Good Friday services at First Baptist

This Friday, April 1st at 12 noon and 7 p.m. the First Baptist Church will conduct a "Good Friday" service. There will be a slide narration of the historical sites and significance of Christ's experience on that day almost 2000 years ago.

The noon service will be abbreviated so that you will have time to go home and eat after the service. The evening service will have special music along with the slide presentation.

The purpose of these services are to help us to better understand and appreciate what Christ has done for us in completing our salvation.

The last words Jesus spoke while on the Cross, as record in the Gospel of John, are very significant to our understanding of what is needed in one having a saving relationship to Christ. "When Jesus therefore had received the sour wine (vinegar), He said, It is finished! and He bowed His head, and gave up His spirit. John 19:30" The one phrase - "It is finished!" speaks of the plan and purpose of God, Christ and the Holy Spirit from eternity to eternity. Before the foundations of this world God's plan was set to offer to a fallen world a plan of redemption (buying back) for lost humanity. When Christ said "It is finished!" this plan of

There have been those all through human history who have said that the plan of salvation is not a finished work and more is needed in order to have a true and meaningful relations with Christ. Paul in his Letters to the various churches makes reference to two such groups. One is referred to as Gnostics (Nostics). These said that knowledge and one's ability to reason plus Christ were needed for salvation. If you had the ability to reason and comprehend God's wisdom plus accepting Christ, then you were saved. This limited many to experiencing salvation so the Gnostic element became an exclusive group.

The other group Paul referred to were the "Judizers". This group wanted to continue with the law (priestly functions of the Old Testament) plus accepting Christ. This would secure one's salvation.

Today we still have groups who insist that one's salvation is secured by some added material or philosophy outside the Bible. The only way one can justify such an interpretation of a salvation experience is to allow other writings plus the Bible to On that "Good Friday" afternoon Jesus said: "It Is Finished". He completed the plan of salvation and offered hope to a lost world.

Acts 4:12 "And there is salvation in no one else; for there is no other name by which we must be saved."

Acts 10:43 "...that through His name everyone who believes in Him has received forgiveness of sins."

Col. 2:9-10 "In Him all the fullness of Deity dwells in bodily form, and in Him you have been made complete..."

1 Tim. 2:5-6 "For there is one God, and one mediator also between God and man, the man Christ Jesus, who gave Himself as a ransom for all, the testimony borne at the proper time."

Those last words from the Cross become so meaningful to our study of salvation for only in what Christ did on that "Good Friday" can one have eternal hope for salvation. It is finished!"

Ballerina Vodenhal to perform Cinderella

Every little girl has wished to be a ballerina at one time or another in her life. When Andrea Vodenhal, a native of Houston, began her career as a world-renown ballerina when she was 6½ years old. "My mother had longed for a career in dance but never had a chance," Andrea said. "So she asked me if I would like to dance. I said 'NO' because I was a real Tomboy. But she took me to see a ballet and I fell in love with it and knew that's what I wanted to be."

At age seven, little Andrea began her studies with Russian teacher Alexander Kotchetovsky. "He gave me excellent basic instruction. So many young people have their bones or muscles ruined because of improper training at such a young age. I was very lucky."

Andrea spent most of her spare time training and was unable to do many of the things a young, beautiful lady longs to do in school such as belong to clubs. "I missed being in the drama club," Andrea said, "because it would have helped me in dance."

To help her in her enthusiasm, her parents made certain she saw as many performances as possible. Now, of course, Houston has its own ballet company, but then Andrea could see one or two a year. Amarillo is very fortunate to have the Houston Ballet perform for all of our aspiring ballerinas.

Andrea doesn't really have a favorite role, but she does love the challenge of dramatic roles. She loves to dance the principal role of "Giselle" because of the dramatic challenges. "I like to utilize all of my senses and skills in a dramatic role," Andrea said. Her exciting portrayal of Cinderella in the kitchen is proof of her abilities.

"I am one of the lucky ones," Andrea said, "I don't have to watch my diet." She eats alot of nuts, white meat, fish and fruits because red meat is such a heavy protein and hard to digest that it could slow her down for performances. "Eating on the road is a problem because we have so little choices, but I eat alot of nuts and fruit and don't really have to worry," Andrea said.

Andrea is on the road quite a bit. The Houston Ballet Company travels for several weeks out of the year and makes a six week tour to Europe and in 1981 they went to China to perform with the Peking Dance Academy. "Ben Stevenson arranged for our troupe to be the first company to ever blend with the Peking Dance Academy in a performance," Andrea said. "We mixed partners and actually performed as one troupe. There was no language problem because dance is an international language. It was very exciting."

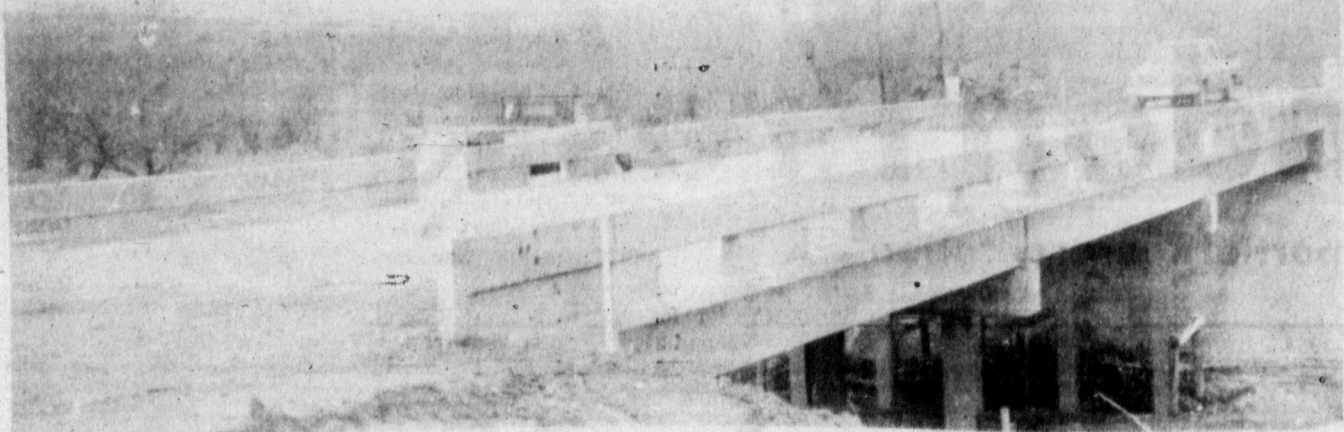
Help a Shriner help a child

ribbon and let the first car cross over the newly constructed bridge at Giles. The bridge replaced a 65

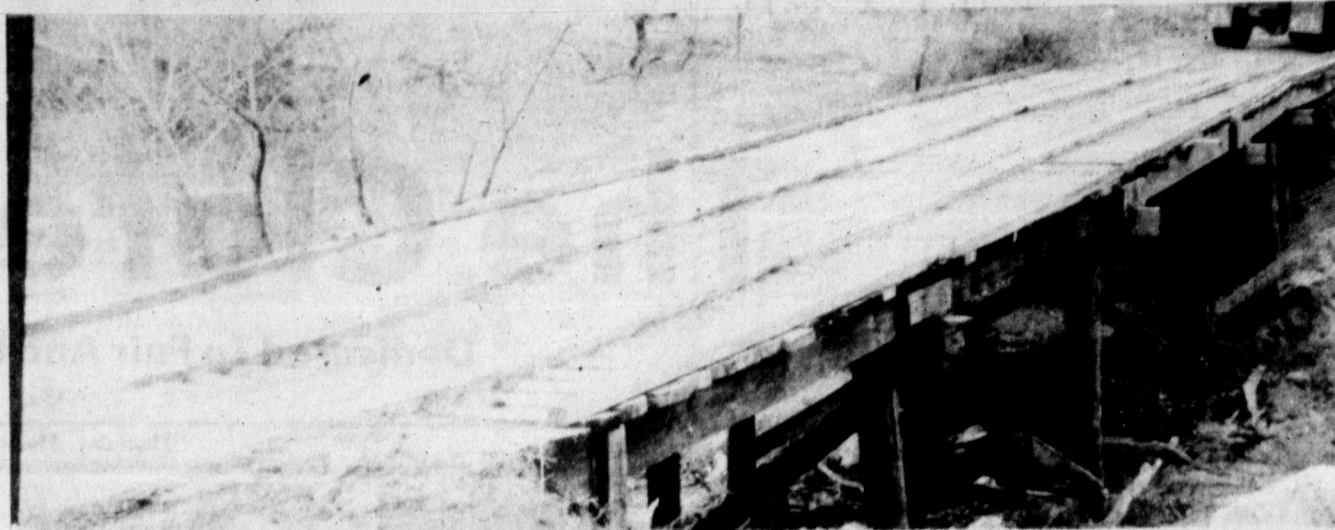
feet wooden span bridge built in 1938. The bridge was nearly ¾ deteriorated and dangerous to drive over.

When Mrs. Gladys Johnson was asked what she remembered about the old bridge, she said "I just remember I was afraid to drive over it." Now she will have no fears along those lines.

In fact, Mrs. Johnson was the first car to cross the bridge that bright morning. The second car was occupied by Fred and Peggy Watt. Fred has lived in Giles since he was born many years ago. The new bridge will make life easier for him. There were several couples from Hedley that had connections with Giles and had traveled across the rickety bridge many times. Two ladies from Memphis, Mary Sue Stotts and Audrey Foster, long-time residents of Giles were on hand to watch as well.

The little bridge crosses the tributary of the Buck Creek at Giles and cost \$120,000 to build. It is a steel and concrete bridge which should last a good long time unless the creek really rises and then we'll all need ark's anyway.


The Lions Tale

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FRIDAY Fish & Calf Fries \$3⁵⁰ Includes Drink

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A new regulation from the Food and Drug Administration will require drug manufacturers to provide a new warning label on certain nonprescription medicines. It will be required in the future on products which, when taken, are absorbed into the bloodstream.

As with any drug, if you are pregnant or nursing a baby, seek the advise of a health professional before using this product.

This regulation will help prevent drug-related birth defects in the unborn. Past studies have indicated that pregnant women typically take up to four prescription and nonprescription drugs during pregnancy. Fortunately, other reports indicated that only five percent or less of all birth defects are related to drug use.

The new regulation will also help minimize the occurrence of drug toxicity in breast-fed infants. This is not a major problem since drugs rarely cause infant toxicity except when taken by the mother in excessive quantities. A good rule-of-thumb for all moms or moms-to-be is to take as few medicines as possible when pregnant or while nursing an infant.

ever attempted was starting their pedodontics practice in Amarillo.

"When we started our practice," Howell says with a laugh "we really had a hard time specializing. There were only one oral surgeon and three orthodontists in Amarillo." This meant that specialists were still a thing of the future and people didn't really like to come or understood why they should come to a pedodontist.

"We spent the first few years really trying to educate the public about children's dentistry," Howell said. "People thought that if it was a baby tooth, pull it out. We got a lot of other doctors problem patients too."

The challenge was converting a frightened, angry youngster into a model patient. "We had about one or two children a week cry and our average aged patient was 4 to 5 years old," Howell remembered. "If we had a child that had been hurt or forced or was simply too frightened, we did their work in the hospital under general anesthesia. Many doctors still do that. Every Wednesday morning I'd go to the hospital. I was on the hospital staff for all three hospitals. I hated hospitals."

"The secret to having a good child patient," Howell says "is never, ever, under any circumstance force the child. As soon as you force them, you've lost them. Many of our referred patients came to us ready to do battle because they had been forced. It took a great deal of patience and understanding to get them willing to have treatment."

"My greatest challenge," Howell remembered with a sad shake of the head "was getting quality help. Some of those girls couldn't even read or write. It was very difficult to train them because they simply didn't have enough education. And when your staff is incompetent, it makes it very difficult to establish good rapport with your patients. Your staff makes or breaks your practice."

Like most doctors, Dr. Howell loves to fish. "If I have time, I like to tie flies and build fishing rods. I love guns and hunting, too. I like to keep bees and once I had a little printing press and made up all of own stationery and checks. I did pottery, too. I have two kilns and a wheel and love to do that. But I never have any time."

The Howells have a little farming and ranching operation with cattle and sheep and miles of fences that occupies much of his spare time and a practice in general dentistry that keeps both of them busy during the day.

Wife Dikki is his strong arm. She is his secretary, bookkeeper, chair side assistant, receptionist, farm hand, cook, and all-around-hand. When he recently underwent back surgery, Dikki was invaluable and inseparable for many months.

The Howells have six children; James, Zachary (deceased) Timothy, Tereia, Joseph, Peter and six grandchildren. Three of their children live in the area and are a constant joy and help. 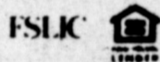

PATTIE SPRINGER'S MEXICAN CORNBREAD SALAD

2 pkg Mexican cornbread mix
1 qt Miracle Whip or salad dressing
1 C finely chopped onions
1 C finely chopped green peppers
1 C finely chopped celery
Cook each package of mix in a separate pan. Cook and

Stir in tomato mix. Cook over moderate heat 10 min. Drain olives, add with corn and green chilies to beef. Cook over low. Add cheese and stir gently. Garnish with green pepper rings.

1 C brown sugar
1 C sugar
1 C shortening
2 eggs
1 tsp vanilla
2½ C flour
¼ tsp salt
1 top baking soda
1 top cream of tartar
Cream sugars with shortening and eggs. Add vanilla, beat until light and fluffy.

Fish Tales

Largemouth Bass, has become the glamour fish for an army of anglers and the bystander can only marvel at the hoopla that it has spawned. For one thing, it has several national organizations of its own. It has its own magazine and, in effect, has produced an industry devoted to its catching. Crappie fishermen can get by in any old boat, but the largemouth has caused the "bass boat" to be created. Swift, stable platforms, powered by motors up to 200 H.P., with depth finders, thermometers, and trolling motors with the complexity of a computer, plus hauling trailers, are part of the package that can run into a minor industry is devoted to inventing and manufacturing lures specifically aimed at taking largemouth black bass.

Of course, with all that investment in equipment, some excuse to use it had to be invented, thus we have the bass fishing tournament. Is the bass worthy of all this fuss? It is not as difficult to catch as a carp. While a bass on a lone may fight, it probably does not do so any more violently than a green sunfish or even a horny-head chub. Its skillet qualities are no comparison to many other less sought after. Yet it is the glamour fish of the angling world.

When you consider that the bass is a chief predator in lakes, and predators cannot be as numerous as their prey, it stands to reason that there are going to be a lot fewer bass than sunfish or crappie. In our large lakes the bass typically amount to five percent or less of the total fish. We can catch a lot of bass and release them to be caught another day.

Eating fish come cheaper at the supermarket. If you want a challenge, try to catch the large carp that most large lakes have. They don't come easy, but if you hook one, he'll turn you every way but loose.

The bass boat, with its thousands of dollars worth of electronics and motor needn't be used only to chase largemouth. It'll work equally well on bluegills. After all, fishing is supposed to be fun, not a way to stock the larder. Satisfaction can be found in catching more difficult fish than bass. Fishing should return to being what Izaak Walton thought it was: a contemplative sport.

There were casseroles containing meat, chicken, cornbread, chilies, cheese and enchiladas. There were salads with everything in

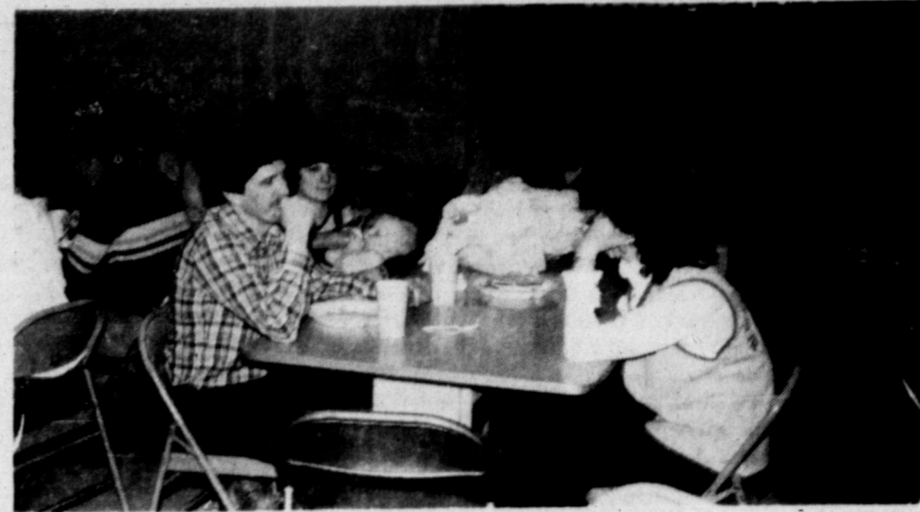
them except Jello, there were desserts to delight even the sweetest sweet tooth among the group. And there were more dishes available in the kitchen that never came out to be served!

"In Peking there are about 8 million people and nearly all of them ride bicycles. And the interesting thing to me was that when they got to where they were headed, they got off of their bicycle and left it and when they came back, it was still there. They didn't have to lock them or anything. Theft was just so rare or the punishment so severe that it didn't exist. That was interesting," Andrea said of her Chinese tour.

"The hardest part of traveling is getting used to the water and food of other places. But when we travel to Europe, we stay in one place a week and it's easier to adjust." Andrea also said she loved to rent a car and travel about in Europe to see how folks live and explore with some of her friends.

This year, Andrea will perform the Woman in Green or Mountain King's Daughter when Houston Ballet presents PEER GYNT at the opening of the Bergen Festival in Bergen, Norway on May 26. The company will tour the Scandinavian countries and Europe from May through July.

In addition to foreign travel, the Houston Ballet takes four weeks to travel in the United States. Amarillo is on their eleven performance, eight city northern tour.

What does a ballerina do in her "spare" time? Andrea likes to run on the beach with her four dogs, sew, read, listen to music and attend other concerts.

She normally has little spare time, however. She will spend two hours each day in class with a six hour rehearsal five days a week. Whenever there is a new role or a change or a challenge, she will work on weekends as well. During performances, the work out is the same, but for only six hours

a day rather than the eight of a normal of a normal work week.

How does a beautiful ballerina keep a boyfriend? It is very difficult," Andrea said. "If you have a friend who is in the business, he must be very understanding of your challenges, your time and if you are together in a show, you must be careful about having time alone. If you have a boyfriend out of the business, it is even harder because he must be very understanding of the time you spend working and traveling and your associations. It is difficult."

A question often asked by local students is "How does she keep from falling down after she has spun around so much?"

Andrea laughed and said that there is a little trick called "spotting". "You actually locate something in front of you and re-focus on it each time you turn. Your head actually turns faster than the rest of you. A skater can't do this because they spin so fast they couldn't possibly spot. But it's something we train regularly on." Andrea does quite a bit of "spotting" in her exciting dances and enjoys the sensation.

Andrea Vodehnal's future plans still include dance. "I am lucky with good training and good genes that I can still perform," she said "I hope to continue another five years

then will have to leave performing for another avenue." She explained that most dancers are physically unable to continue with the exhaustive work for many years. "I would like to work with mentally retarded children. A desk job is definitely out of the question because it is not rewarding in any way to me. I tried it for awhile and found it stifling.
