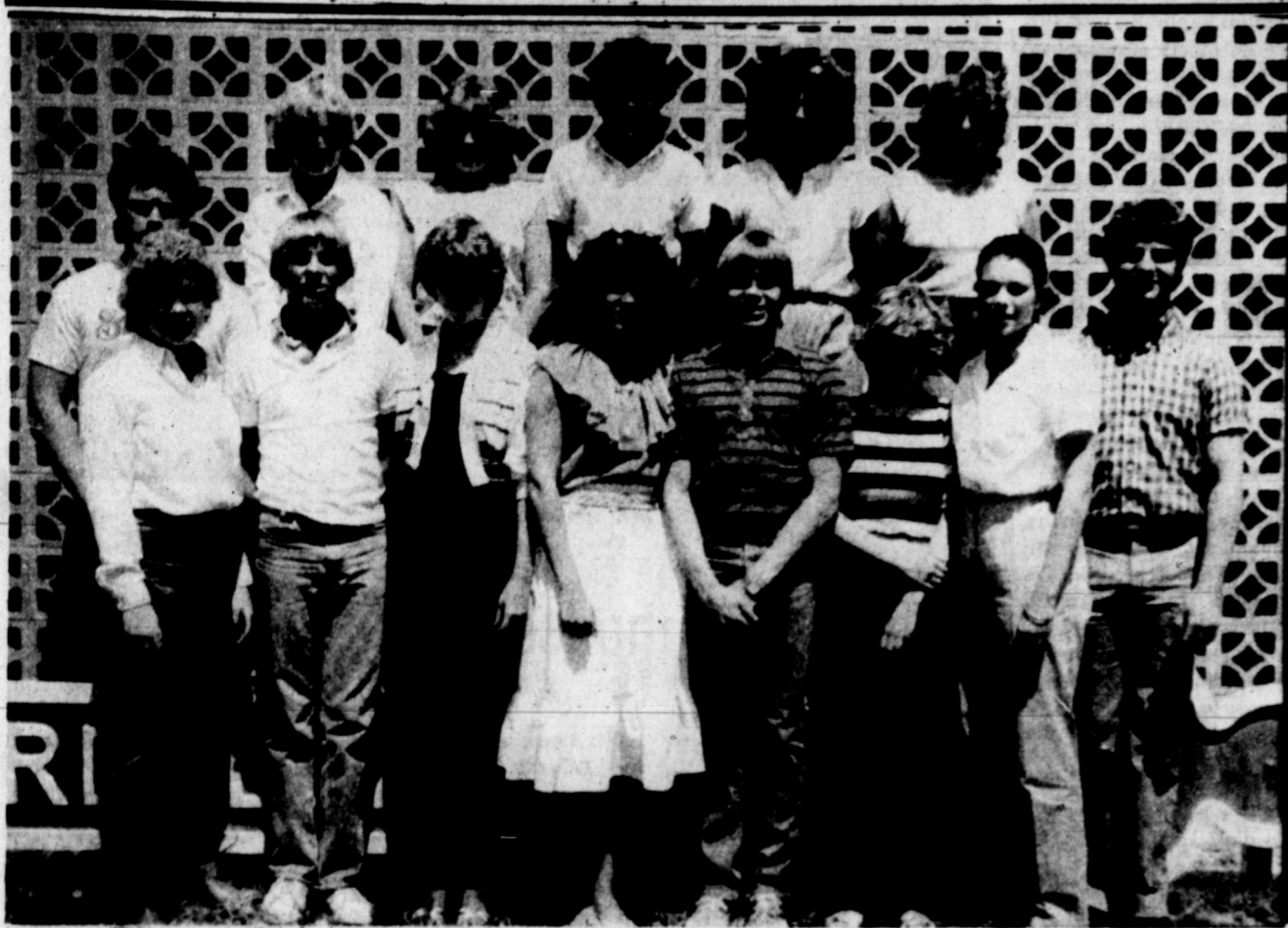

Those of you who attended Clarendon Junior College in 1958 to 1960 will well remember the speaker for the annual ex-students banquet to be held Saturday, April 23, at 7:00 p.m., at the college cafeteria. His achievements have brought him to be the current President of Amarillo College. Dr. H.D. Yarbrough grew up in Claude, Texas, and finished high school there in 1958.

He came to Clarendon Junior College and was the 1960 student body president, captain of the basketball team, and the salutatorian of his class. He received his BS degree from West Texas University. After teaching math and physical education in White Deer, Tulia and Pampa, he was at the Regional 18 Services Center in Midland, Texas. He attended the University of Texas in Austin from 1969 to 1971 and received his doctorate from there in 1974. From 1971 to 1975 he served two years as Executive Secretary of Wyoming Community College Commission, and three

years as President of Laramie County Community College. Dr. Yarbrough returned to the Panhandle and was Vice-President of Amarillo College from 1975 to 1982 when he became President.

90th birthday of St. John Baptist Episcopal Church

St. John Baptist Episcopal Church is celebrating its 90th Birthday on Sunday, April 24. It was consecrated on April 24, 1893 by Bishop A.C. Garrett of Dallas.

The church building constructed on land donated by R.E. Montgomery and Morgan Jones, representing the Clarendon Town Site Company, cost \$1500 and was erected by Denver architects and builders in town to build the Donley County Court House. Funds were given by many segments of the community, not only Episcopalians.

For many years this church was the center of Episcopal church work in the Panhandle. It mothered the development of several other Episcopal churches in the

area. Although the number of communicants of St. John Baptist Episcopal Church is small compared to other denominations, local Episcopalians have always taken a fierce pride in their lovely church and its beautiful symbolic ritual.

Many local residents look forward to the church's annual Christmas Eve Communion service when the church is brightly decorated with greenery. Another popular service is the spring-time outdoor Rogation Service to give thanks and pray for good crops.

Presently the antique organ of the church is being rebuilt and plans are for the music to resound loudly April 24. Following its weekly

communion service, Church members and invited guests will share in the meal in the Mission Hall to celebrate this festive occasion.

Walker, a 1923 graduate of Clarendon College is the author of a newly-published biographical-autobiographical book titled "A Thirty Year Romance in Marriage". This book is the life stories of Margaret Huffman Walker, a counselor-school teacher, and Philip Whitman Walker, a minister in the United Methodist Church, who continued his education at Southern Methodist University where he received a Bachelor of Divinity Degree in 1930.

Dr. Walker was born near Elvasville, Texas, and spent his early years in Ellis and Stephens Counties. In 1918 his family moved to Breckenridge. His Sunday School teacher in the Methodist Church, T.M. James, an ex-student of Clarendon College was the influencing factor that resulted in his enrollment in the Academy of the College in the fall of 1920.

In his book Dr. Walker devotes a chapter to his "fascinating college years" in Clarendon College. He was very active in campus organizations and affairs, being a member of the Commencement Debaters, The College Quartet and the football team. He was the reserve quarterback on Coach H.T. Burton's famous 1922 undefeated Clarendon College football team, probably the best early-day football team in the Panhandle.

Dr. Walker delivered the Sunday morning sermon for the 1979 Clarendon College Ex-Student Reunion. As a feature of this 1983 Ex-Student Reunion he will be present Saturday morning in the College cafeteria to autograph his book for anyone desiring a copy. "A Thirty Year Romance in Marriage" is truly an inspirational story that will have a positive influence on all who reads it.

Other events of the day will be registration at the college cafeteria at 9:00 a.m. From 3:00 to 4:30 p.m., there will be an informal tea and visitation at Mrs. Bromley's.

On Sunday, April 24, special ex-students worship service at the United Methodist Church, and Rev. Paul Hancock will be the speaker. The noon luncheon and business meeting will be at 12:30 at the college cafeteria.

Ivey Greenhouse great idea

Odis Ivey has an unusual hobby. He has a huge greenhouse at the rear of his home. It measures 12 X 40 feet; has a composition sealed roof, plastic paneling on the south side, windows on the east and west sides and is against the garage on the north. This arrangement keeps the insides very warm in the winter when the sun shines mostly from the south and relatively cool in the summer when the sun shines mostly from directly overhead. "Sometimes a greenhouse can be thirty degrees warmer inside than outside in the heat of the summer, but this one only gets about 10 degrees hotter inside than the hottest outside," Ivey said.

His home is located near the Ashcraft shop on the Brice Highway south of town. He mostly grows tomatoes and vegetables for his family. "I'm not a commercial greenhouse," Ivey said, "I just like to fool around with it."

There is a gas heater in the ceiling thermostatically controlled that helps keep the greenhouse warm in the winter months. Controlling humidity is also a problem in the winter since the heater fan dries out the soil.

Unlike most greenhouses, all of Ivey's plants are planted directly into the ground rather than in bins, boxes or pots. The building is nestled in a three foot deep pit as well, enabling him to control watering and helping keep it cooler in the summer.

Last month, he harvested four 1 lb tomatoes off of one of his 36 vines. "I grow Victory tomatoes," he said. "I got the seeds years ago and, since they're not hybrid I just keep using the seeds again."

Ivey is a retired salvage yard operator from Pampa. He built a greenhouse in Pampa, "and I've learned a few things from that experience," he said. His wife tends the houseplants in the greenhouse.

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SOMETHING CAN BE DONE

The loss of calcium and protein from the bone results in a weakening that often leads to fragile, crumbling bones. This condition, termed **osteoporosis**, commonly occurs in women following menopause and to a lesser extent in older men. The bones of the back are often affected (one may lose height and stoop forward as the back becomes arched and humped).

Osteoporosis is due in part to inadequate calcium and vitamin D in the diet. Lack of exercise, which stimulates bone development, is an important factor. Reduced exposure to sunlight and hormonal changes may also play important roles in development of the condition.

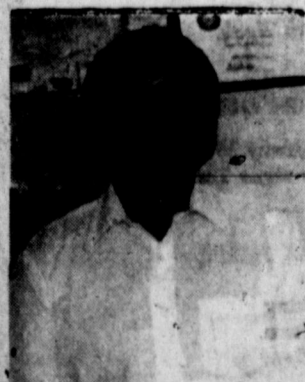
Prevention of osteoporosis is better than treatment. Regular physical activity such as walking a few blocks or a few miles each day is important. Young adults need 800 mg of calcium in the diet each day. Older adults may require 100 to 1500 mg. Sufficient vitamin D is required so that calcium may be absorbed. Sources of calcium and vitamin D include food as well as tablets and capsules of the supplements. Treatment involves these preventive steps plus the optional use of certain other prescription drugs that reverse the effects of bone loss.

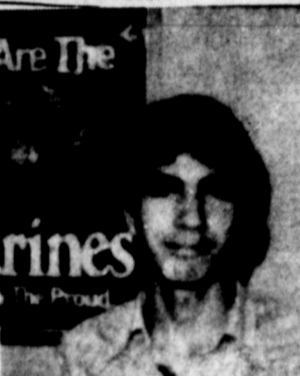

Pat Robertson instructed the forty hour class held every Tuesday and Thursday since March. There were two others in the class that were not certified: one didn't take the test and one was too young to qualify. There were seven volunteer firemen in the class and three women. There are only three other ECA's listed as active in the County. There are, at this time, NO EMT's OR ECA's IN HEDLEY OR HOWARDWICK!!

The classwork came from the same textbook as that studied by the EMT's. In fact, Pat Robertson said, "The ECA will receive all of the same class work as an EMT with the exception of some hospital hours, the need to do an ambulance run and instead of 100 hours of classwork, the ECA only needs 40 hours."

Jarmillo joins US Marine Corps

Recently a Lelia Lake resident who attends Clarendon College decided to accept a challenge, a challenge to join an elite organization. Jose Antonio "Tony" Jaramillo decided he wanted to be one with the few, the proud. Tony joined the U.S. Marine Corps.

The 1981 graduate of Clarendon High School is currently attending Clarendon College, from where he will graduate this spring with an associate degree. He knew that with a degree he had many opportunities available, but Tony decided to join the Marines under the College Enlistment Program.

The Marine Corps developed the program so that both an individual and the Corps can take advantage of post-high school education and training. An associate degree or completion of special training can mean accelerated promotions, bonuses, further training and a guaranteed job, or as the Marines call them, a Military Occupational Specialty.

Tony enlisted into the Marine Feb. 14, and will be going to boot camp in San Diego, Calif. May 16th.

After boot camp, the son of Epifanio Jaramillo will be a personnel clerk, from which he will attend school at Camp Pendleton, Calif.

Murray tours Boeing military Co.

Brian Murray, Clarendon, was among 19 members from the Math Club at Northwestern Oklahoma State University, Alva, Okla., touring the Boeing Military Airplane Company in Wichita on March 31.

The group visited the Operation Analysis Division of the company and toured Boeing's Computer Services Data Processing Center and Manufacturing Technology Division.

The group's final stop was the Computer-Aided Design and Manufacturing Division, where everyone in the group was allowed "hands-on" experience on Boeing's three-dimensional computer graphics terminals.

Every type of medical and traumatic emergency was covered in the class, including but not limited to CPR, fracture, tissue injury, burns head and neck injury, respiratory emergency, communications, alcohol and drug abuse, poison, heart attack, stroke and diabetes.

There are five learned skills also: CPR, obstructed airway for adults and children, traction and splinting, mechanical aids and vital signs.

The final test included a written test compiled by the Texas Health Dept. of 50 questions and a skills test over three of the five areas. EMT's take a 100 question test, cover three of the five skill areas and Paramedics take a 500 question test and are checked out on 12 skills.

This successful class now gives Donley County one trained emergency personnel for every 100 in town, or 1 for every 200 in the County. One third of the firemen now have formal training with eleven firemen having some sort of emergency training.

Unfortunately, the bad news is that there are NO trained personnel in Hedley or Howardwick! It takes only 15 minutes to get to Hedley, but in that time a trained person could have the injured individual stabilized, giving them a great chance for recovery or life. Lelia Lake is also in need.

"Knowing what not to do is sometimes as vital as knowing what to do," Robertson said. "It should be a priority for communities without trained personnel to send someone to the class. Especially the firemen."

Fish Tales

by KATIE DVORAK

Fishing is more popular than ever in Texas, judging from an analysis of fishing license sales.

Computer projections of sales anticipated through August 31, 1983 indicate approximately 3.3 million persons will have fished during the current fiscal year. Mooring Bait and Tackle sold 3,239 permits last year and 37,161 lake permits, indicating an excellent year around this area.

Revenue from sales of various fishing licenses sold by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is expected to rise from \$1.8 million in fiscal year 1982 to \$2.2 million in 1983, an increase of some 21%.

Gibsons, Mooring Bait and Tackle, Barney's Marina, Riggs Farm and Ranch Supplies and Patton's Landing at the lake all sell fishing licenses. All licenses are issued by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept. and are

valid ONLY during the period of September 1 through August 31 of the following year, except those issued for a specific number of days. If you bought your license in 1982, it is good through August of this year. A resident license costs \$5, non-resident is \$15 and combination hunting and fishing license is \$8.75. A temporary (5 day) license for non-residents is \$4.50. If there are any questions, contact Gary Hunt, Game Warden, or any of the areas that sell fishing licenses. Take advantage of Greenbelt this year and FISH.

Summer may be upon us before we get any really good fishing weather, but there were plenty of boats out on the lake this past weekend. Mooring Bait and Tackle has seen some white bass caught some small mouth bass and a "few walleye, not very big, and not very many, but there were some caught," Mooring said. The water temperature Friday was 47 at the 5' depth, so it's warming up "if it keeps as warm as they say it's gonna stay," Mooring said, "we should get the water warmed up again real quick."

Operation Game Thief works

Operation Game Thief, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's reward program for reporting game law violators, set new records for calls, arrests, and convictions during the six-month period which ended this week.

Officials said more calls were received, 718, than were recorded during the program's entire first year of operation. The calls resulted in 347 convictions and \$39,106 in fines paid by poachers. The toll-free number is

1-800-792-GAME, and callers may remain anonymous if they so desire.

The six-member Operation Game Thief Committee met in Austin April 4 and authorized payment of \$8,525 to 50 persons whose tips led to convictions. Another 37 callers whose tips turned out to be valid requested no reward.

Rewards are funded entirely by donations from individuals and organizations, and the Game Thief Committee serves without pay.

The best way to battle drugs is to become aware of the problem, to admit that there is a problem. Some parents are never aware if their child is drunk or using a drug.

Some signs to look for are: 1. significant drop in the quality of school work; 2. passive or withdrawn behavior; 3. an increased need for money, or secretiveness about where their money goes ("Sometimes parents go up to the attic and discover that everything is sold" Schneider said) 4. neglect of appearance; 5. lack of communication, inability to speak coherently and 6. less sensitive to others around them, more distance.

The most frightening thing presented was that parents are not aware of their children's dependency on drugs, on their changes. In fact, parents spend only 22 seconds a week in meaningful communication with their child! That is the real disaster about drugs, Schneider said. "That parents and families are failing to communicate to each other their needs for attention, love, understanding simply because they don't communicate".

He remarked that religion should be BACK in schools and that if we ALL hug kids more and tell them we love them and need them and appreciate them, they won't need to seek these reassurances in the false euphoria that drugs give them. He said that if we do NOT begin to be aware of our children, look at your child tonight and say to yourself "There is Reverend Moonies NEXT victim...unless I start NOW to save him".

The average age for a child to become hooked on any drug is only 13. Children begin smoking as early as third grade. Schneider said that the community did need to "Stop pointing fingers and join hands" today.

After this frightening and enlightening presentation, Willie Moore won a door prize and several others from the District were honored with prizes as well.

This year, the money from the special funds collected at meetings went to support the 1983 Special Olympics. The 1984 money will go to Girlstown USA.

It was announced that a special 4-H fund of \$300 will be established to help with the Fashion Show, Food Fair and awards and rosettes.

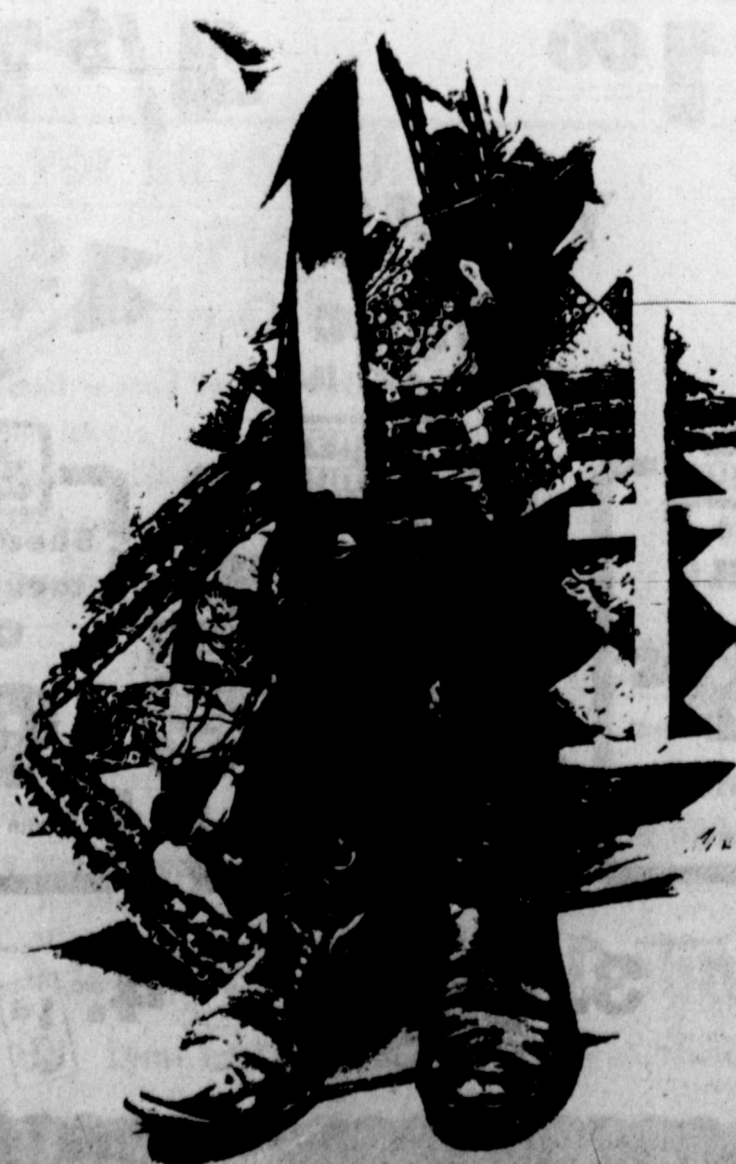

As of January 1, 1983, 270,000 people borrowed on FmHA loans nationwide; 16,124 of them were Texans. There are a total of 427,130 loans nationwide outstanding now. 69% of the FmHA loans in Texas are delinquent.

The highest delinquent type of loan is for economic emergency at 62%, then economic disaster loans at 60% with emergency operating at 79% third and operating loans at 59% delinquency, nationwide. The least delinquent type of loan is grazing loans at 9%.

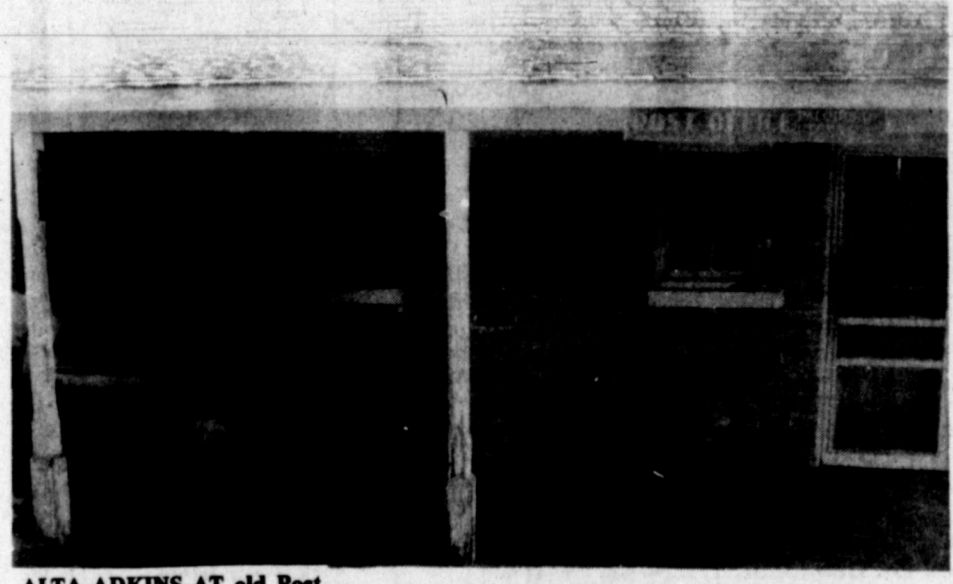

ROAD RUNNER

Alta Adkins

Everyone who has had occasion to travel down RM 2162 after a rain or thaw, will have seen a dark brown pickup loaded with two beautiful ladies. The driver has silver hair done up in a perfect coiffure and covered with a delicate scarf. She will be gripping the wheel with her gloved hands, but upon her angelic face will be an ear to ear grin. Her passenger will have both hands planted firmly on the dashboard and wearing her hair in a neat style and also sporting the grin of one thoroughly enjoying herself. For the longest while, this reporter thought that these ladies waited until the roads were bad and then jumped into the truck to tackle the muddy roads. But that is not the case.

Every Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 8:15 am, Roadrunner Alta Adkins charges down the JA ranch road with her bag full of mail and a companion, Margerette Alderson. "I used to think that I simply had to drive this road," Alta said with her bright smile. "But since Glen isn't alive to go with me anymore, the men at the JA have been real good to me and come pick up the mail at the end of the pavement if the roads are bad."

"Real Bad" is in the eyes of the beholder, evidently, because many times this reporter has been in four-wheel drive, sure to get stuck or slip off of the road into a deep ditch and then along comes the "Pony Express Mail carriers" driving the road in their little truck with nothing but zigzags for their main concern!

"I never get tired of making this trip," Alta said. "Even though I've done it 7020 times." Mrs. Adkins has driven this same route for 45 years in July. She has seen many changes along the way. "I used to have 18 boxes to deliver to, but now I only deliver to 4 along the way." And there are not nearly as many persons to deliver to out at the JA headquarters.

In fact, there used to be a Post Office at the headquarters and Alta would deliver mail

there. Then the post office closed and the arrangements have changed. The bookkeeper has been delegated as mail sorter and Alta takes the mail to the little old post office that now is a clerks office.

John Farrar has been the current bookkeeper for seven years now. Glen Churchman was in that position for 30 years. Miss Beverly was the first collector/distributor of mail when Alta began her route. The building was re-modeled in 1952, but still maintains the grace, charm and fascination of buildings from the great era of big ranches, herds of cattle, large remuda's of horses and dozens of hands. Just to see the old buildings and beautiful headquarters house is well worth the trip out the JA road.

Alta has seen all sorts of wildlife along the beautiful scenic drive. She has seen quail, deer, turkey, snakes, rabbits, kangaroo rats, raccoons, coyotes and even buffalo. "There is one buffalo that liked to run with the cattle and we used to see him alot."

For 44 years, her husband Glen rode with her whenever he had the time or if the roads were bad. "The roads didn't used to be so bad," Alta recalls. "There used to be less traffic but the roads were kept up better because more people lived along the road back then." There is more traffic along the road today because people commute back and forth rather than live out on the ranch itself.

"I drove a car all of those years until this year and I got the truck," Alta doesn't remember how many cars she has driven for this job, but it has been several. "I never used to get stuck like I do now," she remembers. "There used to be one real bad hill that I had to back down and take a cue at several times to get up, but one commissioner

graveled it for me once and it was fine awhile." The gravel has since been graded away, and the hill has become a slick mess again.

"Now I have the hazard of those steep bar ditches. Didn't used to have them and I could drive in the ditches just fine if I slipped off of the road. Now I can slide into them and really be stuck." Alta only remembers getting into trouble once and that was recently this last year.

When the roads look bad, the JA foreman sends someone to pick up the mail because, "He says it's easier to pick up the mail than pull me out of a ditch," Alta laughs. If she isn't at the ranch by 9 am they come for her and their mail. Even if she does get stuck, she won't have much of a wait until help arrives.

One time Mrs. Word's son was real sick and the ambulance needed to take him to the hospital. The bridge was out because the county was working on it and the water was up at the time. "all of us took turns carrying him in our arms like the chair carry across the river", she remembered.

This past summer is the first time that the spring-fed creek was ever dry. The water never did get up to the bridge on the river, she recalls, but there was always water in the river.

During gas rationing during WWII, Alta got special coupons for her mail delivery. She has run through about five post masters since working and has seen many changes in location of the post office in town as well. "It used to be where the Morris tax office is, then it moved to the Haves office and then to it's current location," she remembers.

Alta gets to the post office early and gets back about 10 am unless something exciting happens like eating with the chuckwagon on the JA. "When they'd be out in the summertime, I'd stop and eat with them at the chuckwagon and that would always be great fun. The food was so good and filling."

Alta hopes to continue driving this mail route for many years yet. "It's such a good job for me and it's so much fun, I never get tired of doing it."

Having fun at the job and seeing something new in everything you see always makes it easier to keep working at the same thing for 45 years.

At the Friday, April 15th meeting of the American Agriculture Movement held in the Clarendon High School cafeteria, Marion Garland, an alternate delegate for this district in Sunray, and Arnold Schwertner, a state delegate from District 2 out of Floydada, explained some of the things the American Agriculture is trying to do to help the local farmers.

They explained some of the bills pending in Congress such as the Foreign Land Ownership Bill; some statistics on FmHA loans, the PIK program, Cheese and Butter program and various plans. Garland said, "When the farmers went to Washington a few years ago, their slogan was 100 parity or nothing, and we got what we asked for...nothing." American storage bins are bulging at the seams with butter, cheese and other food commodities.

"It may be possible that sometime this year, powdered milk, rice, corn meal and honey may be distributed as well as the butter and cheese," the representatives said.

They explained that the cheese and butter can be

given away to anyone as long as they use the commodities themselves. They cannot be sold, or used in restaurants or thrown away. "If anyone wants to come pick up a load for distribution in their community," Schwertner said, "they can come get some.

But they must see to it that the commodities are given away and not charged for." This arrangement was made with Secretary Block when Schwertner asked about a more far-reaching distribution. The AAM has been giving away truck-loads of

cheese and butter all over Texas.

THE JOYS OF WALKING



If you aren't the jogging sort, and you'd like to discover a simple, inexpensive way to get a good cardiovascular workout and stay in shape... finding your ideal sport might just be as easy as putting one foot in front of the other: try walking.

Now we're not talking about merely sauntering along. The kind of walking that's being advocated here is really a move-em-out, where's-the-fire, low-key trot. In effect, it's a less stressful, slowed-down version of jogging... that, at the same time, allows you to lose weight, improve the muscle tone throughout your body, experience lowered blood pressure, enjoy better rest, and benefit from an overall sense of well-being. Most doctors agree upon the positive results of walking, while opinions vary on the benefits of jogging and running.

The single most important investment a walker can make is in high-quality, comfortable shoes. If you don't already have a pair of jogging or walking shoes, it would

be a good idea to buy some before you start your new exercise program. You can wear most anything you want above your shoes and socks, as long as it's comfortable and is suited to movement. Shorts are appropriate for both sexes from spring to fall, while a full, free-flowing skirt is OK for women who like to walk home from work. In the winter you may need to wear layers of clothes, since you'll undoubtedly warm up—and perhaps want to slip your outerwear into a daypack—after a short period of brisk walking.

If you're like most people, you've probably never given much thought to how you walk, even though a person's stride is nearly as distinctive as his or her fingerprints or voice. Many individual mannerisms, however, aren't appropriate to brisk, recreational walking. For example, notice how you plant your feet. Do they turn out or in significantly? If so, try marching along a painted line in a parking lot, placing your feet parallel to the stripe on either side and pushing off from the ball of the big toe with each step. This sort of practice will help you develop an efficient gait... similar to that used by Olympic race walkers.

Learn to swing your arms rhythmically as you go, too, holding your forearms at an angle of 90° to your upper arms. Walking is an exercise that involves the whole body, and good arm action is one key to obtaining overall fitness benefits and achieving a stride that will really move you on out.

Of course, it's best to start out covering short distances... perhaps as little as a half- or quarter-mile. *The Complete Book of Walking* by Charles T. Kuntzleman and the editors of *Consumer Guide* (Simon & Schuster, 1980) cautions beginners on three points: You should not walk so vigorously that you can't carry on a conversation as you go... you should feel no pain... and you should experience no great fatigue during the remainder of the day following your walk. If your body disagrees with even one of these statements, you're simply going at it too hard for your present level of conditioning. (A reasonable goal, after six to eight weeks, would be to travel a full two miles in 40 minutes.)

Walking can be extra fun if you organize several people into a walking club. In fact, one of the best aspects of walking for exercise is that almost anyone can join in... from grandparents to toddlers. And this sport is versatile enough that you can make it a solitary, personal activity. Any way you choose, the most important thing is to put your best foot forward and walk your way to fitness!

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HEATS ON

Making a small amount of meat go a long way is the ultimate test of a skilled dietician. A pound of ground beef stretches to serve many in tasty dishes such as the Puffy Meat Loaf Pie. When you invest in ground beef, don't go for the hamburger meat because it could contain other meats such as pork and animal fat and less desirable parts of the animal. Ground beef is leaner and tastier.

PUFFY MEAT LOAF PIE

- 1 C coarsely shredded raw potatoes, well drained
- 1/4 C catsup
- 1/4 C finely chopped onion
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/8 tsp pepper
- 1 egg
- 1 can refrigerated crescent dinner rolls
- 1/2 C shredded Monterey Jack cheese
- 1/2 C shredded cheddar cheese

In a large bowl, combine beef, potatoes, catsup, onion salt, pepper and egg. Mix well, press into 9" pie pan, bake at 375 for 20 minutes, then drain.

Separate dough into 8 triangles, arrange over partially baked meat mix. Bake 10 minutes and sprinkle with shredded cheese and bake 5 more minutes.

MEATBALL STEW
[Lone Star Gas Co recipe]

- 1 1/2 lb ground beef
- 1/4 C soft bread crumbs
- 1 slightly beaten egg
- 1/4 C finely chopped onion
- 1 tsp salt

Combine and shape into 1" balls, brown in 1 TBS vegetable oil and drain.

- 1 can condensed beef broth
- 1 can tomato soup
- 1 can sliced carrots or 2 C cooked carrots, drained
- 1 can whole potatoes or 8 to 10 small cooked potatoes, drained
- 1 can small whole onions or 2 C cooked onions, drained
- 1/4 tsp dried thyme

Simmer over low flame 15 to 20 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add meatballs to vegetables.

Ruth Rowe's mother baked an Emergency Cake, dating from recipes in the 1930's.

EMERGENCY CAKE

- 1 1/2 C flour
- 1 C sugar
- 1 1/2 tsp baking powder
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/4 C milk
- 1/4 C oleo
- 1 egg
- 1 tsp vanilla

Beat all ingredients in a large mixer bowl at low speed for 30 seconds, scraping bowl constantly. Beat at high speed for 3 minutes, scraping occasionally. Pour into a greased and floured 8" square or 9" round. Bake at 350 for 35-40 minutes for square pan or 35 minutes for round pan or until cake tests done. Cool. Top with French Silk Frosting.

FRENCH SILK FROSTING

- 1/2 C oleo
- 1 1/2 C powdered sugar
- 1 square melted unsweetened chocolate
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 TBS milk

Beat together on first three ingredients on low until blended, gradually add vanilla and milk and continue beating until fluffy.

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
