## Clean Up, Paint Up and Fix Up

As a result of efforts by several merchants on Kearney, Clarendon's main street is a little spiffier. Several others are planning to fix up, paint up and spruce up their buildings.

Henson's is in the process of repairing the plaster on the outside of the building and repainting, although the repainting has been delayed somewhat by uncooperative weather. When they are through, the old blue exterior will be replaced with an attractive yellow-tan, and the trim will be a rich chocolate brown.

Greene Dry Goods is engaged in extensive remodeling. They have just recently completed repainting the exterior. Now the store is being

repainted inside. The ceilings, which were last painted in 1947, are now gleaming white. Walls are now a bright pale blue. The Newhouses are also sanding and refinishing the upstairs floors. The downstairs will be carpeted. Throughout the project, the owners are carefully preserving the character of the building. They feel that the antique charm of the building is a real asset. It helps draw customers from outside the county.

The Max Johnsons are refurbishing the quarters that previously housed the barbershop next to the Mulkey Theater. Watch for a grand opening there!

Wanda Deen has painted and redecorated the building that houses The Carousel. That improves the looks of the entire block.

And the city contracted to have the old hotel building gutted and stabilized. Sentiment is building in town to try to get the old building put back to useful service.

This Spring Clarendon's Explorer Troop will offer their services in replanting the barrels on the city sidewalks. They will charge \$10 per barrel plus the cost of the plants.

All of this renovation has been done through the initiative of the individuals involved. That does not preclude an organized "Clean-Up, Paint-Up, Fix-up Campaign". But whether organized or spontaneous, each project improves the city and makes the downtown area more viable. In the long run, that benefits everyone in Clarendon.

## Hedley School Receives Grant

Hedley School has applied for and received a grant through the Star Schools program to participate in the United TI-IN Star Network. This program utilizes satellite relayed programs from different regions of the country. Schools are able to receive these broadcasts through a special satellite dish receiver.

The grant will provide Hedley School all of the hardware necessary to receive the broadcasts. This equipment and the installation will be provided at no cost to the school. This equipment, service, installation, and warranty amount to about \$17,500 in value. The equipment is due for installation within the next four weeks.

The school will receive the following equipment: a fixed KU-Band satellite antennae, an audio-video cart, an electronic writing

pad, a 20 inch monitor, a VHS machine, a dot matrix printer, an equipment cabinet, cordless handset phones, and a service telephone.

Students will be able to participate in live instructional broadcasts through the use of telephones and a toll-free phone line. Staff development and board member training programs are also a part of the TI-IN Network. And, other programs are aired in which members of the community may have interests.

We think we will be able to enrich our curriculum and provide in-home training for teachers and board members through the TI-IN Network. We hope that the installation will be complete before Public Schools Week (March 6-10). If so, we will provide demonstrations at that time.

## Donley County's Economy Growing

According to the latest reports from Comptroller Bob Bullock's office, the economy of Donley County is still growing. Sales taxes in Donley County were up 5.82% over a comparable period last year. And since last year's figures include the tax increase, these figures represent real gains, not just tax revenue. Clarendon sales were up 8.05% and Howardwick was up 2.09%. By contrast, Hedley sales were down with a figure of -24.15%.

Clarendon's performance was about on par with the rest of the state. Cities ran about 8% ahead of last year, largely due to holiday sales.

In this region, there were good and bad spots. Armstrong County (Claude) dropped by -3.93%. Briscoe County (Quitaque/Silverton) was up by almost 12%. Childress grew by less than 3%. Collingsworth County (Wellington) performed poorly, with a report of -4.4%. Gray County (Pampa/McLean/Lefors) picked up about 7%. Hall County suffered a -22.88% loss, and the only town in the county that showed and increase was Estelline; Memphis lost 24.60% over the previous period. Potter County (Amarillo) picked up only 5.82%, less than Clarendon or the state average.

Statewide, areas along the Gulf and Rio Grande seemed to chalk up significant gains, as did areas near Austin. Far West Texas gained as well. Alpine put in a stunning performance with a 60.76% increase, one of the highest in the state. Van Horn scratched up a 15% increase, while Marfa sold 17.96% more than the previous year.

Some Clarendon merchants are now actively trying to draw customers in from other towns, even from Amarillo. While it would be ideal if local residents all shopped here in Clarendon, there is even more potential for economic growth if Clarendon can draw in customers from outside the normal trade area. And some retailers are

## Cotton Meeting Turnout Good

Twenty-eight producers were present for the recent cotton production meeting held at the Lelia Lake Community Building on February 13, 1989.

At the meeting, one of the big concerns of producers was the expected Boll Weevil problems in Donley and surrounding counties. Dr. Carl Patrick, Entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, addressed the problem at the meeting. Dr. Patrick indicated that weevil trap records showed a large number of weevils

going into overwinter in Donley County, but the extremely cold temperatures the first of February and the dry conditions should dramatically decrease these numbers. To what extent will be hard to tell until May when weevil populations can be measured by pheromone traps. I also visited with District III Extension Entomologist in Vernon, Emory Boring III, and he felt that the dry, cold conditions during early February will result in a high level of boll weevil mortality in overwintering habitat. The dry, cold conditions could be compared to those of December and January of 1983 and 1984, when weevil num-

bers were reduced to such low levels that virtually none were captured in traps that season.

Producers are still optimistic at best about the boll weevil situation and many feel that there are some weevils still alive and waiting until spring to emerge. Donley County cotton producers are currently looking at several options to better manage the boll weevil problem. These options include planting later with a uniform planting date, the use of a diapause program, pheromone traps for measuring weevil numbers, and other cultural practices that were discussed at the meeting.

agriculture classes emphasize leadership skills, innovative practices and the application of both to the industry of agriculture.

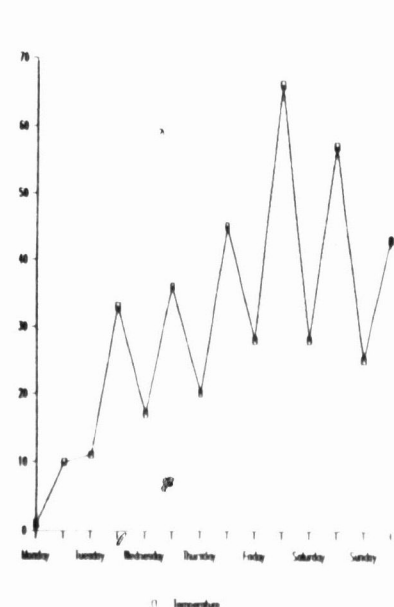

### Postal Inspectors Warn of Telephone Scams

The U.S. Postal Inspection Service today warned the public about the increasing number of "boiler room" scams that use the telephone to pitch a variety of products, usually attached to a "free gift" gimmick.

Chief Postal Inspector Charles R. Clauson says the bogus companies flood post offices with computerized mailings notifying people that they have "won a prize", usually after offering for sale everything from vitamins to office supplies.

"The operators then follow-up with high-pressure telemarketing," Clauson says, "usually asking for money or credit card number to cover shipping charges."

Clauson says the best way to defend against the scams is to "check out the company and call them back--without giving out your credit card number or any money--and if still suspicious, get in touch with a postal inspector through the nearest post office."

Just last week, a promoter and 12 telephone pitchmen were arrested in the New York City area for misrepresenting the sale of cleaning supplies. Several weeks ago four operators from Seattle Washington, and Las Vegas, Nevada were arrested for mail and wire fraud for offering prizes as part of a nationwide promotion.

And in Houston, William E. Gardner, 35, operator of International Direct Mail Marketing, Inc., is awaiting sentencing after pleading guilty to mail fraud charges. He told those who responded to his mailings to call a Houston area phone number to claim a motorboat and outboard motor he said was worth as much as \$500, as part of a marketing survey. The thousands who responded--by each paying \$120 for shipping--received an inflatable raft and motor worth \$40.

Chief Inspector Clauson says, "the telephone boiler rooms have been concentrated in certain areas of the country, but the victims come from all over."

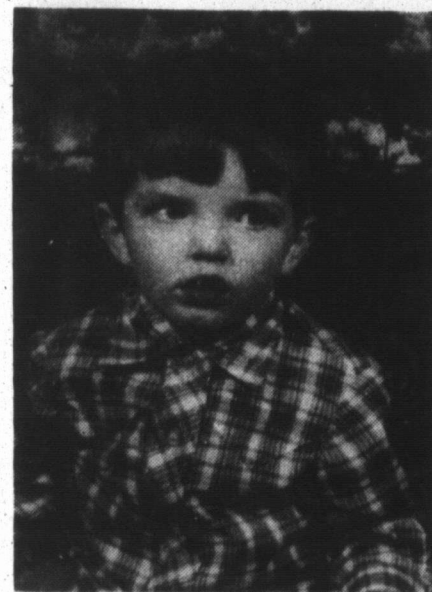

## Insurance Hoax Continues To Frustrate Veterans

**A** GI insurance dividend hoax that first appeared more than 25 years ago continues to plague veterans.

The Veterans Administration Insurance Center in Philadelphia reports it is receiving between 7,000 and 15,000 applications a week for a nonexistent dividend.

For many years the principal victims of the rumor were World War II and Korean Conflict veterans, who were told that the VA was sending a check for hundreds of dollars -- a so-called insurance dividend -- to any veteran who requested. In recent years, however, bogus brochures also have been targeting veterans of the Vietnam war.

The phony applications claim dividends have been authorized by recent Congressional legislation. In fact, there is no insurance dividend for veterans who do not keep their insurance in force and no dividend legislation has been proposed in Congress.

The hoax causes thousands of veterans and dependents wasted effort, and generates needless labor and mailing expense at the VA's 58 regional offices across the country.

The hoax applications usually are unwittingly printed in magazines, newspapers and newsletters, or distributed in handbills. When notified of the error, editors have been cooperative about publishing retractions. Attempts to trace the origin of the hoax have been unsuccessful, but it is believed that its life has been perpetuated by the innocent duplication of bogus information.

The VA's legitimate insurance dividends are paid annually to current policyholders. More than 3 million veterans share in an annual dividend distribution, but payments are automatic and no application is needed.

Veterans and dependents with questions about government life insurance policies can phone a VA insurance specialist toll-free from throughout the U.S. Insurance holders and beneficiaries can obtain immediate service on address or policy changes, dividend information and other actions by dialing 1-800-422-8079, from 7 AM to 4:30 PM CST.

Cotton Meet

Dr. Michael Hickey, Extension Soil Chemist, and Dr. James Supak, Extension Cotton Specialist, were also on the program at the meeting and I wish I could write about some of the things they talked about but there is not enough room for that, so you will just have to come by the Extension office and visit.

I did want to mention one important point that Dr. Supak mentioned about cotton seed quality. Dr. Supak indicated that seed quality was probably going to be very good this year, and producers should have seed tested for percent

germination (standard germ and cool germ) so that adjustments in planting rates can be made. Generally, 6 - 8 seed per foot of row is recommended, but with high quality seed producers may want to lean toward the 6 per foot of row.

Estrogen Hormone Replacement Therapy

Estrogen hormone is often given to women who have reached menopause (cessation of menstrual periods) or undergone surgical removal of their ovaries, the site of natural estrogen production. Although estrogen replacement therapy is often associated with reducing the incidence of "hot flashes" following menopause, estrogen may also help alleviate other potential problems such as osteoporosis (bone thinning) and bladder-genital problems including burning, itching, and infection. The replacement of estrogen may be accomplished with oral tablets, vaginal creams, intramuscular injections, or transdermal patches applied to the skin.

Endometrial hyperplasia is an abnormal increase in the number of cells in the endometrium (lining of the uterus). The increase in cells may occur with estrogen use. Some authorities believe that estrogen-induced endometrial hyperplasia can be prevented through the use of progestin, a female hormone. Progestin is often given for this purpose during the last 10 to 13 days of the estrogen dosage cycle.

Side effects of estrogen replacement therapy may include enlarged and tender breasts, water retention, weight gain, headache, nausea, and heartburn.
