Dedication Of Boydston Marker

The 100th Anniversary Dedication Services will be held April 16, 1989 by unveiling the Historical Marker recently placed on Highway 70 near Jericho. The marker is in honor of Mr. & Mrs. Boydston who in the year of 1889 settled on their homestead northwest of Clarendon. In 1890 they were saddened by the loss of an infant son. With the help of three sympathetic cowboys, Mr. Boydston buried the infant in the southwest corner of his farm. Later he deeded two acres of land to Donley County for cemetery purposes. It became a community burial ground. There are approximately 20 graves.

Deadlines Emphasized

The editor of The Clarendon Press reminds area residents that the deadline for submitting copy to the newspaper is 5 p.m. Monday.

"Deadlines are an unpleasant fact of life," said Bob Williams, "but they are necessary. There has to be some time to get the paper ready to be printed."

Material that is submitted late may still be accepted when possible, but there will be a \$10 surcharge, even on news items that would normally be free.

"Tardy submissions cause extra labor costs, they disrupt the production process and cost the paper money. We are simply trying to recover costs," said the publisher.

It is also in the advertiser's interest to get his material in early. The longer the staff has to work on material, the better job they are able to do.

Social Security Administration

The Social Security Administration is revising the visit schedule to Clarendon beginning April 1, announced Jim Talbot, district manager of the Amarillo Social Security office.

Talbot said that recent developments paved the way for the department to have a representative visit Clarendon once a month rather than the current twice-a-month schedule. "We are witnessing a steady decline in the number of people coming in to see our representative," he said. "Reduction in the number of visitors, along with the introduction of the new toll-free phone number no longer requires us to make two trips a month to Clarendon," he added.

A representative will continue to visit Clarendon in the Donley County Courthouse on the first Monday of each month from 1:00 to 2:00 p.m.

Talbot emphasized that residents do not need to wait to see the representative to conduct Social Security business. "All business, including making an appointment to file for benefits, can be handled by calling the toll-free number, 1-800-234-5772," he said.

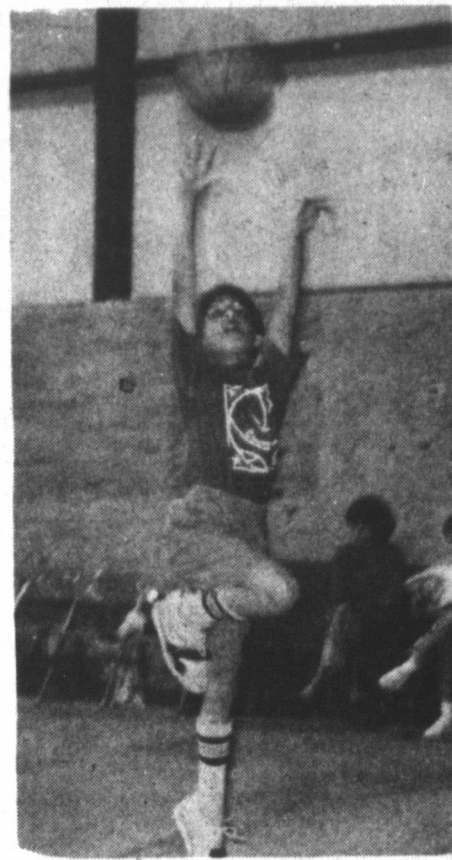

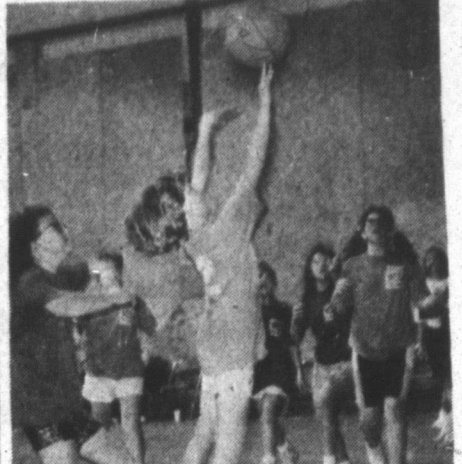

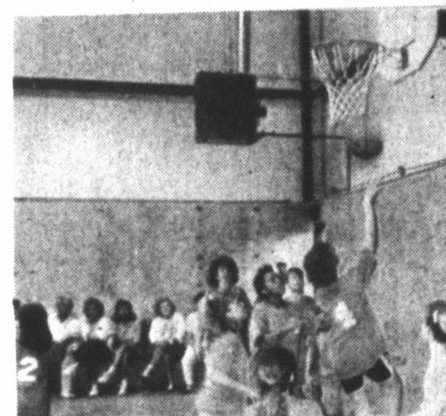
closed out a very successful 1989 season which had started back in February with 3 weeks of practice followed by a 6 week, 12 game, regular season schedule.

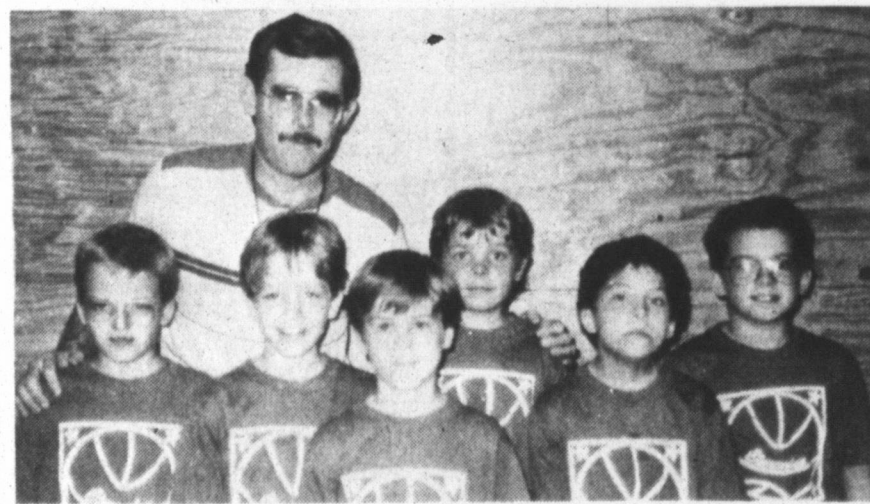

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American Cancer Society Meets

The Donley County Local Unit of The American Cancer Society met Monday, March 20, 1989, at the Hospitality Room of the First Bank and Trust of Clarendon.

President Genevieve Caldwell called the meeting to order, and the minutes were read and approved.

Mrs. Caldwell introduced Diane Drake, R.N., who heads the nursing staff for Harrington Cancer Screening Project for the Texas Panhandle.

Mrs. Drake, says that this screening project is the only one of its kind in the nation. A mobile mammogram unit visits a town on a regular basis, and follow up examinations are made as indicated. She noted the rise in breast cancer; more women are developing breast cancer and dying from it. She recommended a base line mammogram before the age of 40; after forty every one or two years; and after 50 a yearly mammogram. Through the screening projects, women can get mammograms for about \$50.

Although all the causes of breast cancer are not known, early detection plays an extremely important role in terms of recovery. Mrs. Drake also discussed the self-breast exam and its importance.

Producers Need To Check Alfalfa

I recently visited with Dr. Carl Patrick, Texas Agricultural Extension Service Entomologist in District I, and he indicated that producers need to check their alfalfa for weevil problems.

With the warm temperatures this early in the spring, the alfalfa weevil could build up numbers relatively early. This could delay the alfalfa significantly, cutting production. Producers will want to check fields closely to see if control measures are needed.

Building Winning Kids

Are you building winning kids in your town? Not just those youngsters that can win at sports and other activities, but those that can win in the game of life. If you are part of a family, does the family work together as well as play together, helping you to grow stronger as a family, thus enabling you to endure the rough times and enjoy the good.

If these are important questions to you, then you will want to take the opportunity to participate in the "Building Winning Kids" and "Strengthening Donley County Families" Seminar, which will be held this Thursday, April 6, at 7:00 p.m., in the Clarendon Community Center. The Seminar will feature Dr. Lynne Thibodeaux, Texas Agricultural Extension Service 4-H Youth Development Specialist. Dr. Thibodeaux, of College Station, will address the importance of instilling positive self-esteem in young people. She also will teach techniques designed to make educators and parents more aware

of their responsibility for developing self-esteem in youngsters.

Thibodeaux has given many similar programs throughout Texas and has been particular demand as a speaker at in-service training for teachers throughout Texas.

In past years, Thibodeaux has developed a series of teacher/leader lessons entitled Seymour Safety, an eye-care study course, which in one year reached more than 150,000 Texas students. CRP Weed Control

Well folks, it is almost that time again -- weed control on CRP land. Weed control is vital to newly seeded grass. First of all, it helps reduce the competition for the soil moisture that is needed for new grass seedlings. Second, it will knock out the shading effect the weeds have over new seedling grass, which is important because sunlight is needed to help produce food for continued growth of the newly seeded grass.

The two types of weed control are mechanical and chemical. The mechanical control, or shredding, usually only has a short-lived effect because in most cases it does not kill the weeds. If you get another rain most of the weeds will usually resprout from the same cut stem. Chemical weed control is usually cheaper and also has a longer-lived effect than shredding. Weeds are usually killed outright with chemical control. Chemicals that have a residual effect are even more effective because they will kill new weed sprouts for a certain period of time. However, time of application for chemical weed control is of utmost importance. Time of application usually will have a direct effect on how effective the chemical control can be, unless you use a hot chemical. Using a hotter chemical, how-

ever, runs the risk of damaging your grass as well increasing your liability.

Please, contact you local Soil Conservation Service office for more information about the timing and the type of chemical to use on CRP land. Different chemical controls react differently so make sure that right chemical is used.

Control Soil Insects In Vegetable Gardens

As vegetable gardeners in Donley County prepare for spring planting, their first step should be to control soil insects.

Soil insects can reduce vegetable quality and yields if left uncontrolled.

For effective control, mix insecticides into the soil at a depth of 4 - 6 inches at least two weeks before the garden plot is planted.

Among destructive soil insects are wireworms, white grubs, seed corn maggots, cabbage maggots, mole crickets, sowbugs, slugs, snails and cutworms. Some destroy plant seeds, roots, tubers and underground stem parts while others cut off young plants at or near the soil surface.

Most soil insects can be controlled with diazinon 25 percent liquid concentration or Spectracide 6000 applied as a 5 percent granule. Granules usually give the best control. If cutworms or sowbugs become a problem after the garden has been planted, broadcast 5 percent Seven bait over the soil surface.

Garden sites planted for the first time or those previously in grass or weeds are more likely to harbor damaging numbers of soil

pests. Before treating with an insecticide, inspect the garden site by taking soil samples at several locations to a depth of 5 - 6 inches. Remove one square foot section of soil from each location and record the number of soil insect pests present. As a general rule, an average of one or more soil insects per sample suggests the need for insecticide treatment.

Before applying any pesticide always read and follow label instructions.

Adjusted Weed Control Suppresses Mesquite in Range and Pasture

Ranchers with small mesquite in their pastures may want to consider getting economical double duty from weed spraying.

Spiders Effective Predators on Cotton Pest

The cotton fleahopper has replaced the boll weevil as the major pest of cotton in Texas and ranks as the third most damaging cotton insect pest in the United States. While the stature of this insect as a pest has grown, so has the interest of the agriculture industry in its search for a means of control that does not rely on widespread, intense use of insecticide.

Entomologists with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station are studying various means of biological control of insect pests; natural predation is one of the major means being explored. The cotton fleahopper faces at least four effective predators: the striped lynx spider, the black-and-white jumping spider, the celer crab spider and the imported red fire ant. (It's good to know the latter is good for something.)

In studies by TAES entomologist R.G. Breene, W.L. Sterling and M. Nyffeler, the spider predators were evaluated in a cotton field using confinement cages on cotton plants. Average percent control was 42 percent for the lynx spider, 66 percent control for the jumping spider, and 32 percent for the crab spider.

Use of confinement cages for fire ants proved infeasible, but laboratory tests using several densities of ants and fleahoppers found a control rate of .5 percent to 100 percent. Fleahoppers exposed to a colony of ants experience 100 percent mortality at three different flea densities in five 24-hour periods. The lowest percent control rate occurred in the treatment with the single and the single fleahopper.

"Although confining the foraging of a colony of ants to one or a few plants would seldom be found in nature, it served to demonstrate that five sufficient numbers of ants, predation rates can be very high," Breene says. "Ants that were isolated from the colony displayed patterns of predation that were a function of both fleahopper and ant densities. In general, the higher the density of ants and fleahoppers, the greater the predation rate."

By spraying later in the season, with a higher dose of certain herbicide mixtures, a yearly weed control program also can suppress small mesquite, says Dr. Tommy Welch, Extension range brush and weed control specialist. Over several years, the program can actually thin a stand.

For annual weed control alone, Welch normally recommends ranchers spray when weeds are two to four inches tall and actively growing, usually March to Mid April. Under those conditions, 85 to 90 percent control is achievable. Demonstrations consistently show a pound of grass produced for every pound of weeds controlled, the Extension specialist says.

Sprayed early when growing con-

ditions are good, 2,4-D amine usually will control most annual weeds at the least cost. If growth conditions are less than ideal, better results may be obtained by using one of the commercial mixtures, such as Grazon* P + D (1:4 mixture of picloram and 2,4-D) or Weedmaster** (1:3 mixture of dicamba and 2,4-D). As weeds mature, higher doses of herbicide may be necessary for control.

If a rancher sprays for weeds about every year anyway, he could alter his program to simultaneously suppress small mesquite, Welch says.

For maximum benefit from such a program, the specialist advises, delay weed spraying until May. This allows mesquite leaves to mature. Spraying usually should be completed by mid-May however, or weeds will have already damaged forage production, and the benefit from spraying will be reduced. This may be less critical if spring weather is colder than normal and growth is slow.

When sprayed in May for weed control and mesquite suppression, 2,4-D will not be as effective as the commercial mixtures, Welch says. He recommends applying two to three pints of Grazon P + D herbicide per acre or two pints of Weedmaster herbicide per acre.

On small mesquite, Welch says, "This will knock most of the leaves off for a season, and give a reasonable top kill. On top-killed mesquite, basal sprouts will come

back the next year."

The larger benefit is in repeated application. In demonstrations in east central Texas, Welch says, "After about the third year, some of the mesquite sprouts died (root killed). Not a high percentage, but the stand was thinned.

"If a rancher is in a routine weed control program where he sprays every year anyway, this is a way he can get mesquite suppression."

If a rancher isn't prepared to spray yearly, or if weed infestations don't justify spraying, small mesquite may be better controlled in other ways, Welch says.

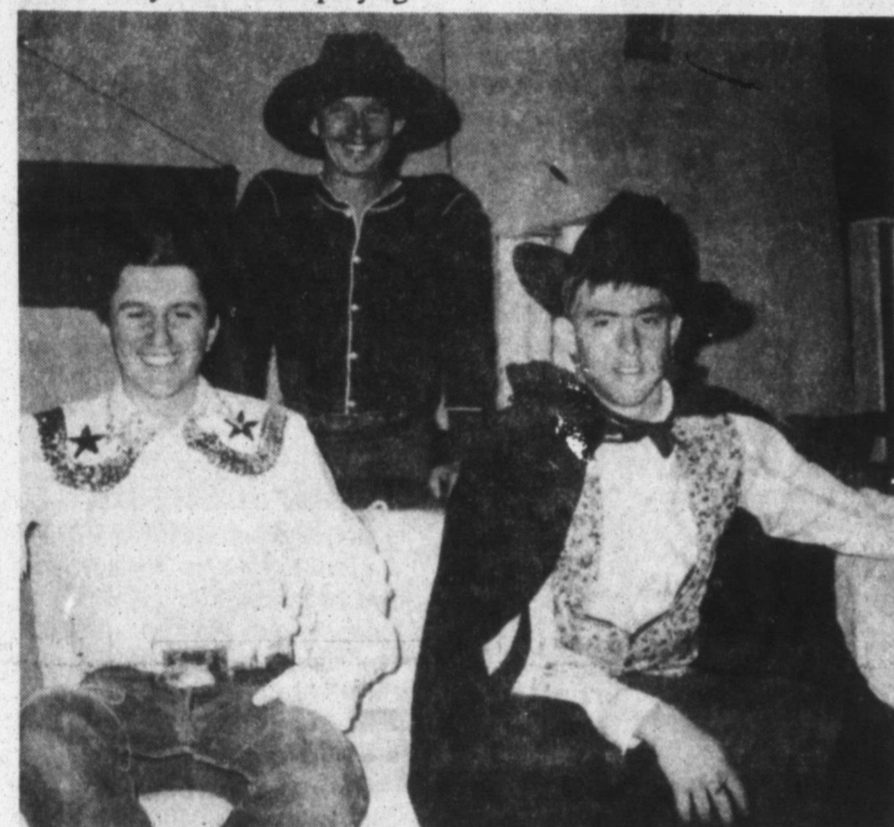

Furrow Diking Holds Rainfall, Increases Yields

Crop yields in the Texas Panhandle region are extremely dependent on available water. Many conservation practices have been used through the years in an attempt to increase crop production in this area. The only practice that has substantially increased crop production was the use of irrigation. Due to the declining water table and rising fuel costs, irrigation may not be feasible in some cases

and farmers have to rely on getting the most from natural rainfall. Furrow diking is one practice being used to achieve better management of rainfall.

Furrow dikes are small dams constructed in the furrow after a crop is planted which will hold excess rainfall and prevent runoff. Furrow diking shows the best results in years when rainfall intensity is great enough to run off or on sloping land prone to runoff. Furrow dikes hold the rain water in place on the field allowing it to soak into the soil, thereby increasing crop yields.

Farmers in the Southern High Plains have been using furrow dikes for several years. This operation is gradually spreading northward due to the decline in irrigation. It is most useful on dryland crops, but furrow dikes can also be used in conjunction with irrigation. They are being utilized under center pivot irrigation systems when pivots are on sloping land (1% or greater slopes). The dikes hold the water in place and allow it to soak into the soil without running off. This leads to better crop performance and higher yields because of more even distribution of irrigation water.

Many farmers are using furrow dikes in alternate furrows, (skip row). If rainfall occurs, it is stored in the furrows which have been diked. This also make it easier to harvest the crop because equipment can run in the non-diked rows.

For information concerning furrow diking techniques and equipment contact the Donley County Soil and Water Conservation District of the Soil Conservation Service.

Time Is Running Out..Deadline For Conservation Plans

The conservation compliance provision of the Food Security Act of 1985 provides that

anyone who farms highly erodible cropland must develop a conservation plan for the land and have it approved by the local soil conservation district by December 31, 1989, in order to remain eligible for many USDA farm program benefits.

Producers who do not have an approved plan will be giving up USDA program benefits on not only their highly erodible acres, but on all of the land they farm. Program benefits include not only price supports and commodity-related payments from ASCS, but also federal crop insurance and Farmers Home Administration loans.

If you have highly erodible cropland, you must have a conservation plan by December 31st, or you will be ineligible for farm program participation until you have a plan approved. Time is running on, so don't let it run out on your program benefits.

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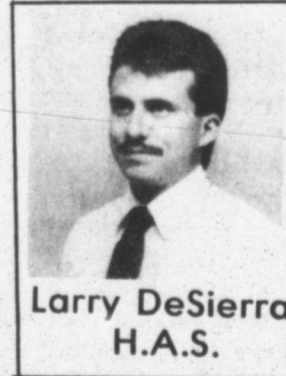
