Immdiately tollowing broadcast of the ABC network's television program, 20/20, on March 25, concerning the Clark Ranch and FmHA, Administrator Charles W. Shuman sent the following letter to the show's producer, Craig Rivera. Dear Mr. Rivera.

20/20's March 25 feature on the Clark ranch and Farmers Home Administration slanted or ignored a number of facts available to you from your access to the loan file. Had you chosen to present them your viewers

would have received a balanced account of how and why one Montana rancher went out of business.

For instance: *During the same winter

Mr. Clarek alleges Farmers Home had denied him money to heat his house, fuel for his tractors, repair his machines and feed his family, Farmers. Home had in fact made available \$40,000 in loan funds for these purposes. The amount Mr. Clark reported expending for these purposes -- a matter of recordwas \$20,506.

•Far from suffering from a lack of loan counseling, Rick Hall, the county supervisor, had contacts with Mr. Clark either by phone, letter, or face-to-face in the Circle, Montana, Famers Home office (which is over 100 miles from the Clark ranch) 16 times. These contacts began when Mr. Hall became a supervisor in late 1980 and continued over the next 13 months when it became apparant the loans; were in trouble. Before that, farm visits were made by a previous county supervisor; an, assistant district director and a senior loan officer for a total of four times between. 1979 and 1981. Advice, to be effective, must be followed. There is. ample evidence that much of Farmers Home's advice went unheeded and that this, in part, led to Mr. Clark's present financial straits.

totaled some \$50,000. *Failure to account for secured property is a serious matter. You can't sell your mortgaged car of home without your lender's permission. The same is true with property securing a government loan. When this happened, the county supervisor very properly took action to protect the taxpayer's interest. The taxpayers' interest in the Clark place is consider-

able. As of March 1, 1983. unpaid principal was \$1.3 million and principal and interest deliquent was \$820,693. The daily interest load was \$372. No plan devised by the Clarks or by Farmers Home could bluepring a method to eventually pay off this debt and interest load, given the ranch's resources and Mr. Clark's track record in the past. Liquidating the loan was the only answer to both protecting the taxpayers' interest and preventing a further descent by the Clarks into a lake of unpayable debt. 20/20 made much of the fact that County Supervisor

Hall did not grow up on a farm. In fact he has had

extensive experience working on farms and ranches in Montana--even to the extent of putting in a crop on his own time for an injured borrower. There is nothin in law or regulation -- nor should there be--requiring a county supervisor to be the son or daughter of a farmer. Mr. Hall has a university degree in agriculture and is fully qualified by education and experience for his job.

*Mr. Hall did not refuse an interview with 20/20, as you know. 'He had been instructed by his boss, the state director, to refer 20/20 to the state office for the interview, because the file was not available at the county office and because of the necessity for having an attorney present to advise on Privacy Act matters.

Finally, it should be noted that over a 9-year period the Clarks received more than \$1 million in federal loans at much lower interest rates than most other farmers could obtain. From 1976 through 1980, with this assistance, they increased their assets from \$180,000 to \$1,222,000 with a concomitant increase in debt. This included a half-million dollar purchase of land from an individual, on which the Clarks made annual payments from FmHA loan funds, not their own funds. his individual lender's fore-

closure action on the Clarks was yet another precepitating factor in the FmHA loan acceleration, a fact that went unreported by ABC.

In 1982, when the Clarks' loan was accelerated, they were one of 3,027 Farmers Home borrowers in Montana. All suffered from the same low prices and many suffered from the same natural disasters afflicting the Clarks. However, of these 3,027 borrowers, only 27 went in such dire straits as to require acceleration of their loans. The others remained in farming, thanks to the kind of Farmers Home loan counseling exemplified

by Rick hall and other county supervisors, but most of all, thanks to the self-sacrifice and good management ability of the individual farmers and ranchers themselves.

I believe that you should be aware in addition that Geraldo Rivera violated an agreement with the state director, made in advance, to turn off cameras when Mr. Lund felt it necessary to consult with Farmers Home's attorney. Using one of these sequences on the air, as he did, to make it appear that Mr. Lund was unwilling to answer a question--when in fact he was seeking counsel from the attorney -- is at the very best a violation of trust. Such tactics may provide drama be"


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



Current Theft

Electric utilities in Texas, including West Texas Utilities Co., are taking a tougher stance these days on theft of electricity.

Reasons for the crackdown are a change in the State Penal Code making meter tampering a penitentiary offense and the fact that, the cost of producing electric energy has gone up.

"We view any form of stealing electric power as a serious crime," said Don Welch of Abilene, WTU vice president and director of customer services, "because we feel a strong responsibility to protect the interest of our good paying customers."

"It costs money to produce electricity," Welch said. "If one customer manages to get some of it free, the other customers-have to make up the difference.'

The State Legislature amended the criminal mischief statute in 1981 to make diversion of any utility service a third degree felony with a possible punishment of a maximum fine of \$5,000 and from two to ten years in prison. The law also allows authorities to make the assumption that the person in whose name the service was last billed is the responsible party.

Convictions have been obtained in several Texas cities since the law was passed, and STU recently filed charges which resulted in a felony indictment being issued against a customer. Welch said that meter tampering not only is a serious crime which is be-

coming more easy to detect, but that it is extremely dangerous. "Many people do not un-derstand the danger in-

volved," he said. "Property damage, serious injury, or even death can result."



TIPS FOR FISHERFOLK

1: D. 41 9 . A.

This is the time of year when fishing fever casts its spell across the land and, so that your "gone fishing" day won't be totally wasted. Randy Kidd. noted veterinarian and avid outdoorsman-working with Chuck Bever, fisheries biologist of the Kansas Fish and Game Commission-has compiled this list of the hows, wheres, and whats of catching some of North America's more common fish

Bluegills. [1] How-to: most any sort of reasonably light rod and line. Cast or still-fish with a floating bobber. [2] Bait: small worms, very small minnows (an inch or so long), crickets, jigs (small lures bounced up and down on the bottom of the lake or pond). and tiny spinners. [3] Times and places: throughout the late spring and summer. The spawning season (which will occur within this period) is best. Mating areas are usually located in shallow water ... either within bare

spots in weed beds or upon carefully prepared circles of pebbles. Channel Catfish. [1] How-to: spinning. spin-casting. or casting rod and line. Fish on the bottom of rivers, etc. Thread your line through a slip sinker and add a swivel or bead below the weight to keep the sinker from sliding onto the hook. Attach one or two hooks to the end of a 12" to 18" length of line fastened below the sinker. [2] Bait: worms, minnows, shad, small fish, prepared bait, frogs, and crawdads. Use large hooks (from 4 to 00, depending on the size of catfish present). [3] Times and places: spring

. in rivers, creeks, and shallows, summer . . . in creeks, lake channels, and mud flats. *Crappie*. [1] How-to: a light line (two- to six-pound-test) and an ultralight pole. Jig. cast, or use bobbers. [2] Bait, jigs, worms, crickets, minnows, and small spinners. [3] Times and places: usually best in the springtime. Crappie spawn along rocky shorelines and around underwater structures.

Largemouth Bass. [1] How-to: spinning, spin-casting, or casting rod and line. Cast, troll (that is, pull a baited lure behind a slowly moving boat), or use a bobber. A heavy line (six-pound test or better) and a stout pole (with a stiff action) are best. [2] Bait: jigs, spinners, other artificial lures, worms, minnows, frogs, crawdads, salamanders, or other natural bait. [3] Times and places: around standing timber and brush piles and along weed patches during sunny days. Farm ponds sometimes provide excellent bass fishing. Most largemouths spawn in the spring on beds similar to those prepared by bluegills, but many seem to keep at it throughout the summer. They generally don't feed and shouldn't be molested while spawning.

Rainbow Trout. [1] How-to: spinners, spin-casting, casting, or fly rod and line. In small, clear streams, a quiet approach to the water and a gentle lure presentation are needed. Try casting or still-fishing with a very small slip sinker. [2] Bait: worms, minnows, packaged salmon eggs, or grasshoppers on tiny No. 12 to No. 14 hooks, or small spinners artificial flies. Most stocked trout are less than 12 inches long. If you have larger fish in your area, use larger hooks. Trolling is a good technique to catch the bigger specimens

As there was no further business to be handles, the meeting was adjourned by Mayor Lee Roy Jackson.


