PEANUT BUTTER BALLS

- 1/2 cup peanut butter
- 1 teas. vanilla
- 2/3 cup coconut
- 1/4 cup chopped nuts
- 1 teas. lemon rind
- 1/2 cup raisins

Mix well and form into balls. Roll in coconut or sesame seeds. Chill until firm. Makes about a dozen.

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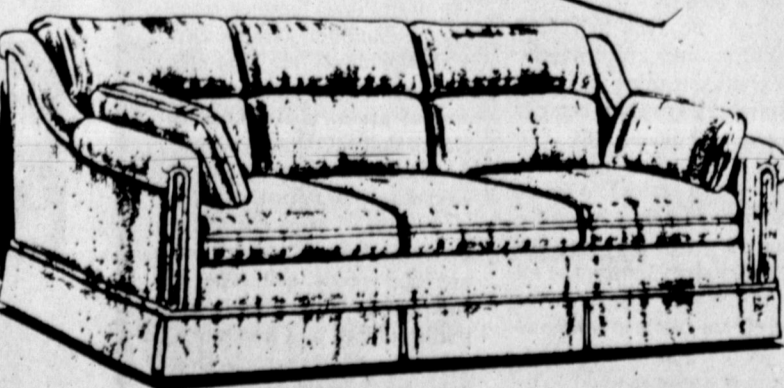
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Players of the Week
