The Jaycees and Chamber of Commerce Christmas decorations were put into place this past week. The Jaycees and Jayceettes made cedar rope for the highway intersection.

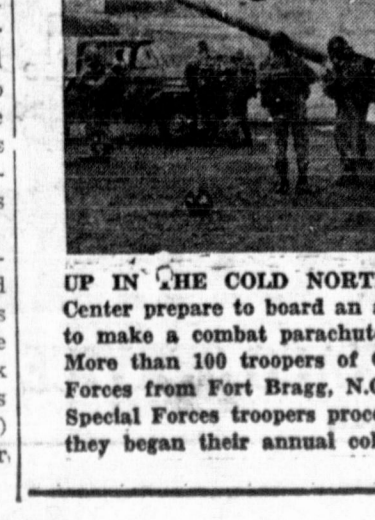
Huffman Services Held In Hedley Monday

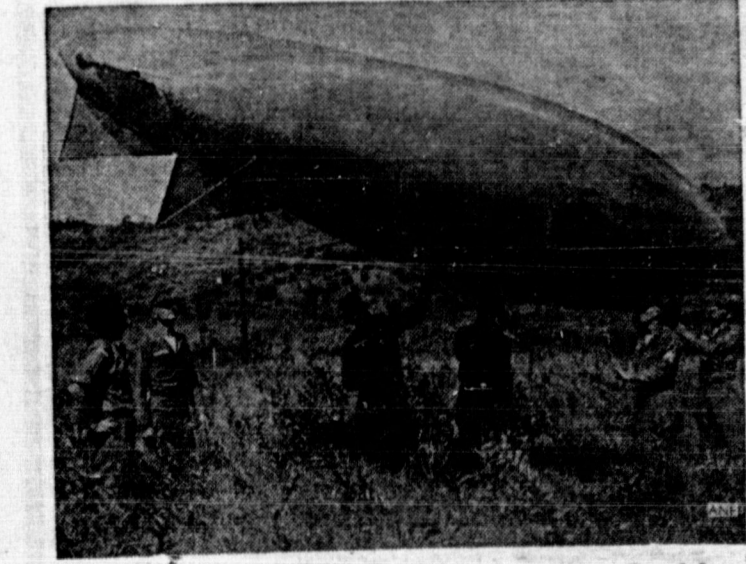

Floyd E. Dominy, Federal Reclamation Commission, called for grass roots leadership to push the Texas Basins Project. Proposed is \$3,000,000,000 in expenditures for 83 dams and an elaborate conduit system to include a 419-mile canal along the coast. "Industry is not attracted by water plans," stated Dominy, "Industry wants water supplies. Lacking them here, it will go where water is available."

EXPENDITURES APPROVED — Legislative Budget Board approved plans for a \$1,000,000 conference center at The University of Texas. Governor Connally had vetoed the appropriations item because they placed "bricks over brains."

Board also authorized expenditures of \$253,000 by the Parks and Wildlife Commission. Of this, \$49,500 will go for conversion of Port Lavaca causeway into a fishing pier.

House Speaker Byron Tunnell, a member of the board, criticized Sul Ross College President Bryant Wildenthal for buying a \$65,000 electronic computer after the legislature turned down the purchase. Tunnell asked the comptroller not to pay the bill and said he thought a legislative investigation is in order.

SEEKS IMPORT CURB — A law to back up the State Highway Commission Order (voided by the courts) to curb use of steel imports on state projects has been proposed by a legislative committee.

Supreme Court has held that the 1960 "Buy America" order infringes on state law requiring competitive bidding.

OGALLALA HEARINGS — Major oil and gas industry spokesman told the Texas Water Pollution Control Board they are going all out to protect fresh water supplies of the Ogallala formation. The formation covers 48 West Texas and Panhandle counties and extends 31,500 square miles.

James L. Sewell, president of Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association said: "It is our desire to form an alliance with groups in the industry or outside... who wish to protect the waters of this state." He predicted a flexible program can solve the problems without jeopardizing extensive oil and gas operations.

Last September the board's geologist recommended elimination of unlined surface pits used for disposal of oil field brines in the Ogallala area. Seepage of brine was contaminating underground water.

CAR-TAX SOLUTION SUGGESTED — Although county tax collectors have authority to levy and collect ad valorem taxes on automobiles, a study by the Texas Commission on State and Local Tax Policy reveals that only about a fourth of the state's taxing units make any effort to collect them.

Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas County — one that does collect — suggests that county tax collectors have their pay cut when they fail to collect all the taxes which they levy. As a member of the tax-study group, Parkhouse will have an opportunity to present his suggestion to the Legislature in 1965.

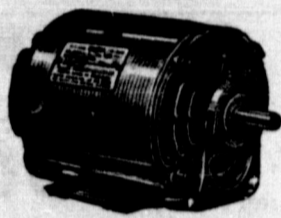

Polls will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Every effort has been made to inform farmers fully about the allotment-quota program, so that the outcome of the referendum may represent the considered opinion of all the voters. Farmers eligible to cast ballots are all those who engaged in the production of the upland cotton crop in 1963. Approval by at least two-thirds of the growers voting is necessary if the quotas are to go into effect for the 1964 crop.

If the vote is favorable, quotas will be in effect for the crop — with penalties on any "excess" cotton produced on a farm, and price support to growers who comply with their farm allotments will be available at a level of from 65 to 90 percent of parity. If the vote is not favorable, there will be no quotas or penalties applicable to the 1964 upland cotton crop, and price support to cooperators will be at 50 percent of parity, as directed by law.

Growers who have any questions about their eligibility to vote or about any particular part of the cotton program are urged to get in touch with the ASCS County Committee.

Right Of Way Bond Election To Be Held Here December 21

A county-wide bond election to determine whether or not the people of Donley County desire to authorize their governing body to issue bonds to purchase the county's 50 percent of the right of way necessary to construct a four lane highway from the Donley County Line near Memphis to Clarendon is scheduled for December 21, 1963. The election was called recently after the required number of qualified voters signed and presented a petition to the county judge and commissioners court asking that such election be called.

Here are some answers to questions asked in connection with the bond election:

The people will be voting on whether or not to authorize the issuance of a maximum of \$100,000 in bonds to pay for the right of ways, and if passed, a tax of fourteen cents (14c) per hundred dollar valuation for a period of twenty years will be necessary to pay the bonds. This means fourteen cents per one hundred dollar valuation, one dollar and forty cents for one thousand dollar valuation, and fourteen dollars for ten thousand dollar valuation. No raise in valuation will be necessary but the fourteen cents tax per hundred dollar valuation will be necessary and will be for a period of twenty years.

The state requires the county to furnish one-half of the cost of the right of way, and the result of the vote in the bond election will determine whether or not Donley County is able to go ahead with the four lane construction through the remainder of the county.

March of Dimes Aid Frees Joan To Devote Self to Helping Others

For 13 years, Joan Keeler has been jousting with a formidable antagonist.

Sometimes this attractive young woman, who lives and follows her profession of occupational therapy in Summit, N. J., makes some headway and seems to be winning. Then in a counteroffensive, her old foe will deliver a succession of cruel blows.

The old foe, the formidable antagonist, is rheumatoid arthritis. Arthritis tortures, cripples and deforms more people in the United States than any other disorder.

Emphasizing that she neither wants nor needs anyone's sympathy, Joan agreed to tell something about her encounters with this excruciating disease since her teens. She spoke during one of her monthly visits to the March of Dimes-financed Arthritis Center at Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center, New York City.

At the age of 17, Joan could look forward to what should be a reasonably happy life. She was attractive, athletic and a good student.

Then without warning, Joan says, "the roof of my little dream house caved in."

First, there were unaccountable pains during the summer just before college, and that meant the end of athletics because pain wracked her body. Next, fever and loss of weight. Diagnosis of rheumatoid arthritis, never simple to make, was even more difficult 13 years ago. Specialists shook their heads in puzzlement over which disease had robbed this young woman of perfect health.

Despite the increasing severity of the pain, Joan was determined to start college. The first, almost insurmountable problem was getting from dormitory to classroom. The next difficulty was concentration.

How can a student apply herself closely to lectures and homework when she suffers incessant spasms of pain in her back, arms and hands, legs and even her toes?

"It became a fiasco," she says. "The plain fact was I couldn't keep up. I had to drop out." Then, during the following summer, Joan's old foe seemed to relent. She improved and returned to school.

But the rheumatoid arthritis returned to the attack—more

savagely than it had before.

The second homecoming from college was no less discouraging than the first. But it did result in her applying to the Arthritis Clinic of Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center, which had been studying the problem of rheumatoid arthritis since 1928, and to which The National Foundation-March of Dimes has contributed \$105,106 since 1959.

After exhaustive tests, the upshot was a definite diagnosis of rheumatoid arthritis. Now, at last, the enemy was identified.

The first urgent objective was to reduce Joan's pain so that she could be moved, and move herself, without unendurable suffering. This was accomplished in part through administration of cortisone (which she continues to take but in reduced dosage). A second goal was, by means of surgery, to "unclench" her hands so that she could regain the use of her fingers. A third aim was to minimize the weight-bearing pressure on her feet by designing special moccasins.

The fourth aim was to begin physical therapy as soon as cortisone had reduced the inflammation of joints and connective tissues to a point where

rehabilitative exercise was possible.

"The simple truth is that the March of Dimes put me on my feet," she explains. This feeling of thankfulness set her to thinking of doing something within her capabilities which would also be helpful to others.

She had had intimate experience, during her own ordeal, with many kinds of therapy. Armed with this familiarity, she began to study occupational therapy which is the teaching of arts and trades as a means of rehabilitation of patients handicapped physically or mentally.

"I was lucky to get a position as an occupational therapist at Fair Oaks Hospital in my home town," Joan relates. "I soon learned that I understood the attitudes of these patients toward life—their fears and hostilities—and that they understood my attitude, because all of us had experienced what it is to be handicapped. And I am better adjusted and happier than I was because I am helping others."

Perhaps the old foe, the formidable antagonist, has not been altogether vanquished. But by helping others, Joan Keeler has found that at least she now keeps her enemy on the defensive, most of the time.

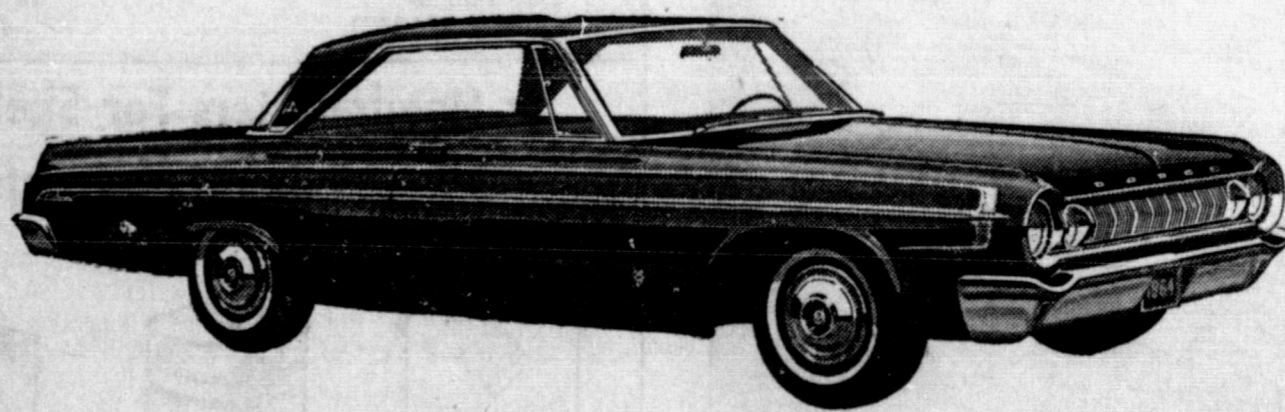

WHEREAS, there has been presented for the consideration of the Court a Petition signed by C. L. Johnson and 77 other persons praying that an election be held in Donley County, Texas, on the proposition of the issuance of \$100,000 of Road Bonds of said County, and the levy of a tax in payment thereof; and

WHEREAS, the Court has found that said Petition is signed by more than fifty (50) of the resident, qualified property tax-paying electors of Donley County owning taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation; and

WHEREAS, the amount of bonds to be issued will not ex-

ceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said Donley County;
IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED, ADJUDGED AND DECREED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF DONLEY COUNTY, TEXAS:

1. That an election be held in said County on the 21st day of December, 1963, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, to determine:

"Whether or not the bonds of Donley County, Texas, shall be issued under Article III, Section 52 of the Constitution in the amount of \$100,000, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Four (4%) per cent per annum, and maturing at such time as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, in not to exceed Twenty (20) years from the date thereof, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized graveled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof

throughout Donley County, Texas; and whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied annually on all taxable property in said County sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the bonds at their maturity."

2. That said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 3, Title 22, Revised Statutes of 1925, as amended by Chapter 16, Acts of the First Called Session of the 39th Legislature.

3. All persons who are legally qualified electors of this State and of this County, and who are resident, qualified property tax-paying electors of this County, owning taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election, and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence.

4. The ballots of said election shall be given by publication of a copy of this order in "The Donley County Leader", a newspaper published in said County, for three (3) successive weeks before the date fixed for holding said election. In addition thereto, there shall be posted four copies of this order at four public places in the county, one of which shall be at the Courthouse door for three (3) weeks prior to said election.

6. The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the General Laws of the State of Texas, regulating general elections, when not in conflict with the provisions of the Statutes hereinabove cited.

7. Notice of said election shall be given by publication of a copy of this order in "The Donley County Leader", a newspaper published in said County, for three (3) successive weeks before the date fixed for holding said election. In addition thereto, there shall be posted four copies of this order at four public places in the county, one of which shall be at the Courthouse door for three (3) weeks prior to said election.

8. The County Clerk is hereby

directed to have published and to post the same as hereinabove directed, and further orders are reserved until the returns of said election are made by the duly authorized election officers and received by the Court. (43-3c)

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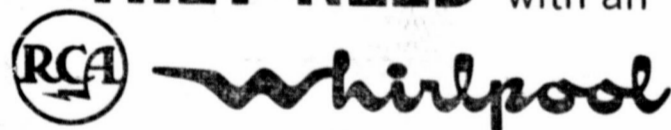
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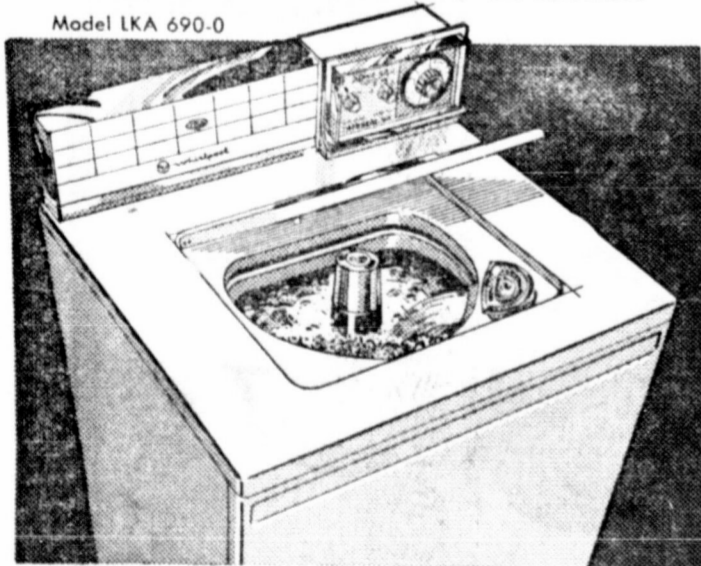
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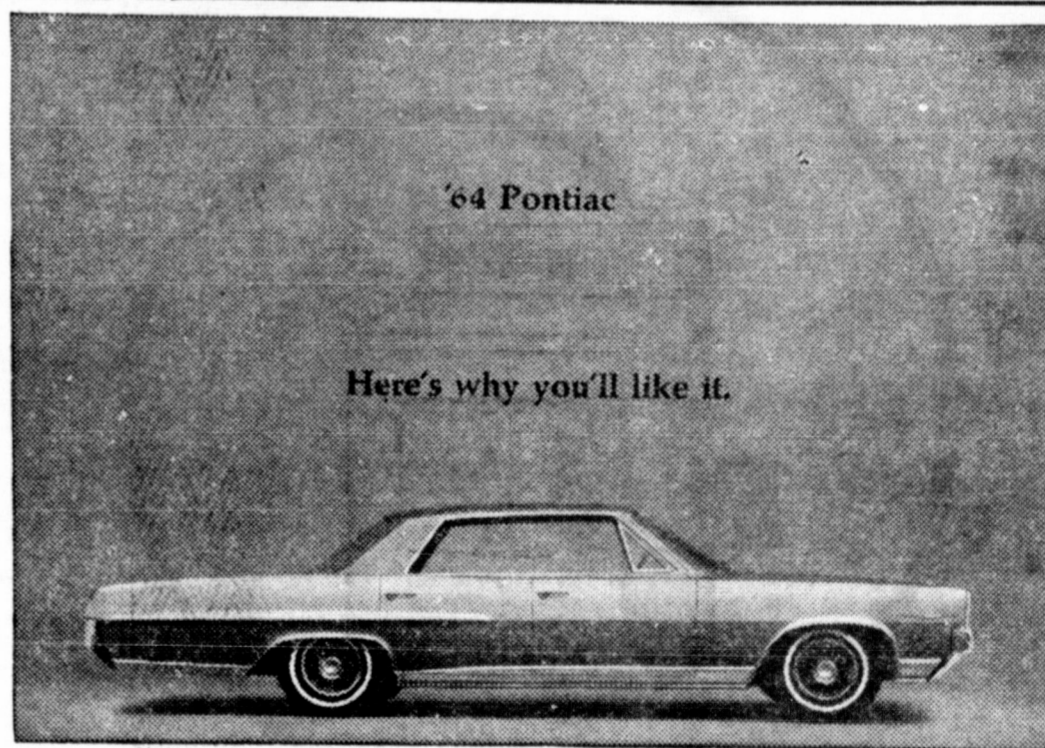


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
