On one of the mounds of trash is a child's old metal tov waagon less its wheels. It looks forlorn. I wonder if
maybe it was a Christmas wish that Santa answered and where its former child owner is today. Sticking out of the red Hedley

cars owner to have the freedom from mules and wagons to drive from the farm to town to sell eggs, butter and produce anytime he
