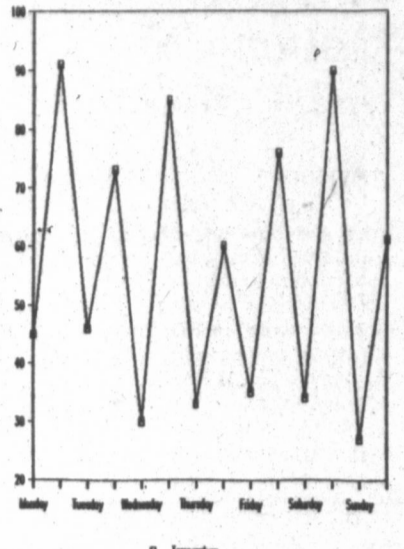

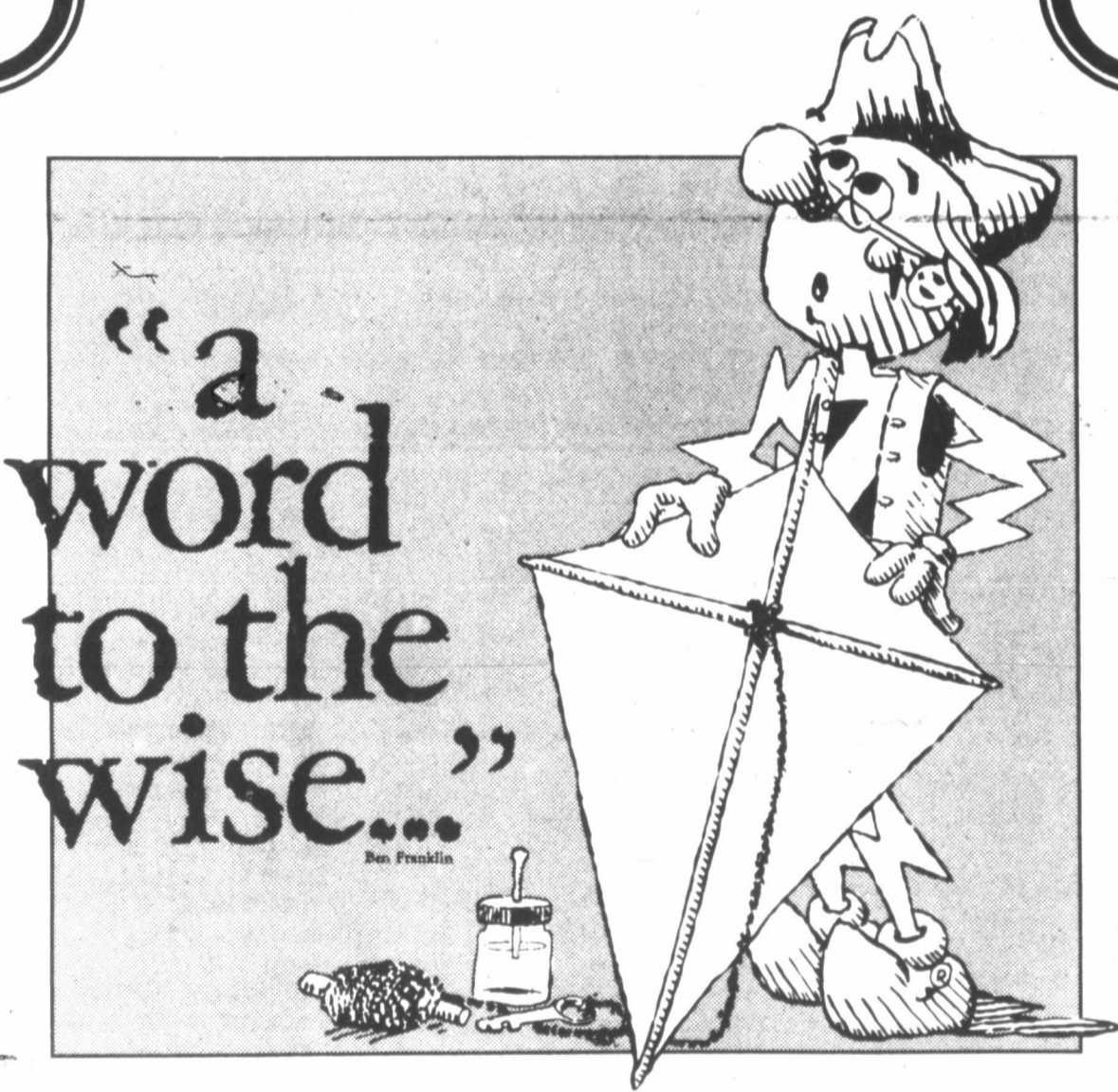

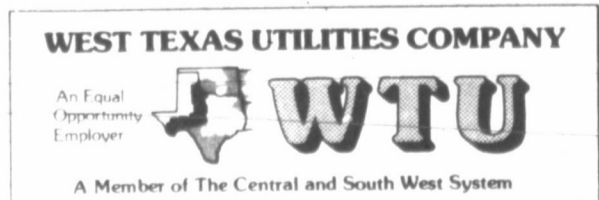

National Poison Prevention Week

March 19-25 has been designated National Poison Prevention Week. The prevention of accidental poisonings is one of our most important responsibilities as parents and concerned citizens. Since 60 to 80 percent of all poisonings occur around the home, we can all help reduce the number and severity of household poisonings. Concentrate on the kitchen, bathroom, garage, and storage areas - the four most common sites of accidental poisonings in the home.

Teach children at an early age not to eat or play with plants, drugs, or household chemicals. Keep an eye on small children, especially in the late afternoon hours when children get hungry and many poisonings occur. Store household cleaners and disinfectants out of the sight and reach of small children. If cleaners and other products are transferred from original containers, make certain the new containers are properly labeled.

Make certain all prescription and nonprescription medicines have child-resistant tops. Keep these container tops on tightly when medicines are not being used. Periodically discard outdated medicines and household products by flushing them down the toilet.

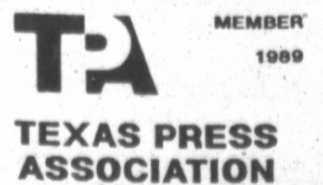

March 18, 1989, Russell Estlack carried his show chickens to Amarillo for the Amarillo Bantam Club Spring Show. He competed against the birds of 45 exhibitors representing Oklahoma, Kansas, Colorado, New Mexico and Texas.

He had three Silver Sebright bantams. This cockerel in the open how placed 2nd; his 4-H cockerel was 1st place, Best of Variety, Best of Breed, Champion Rose Comb; and his Jr. show cockerel was 1st place, Best of Variety, Best of Breed, and Reserve Champion Rose Comb of the Jr. show.

The Black Cochon Bantams were 1st Cock, 1st Hen, 1st Cockerel, 1st Pullet, 1st Young Trio, and 1st Old Trio. The Pullet was Best of Variety, Best of Breed and Champion Feather Leg Bantam of Show. The Hen was Reserve of Variety, Reserve of Breed and Reserve Champion Feather Leg Bantam. The Old Trio was Champion Trio of Show. He showed one Cochon Pullet in the 4-H Show that was 1st place, Best of Variety, Best of Breed, Champion Feather Leg and Grand Champion of the 4-H Show. His Black Breasted Red Old English Gam Bantams placed 1st Cock, 1st Hen, 1st Pullet, 1st Cockerel, 2nd Old Trio, and 2nd Young Trio.

The hen was also Best of Variety, Reserve of Breed, and Reserve Champion Old English. He had two Old English entered in the 4-H show. The Pullet was 1st place, Reserve of Variety and Reserve of Breed. The Cockerel was 1st place, Best of Variety, Best of Breed, and Reserve Champion of the 4-H Show.

Russ also showed three chickens in the Standard Chicken Show. He had 1st Hew Hampshire Cockerel, which also was Best of Breed. He had the 2nd place Rhode Island Red Cockerel. His Black Cochon Pullet was 1st place, Best of Variety, and Reserve of Breed.

Russell received 4 Red ribbons, 17 Blue ribbons, and 6 trophies for his Champions.

Close to 200 people were present. One person conspicuously was not present: a representative from The Clarendon Press.

This is only one example of how news important to the citizens of Hedley is often left out of your paper. The Hedley news that does appear in your paper is often incomplete, inaccurate or concerns only a select group of people and organizations. News and photos concerning UIL events, basketball games, plays, FFA contests, achievement scores, etc. are important to those associated with the school.

Many great things are happening within our school system and our entire community. Shouldn't we be represented, too?

Editor's note: The Clarendon Press appreciates Mrs. Pickard's letter. It was neatly typed and articulate.

Such letters are good for a paper. They make the editor re-evaluate the policies of the paper and examine present coverage. Readers may, in fact, be interested in the facts uncovered in that re-evaluation.

The 380 people of Hedley constitute no more than 9% of the population of Donley county, yet generate about 43% of the complaints received at the newspaper office.

That same 9% of the population gets about 12% of the non-advertising space in the paper. Yet that 9% generates less than 1% of the newspaper's revenue.

Perhaps it is appropriate to reiterate the newspaper's policy on news coverage: "This paper will never deliberately ignore a story of significant local interest." Whether the story comes from Hedley or Howardwick or Clarendon is irrelevant.

Frequently organizations forget to request that a reporter or photographer be present and there are times when the staff cannot be everywhere. In fact, no one asked for news coverage of the open house at the Hedley Schools. "Ask and ye shall receive."

Prior to the event in question, the paper carried numerous stories about it—at no charge, incidentally. Articles promoted the event in the issues of February 9th and February 16th. And on February 23rd there was a story on the front page, as well as on "the Hedley page".

The Clarendon Press spends far more on gathering news from Hedley than it ever gets back. And the Hedley reporter has spent more on cameras and equipment than she gets from that salary. She wants to do a good job, and has gone to formal training to improve her skills. The editor frankly asks her neighbors in Hedley to cooperate with her, and feels confident that such cooperation will be mutually advantageous.

The newspaper appreciates Mrs. Pickard's candid criticism. Without such feedback, it is easy to slip into complacent habits that do not reflect current realities. Donley County residents must pull together if we are to thrive. The only alternative is becoming a "ghost county". The Clarendon Press remains dedicated to the non-partisan promotion of this county, an advocate of cooperation and consensus. We invite all readers—in all the county's towns—to join us in building up our community.
