



### Summer Hair Care Tips

A short haircut is a good idea for summer. A style that can be towel-dried in a few minutes is easy to manage and also fashionable. If hair dries out from too much sun, give yourself a hot oil treatment every few weeks (or whenever hair begins to look lifeless).

This can easily be accomplished by heating olive oil in a pan, and applying it to the scalp with cotton puffs. Leave on the scalp for a minimum of 30 minutes, then follow with a shampoo. Rinse hair thoroughly until it feels really clean.

To keep hair healthy, don't over-blow-dry, overdo curling irons/heated rollers, overbrush or back-comb hair. Use as little spray and setting lotions as possible to keep hair looking silky.

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

Drownings and water-related fatalities decreased during 1982, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department said.

Water safety officials documented 531 drownings during the year, compared to 572 in 1981 and 575 in 1980. Greenbelt Lake held it's state record of water safety with no drownings or fatal water related accidents.

Swimming accounted for the most victims, with 164 deaths; falls, 75; fishing, 53; wading, 44; and 36 misc. A total of 27 persons died in accidents where motor vehicles fell into the water. Proving that it doesn't pay to drive and swim.

Swimming at Greenbelt Lake is relatively safe if you stay in the designated swimming areas. There is a problem most swimmers will agree, with having boats come into the swimming area to beach. It does pose a problem with children on floats and a motor boat comes chugging in. But no harm has come of it yet.

There were 181 deaths in lakes; 96 in rivers; 60 in tanks, ponds and pits; 54 in creeks, bayous, resacas and streams, and 52 in pools. Our area has a lake and several ponds or pits and the swimming pool here has a great record for safety.

Approximately 67% of the fatalities involved persons under 25 years old. If you are older than 25, you should wear water wings or stay on land. Of these, 73% were males and 27% were females. Proving that men are dead weights and women are full of hot air.

### REDUCES HEART ATTACKS?

Heart attacks are experienced by about one and one-half million. Americans each vear. The typical attack occurs when one or more of the blood vessels serving the heart muscle become blocked in some manner... often by small blood clots Because platelets in blood play a significant role in the formation of clots, much research has been focused on drugs that prevent platelets from helping to form clots.

A recent issue of the Journel of the American Medical Association reported on the results of a seven year study of men having unstable angina...a condition often associated wit heart attacks. Some of these men received small daily doses of common aspirin, a medicine known to partially prevent platelets from helping to form blood clots. According to this study, there were fewer heart attacks in men who received aspirin. The death rate following heart attacks was 50% lower in men who received aspirin as compared to men who did not receive aspirin.

This study does not indicate that we will all have fewer heart attacks and live longer if we take aspirin every day. It does, however, point out that we can sometimes reduce the consequences of this leading cause of death.





## Cosmetology - the art and science of beauty care

Cosmetology, the art and science of beauty care, has been a successful part of Clarendon Junior College since 1973. The class, under the instruction of Mrs. Dalton (Virginia) James has an enrollment of 17 at the present compered to an enrollment of 14 a year ago.

To the contrary of what is believed, Cosmetology offers a variety of career opportunities to a person interested in a future in Cosmetology. They include such things as a state board or Commission of Cosmetology member, public and private school instructor, salon owner or manager, competition stylist, platform stylest, research technician, field technician, manager-operator, licensed or registered cosmetologist, member of the state board of examiners and cosmetology student. But before any of these careers can be persued, a person must comply with the Texas Cosmetology Commission Rules and Regulations Agency rules.

Under these rules, a prospective student is required to have a physical check up and a TB test before entering classes. After enrollment, they must complete 1500 hours of classroom and clinical work before being allowed to take the state board examination given to graduates of Cosmetology.

In order to graduate, a student must maintain a grade level of 75 in classroom work and clinical work. Classroom work covers things such as "Careers in Cosmetology", "Sanitizing Implements and Equipment", "Giving Scalp Treatments", Selecting Hair Styles, facial treatments, applying makeup, and manicuring nails. Of importance and also covered in this class are anatomy and physiology, bone structures, muscles and nerves; and the vascular system and the endocrine

After these many hours of study, a student has earned the right to take the state board exam. This examination includes a practical examiniation covering all phases of cosmetology and a written exam consisting of 100 questions. The practical exam also includes an oral presentation on chemical

Virginia James has taught at Clarendon Junor College for 8 years. She received her training at the National Beauty School in Dallas, Wynnewood, Pleasant Grove Garland, and Mesquite. In addition, she received advanced method training at the Chicago based Pivot Point Internationally which is recognized internationally.

### Donald Robinson attends Federal Land Bank meeting

Donald Robinson of Clarendon has just returned from Houston where he represented the Federal Land Bank Association of Childress at the 38th Annual Stockholders' Meeting.

The meeting, held at the Westin Oaks Hotel, was attended by members of the 55 Federal Land Bank Associations in Texas. There were approximately 450 persons in attendance at the March 25 meeting.

The Federal Land Bank of Texas, the state's largest, long-term farm mortgage lender, released its 1982 annual report during the meeting, showing \$2.4 billion in outstanding loans, an 11.3 percent increase over 1981.

According to Land Bank President Thomas H. Benson, while low commodity prices, high interest rates and rising producting costs combined to create a year of adversity for farmers served by the Texas Land Bank, the rate of deliquencies and foreclosures remained low due to the Bank's policy of working with member borrowers.

The Federal Land Bank of Texas is part of the nationwide Farm Credit System, the nation's largest private cooperative lending institution. The Federal Land Bank Association of Childress makes and services loans in this area.


