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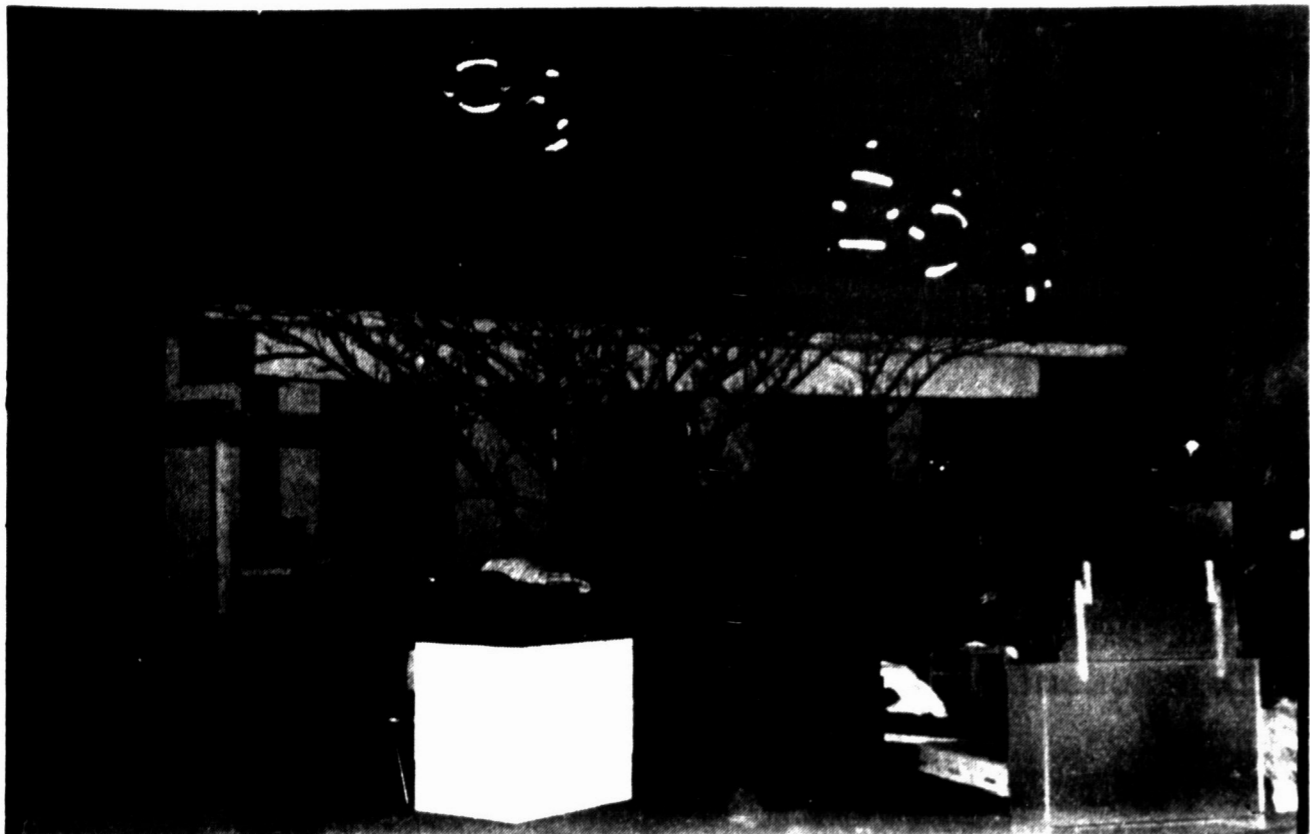

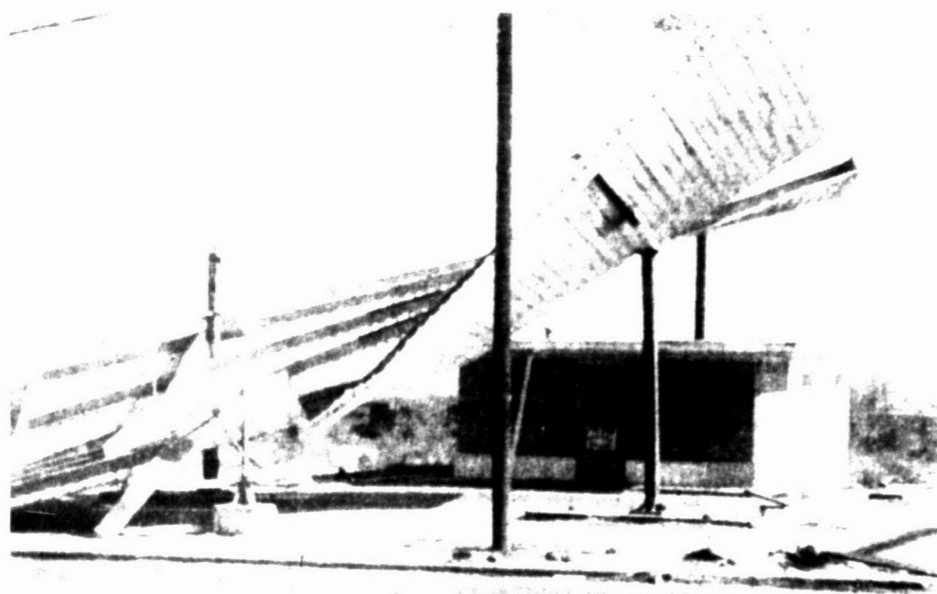

## Summer Hair Care Tips

A short haircut is a good idea for summer. A style that can be towel-dried in a few minutes is easy to manage and also fashionable. If hair dries out from too much sun, give yourself a hot oil treatment every few weeks (or whenever hair begins to look lifeless).

This can easily be accomplished by heating olive oil in a pan, and applying it to the scalp with cotton puffs. Leave on the scalp for a minimum of 30 minutes, then follow with a shampoo. Rinse hair thoroughly until it feels really clean.

To keep hair healthy, don't over-blow-dry, overdo curling irons/heated rollers, overbrush or back-comb hair. Use as little spray and setting lotions as possible to keep hair looking silky.

Rachel and Leah were sisters who were married to Jacob. Although Rachel was his favorite, it was Leah who would continue the line to Jesus. Rohab, a Cannanite prostitute who saved Joshua and his men from the destruction of Jericho by letting the men down in a basket from the well married into the lineage of Jesus.

Mrs. Delaney told of Ruth, the "perfect" daughter-in-laws of Naomi; and of Bathsheba, wife of King David, mother of the great Solomon. The Virgin Mary, mother of Jesus, was the concluding biblical woman's story. Her

obedience and acceptance of God's will for her life is an example for all.

### Wood burner sparks Burleson fire

Caution should be extended to those who have wood burning stoves used for heat. Make sure your chimney and flue are working well and are cleaned. Woodburners can reduce the cost of your utility bill substantially, but if they cause a fire, they are not worth the investment. Use them carefully for the maximum benefits.

### Fish Tales

Drownings and water-related fatalities decreased during 1982, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department said.

Water safety officials documented 531 drownings during the year, compared to 572 in 1981 and 575 in 1980. Greenbelt Lake held it's state record of water safety with no drownings or fatal water related accidents.

Swimming accounted for the most victims, with 164 deaths; falls, 75; fishing, 53; wading, 44; and 36 misc. A total of 27 persons died in accidents where motor vehicles fell into the water. Proving that it doesn't pay to drive and swim.

Swimming at Greenbelt Lake is relatively safe if you stay in the designated swimming areas. There is a problem most swimmers will agree, with having boats come into the swimming area to beach. It does pose a problem with children on floats and a motor boat comes chugging in. But no harm has come of it yet.

There were 181 deaths in lakes; 96 in rivers; 60 in tanks, ponds and pits; 54 in creeks, bayous, resacas and streams, and 52 in pools. Our area has a lake and several ponds or pits and the swimming pool here has a great record for safety.

Approximately 67% of the fatalities involved persons under 25 years old. If you are older than 25, you should wear water wings or stay on land. Of these, 73% were males and 27% were females. Proving that men are dead weights and women are full of hot air.

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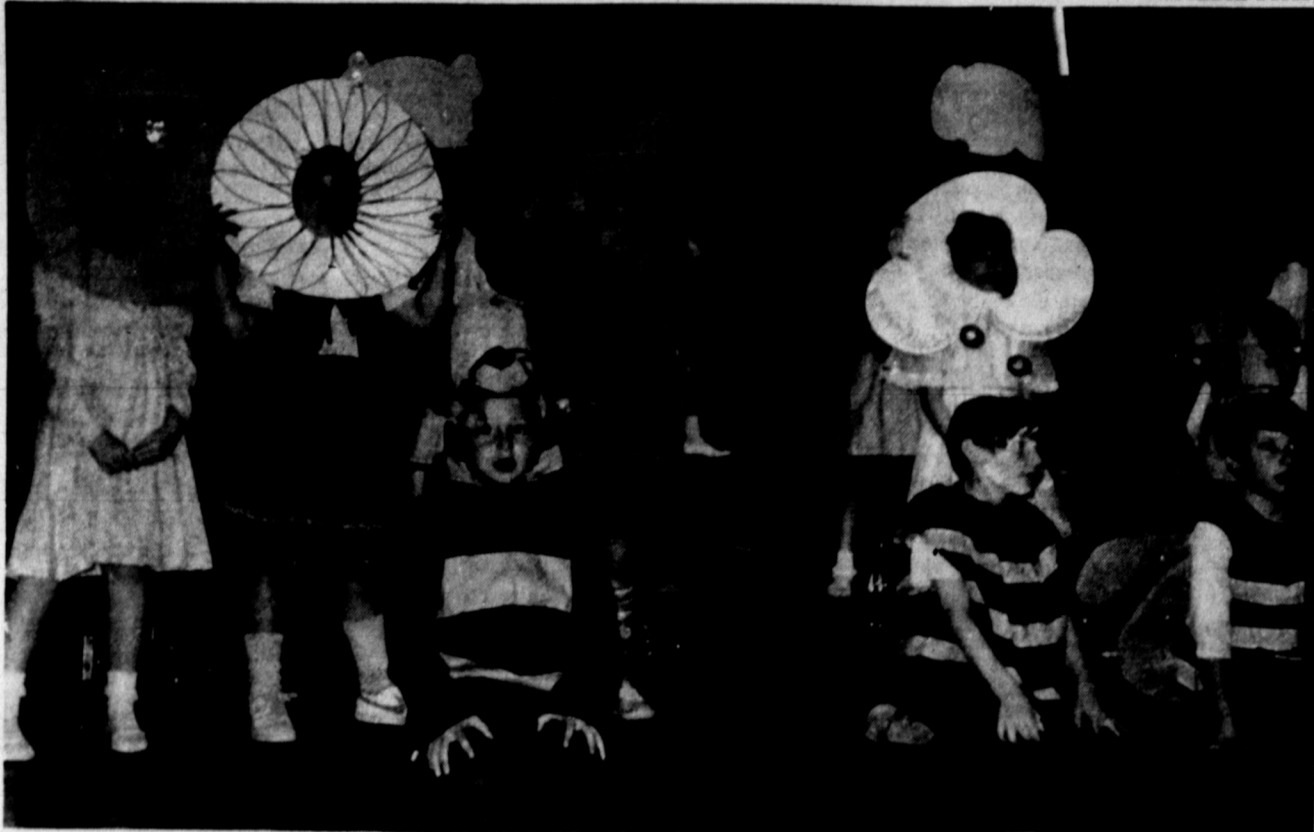

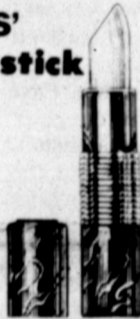

**Living expenses can be a tax deduction**

Senator Lloyd Bentsen introduced legislation Wednesday which would allow parents who must take their children out of town for chemotherapy or other medical treatment to claim living expenses as a tax deduction.

The Bentsen bill permits parents to deduct their costs of meals and lodging when a child is receiving outpatient medical care away from home. Transportation expenses involved in such care are already deductible.

"This bill would lift an economic burden from many families who need to concentrate their energies on a child who suffers from a serious illness," Bentsen said.

Senator Bentsen noted a recent survey by the University of Texas System Cancer Center which indicates that 43% of its patients over a 1-month period required housing accommodations. Of these visits, which generally included one parent and one child, 79% were return visits and each visit averaged 5 days.

"It doesn't take long to realize that in this situation the housing expenses, the absence from home and job and the uninsured portion of expensive medical treatment can create an astronomical financial burden on families," Bentsen said.

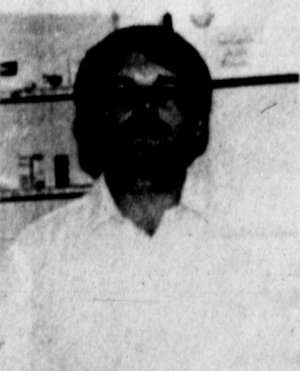

## Board of Aldermen meeting

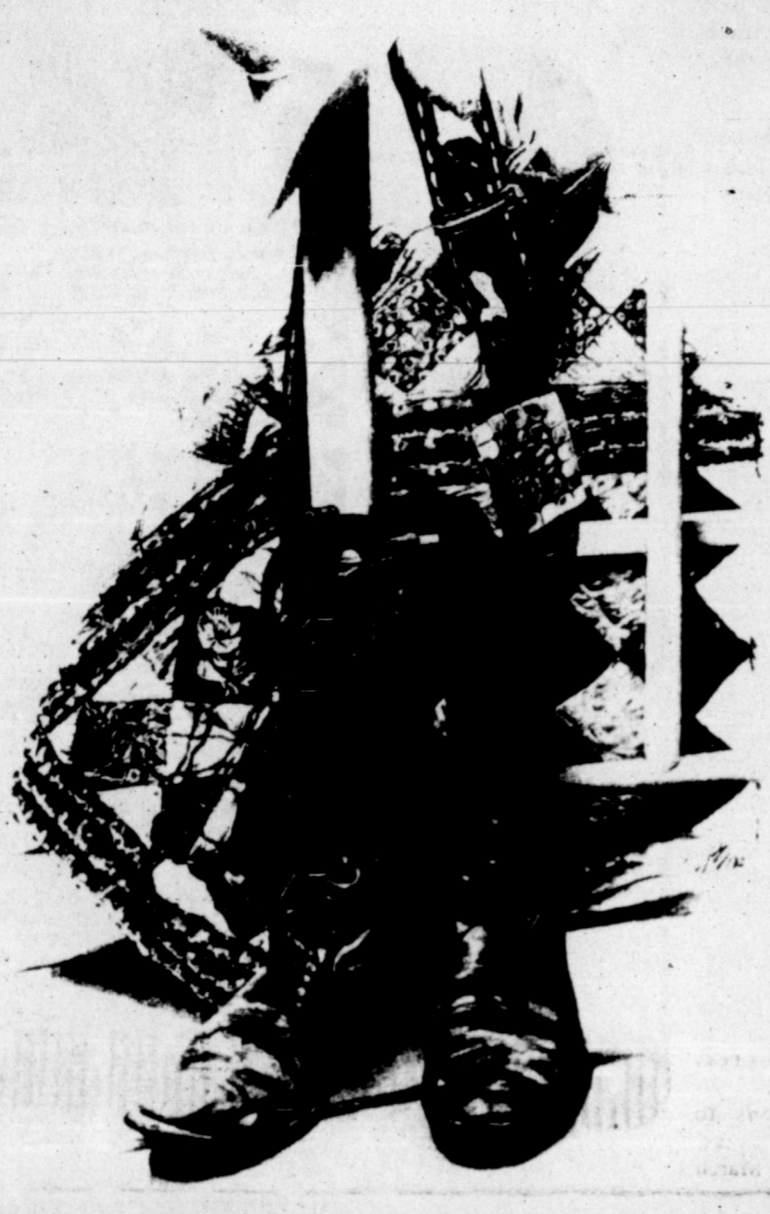

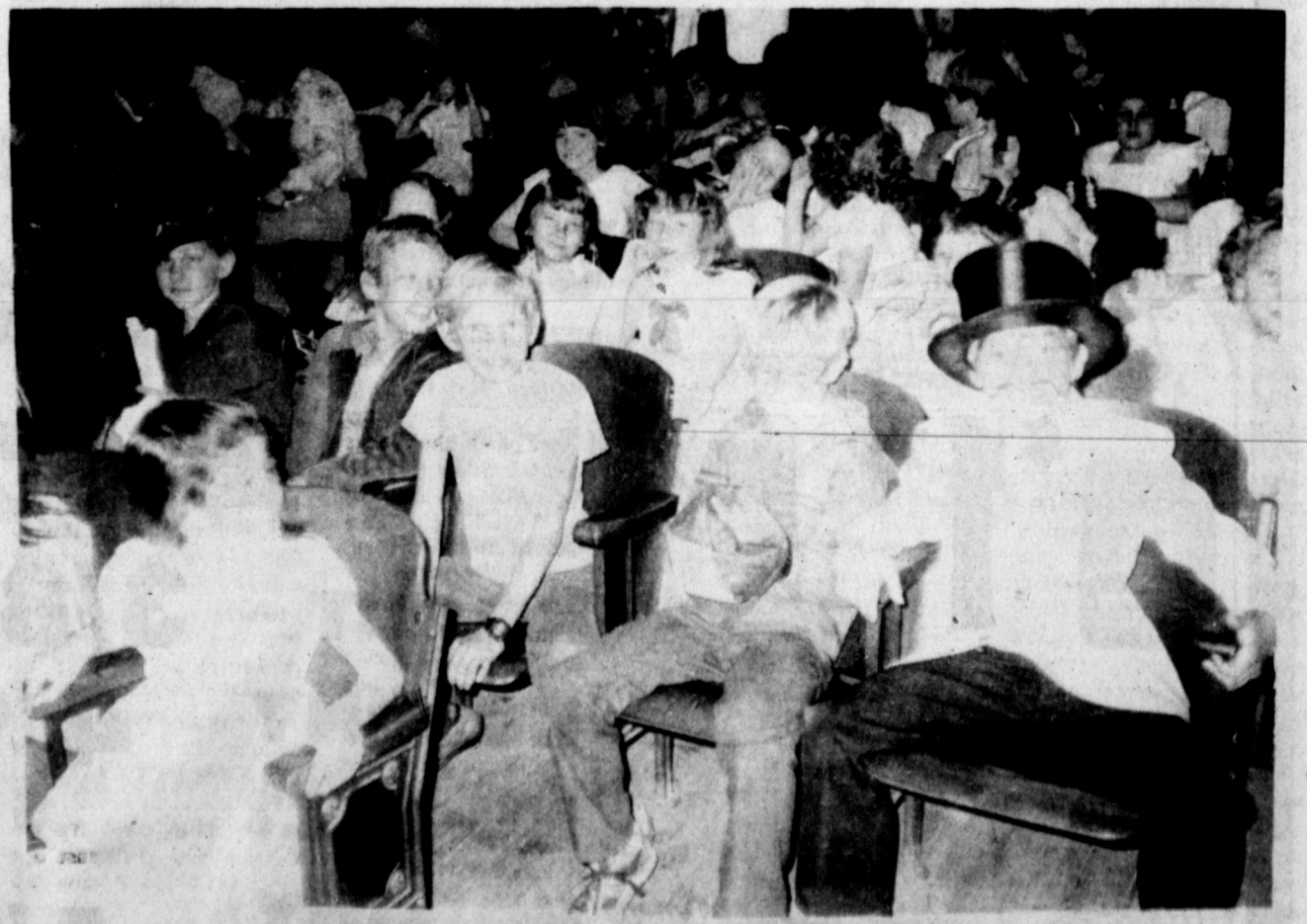

## Cosmetology - the art and science of beauty care

Cosmetology, the art and science of beauty care, has been a successful part of Clarendon Junior College since 1973. The class, under the instruction of Mrs. Dalton (Virginia) James has an enrollment of 17 at the present compared to an enrollment of 14 a year ago.

To the contrary of what is believed, Cosmetology offers a variety of career opportunities to a person interested in a future in Cosmetology. They include such things as a state board or Commission of Cosmetology member, public and private school instructor, salon owner or manager, competition stylist, platform stylist, research technician, field technician, manager-operator, licensed or registered cosmetologist, member of the state board of examiners and cosmetology student. But before any of these careers can be pursued, a person must comply with the Texas Cosmetology Commission Rules and Regulations Agency rules.

Under these rules, a prospective student is required to have a physical check up and a TB test before entering classes. After enrollment, they must complete 1500 hours of classroom and clinical work before being allowed to take the state board examination given to graduates of Cosmetology.

In order to graduate, a student must maintain a grade level of 75 in classroom work and clinical work. Classroom work covers things such as "Careers in Cosmetology", "Sanitizing Implements and Equipment", "Giving Scalp Treatments", "Selecting Hair Styles, facial treatments, applying makeup, and manicuring nails. Of importance and also covered in this class are anatomy and physiology, bone structures, muscles and nerves; and the vascular system and the endocrine system.

After these many hours of study, a student has earned the right to take the state board exam. This examination includes a practical examination covering all phases of cosmetology and a written exam consisting of 100 questions. The practical exam also includes an oral presentation on chemical

services. Virginia James has taught at Clarendon Junior College for 8 years. She received her training at the National Beauty School in Dallas, Wynnewood, Pleasant Grove Garland, and Mesquite. In addition, she received advanced method training at the Chicago based Pivot Point Internationally which is recognized internationally.

## Donald Robinson attends Federal Land Bank meeting

Donald Robinson of Clarendon has just returned from Houston where he represented the Federal Land Bank Association of Childress at the 38th Annual Stockholders' Meeting.

The meeting, held at the Westin Oaks Hotel, was attended by members of the 55 Federal Land Bank Associations in Texas. There were approximately 450 persons in attendance at the March 25 meeting.

The Federal Land Bank of Texas, the state's largest, long-term farm mortgage lender, released its 1982 annual report during the meeting, showing \$2.4 billion in outstanding loans, an 11.3 percent increase over 1981.

According to Land Bank President Thomas H. Benson, while low commodity prices, high interest rates and rising producing costs

combined to create a year of adversity for farmers served by the Texas Land Bank, the rate of delinquencies and foreclosures remained low due to the Bank's policy of working with member borrowers.

The Federal Land Bank of Texas is part of the nationwide Farm Credit System, the nation's largest private cooperative lending institution. The Federal Land Bank Association of Childress makes and services loans in this area.

## Spring turkey season starts April 16

April 16 through May 1 folks in 119 counties including Donley County will begin to polish their shot guns, smear camouflage paint on their face, get out their various types of turkey gobble calls and head for the brush for the spring gobbler hunt.

The season limit is one gobbler per hunter statewide. There are a few counties with an earlier season, but up in the Panhandle the dates are from sunrise to sunset, April 16 through May 1. Check with the Texas Parks and Wildlife 1982-83 hunting regulations guide or contact Gary Hunt, Game Warden or Dave Dvorak, Biologist for information about other counties dates.

The current high populations of turkeys is somewhat unusual, since hen-poult counts completed last summer indicated low production. "It appears that the percentage of hens producing poult was fairly low in most areas," Biologist Dave Dvorak said, "but the difference is that there were so many mature hens available for production."

The spring gobbler hunting season is held after most breeding activity has oc-

cured. There always are more gobblers available than are actually needed for breeding, a portion of the surplus gobblers can be taken without harming the populations.

"Spring turkey hunting is an entirely different situation from fall hunting," Dvorak said. "Most turkeys harvested during the fall are taken incidentally to deer hunting, and most from deer stands. In the spring, it's almost essential to be able to use a call to bring the gobblers within range."

And that, Dvorak believes, is the challenge which has made spring turkey hunting one of the fastest-growing hunting activities in Texas. There were 54,600 turkeys harvested this past fall. It is probably that there will be an excellent harvest this past fall. It is probably that there will be an excellent harvest of gobblers this spring as well.

You should insure that you have a hunting license and land owner permission before you hunt. There is no hunting out of vehicles off of county roads.
