Today these monsters of the highways invade our smaller communities with goods bought in great quantities at a much less cost than they could be purchased by the small town merchant, and undersell the men who have helped build and sus-

tain the smaller towns of Texas. If trucks are to use the highways let them do one of two things: either bear their part of highway construction costs and maintenance and their share of responsibility to the communities they serve, or build the railroads have been compelled to do. If the present truck laws will be rigidly enforced and truck opera tors will quit asking for more public subsidy, Texas citizens, Texas communities and Texas business will be
