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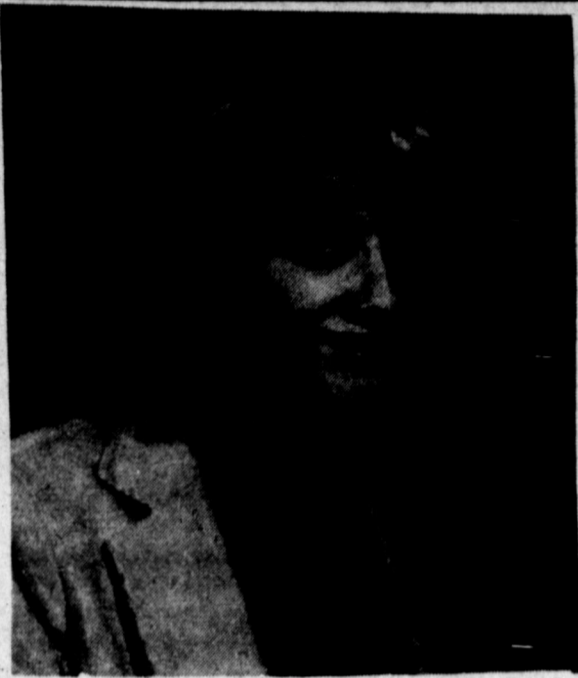

Services to be held Thursday for Tambra Phillips

Funeral services for Tambra Renee Phillips, age 17, will be held at 3:00 p.m. on Thursday, May 12, 1983 in the First Baptist Church, with Rev. Randy Daniels, Pastor of the Martin Baptist Church and Tom Harguess, Pastor of the Church of Christ, officiating. Interment will be in Citizens Cemetery with the arrangements under the direction of Robertson Funeral Directors. Miss Phillips died at 10:15 p.m. on Monday, May 9, 1983 following a one car rollover 4 miles west of Clarendon on Highway 287. She was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace W.W. Lovelady. Three other occupants of the car received only minor injuries. Miss Phillips was born October 8, 1965 in Amarillo, Texas and had

been a lifelong resident of Clarendon. At the time of her death, she was a Junior at Clarendon High School, having attended Clarendon Schools all of her life. She was a member of the Martin Baptist Church. Survivors include her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Donnie Phillips of Clarendon; her paternal grandmother, Mrs. Katie Phillips of Clarendon; her maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Bob Thieme and Mr. and Mrs. John A. Kennedy all of San Antonio; one sister, Miss Shonda Phillips of the home; and one brother, Todd Phillips of the home. Ken Dorris receives scholarship from RepublicBank Waco

William A. Nesbitt, President of RepublicBank Waco has announced that Ken Dorris of Clarendon, Texas has been awarded the 1983 RepublicBank Waco Banking Scholarship at Baylor University. This will be the 29th consecutive year for this most unique scholarship which has provided an education to many of Texas' most outstanding bankers. Ken is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Gary Skinner and will graduate from Clarendon High School on May 26th where he is President of the National Honor Society and Captain of the football team in addition to being active in many other student organizations and extracurricular activities.

The scholarship currently provides \$3,500.00 toward tuition, room and board per academic year at Baylor University. Each year RepublicBank Waco awards a four year scholarship to attend Baylor University to an outstanding senior in the state of Texas who is interested in Banking as a career and was established to encourage young people to enter the banking profession.

CHS boys track team places 4th in Region IAA

The Clarendon Broncho Varsity Boys Track Team traveled to Lubbock this past weekend to compete in the Region I-AA Track and Field Meet which was held at R.P. Fuller Track on the campus of Texas Tech University. Seven outstanding young athletes, as well as fine young men, represented our school and community at this meet.

Once again these young men proved that hard work, diligence, and self-discipline coupled with athletic ability will provide the formula for success on the track.

The meet began on Friday morning at 11:00 with several of the field events. Brad McGuire was the Bronco's entrant in the shot put and had an outstanding series of puts with a best effort of 51'10". This was good for a second place finish but more importantly it qualified Brad for the State Meet to be held in Austin this coming weekend. This is the second year for Brad to compete at the State level and he is certainly excited and will be a definite threat for high honors at Austin.

The running prelims began at 1:30 on Friday afternoon and the first Bronco to run was Dean Cearley in the 110 meter high hurdles. Dean had some tough luck as he stumbled coming out of the blocks and ran a 16.95. This was well behind his best effort of the season which was a 15.77 at district. Dean will be back however as he is only a Sophomore and has shown tremendous improvement throughout the season.

The next running event in which the Broncos had an entry was the 400 meter dash. David Weatherston ran an excellent time of 49.33 to have to top qualifying time for the finals in his specialty.

The final event of the day had the Bronco 1600 meter relay team of Rodney Smith, Glenn Weatherston, Dylon Howell and David Weatherston entered against some of the outstanding 4 lap relay teams in the state. The Broncos were determined to improve on their seasonal best of 3:29.68. Not only did they improve but the relay team finished second in their heat and qualified with the fourth best time of the day with a 3:25.77. Rodney lead off with his best time of the season of 52.68. Glenn followed with a strong leg of 52.26. Dylon posted a 52.93 on his carry for a personal best and David anchored the team with a sizzling carry of 47.90! He passed the anchor legs of Stratford and Slaton to bring the Broncos home in second behind Hamlin.

The Bronchos began their efforts on Saturday morning at 8:30 with Brad entered in the discus competition. Once again Brad proved to be too much for the rest of the field by winning the event with a throw of 149'2 1/2". Five of his six throws were better than the second place finisher in the event. This complete domination by Brad made it possible for him to be able to compete in his second event in Austin this weekend.

Bryan Smith was the first Bronco to compete in the running finals on Saturday and he turned in his best time of the season in the 3200 meter run with a time of 11:05.88. Bryan failed to place in the event but since he is only a junior and has shown great improvement throughout the season, he is a definite threat in this event at regional next season.

As time for the 400 meter dash drew near, David nervously prepared for yet another

Greenbelt Water Authority donates suction unit for ambulance

The Greenbelt Water Authority recently purchased a portable suction unit to be placed on one of the local ambulances. This new piece of equipment is required under the new state statutes for licensing as a Mobile Intensive Care Unit. The unit is a Laerdal Portable Suction and it is valued at \$1,750. Both local ambulances have permanent mounted suction but have no way to carry suction to a patient when he is away from the ambulance. This is no longer a problem with the new suction. It will operate for 1 hour on its own internal batteries and can be recharged while the ambulance is garaged. It is very small and lightweight. It can be taken to drowning victims, boating accident victims, heart attack, stroke, severe head and/or facial trauma, or any unconscious patient. It

is extremely important that these patients be suctioned if they are to survive. While unconscious, they are unable to cough or swallow and secretions such as blood, saliva, or vomitus can enter the trachea or windpipe, causing them to suffocate or die later of aspiration pneumonia. Proper suctioning and airway management are the first priority in every patient, particularly those who are unconscious.

Greenbelt Water Authority has always been a supporter of Emergency services locally. The Clarendon EMS and the Clarendon and Howardwick Fire Departments provide primary medical and fire services to Greenbelt Lake and Howardwick and the surrounding areas so that Greenbelt Water Authority does not have to maintain their own medical and/or fire services.

Air Infiltration

Recently, Texas Power and Light Co. in conjunction with Texas A&M University and Princeton University tested 50 homes in the Dallas area to pinpoint sources of their air infiltration.

One of the most surprising finds was that wall outlets were responsible for 20% of the air infiltration. This is more than for doors and windows combined.

Air follows the wiring through the studs and cavities of your walls and moves in and out of your home through the plug and switch plates.

There is a simple remedy available to homeowners. A number of manufacturers produce inexpensive gaskets pre-cut to fit behind your switch and plug plates.

To install, simply turn off the electrical power at the fuse or breaker box, unscrew your switch and plug plates and place the gasket material in the proper alignment.

For very little money--probably not more than five dollars--and one hour of your time, you might want to try

these new products to cut down heating and cooling bills.

This is just one of the many tips that will be presented at the "Energy Efficient Home Interiors" workshop that will be on Thursday, May 12, from 7-9 p.m. in Room 102 at Clarendon College. 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Toothaches may occur with no advance warning. If toothaches begin at night or when a dentist is not available, one faces the prospect of hours of discomfort. But several nonprescription products are available to help cope with toothache until professional care can be obtained. (All toothaches should receive the care of a dentist in order to prevent further damage to the teeth.)

First, any of several pain relievers can be taken by mouth. Most of these contain aspirin or acetaminophen. These products help reduce the intensity of the pain. Also, products that contain local anesthetics (usually eugenol or benzocaine) may be applied to the gums and in cavities.

But are local anesthetics really effective in relieving toothache pain? This question was asked by dental researchers and their results were published in ORAL SURGERY. Some toothache sufferers received a gel containing benzocaine; others received a plain gel (no active ingredient). Over 80% of the group receiving the benzocaine gel reported almost immediate pain relief. Only 16% of individuals receiving the plain gel claimed toothache relief. From this study it appears that benzocaine gel is an effective temporary toothache reliever..and it is available without prescription.

Former Resident Dies

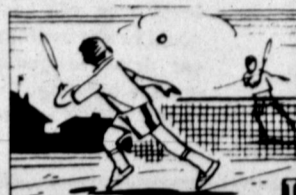
