According to City Water Superintendent Orville Housden, water consumption in Clarendon has been nearing the one and one-half million mark each day which is a record for recent years. He reported that over a million gallons had been consumed every day since the first

of July. Mayor C. J. Lohoefer stated that the water tank at the depot has been a life-saver and that water would have possibly been rationed if it had not been for this additional storage. We had planned to start moving operations on this storage tank to help alleviated the water pressure problem, but if we disconnected this tank right now it would definitely mean rationing of water. We will hold off until the situation is improved, he concluded.

Housden stated that at times throughout the day and night that all seven city wells were in operation. We have at least four wells going all the time to supplement the water storage which is built up in the tanks during the night hours, he ad-


