Over 21 Million Gallons Of Water Consumed Here June 20 To July 20

Mayor C. J. Lohoefer released figures Wednesday morning revealing that over 21 million gallons of water had been metered through 914 meters in Clarendon from the June 20th reading to the July 20th reading. This was also one of the longest prolonged hot weather periods in recent years. The above figure does not include water used on the city park, streets or at the City pump outlet which would raise this figure considerably.

Behrens Attends Sheriffs' Conference

Dallas Firm Completes Study Of Water Dept.

The R. A. Underwood Co. of Dallas completed their survey of the financial structure of the City Water Department here Monday and Mayor C. J. Lohoefer stated that he was due to receive a complete report from the firm within a few days. This study in the various membership towns in the Greenbelt Authority is being made prior to calling the Dam project election later this month.

Mayor Lohoefer pointed out that the dam is to be financed with revenue bonds which will be paid for by water contracts only and no city tax fund will be touched whatsoever. The above mentioned survey has been made and a report will show pretty close what the price of water from the lake will be in Clarendon.

The survey made here by the Underwood Co. was free of charge to the City as this firm has been hired as the fiscal agent for the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority.

Services Held Sunday For Pioneer Educator

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at the First Baptist Church for Miss Sarah Elizabeth Stevens, 85, pioneer Clarendon educator, with Rev. W. R. Lawrence officiating. Interment was in Citizens Cemetery with the Murphy Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Miss Stevens died in Hillsboro, Texas, last Friday. She had been visiting a sister in Dallas the past few weeks. She was born July 7, 1878 in Leon County, Texas, the daughter of Martia Ann Manning and William M. Stevens. The family moved to Clarendon in 1889.

Miss Stevens became a teacher in the Clarendon schools in 1899 and retired after 50 years of service. A few years prior to her retirement, the elementary school building which was abandoned when the new school buildings were completed, was named Elizabeth Stevens Ward. During her tenure as a teacher she taught three generations in the same family in many instances. Those she taught among the third generation, she called her grandchildren.

Miss Stevens was a strong promoter of Clarendon at all times and took great pride in pointing out the many, many successful people who had been educated in Clarendon's schools. She assisted numerous students in securing higher education and remained anonymous in many instances.

She was one of the first members of the Clarendon First Baptist Church, a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution. Life member of the Texas State Teachers Association and Life member of the National Parent-Teachers Association.

Survivors include one sister, Mrs. T. E. Wright of Dallas; two brothers, A. G. Stevens of Dalhart and O. K. Stevens of Roswell, N.M.; also five nieces and three nephews.

Pallbearers were Bill Lowe, Frank White, Jr., Tommie Saye, John Payne, P. C. Messer and Ernest Kent.

FORMER RESIDENT DIES IN DALLAS

Thomas Ernest Wright, a former resident of Clarendon and Memphis, passed away in the Gaston Hospital in Dallas July 29, 1963. Born in Comanche, Texas, October 23, 1880, he came to Clarendon with his parents in 1901. On January 18, 1905, he was married to Etta Leila Stevens. They moved to Memphis in 1909 and lived there most of the time until 1925 when they moved to Fort Worth. They went to Dallas about 16 years ago to be with their only daughter, Elizabeth, who is a teacher in the Dallas schools. He was a registered pharmacist for more than 50 years.

Funeral services were conducted by A. C. Garrett Masonic Lodge at 3:00 o'clock, July 31. Burial was in Restland Memorial Park.

Mrs. Wright is a sister of Miss Elizabeth Stevens who was buried here Sunday.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1963. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read, respectively, as follows: "Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces and provided further, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered if required by law to do so. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. This Amendment shall take effect on December 1, 1963. Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1963, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters." "AGAINST the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters." Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1963. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to authorize the Legislature to increase the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Three Hundred Fifty Million Dollars (\$350,000,000.00); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an act and the issuance of a proclamation therefor. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows: "Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified here. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in the finances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. Compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature and such shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature. "The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present. "The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Three Hundred Fifty Million Dollars (\$350,000,000.00) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund for the purpose of the Veterans' Land Fund. Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000.00) of which have heretofore been issued and retained by the Veterans' Land Board shall be sold for not less than the par value thereof; interest shall be issued in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, at such places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly used and ordinarily understood in the municipal bond market, of all installments of any bonds may not exceed four and one-half percent (4½%). Bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or pur-

principal and the interest thereon, together with the expenses herein provided for, shall be paid out of the Veterans' Land Fund. Said bonds or obligations shall be issued and sold by said Board, and shall be subject to the same terms and conditions as provided by law for the issue and sale of bonds or obligations of the State of Texas. In order to provide for the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate sufficient amount to pay the same. "In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent Pensions System, and the Permanent School Funds. **Executive Orders**  
What are Executive Orders? Sometimes referred to as "Presidential Directives," these orders initiate actions by government departments and agencies. Virtually every American is affected by them. I've often been asked about them by folks in the Panhandle. Here's a report:

George Washington issued the first Executive Order on June 8, 1789, when he asked reads of Executive Departments to submit "a clear account" of affairs connected with their departments. From Constitutional powers is implied the authority exercised by Presidents through history to issue Executive Orders. Under the Constitution, the President is vested with the executive power; the power to preserve, protect and defend the Constitution and the power to see that the laws are faithfully executed. Presidents have based the authority for Executive Orders on all these grounds, most often the latter.

There has been a tendency in this century for Presidents to guide Executive Branch policies by using Executive Orders. Most have been routine in nature. One order, for example, provided for the appointment of a "charwoman" in a local post office. Here are the total numbers of Executive Orders issued by Presidents in this century: Theodore Roosevelt, 1,001; William Howard Taft, 699; Woodrow Wilson, 1,770; Warren G. Harding, 484; Calvin Coolidge, 1,248; Herbert Hoover, 1,004; Franklin D. Roosevelt, 3,722; Harry S. Truman, 903; Dwight D. Eisenhower, 481; John F. Kennedy (through July 4, 1963), 212.

Executive Orders are supposed to be based on authority granted directly to the President by the Constitution or by specific Acts of Congress. In many instances, Presidents have issued Executive Orders to lay down administrative procedures to be followed by departments in implementing laws passed by Congress, a practice that has evolved as Congress has legislated in broad, non-specific terms. As many of you know, I have been critical of Congress for frequently legislating so broadly that too many details have been left to Executive decision and direction.

Occasionally, Presidents have had their hand called by the Courts when a challenge has been raised over the provisions of an Executive Order. The order of President Truman of April 8, 1952, seizing the steel industry, was held by the Supreme Court to be without Constitutional or Congressional authority and therefore could not stand. In this case, Youngstown Steel Co., threatened with seizure, brought the case before the Court — and the Court held that the power President Truman sought to exercise was a law-making power which the Constitution vests in the Congress alone.

When business groups such as the steel industry are threatened by the effects of an Executive Order, they move quickly into the Courts to test its validity. On some occasions, as in the Youngstown Steel case, the plaintiff has been successful.

Greatest concern centers around the type of Executive Order directing administrative action or procedure by a governmental agency. This is, in effect, a construction by the President of Congressional intent. The administrative agency has

no choice but to follow the Presidential edict. Action taken by administrators acting under these orders can drastically affect the affairs of small business operators. Unlike major industry groups which are quick to challenge the provisions of Executive Orders they oppose, the "little man" is often loathe to contest the effects by taking the matter to court. The little man's own economic situation may prevent him from seeking redress in an expensive court action.

Custom now is for a President to set forth in the Executive Order the authority, Constitutional or Congressional, upon which his order is based. Thus, in Executive Order No. 11115, a good example of a more or less routine order, President Kennedy cited Section 10 of the Railway Labor Act as authority for him to create an emergency board to investigate a railway dispute. This order of July 4 is the latest in the historic chain.

From time to time there has been criticism of Executive Orders, even as constituting illegal government by edict. I've questioned the wisdom and validity of many Executive Orders issued over the years by Presidents of both political parties. In my opinion, it is time that this question be dealt with directly either by the Courts or by Congress. There should be a delineation in clear-cut terms of where the President's powers with relation to an Executive Order begin and where they end.

FARM NEWS

from County ASCS Committee

Cotton Measurements

The work of checking the acreage of cotton, feed grain, diverted acres and all soil bank base crops is almost complete in the field. We want to thank everyone for the fine cooperation the reporters have received. With so much to measure on each farm this year, the work has been difficult and has taken a lot of the farmers time and we do appreciate how considerate everyone has been.

Farmers who receive notice of excess cotton or feed grain acreage must destroy such excess, report it to the ASCS Office and pay the recheck fee within 15 days from the date of notice in order to be in compliance. The rate of charge for checking adjusted acres is \$4.00 per farm plus \$2.00 for each plot over one. The destroyed areas must be regular in shape with not more than four sides. One side or one end of the disposition area shall be parallel with the rows or field boundary. These restrictions may be disregarded when the crop in an entire field or subdivision is destroyed, or when the disposition area is made between adjacent terraces or between the field boundary and a terrace.

Special Note To Farms With CR Contract In Effect For 1964

Farmers who have land in Soil Bank agreed when they signed the contract to comply with all allotments for the farm. Farmers who have a CR contract in effect for '64 and exceed the '64 wheat allotment will be in violation of their contract.

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Thirty members of the Texas Great Plains Conservation Program Committee, representing most of the agencies, groups and associations working in the field of soil and water conservation, met in the Pecos area June 26 and 27, reported H. N. Smith, State Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service.

The occasion was the annual field meeting of the committee when results and experiences of the past year are discussed and recommendations for improvement of the program are made.

George Skeete, rancher near Water Valley and a director of the Association of Texas Soil Conservation Districts explained that the principle of the GPCP, where cost-share assistance is provided in accordance with a complete conservation plan developed for the entire operating unit and scheduled for application on a systematic basis, has proved to be the best demonstration and educational tool for soil and water conservation to date.

Jack Stone, supervisor of the Toyah-Limpia Soil Conservation District, talked to the group and showed pictures of the work done on his ranch with GPCP assistance.

E. L. Thaxton, head of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station located at Pecos, explained the research work being carried on there and conducted a tour of the station for the committee.

James Abbott of the Soil Conservation Service reported on progress and accomplishments of the GPCP. He said that approximately 900 contracts had been signed since July 1, 1962, obligating just under three million dollars on over a million acres of farm and ranch land.

Following the business session, the committee toured farms and ranches where many outstanding examples of conservation were observed on each farm and ranch.

Thomas, Dean of Agriculture, Texas Tech College; Harvey Davis, Executive Director, State Soil Conservation Board; Ben A. Jordan, Jr., State Director, Federal Crop Insurance Corporation; J. D. Prewitt, Associate Director, Texas Agricultural Extension Service; N. B. McGuire, State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service; John D. Wells, President, Association of Texas Soil Conservation Districts; A. L. Bading, Executive Director, Association of Texas Soil Conservation Districts; Dr. J. R. Johnston, Agricultural Research Service; and D. C. Stevens, W. P. Blaney and Brad Emery of the U.S. Forest Service.
