Not only do the tickets admit a person to the Scout Show, but they also provide the purchaser with price of the ticket.



#### Farmers and Ranchers at Risk from **Skin Cancer**

Farmers, ranchers and others who spend time out-of-doors are in danger of developing skin cancer, but the risks can be reduced with a combination of protection and common sense.

According to Dr. Turner Caldwell, who was raised in Clarendon, the incidence of skin cancer is rising at near epidemic proportions. Melanoma, the most fatal form of skin cancer, is increasing at a rate of three to five percent every year. Basal cell carcinomas appear as slowly growing, raised, translucent, pearly nodules. If untreated, they may crust, ulcerate Cont'd on p. 9

#### **Check Soil Temperature Before Planting**

In many cases the early bird does get the worm. But when it comes to spring planting, farmers may want to use a little restraint and take a look at soil temperatures before cranking up their planters.

One of the keys to getting spring crops off to a good start is to heed soil temperatures.

Soil temperatures have been shown to have an important effect on how well seeds germinate. Planting in cool soils often leads to poor seed germination and poor crop stands. Plants that do come up often lack vigor for early growth. And this opens the door to early season diseases and insect attacks. Farmers should begin plant-

The results should give Donley County a better of idea of the problems youth have in the County and should help local leaders, school officials, churches, extension, and others to work on prevention strategy in these areas.

#### **Burlington Northern** Renovating Tracks through Clarendon

Work crews are placing a new foundation under the railroad tracks through Clarendon. They did not even stop when a spring shower drenched workers and right-of-way alike. The work is a part of an n-going effort to keep the road in the top shape.

This phase should also result in smoother grade crossings. "We realize that this work creates a temporary inconvenience at crossings," says Roadmaster Charles Gulledge of Childress, "But we feel that the results will be more than worth the trouble." Wherever possible, the crossings are being raised and leveled for about 20 feet either side of the rails. The new crossings will have better visibility, as well as being smoother.

The work crew is also placing a carpet-like material under the rock ballast at the crossings. The material--called "underlay felt" prevents mud from working up into the stone foundation, keeping the base firm and

The railroad began this particular project about four miles east of the old depot building, and will finish about six miles west of Claude. The

track on either end was reworked last year. "We hope the crossings will be at least 100% better than before," said


The process is quite expensive. The first step was the replacement of

all rotten or questionable ties. The the mud and ballast was dragged from under the ties. The undercutter machine screened the material it removed. Large crushed rock was returned for re-use. Smaller rocks, mud and gravel were belted to one side. That mixture was used to build up unpaved crossings. It is a good roadbed material. The the large rock was tucked under the ties, more crushed rock was added, tamped under the ties and finally the track was leveled. The undercutter alone costs \$700 to

The expense of the refurbishing the track is borne by the Burlington Northern Railroad, which is also the largest taxpayer in Donley County. (By contrast, Highway 287 was built and maintained by tax money, a big indirect subsidy for truckers.)

The railroad was completed through Clarendon from Ft. Worth to Denver in the last few decades of the 19th Century. The Texas portion was the Fort Worth and Denver City Railroad, but beyond the state line it was the Colorado and Southern. Later the railroad was taken over by the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy. That company eventually merged into the big Burlington Northern.

Today the railroad runs about 25 trains per day through Clarendon.

Mike's rmacy Antihistamines Aid Ulcer Patients When we mention antihistamines, people may think of the ingredients in many nonprescription cold medicines. Antihistamines are included for their "drying" effect. A special class of prescription-only antihistamines has proven to be useful in the treatment of peptic ulcers. These special antihistamines, referred to as "H-2 receptor antagonists," are used alone or in connection with other ulcer medicines such as medicines which neutralize acid (the antacids). Peptic ulcers are open sores or lesions that form in the lining or wall of the stomach or small intestines. "Peptic" means that the ulcer is associated with pepsin, a digestive enzyme which works along with hydrochloric acid to help digest many of the foods we eat. Cimetidine and rantidine were the first H-2 antagonists available to treat peptic ulcers. Both of these antihistamines have chemical structures that are similar to histamine. 





Wind strip-cropping consists of alternating rows of a tall growing crop like sorghum, wheat, or perennial grasses with s shorter crop that is susceptible to wind erosion damage, such as young cotton. use them as a barrier to reduce

wind velocity and thus soil erosion," says Donley County District Conservationist Jim Donaho of the USDA-Soil Conservation Service.

Donaho notes, "Blowing sand can damage cotton considerably. By using wind strip-cropping, we're trying to hold soil movement down to a minimum which will save soil moisture, topsoil and seedlings. If planned and applied according to SCS guidelines, the system will also satisfy the new government regulations concerning highly erodible land and USDA farm program benefits."

Farmers also need to keep tuned to weather forecasts prior to planting. A sudden change in weather conditions following planting can be detrimental to the crop, particularly a cool, wet spell that can lower soil temperatures drasti-

Just when is it safe to plant what crop?

Average minimum temperatures (at the four-inch depth) for planting are as follows: corn, 50 degrees; sorghum, 55 degrees;

cotton, 65 degrees; and soybeans, 70 degrees. "Minimum" rather than "average" temperatures should be used for rice and peanuts, with rice being 60 degrees and peanuts, 70 degrees.





Skin Cancer Cont'd from p.1 and sometimes bleed. If detected and treated early, there is a 95% cure rate of basal cell carcinoma.

"The effects of the sun take 10 to 20 years to appear. That's why it's so difficult to convince people to protect themselves today. One bad childhood sunburn definitely increases the risk of skin cancer, and melanoma particularly. There are many skin changes we attribute to aging--leathery texture, spots. About 70% of these changes are actually due to skin damage," explains Caldwell.

The dermatologist says most skin cancers result from the cumulative effects of outdoor occupations and

recreational sun exposure. There are also commercial and environmental elements involved in the skin cancer problem. For every percentage drop in the ozone layer, there is a corresponding increase in the amount of ultraviolet rays which penetrate the atmosphere. Pollutants that destroy the ozone

layer are still being manutactured and will continue increase the ultraviolet radiation level in Donley

Area residents who notice changes in their skin should consult their physician or attend a cancer screening as quickly as possible. As with other forms of cancer, early detection means a better chance for recovery.

WHY DOES GOD LIKE STEAK DONE? or WHY A BURNT **OFFERING?**

few days ago, the co-author A of this column asked me why God required a burnt offering of the Children of Israel. I was tempted to answer too flippantly and too simplistically, "God told them to do it, and ours is not to question why." But the question was a serious one, and God never told us that we were forbidden to ask questions. So after a bit of thought, and after tossing several ideas around, we came up with these answers.

First, there are several passages in scripture that mention incense, and suggest that the prayers of His people rise heavenward like the smoke of the incense. Psalm 141:2 and Revelation 8:4 are two examples. Possibly the smoke from the offering would also be symbolic

of those prayers. Secondly, the sacrifice was to be burnt so that the offering could not be used for any other purpose. Again, using incense as a parallel, the Word specifically forbade the use of that preparation for any other purpose (Exodus 30:32-33). The incense, the oil, the sacrifice were God's, and God's alone.

In the third place, the burning flesh of the sacrifice would hardly have been the most pleasant of smells. The aroma of the sacrifice, plus the fact that the smoke from the altar rose continually (Exodus 29:38,42), should have reminded the worshiper that the expiation of sin was serious business. ". .Without the shedding of blood is no remission" (Hebrews 9:22). "The wages of sin is death. . ." (Romans 6:23). In a word, sin

And that suggests a fourth reason--a very practical, down-toearth reason--for the burnt offering: had the animal's body not been burned, a health hazard would have quickly developed.

Finally, the entire sacrificial system pointed to the perfect sacrifice of Jesus Christ. We use the expression "up in smoke" to indicate that something is completely gone. The smoke was an Old Testament picture of how completely our sins are taken away by God's grace. "As far as the east is from the west, so far hath He removed our transgressions from us" (Psalm 103:12).
