Nothing remains of Goldston lab where a store once stood. It was located on the Jericho road at he intersection going west to the ld country club (now Quivera Gir Scout Camp). The once busy
school house was destroyed by a tornado in 1957.
The cotton gin (The Smith rothers Gin, owned by Bert and Vestis Smith) was the biggest in-
dustry. A row of four houses o the east of the gin, and a grocery tore-filling station sat on the orthwest corner. The operator of the store lived in an attractive house behind the store. There wa tion on the east corner. The heart of Texas is beating mall and medium size Texas cities have succeeded in revitalizing their conomies by investing in the repair fildings, landscaping and and marketing techniques.
More towns than ever are taking advantage of the Texas Main Street Project's strategies for restoring
the confidence in downtowns and reversing their lagging economies. The latest figures from the Texas Historical Commission's Texas Main Street Project office now how that a total of more than $\$ 175$
million in public and private funds million in public and private funds
have been reinvested into more than 30 communities since the program started in 1981, according to Anice Read, director.
Since the program

Texas Main Street cities have seen a total of 2,356 downtown buildings rehabilitated, a net gain of 1,162 ew businesses, and 3,536 new jobs created.

Your carrier will remove accumulated mail when the box becomes full, and leave a notice to pick up the mair at the Post Office. at the Post Office for up to 30 days," says Postmaster McCombs. "Either stop by the office here, or ask your carrier for a hold mail
card. Be sure to specify the dates
which you would like -your mail
held, fill out the card hand it to a clerk or your carrier day or two before you leave." "The Postal Service does not cept requests to hold mail for one day or requests made
telephone," McCombs says. When you return, you can either pick up the accumulated mail at the office, or call and ask that it be

$2,4-\mathrm{D}$ treatment produced 25 bushels per acre. Yield was 30 ushels per acre with both sweep and no-tillage where Tordon or Banvel were used. According to Schoenhals,
bindweed reduced wheat and sorghum yield by competing for soil water. Soil samples to four feet showed that bindweed reduced soil fallow period by about two inches. This is enough soil water to produce from 500 to 700 pound per acre of sorghum", the Re searcher said. In dry times, like the
fall of 1988 the difference was even greater. Available soil water stored from wheat harvest in June 1988 to December 1988 was zero inch on untreated bindweed and three in led. Schoenhals summarized by stat ing bindweed could be controlled in three years with combinations of 2,4-D and sweep tillage at three system he devised. Control time could be reduced to two years when Banvel or Tordon were sprayed in October of the first fallow period.
He said "Control developed prevented bindweed from competing with wheat and sorghum for soil water". "This
