Cold Temperatures Cut Many Insect Numbers

The Arctic front that blasted Texas in February blew in some benefits for agriculture by reducing insect pests, said an expert with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Dr. John G. Thomas, an Extension entomologist, said the prolonged sub-freezing temperatures will have an enormous economic impact on insects affecting Texas and Texans.

"The below-freezing temperatures, which set new records or tied existing records for continuous cold hours in many parts of the state, should dramatically reduce many insect populations," Thomas said.

He said producers will realize considerably less damage and save on control costs. This often means that the consumer benefits as well.

Thomas said the extreme cold should have eliminated most of the active - and many hibernating or diapausing - individuals of many insect populations

"When the Arctic air spread over Texas last week, many insects were very active as opposed to their usual winter diapause state. The cold caught them off-guard and killed many of them," Thomas said.

Thomas said cold temperatures are not the only factor that influences survival of biological organisms, however.

"Moisture or rainfall has a significant impact on survival of insects, along with availability of host plants to provide food and shelter. Other factors include whether the insects are cool season or warm season species, and the impact of parasites or predators on each insect family," Thomas said. He said cold temperatures with dry conditions cause greater mortality

than the same temperature with ample moisture. Dr. Jonathan Edelson of Weslaco, vegetable entomologist with the Texas

Agricultural Experiment Station, said the balmy early winter temperatures have allowed thrips to remain quite active on onions in the Rio Grande Valley this season.

Edelson said the cold snap in February caused them to slow down momentarily-but they have become active again with the return of warm weather.

"Thrips have reproduced throughout the warm winter season. We have no record of that happening previously. Usually, December and January are months of no or very limited egg laying," Edelson said. "This winter has been quite unique." Thomas said another weather-related example concerns greenbug populations on the Texas High Plains.

"Greenbug populations increased through late November on wheat and other small grain crops. Producers sprayed a sizeable acreage as a result of the greenbug buildup," Thomas said.

He said in December and January, parasites and predators began to reduce greenbug populations significantly, and treatment with insecticides was no longer required in most fields.

Another insect pest of the Texas plains-the Russian wheat aphid-has increased steadily from November through February.

"This is most unusual. Generally, there is a slight increase in the wheat aphid populations in the fall. Then, the numbers begin to drop from mid-to-late December until about mid-February, when populations begin increasing again," Thomas said.

"This illustrates a difference in two populations of closely related insect species, the greenbug and Russian wheat aphid. The greenbug has numerous, effective parasites/predators which help control it. But the wheat aphid, which takes up residence in the curl of the leaf, is rather well protected against both parasitism and predation," Thomas said.

Another entomologist, Dr. Don Rummel, who works with cotton in the Lubbock area, said an ideal length for cold weather there would be 10 days-rather than the 5 or so recorded-in order to slow boll weevil activity on the Plains.

"We were quite dry, and the dry cold should have significant impact on other items of business. Please boll weevil numbers. We will continue to monitor the situation as winter progresses," said Rummel, a scientist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

H.U.D. Landlords Asked to Attend






OTC Medicines May Relieve Insomnia

Insomnia – the inability to sleep during normal sleeping hours – is a problem reported by many individuals. Half the population experiences insomnia at some time. Sleep problems are commonly reported as being associated with excessive levels of stress and anxiety, changes in daily rhythm (e.g., vacations), depression, aging, pain, physical discomforts, and the consumption of certain foods or drink (e.g., caffeinated beverages). A recent Gallup poll of people over age 60 found that four out of ten were experiencing some type of sleeping problem (e.g., awakening several times during the night)

There are many physical and psychological causes of insomnia. Sleep problems may also be associated with taking certain prescription medicines (e.g., thyroid hormone, asthma preparations that have adrenalin-like properties, and stimulants such as the amphetamines).

OTC (over-the-counter) sleep medicines usually contain an antihistamine which may produce drowsiness. Antihistamines in these products include diphenhydramine, pyrilamine, doxylamine, and phenyltoloxamine. The effectiveness of OTC sleep product ingredients has been found to vary from individual to individual





New Tree Book for Clarendon **Nature Lovers**

Clarendon nature lovers may be interested in a new book which has just been released. A new Field Guide Series has been published by Texas Monthly Press, "A Field Guide to Texas Trees" by Benny J. Simpson.

Simpson spent eleven years studying and writing about the beautiful trees found across the Texas landscape. Mr. Simpson's book is the first comprehensive book on Texas trees to use photographs. He captures the beauty of the trees in his color photographs. They are displayed and shown in a very distinctive

"A Field Guide to Texas Trees" is a guide to native trees of Texas, their natural history, species, common names and vegetational areas. The book also includes county distribution maps and ecological information about each tree.

Simpson studies and adapts native woody ornamental plants at the Texas A. & M. University Research and Extension Center in Dallas and at various sites around the state. He is a 1945 graduate of Matador High School. He attended Texas Tech University and received his B. S. degree in Agriculture.

In his book, Simpson said the potential number of native trees could be 305 if one added the current species, which is 222, an additional 24 possible species, 51 natives that are considered shrub, and extinct or lost native trees.

A tree is defined by Simpson as having "a single trunk or multiple trunks, growing 12 feet or more in height and being definitely wood.

I found it very interesting that the trees in our area most commonily found along the Caprock, Canadian and the Red Rivers are called Celtis reticulata (Netleaf Hackberry), Populus deltoides var. occidentalis (Plains Cottonwood), Quercus mohriana (Mohr Oak) Junipirus penchoti (Pinchot Juniper), J. monosperma (One-seed Juniper), and J scopulorum (Rocky Mountain Juniper).

The vegetation in our area is llgrass on the deep sands with dominant species such as Little Bluestern, Sand Bluestern. This is only a few of the trees that I jotted down, but all the information in this book is very interesting and easy to find because of the numerous maps Mr. Simpson has included in his book. He also

describes the trees as well as showing photographs of them. Texas has 33 to 45 percent of the

native tree species of the United States, but little is known about the native species except among professional botanists and taxonomists.

"A Field Guide to Texas Trees" can be purchased from your favorite book store or from Texas Monthly Press, P.O. Box 1569, Austin, Tx 78767 for \$24.95.





the Azteca Inn, located at 918 Railroad Avenue in Beaumont. The menu tells us much about Mexican cuisine prepared for Anglo diners during the days of the Great Depression.


The "Special Dinner," the most expensive meal listed, consisted of tamales with chili, an enchilada, chili rellenos, taco, fried rice, desert, and choice of coffee, iced tea or milk, all for 75 cents. The more modest "Mexican Dinner" with only tamales, chili, enchilada, rice, tortillas, dessert and drink cost 50 cents.

A note appended at the bottom of the menu advises, "Please ask for hot sauce."

The <u>a la carte</u> section of the menu, a second sheet attached with a straight pin, included such food items as huevos rancheros for 30 cents, bowl of chili for 20 cents, and half a dozen tamales with chili for a quarter. Coffee, iced tea, milk and cokes were a nickel a glass.

Cathryn Grady, coming from the land of plain cooking in Nebraska, concluded her comments on the spicy meal at the Azteca Inn with the observation, "The food had a peculiar taste."

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



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

Texas A&M scientist says 'safe' lead levels adversely affect children

COLLEGE STATION - Newly detected size changes in the brain cells of young guinea pigs suggest that low levels of lead now legally safe may be harmful to the immature mammalian brain, says a Texas A&M University scientist.

Effects of lead exposure on starshaped cells called astrocytes had not previously been explored by health researchers, said Dr. Evelyn Tiffany-Castiglioni, who led the first major study using guinea pigs to simulate the effects of low-level lead on children. "It's pretty clear that children are affected by low levels of lead," said Tiffany-

Seventy-seven Years of Living

by JoAnne Sibley English IV,2 February 15, 1950

Lucy Ann Horton Sibley, the author's grandmother, has never done anything to gain fame or fortune, but to her family she stands out ahead of the most important people. Mrs. Sibley never found life easy but worked hard to try to make it easy.

Mrs. Sibley was born in the fall of 1872 just after the Civil War when the South was under reconstruction. She was born in Franklin County, Alabama, on a farm. Mrs. Sibley's mother died when she was small and left four daughters to be cared for by her father. Mr. Horton remarried, and his wife became the mother of Mrs. Sibley. Mrs. Sibley's companions were her three sisters, her halfbrothers, and her half-sisters. In Mrs. Sibley's school days the terms were short and usually when the crops were gathered. Mrs. Sibley received very little schooling. The subjects she studied were reading, writing, math, spelling, geography, history and grammar. Her favorite study was spelling.

In 1890, she was wooed and won by a suitor, Albert Sidney Johnson Sibley, who was named for the great Southern general in the Civil War. Mr. Sibley was a farmer and received twelve dollars a month. When the crops were gathered he work in an iron ore mine. In 1891 a son was born to the family. With an addition to the family more money was necessary. This added to their reason for leaving Alabama.

In the winter of 1891, the family started to Texas by train. They carried only their clothes and bed clothes A bed was shipped by express. The reasons for this journey were because of the people who were living around the mines and were doing so much meaness and a friend who was working on the Hensley ranch wanted to go to East Texas and wanted Mr. Sibley to take his place. The journey took fourty-eight hours. The family arrived in Bowie, Texas, January 1, 1892. They were supposed to be met by Mrs. Sibley's uncle. They had written him a registered letter and he had failed toreceive it be-

cause he had to sign for it and no one could bring it to him unless he did. They rented a wagon to take them to the ranch but had waited two days on Mrs. Sibley's uncle.

In 1892, they made their first home in Texas on the Hensley ranch, ten miles west of Jacksboro. Mrs. Sibley was very disssatisfied and lonesome here. She cried and was blue for about six months. She had never been away from her father for more than a month. She decided they were going to stay, and she had just as well be satisfied. They stayed here a short time. They then moved to a farm owned by the same person. They made one crop here and then moved to Joplin, where they rented a farm. This was in 1893, and they remained here until 1904. Two sons and three daughters were born her. The eldest daughter died here of pnuemonia when she was eighteen months old. The family house burned in 1900 and burned the eldest son. When he was lighting the stove the gasoline exploded and burned him severly. He was nine years of age when the accident happened. In 1904, they bought a farm nearby. Here one daughter was born. They remained here for five years. In 1909 they moved to Gibtown where Mr. Sibley ran a general merchandise store. They stayed here four years and two sons were added to the family. Many happy years were spent in Jack County, but the family again decided to move.

In 1913, the family, which now consisted of the mother, father, five sons, and three daughters, moved to Hedley in Donley County. They moved on a farm and remained here for seven years. A daughter and a son were born in Hedley. In 1917, the family bought their first car. This was a thrill for the whole family, and many quarrels arose over who would drive it. During the first World War the eldest son enlisted in the Army. The family knew he was going to the army so he did as he pleased the last few months home. The depression followed the war, and the family had difficulties in clothing and feeding the large family. In 1920, the family moved to the Martin community near Clarendon on what is now the Guy Sibley farm. In 1923, the youngest

nine in the family. Mrs. Sibley returned to Alabama in 1928 when her father became ill with cancer. Mrs. Sibley had not been satisfied when she came to Texas, but she changed her mind completely when she returned. In 1934 at Christmas time the youngest son and child was killed in a car wreck. He was popular among his senior class and high school as well as in the community. When he was killed the whole community and the family were terribly grieved. In 1937 Mr. Sibley failed to wake. Mrs. Sibley was terribly grieved but bore her burden well. After Mr. Sibley passed away she kept the farm for six years, but in 1943 she sold the farm and moved to Clarendon. She is very contented here and has many friends who visit and keep her company. She amuses herself with piecing quilts, quilting, crocheting, and doing Church work. Her family has slowly dwindled away, and she only has two sister and three halfbrothers. She has five sons, three daughters, twenty-five

grandchildren, and ten great grandchildren. A varity of professions are carried out in her family. A farmer, a truck director, two Baptist preachers, two school teachers, a carpenter, and various other professions are among those of her family. During the second World War she had a son in the army. All the immediate family live in Texas. She keeps close contact with them; although, they fail to write her as often as she would like to hear from them.


Mrs. Sibley has had her hardships and difficulties, but all in all she has had seventy-seven years of living that is an example of the true pioneeer.
