PROCESS FOR REMOVING STRONTIUM EVALUATED

COLLEGE STATION - A new process for removing strontium 90 from milk is soon to be tested in-law, Wallace Walling, suffered on a commercial scale, says A. M. Meekma, dairy specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The specialist points out that the present and foreseeable consumption of radiostrontium in milk and other foods is well below the level considered by the Federal Radiation Council to be acceptable for a lifetime. However, there is a need for a standby decontamination process that would also maintain the nutritive value, wholesomeness, flavor and sanitary quality of our milk supply in the event of an emergency, he explains.

The process, now in pilot-plant operation, will be evaluated by the Missouri Producer Creamery Company under contract to the USDA and the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. The Company will determine the commercial feasibility of the radiostrontium removal process and work out details for its operation on an industrial-scale basis, says Meekma.

Work was begun on the process three years ago at the Agricultural Research Center, Beltsville, Maryland, according to the specialist. He adds that these pilot operations have demonstrated that more than 90 per cent of the radioactive strontium can be removed from the milk by the

The purpose of the commercial evaluation is to scale up the operation from a rate of 850 pounds of milk per hour to approximately 12,500 pounds per hour, and to determine if the process can be used in the average dairy plant, stated Meekma.

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
