Cotton

Donley County cotton producers are encouraged to attend a breakfast meeting on Thursday, April 27 at the Clarendon Community Building. Donuts, coffee and orange juice will be served starting at 7:00 a.m. and the meeting will start at 8:00 a.m. The breakfast is sponsored by the local gins in Donley County.

The boll weevil is still a big concern for many cotton farmers and this will be the main topic at the meeting. 100 boll weevil traps have been ordered for use by farmers to use to monitor boll weevil population at their fields. The traps will be issued at this meeting and farmers will receive training on how to use them at the meeting. Most farmers should only need from 5 to 10 traps.

This also may be one of the most important years yet for farmers to consider a uniform late planting date since two late cold snaps should have reduced overwintering weevil numbers. With a uniform late planting date weevil numbers could be lowered to nonexistent levels. Getting farmer participation for later planting will be most important and this will be discussed at the meeting on Thursday.

Topical and Oral Acne Medicines

Acne is one of the most difficult-to-treat of all the skin conditions Effective topical and oral acne medicines include:

Benzoyl Peroxide: This topical medicine is considered the most effective of the nonprescription acne medicines. Benzoyl peroxide drys the skin and helps peel away dead layers that might otherwise clog openings in the skin. It also causes the release of oxygen in the skin, which kills bacteria associated with the development of acne.

Tretinoin: This prescription-only topical medicine is often reserved for moderate to severe acne that does not respond to benzoyl peroxide.

Antibiotics: Topical antibiotics, such as erythromycin, clin-damycin, and tetracycline, are often effective in treating mild to severe acne. Severe acne often requires oral antibiotics, however.

Isotretinoin: If oral antibiotics are not effective, isotretinoin, a derivative of vitamin A, is sometimes considered. This oral medicine decreases sebum production in the skin and is effective in treating severe acne. Isotretinoin should not be taken by women who have recently be-

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The Old Goldston Community School and the addition.

The Way We Were

This is the first of a series of articles about the old Goldston Community and the people who lived there. A reunion is being planned for July 15th. at the Community Center.

After the resettlement of New Clarendon, almost a century ago, a little community was born just north of Old Clarendon. The community went by the name of Graff, named for, or by, a rancher by that name. The ranch was located just north of the Quivera Girl Scout Camp. The number of inhabitants at that time is not known, but the "Graff" community would be short lived.

Mable Elmore remembers when the community became know as Goldston. It was named in honor of her grandfather, J.J. Goldston.

J.J. Goldston moved to the Graff community in 1900 from Waco. "Uncle Jack," as he became known, had a large family: "Preach," Leck, Walter, John, Joe, Nathe, Tom, Ethel, Eva and Hollie.

Hollie Goldston was married to Dick Eickleburger and the couple had one child, Mable. Mable was very young when the flu epidemic of 1918 struck the community, taking the life of her mother.

Shortly after the armistice of World War I(November 7,1918) a snow storm paralyzed the community. "It started about the first of December," Mable recalls, and "never let up." During that time flu had reached epidemic proportions.

The doctor could not reach the sick because of the storm and many lives were lost, including Mable's mother and Fontayne Elmore's (her future husband) sister and husband. Hollie Goldston Eickleburger was buried on Christmas day, 1918. Dick Eickleburger later married Mazie Stewart, and the couple farmed in Goldston for many years.

Mable started to school in a two room house. The two rooms still exists after several remodeled jobs as

the Porter Ranch headquarters, located on the road that leads to the girl scout camp. In the days of the they remained a large part of the Goldston Community the road was community and owned land there. known as the Country Club Road. Ross McAdams owned the land Mable still lives in Clarendon. where the school was located. Later the land was sold to J.R. Porter. The school was then a twelve year school and, as it grew, another portion was moved and placed beside it. It had been the old Boyston Switch school house and had accommodated five

students. Mable related, "everybody did -- or p.m. buggies. I rode a horse and at first had to be lifted on and off. We had boys and girls basketball teams in high school. Our uniforms were black stockings, bloomers and boxpleated skirts that hung below the p.m., Games 12:30 - 3 p.m., 1st knees. We played matched games with Martin and Jericho."

Mable and Fontayne lived across the road from what is now the

Quivera Girl Scout Camp before moving into Clarendon. Even then,

Fontayne died February 14, 1963.

One company built its success in placing its ads all exactly alike, under several different classifi

More friends and neighbors read these, so then was heavier response.

These ads appeared under Personals, Business
Opportunities, Merchandise for Sale.

Remember, no one reads every classified ad

in any issue of any newspaper.

Your friends and neighbors read only the classi fications of interest.

The fact is this: if your classified is not seen by those who should see it, you won't get the

by those who should see it, you won't get the response you deserve.

One very smart retailer had his ad typeset as a small ad about an inch deep. He used a black border, had his name and phone in large black letters.

He worked with his newspaper staff to have seven — count them — seven of these scattered throughout the classified pages.

He sold out the item advertised with just two insertions.

An even smarter retailer grew up in New York in the theater district. He had seen countless posters for Broadway shows pasted on fences, empty build

for Broadway shows pasted on fences, empty build-ings, everywhere.

These posters, all alike, were often mounted 10 posters wide X 2 posters deep.

He thought about his classifieds. He had a one inch ad typeset and ran 7 ads, all exactly alike, one after the other, in a single classified column, some-thing like "ducks in a row."

Did these ads work for him? In six months he

built his small computer electronics repair business from \$100 a day gross sales to more than \$800 each day. He never changed his ad. Not one word. His magic number was 7. 7 ads all tight

Another wise man with limited budget ran a 4-inch classified. Then he had 15 tiny ads of 2 or 3 lines each scattered throughout the classifieds asking the reader to see his important 4-inch classified. Did that work? Well, he still does it. Every



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
