FARM NEWS

from County ASCS Committee

1963 Cotton And Feed Grain Performance

Reporters are in the fields measuring cotton and grain sorghums for those farms that signed up in the feed grain program. It is very important that plots that were planted to cotton but have been destroyed by adverse weather conditions or some other reason beyond the control of the producer be measured in order to give full credit for history for future allotments. As you know, if less than 75% of the cotton allotment is planted, the history for future years will be reduced.

Notices of measured acres are being mailed out as field work and office computations have been completed. If you receive a notice showing excess cotton, you have only fifteen days from the date of the notice to dispose of the excess and report to the office. Please look over your notice closely and if there is anything you do not understand, please come to the office for a full explanation. The notices are rather complicated and it is MOST IMPORTANT that you review it thoroughly.

Conservation Reserve Acreage

Inspection of the CR land (Soil Bank) will be made throughout the year to see if the contract is being violated. Therefore, please see that noxious weeds are controlled and that no grazing or harvesting is done on the CR land.

1964 Wheat

In planning your farming operations for the 1964 crop year, please keep in mind that with the exception of those farms having soil bank contracts, under existing regulations there will be no penalties involved in overseeding your wheat allotment. With this in mind, MAY WE URGE YOU TO STUDY THE FOLLOWING ITEMS VERY CLOSELY.

1. If you overseed your wheat allotment and do not dispose of the excess by not later than the final disposition date, you will lose approximately 8 to 10 percent of your history credit. 2. There will be no opportunity to store or pay a penalty for (See Farm News, page 8)

A re-survey of the use of water in the towns involved in the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority has shown that the price of the water delivered to the various towns will be reduced, it was announced by the engineer at a meeting of directors at Childress Friday night.

Water prices for Clarendon, Hedley, Childress and Quanah will be reduced from 35 cents per thousand gallons to 30 cents per thousand gallons and for Paducah it will be reduced from 40 cents to 37 and a half cents.

The mayor and three councilmen from Crowell attended the meeting to learn what would be required for Crowell to join the Authority.

"We have a serious water shortage," said Mayor Henry Black of Crowell.

Fiscal and financial agents for the Authority will be contacted immediately and directors of the Greenbelt are of the opinion that the election for the cities to sign the water purchase contract would be ready for a vote some time in August.

A hearing on the application of the Authority to amend its permit which will enable it to change the location of the damsite has been set before the Texas Water Commission September 4 in Austin.

Millard Parkhurst of McCall, Parkhurst, Crowe, McCall, and Horton, told the directors that it was not necessary for the election to wait until after the hearing.

"You are not asking for more territory but less territory and territory over which you now have control," he said.

Si Freese of the engineering firm of Freese, Nichols and Endress of Fort Worth, said that the reduction in rates was brought about by the increase in water consumption.

"Our original figures were based upon water consumption in years past and our latest studies show an increase in consumption," Freese said, "so we are going to suggest the reduced rates to the directors of the Authority."

The rates are to prevail for five years and will be changed at the end of that period, if necessary. Should consumption continue upward, rates probably will be reduced again at the end of the five-year period.

Quanah has a serious water shortage now and engineers said that sufficient water could be gotten for them and possibly some for Childress from Lake Creek, which is near the damsite in Donley County by July, 1964.

Roland Walden, Greenbelt Director from Quanah, and State Senator Andy Rogers gave a report on their recent trip to Austin to confer with members of the Texas Water Commission and the Texas Water Development Board.

Ray Hutcheson of the firm of McCall, Parkhurst, Crowe, McCall and Horton, gave highlights of the water contract which the cities will vote on.

The contract with the cities will run for 40 years, although the project will be paid out in 35 years.

If a city fails to pay its bill, the Authority will charge interest and then cut off the water supply.

Cities will operate their own water systems.

The Authority will never have the right to take a city's tax money.

Cities will be required to buy all of its water needs from the Authority.

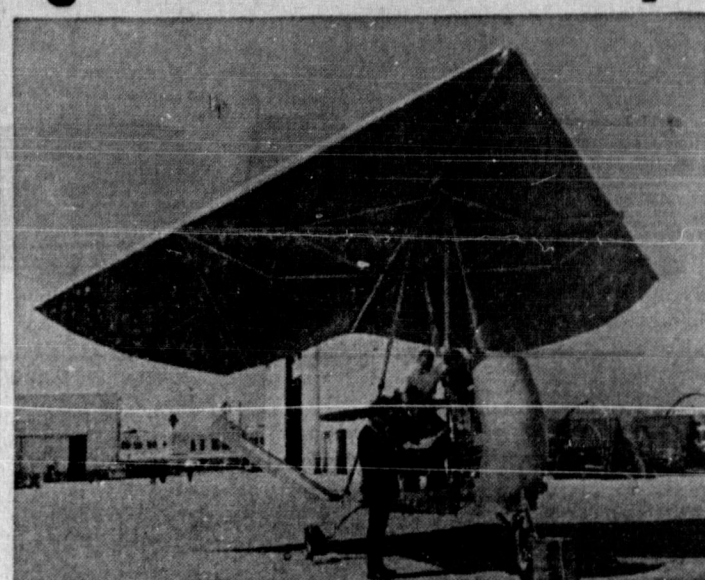
New "Flying Truck" for Army

YUMA TEST STATION, ARIZ. (ANP)—A new unique "flying truck" has recently been delivered to the Army Transportation Research Command at Army's Yuma Test Station, Yuma, Ariz., for test and evaluation.

The Flexible Wing Aerial Utility Vehicle, nicknamed the "Fleep", is designed to operate out of rugged, unimproved areas where conventional airstrips are unavailable, in logistic support of combat troops.

The initial design calls for a payload of 1,000 pounds, a 100 mile range and take-off distance of only 300 feet. The handling characteristics of the "Fleep" are so stable and its controls so simple that personnel accustomed to operating ground vehicles could quickly be trained to fly and maintain the aircraft.

Fifteen test flights, comprising 10 hours, are planned to evaluate basic characteristics of the "Fleep." A second phase test program is then planned which



will involve the training of military personnel in the operation of the aircraft. The "Fleep" was designed by the Ryan Aeronautical Company under contract from the Army Transportation Research Command.

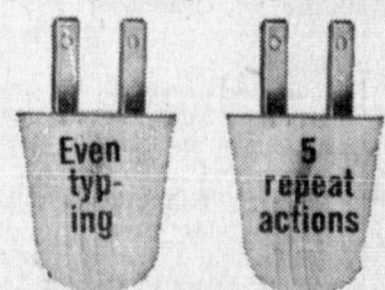

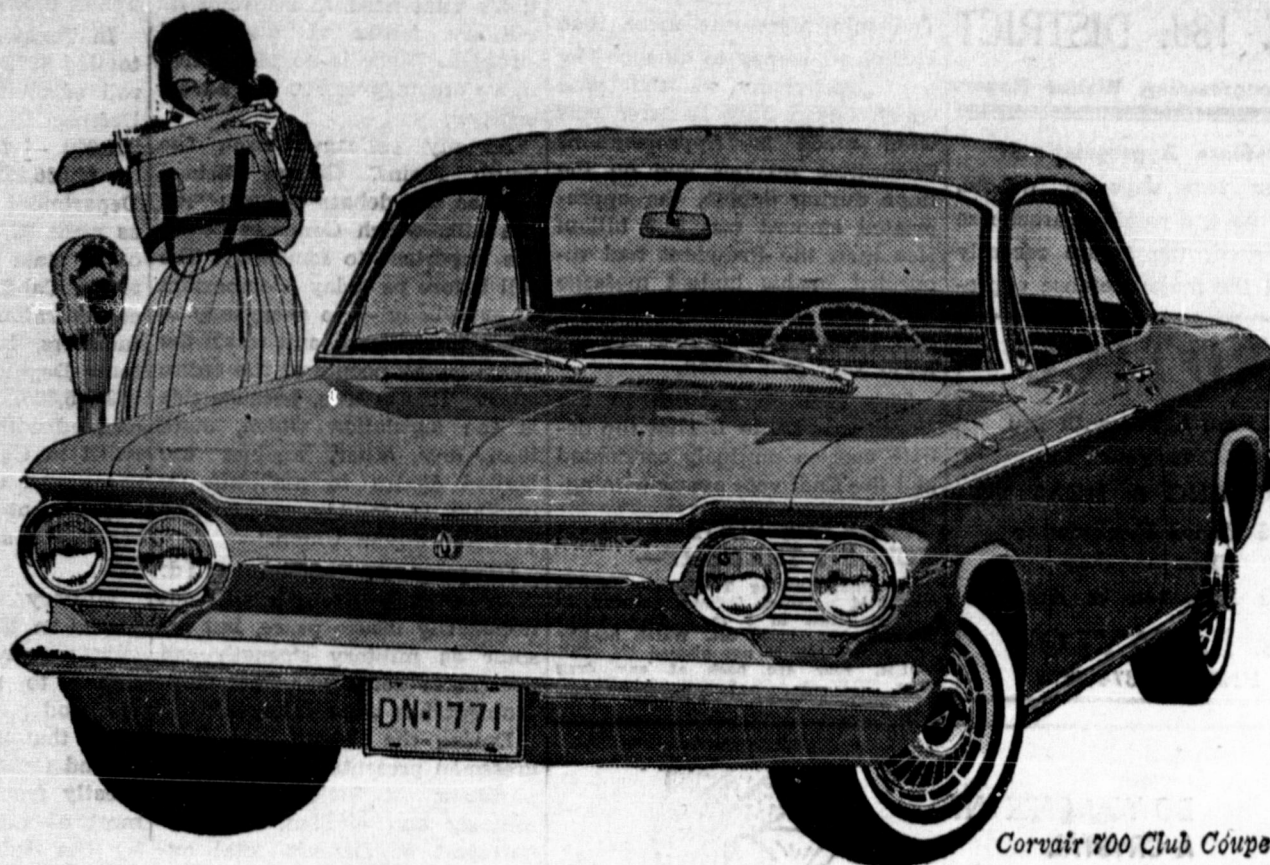

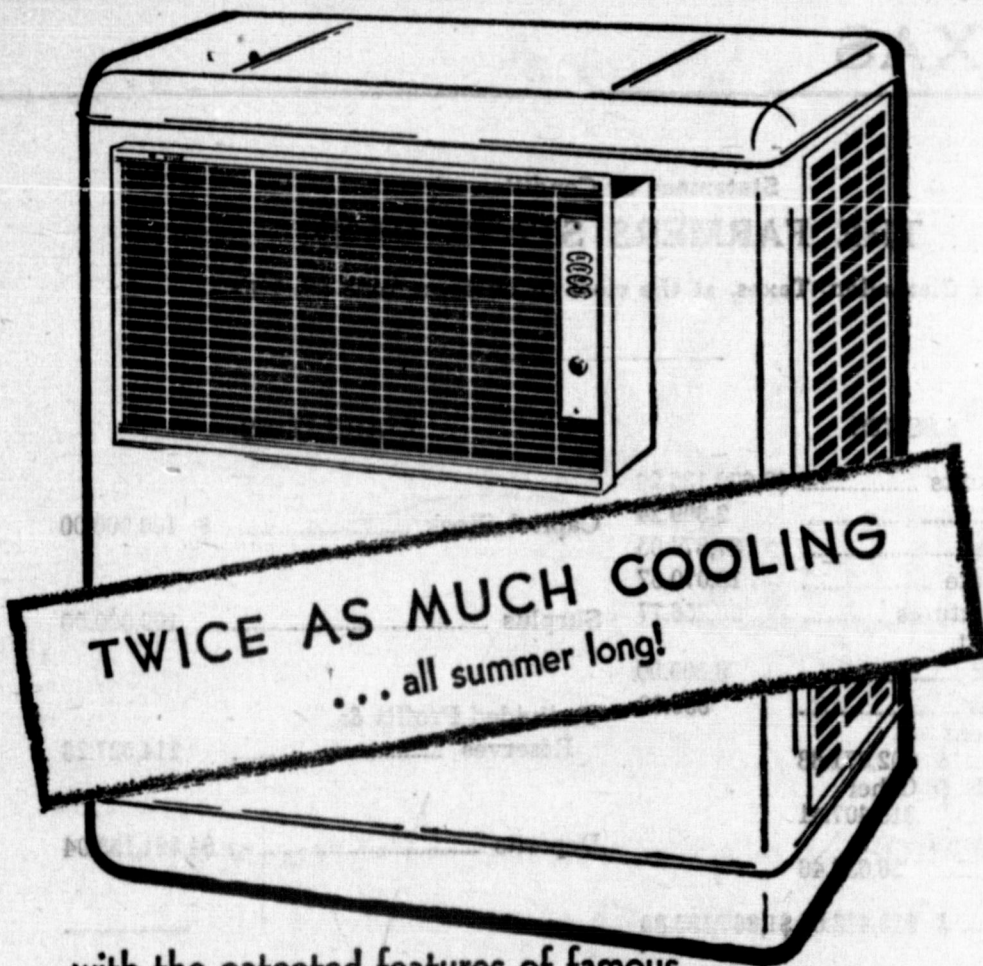

Defense Appropriations
After two days of debate, which no one would characterize as spirited, the House recently passed the major defense appro-

priation measure for the next fiscal year — a bill calling for expenditures totaling \$47 billion. The sum represents more than half of all money to be spent by the government in the year which began July 1. After cuts were made in Appropriations Committee sessions and on the floor during debate, the appropriated amount was \$1.9 billion less than the President had requested in his budget message and \$1.25 billion under the actual similar expenditures for the fiscal year just ended.

The vote on passage in the House was 410 to 1. That the debate was so routinely conducted and the final vote overwhelming-

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ly bears out what every American knows anyway: That there is simply no way around the Nation's vital need to maintain its military forces at unequalled strength. There is no alternative if we are to preserve our sovereignty.

As my colleague from the South Plains, George Mahon, said as the debate opened: "All the bills which Congress passes are important to somebody. The bill before us today is important to everybody — to everybody in the United States, and to all the peace-loving people of the entire world. This is true, because this is the legislation which, more than any other, enables the United States to maintain its position of military superiority over the Soviet Union."

Congressman Mahon said: "Our military strength will not necessarily insure peace, but insofar as military strength can avert and deter war, this Government has what it takes."

During the debate, one Congressman presented the 1962 Department of Defense payroll, military and civilian, and Department of Defense total ex-

penditures for each state. The figures spell out just what military spending means to the Texas economy.

In Texas, the military payroll totaled \$778,798,000 and the payroll of civilian workers for the Defense Department was \$361,742,000 — for a combined total of \$1,006,253,000. Total Defense Department expenditures in Texas as were \$2,146,793,000. Only one other state exceeded the Texas totals. California, with its heavy concentration of aircraft manufacturers, had a combined Defense Department payroll of \$1,709,585,000, and that figure coupled with the enormous sums spent in California for procurement sent the total of Defense Department expenditures in that state to a staggering \$7,702,829,000.

Military installations were placed in these states and military procurement contracts assigned to manufacturers there for good reasons. No one would argue that the economies of Texas and California do not benefit greatly from this situation. Almost as much money is spent by the federal government in

these two states — for defense purposes only — as is taken out in total taxes. The taxes paid into the federal treasury from Texas, for example, totaled in 1962 \$3,329,247,000 on defense payrolls and contracts.

Several Congressmen from Southern States expressed concern during the debate over what they regard as an implied threat that military installations in the South will be deactivated unless nearby cities do not act to desegregate public facilities. The objections raised by these Members of the House followed news reports that Defense Secretary McNamara had been ordered to investigate integration conditions in cities near military bases. If such a situation actually does develop, you can be sure I will be among Congressmen speaking out in vigorous opposition. I concur wholeheartedly with my colleague from Alabama, Congressman George W. Andrews, who told the House: "Military bases were selected on the basis of what was good for the defense effort and not to appease minority groups."

This past week it was my privilege, as a member of the

House Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs, to attend the dedication of the Saline Water Conversion Demonstration Plant at Roswell, N.M. The plant is designed to desalt brackish underground water to fresh water at the rate of one million gallons per day. Fresh water produced by the plant will be sold to the City of Roswell, and the research work to be conducted there will help show the way to solutions — at least partial ones — of the

Nation's vital water conservancy problems.

AUSTIN — Creation of many in a money problem for the new lakes in Texas has resulted State Highway Commission.

Commission Chairman Herb Petry, Jr., of Carrizo Springs expounded on the situation when a Nacogdoches delegation headed by Carl Monk and County Judge F. L. Harris came to Austin to ask for a farm-to-market road from Nacogdoches to McGee Bend Reservoir, now 59 percent complete.

Petry said cities and lakes are draining heavily on state road funds. He pointed out that the State Highway Department worked up a plan for access roads to McGee Bend in 1959. That work has been proceeding in cooperation with the surrounding counties. But there was no new Nacogdoches County road in the plan.

State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer stated that the farm-to-market road law specifically authorizes use of that money for building roads to recreation areas. Petry said some people call these fish-to-market roads.

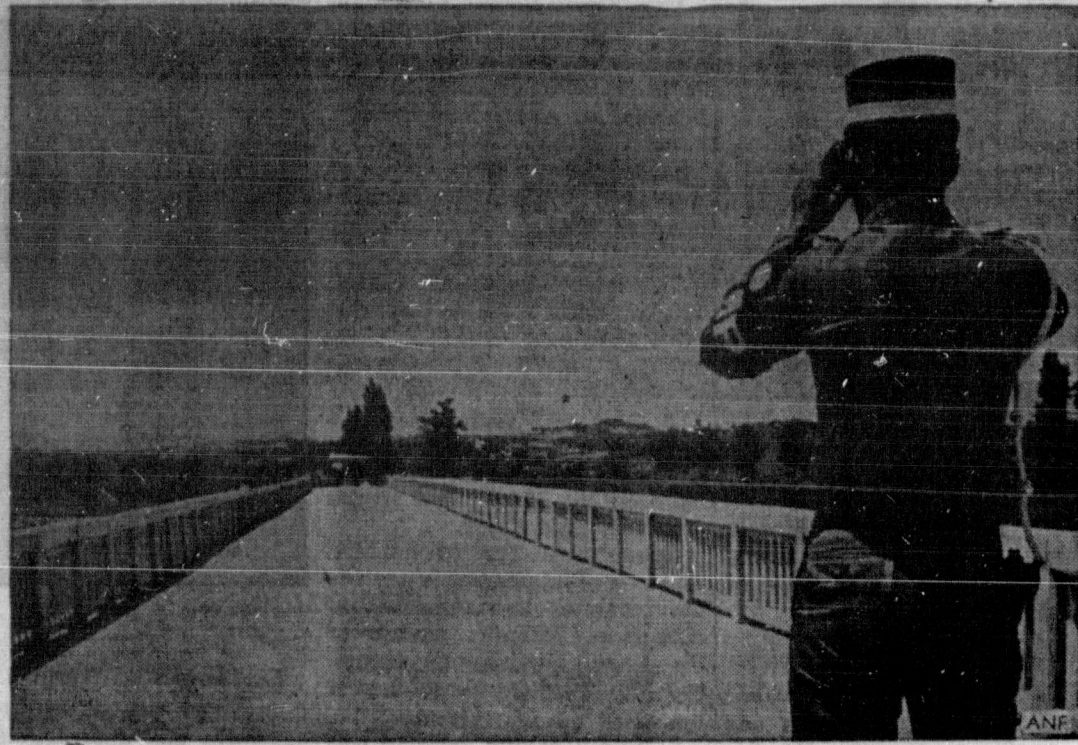
PADRE'S DEED — Lawyers have drawn up the deed by which state-owned land in Laguna Madre will be transferred to the United States. This land is to become a part of the Padre Island National Seashore.

But deed can't be signed by the School Land Board until the law authorizing the transfer takes effect on August 23.

VACATION — Gov. John Connally and his family took off for the family ranch at Floresville for a brief vacation.

So far his vacation has been interrupted twice for speeches in Austin and Dallas.

Connally also took along a pile of work to do. He has many appointments to state boards, commissions and courts to make. He gathered up a file of letters containing recommendations. These will help him decide whom to

name to the two new Courts of Civil Appeals (at Corpus Christi and Tyler), to the new Parks & Wildlife Commission, and to many other state boards.

He also obtained an opinion from Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr, saying that the six new justices he will name need not live in the districts at the time of their appointments. Only requirement is that they move into the district before they take oath of office.

RED REGISTER — Attorney General Carr is taking steps to force Texas only known communist to register. But he has not decided where to bring suit.

A 1951 law requires any communist remaining in Texas as long as five days to register with the Department of Public Safety. No one ever has registered.

Two weeks ago, U.S. Atty. Gen. Robert Kennedy notified the man, a resident of San Antonio, to register within 20 days under a Federal registration law, or face prosecution.

Carr picked up the ball and decided to try to make him register under the unused state law, too.

LIQUOR FINES — People still keep violating the liquor laws. Liquor Administrator Coke Stevenson, Jr., reports that his

agents filed 743 cases last month. There were 738 convictions, with 28 jail terms, for violations. Fines came to \$46,172 during the month.

The Lubbock district, mainly dry, was as usual the location of the largest number of cases among the 18 enforcement districts.

INSURANCE UP — Recommendations for higher auto insurance rates have been made to the State Board of Insurance by insurance companies, and the Board's own staff.

Losses under current rates prompt a general statewide increase averaging 8.6 percent. But

there are variations. Farmers and ranchers, who have chalked up a good non-accident record, will get substantial cuts. They will range from 20 to 30 percent, in various parts of the state.

City drivers will face higher rates for their public liability insurance. Statistics show that where there are more cars there are more accidents.

State is divided into 26 rating territories. Drivers living in safer areas will pay less for their insurance.

Board will announce its decision soon, and new rates will take effect on August 1.

SEWER AID — State Health Department has compiled a list of 37 cities awaiting word that Congress has appropriated money to continue the federal-aid program for construction of sewage treatment facilities.

These cities have applied for \$4,067,626 worth of grants to help them build \$15,980,384 worth of projects.

Expected Texas allocation is about \$3,200,000. So some will have to do without federal aid — or wait for next year.

ETHICS — Three representatives who piloted a tough code of ethics bill through the House of Representatives still are trying.

Rep. James E. Nugent of Kerrville, Robert C. Eckhardt of Houston and Travis Peeler of Corpus Christi presently are seeking help from the Attorney General in drafting a new version for the next session of the Legislature. Later on they hope to talk with Governor Connally about it.

Their bill zoomed through the House. But it was killed in the Senate.

It would prohibit state officials (and legislators) from having extensive business holdings in areas they regulate — or legislate.

SWEDES CELEBRATE — Some 1,300 Texans of Swedish descent gathered in Austin to observe the 125th anniversary of the arrival of the first Swede in Texas.

He was S. M. Swenson, who became quite a power in Texas affairs, and then brought hundreds of other Swedish immigrants to Texas.

Swenson family still operates a large ranch in Throckmorton and Jones Counties.

A program in two languages marked the observance.

CLERKS — Folks who keep the official records in the 254 courthouses of Texas had a convention in Austin.

County Clerk Val D. Huvar of Victoria County wound up as the new president of the County and District Clerks' Association of Texas.

Runnels County Clerk Frankie Berryman was named first vice president, and will move up to president in 1964.

SALES UP — Retail sales in Texas improved a bit in May, after a slump in April.

May sales were 4 percent above April and 1 percent above May, 1962.

RAINS ON THE RANGE — Ranchers got some breaks in some parts of the state, reports the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Summer range and pasture feed prospects continued on the upgrade in the northwest part of Texas. Prospects also were improved by rains in the central and southeastern parts of the state. There ranchers had been culling herds, and sales had been heavy until the rains came.

BED-ROCK RULING — Securities Commissioner William M. King issued an order prohibiting further sales of stock in the Roka-Bed Corporation of Lubbock.

Firm was organized to make children's furniture, including a baby bed which would rock baby to sleep when he cries.

Advertising said Roka-Bed had been tested on 5,000 babies. But promoters told investigators no such tests had been made.

Stock was sold to about 200 persons, mainly in the South Plains area.

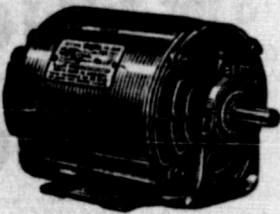

Quoting: "The Moonflower Vine" is Jetta Carleton's first novel.

"Its subject seems an almost radical departure; it is about a family whose members love and respect one another, who have loyalty in their bones and a gift from the gods — a peaceful time and a place to live in (the novel is set in Missouri over the past fifty years) and the ability to love life with passion and delight."

"...How to describe the particular quality of this book — its beauty, its grace, its strength. 'The Moonflower Vine' is written with entire honesty; it portrays — without a trace of false sentimentality — the struggle, common to every human being, of coming to terms with one's own nature. But it is also written in celebration — of laughter, music, breakfast, weather, home, the moments of joy which are as much a part of life as violence and despair. In the book, as in

life, people hurt one another. But there is joy, too. There is the moment, among others, when the moonflowers bloom."

It is hoped that this will by no means be Jetta Carleton's only book. That she will write more and often.
