## Charlie Waters visited Clarendon Thursday

Twelve-year veteran of the  
Dallas Cowboys, Charlie  
Waters, who had been a  
third-round draft choice in  
1970, was in Clarendon  
Thursday on the campaign  
trail for Governor Bill Clem-  
ents. Also in the campaign  
swing through the Texas  
Panhandle, stopping at  
Shamrock, Childress, Bor-  
ger, Dalhart and Pampa be-  
fore coming to Clarendon  
where Tom Higley, news di-

rector of KIXZ in Amarillo,  
Jerry Hodge, former mayor  
of Amarillo, and three-term  
State Representative Bob  
Close of Perryton.

Charlie Waters stated that  
he was a democrat, "but I  
like Gov. Clements, because  
he is a no nonsense govern-  
or. He put the basic three  
R's back into education, a 45  
percent pay raise for school  
teachers, war on drugs,  
helped to create 800,000 new

jobs in Texas, no tax in-  
creases, has a great relation-  
ship with Old Mexico, organ-  
ized the Texas 2000 Commis-  
sion. He runs the state as  
a business. If Clements is  
re-elected, we know that  
Texas will be in good hands  
for four years."

Hodge states, "I support-  
ed Clements four years ago  
and I'm supporting him a-  
gain this time." Representa-  
tive Close who served on

Clements' staff last session  
said, "Gov. Clements is hard  
working, intelligent and got  
77 percent of his programs

passed. He had the coopera-  
tion of many Democrats and  
Independents as well as Re-  
publicans."

The party was met at the  
airport by Jerry Courtney,  
Donley County Republican  
Chairman.

## Clarendon to host Skyrockets

The Clarendon Bronchos  
came home licking their  
wounds, after two defeats, in  
district play, on the road.  
The team seems even more  
determined to win since they  
have their backs to the wall  
with the two losses.

However, with the win  
over Wellington, tomorrow  
night beginning at 7:30, the  
bronchos are still in a posi-  
tion to earn the runner-up  
spot for District 2AA. So the  
Bronchos are down but not  
out of the coveted play off  
spot.

The Rockets come to town  
with the same appearance as  
the previous opponents have  
shown the Bronchos - speed,  
quickness and size. But the  
big defence being the  
Bronchos are home with  
home folks to support them,  
with the strong backing as  
we have always had.

Looking at the Rockets,  
you can see why they are  
6-1-1 with the loss to Hollis,  
Okla and the tie to Childress.  
The Rockets beat a very good  
Memphis team 27-17 this  
past Friday in what was  
called the Class AA "Game  
of the Week" by the Harris  
Post.

The team has tremendous  
talent in the backfield with  
all-state defensive back  
Wade Williams (160 Sr) at

quarterback; Dewayne Cul-  
pepper (150 Jr) and Dewayne  
Curry (155 Sr) are the run-  
ning backs. These three  
athletes are quick and have  
extremely good speed. The  
receivers are blessed with  
very good hands and Wil-  
liams throws the ball  
above average. Even though  
the skill people are very  
talented, the strongest point  
the Rockets have is the line.  
Offensive and defensively,  
the Bronchos have seen only  
two teams with this much  
talent at the line - Panhandle  
and Quanah, whom the  
Bronchos have lost to.

Dru Lucy (6'4" 195 plus)  
Chad Holland (195 Sr) Matt  
Hanna (6'0" 195 Sr) and Rick  
Martinez (150 Sr) are the  
leaders in the trenches for

## Indians surprise Bronchos

The Bronchos went to Quanah  
last Friday, the Indians  
had nothing to lose, and they  
played probably their finest  
game of the season. Seem-  
ingly out of the playoff  
picture with two district losses,  
the visitors performed as  
if a district title were up for  
grabs as they downed Claren-  
don, 17-6.

The Bronchos seem to  
bring out the best in their  
opponents. Last week the  
Panhandle Panthers looked  
awesome in defeating the  
men in maroon, and this  
week the Indians displayed  
an outstanding running  
game in handing the Bronchos  
their second district loss in  
a row.

Turnovers were costly for  
the home team, which per-  
formed well itself in most  
phases of the game. After  
receiving the opening kick-  
off, senior Fullback David  
Weatherton, the workhorse  
of the maroon offense, made  
15 yards on his first two  
carries. But on the second  
try he was tackled hard by an  
Indian, who butted the ball  
loose from David's arms with  
his helmet.

Quanah then took the ball  
at the Broncho 37 and tried  
for a touchdown pass on the  
first play. Weatherton broke  
up the pass, though. But a  
long run gave Quanah a first

down at the 15. Rodney  
Smith, sophomore defensive  
end, threw a runner for a five  
yard loss on a sweep play,  
but the Indians came right  
back to score on a 20-yard  
touchdown run on the next  
play, giving the visitors an  
early 7-0 lead.

A long kickoff put Claren-  
don back on the 7 yard line,  
but Weatherton made 10  
yards on a dive play and 8  
more on an option pitch. But  
that was all the offense could  
produce and a punt was  
forced by Quanah.

The Broncho defense re-  
turned the favor, forcing  
Quanah to punt. Then, on  
their third possession, the  
Bronchos committed another  
costly turnover. Junior  
Quarterback Dyron Howell  
tried to hit senior Tight End  
Kelly Hill on a pass that was  
intercepted by Quanah at the  
Broncho 44 and returned to the  
38.

The maroon defense rose  
to the occasion, however.  
Rodney Smith took on two  
blockers, whipped them, and  
tackled the runner on one  
sweep play for no gain. Then  
Quanah tried an imaginative  
play: the quarterback pitched  
to the tailback for a sweep  
right and then sneaked out  
into the left flat; the tailback  
ran right a ways and then  
pulled up and passed back

across the field to the quar-  
terback. It was good for 10  
yards to the Broncho 15. But  
that was as close as the  
Indians got on this opportu-  
nity, for the Bronchos held on  
the next four plays and the

ball went over.  
David Weatherton pushed  
the ball back the other way  
with a run of 21 tough yards  
into the heart of the Indian  
defense. The run was typical  
of David's play all evening,

and all season: quick, deter-  
mined, strong and aggres-  
sive.

The Bronchos moved the  
ball out to midfield, but there  
a third crucial turnover oc-  
curred.

## Local and State Wide elections

the polls. Nine ballot boxes  
will be located in the county's  
four precinct. The  
residents of the precinct  
must vote at the boxes  
allocated for that precinct.  
The precinct of residence is  
listed on the voter registra-  
tion card.

Balloting will be from 7  
a.m. to 7 p.m. Tuesday, Nov.  
2. In Donley County 2764  
voters are registered.

As of noon Tuesday, Oct.  
26, 35 Donley County voters  
had cast absentee ballots.  
Absentees voting ends Fri-  
day, Oct. 29, at 5 p.m.  
These may be cast at the  
County Clerk's office in Claren-  
don.

William R. Chamberlain,  
county commissioner in pre-  
cinct 4; and Dood Cornell for  
county commissioner, pre-  
cinct 2.

Area wide elections in-  
clude the contest for Repre-  
sentative for the 13th District  
involving incumbent Jack  
Hightower and his opponent  
Ron Slover, a Republican and  
Rod Collier running in the  
Libertarian Party.

State wide races include  
US Senator, Jim Collins,  
Republican; Lloyd Benson,  
Democrat; John E. Ford,  
Libertarian; and Lineaus  
Hooper Lorette on the Citi-  
zens Party. The governors  
race has W.P. Clements,  
Republican incumbent; Mark  
White, Democrat; David  
Hutzelman, Libertarian and  
Bob Potet as the Citizens  
Party candidate.

where in today's paper. Also  
on the ballot is 6 proposed  
constitutional amendments.  
They also can be seen on the  
bottom of the sample ballot.

 curred. A fumbled handoff between Howell and David Weatherton was lost to the defense.

Again Quanaah tried the sweep, but Rodney Smith played off three blockers to force the runner to move laterally rather than upfield, and junior Cornerback Glenn Weatherton came up to stop the play for no gain.

But Quanaah was undeterred. The Indians put on a patient drive of 9 plays that took them 45 yards to their second touchdown, making the score 14-0 early in the second quarter.

Another long kickoff punt Clarendon in a hole, and the visiting team was forced to punt after three plays. Quanaah fielded the punt at their 37 and then drove again toward the Broncho goal line. A third touchdown was prevented when Quanaah tried to pass from the 4 yard line and senior Safety Kelly Hill made an excellent play to knock down the pass in the end zone. Quanaah then kicked a field goal from close range to end their scoring for the game at 17 points.

At this point the Clarendon offense came alive. A good kickoff return put the ball at the 35, and from there Howell hit David Weatherton on a short pass that resulted in a 12 yard gain. Then David carried for 9 more yards to the Indian 44. A quick pitch to Tailback Rodney Smith brought 13 more yards around left end. Another

quick pitch gained 10 more yards as David Weatherton raced around right end. Then a Howell pass to Smith produced a 6-yard gain, and another quick pitch to Smith 5 more yards. Still another outside play earned 9 yards as David powered his way to the 1 yard line.

Expecting another pitch play, Quanaah was fooled on the next play. Howell showed off sweep play action but lofted a soft pass over the defense to a leaping Richard Gaines in the end zone. The junior flanker was elated by the catch, as were his team mates. A 2-point conversion attempt failed, though, leaving the score 17-6 at half-time.

The second half was scoreless, though both teams threatened. On the opening possession Quanaah drove to the Broncho 13 yard line, but there a blitzing Kelly Hill dropped the Indian quarterback for a 12-yard loss. Then senior Noseguard Ken Dorris put on a strong pass rush to force a poor throw and an incompletion on the next play. Passing on third and long, the Indian quarterback saw his pass tipped by big junior Tackle Arlis Thomas, and then Kelly Hill intercepted the pass at the goal line and made a big return to the 25.

The Indians then put on a pass rush of their own and sacked Howell on third down, forcing a punt. Arlis Thomas boomed one from his own 15, though, and the ball got a good bounce and finally

stopped rolling at the 12 on the other end of the field.

After a pair of punt exchanges, Quanaah mounted another drive that brought the Indians to the Broncho 7 yard line. There the maroon line stiffened, and again the visitors were forced to pass. This pass was intercepted by junior Safety Richard Gaines in the end zone and returned all the way out to the 30.

Time was running out in the fourth quarter now, though. Howell completed a 15-yard pass to Rodney Smith and then ran a keeper himself for 5 more yards, enduring a vicious tackle as he was hit simultaneously by Indian tacklers from front and back.

A quick pitch to David Weatherton moved the ball 12 more yards, but then the drive stalled. A fourth-down fake punt pass was completed by Howell, but it was short of the first down, ending the final Broncho possession.

Again, disappointment pervaded the Broncho squad. But there is still a chance for the team to get into the playoffs. Two victories at home, over Wellington and Memphis, could produce a tie between Clarendon and Wellington for second place in the district, and the Bronchos would enter the playoffs by virtue of defeating Wellington in direct confrontation.

The Bronchos have worked hard and played hard, even in the two recent defeats. Let's hope they encounter

some good fortune in the last two district contests.

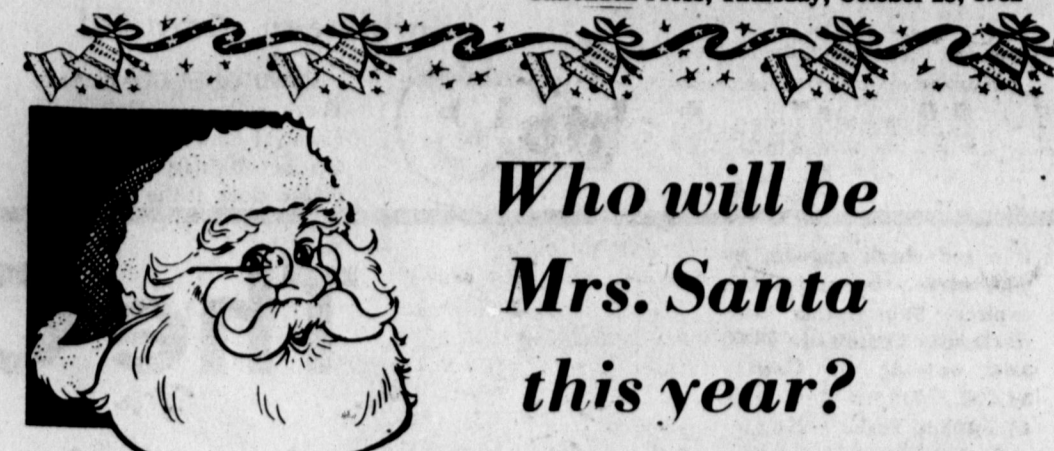

## Bank deposits top 47 million

Donley County State Bank, First Bank and Trust Co. of Clarendon and the Security State Bank of Hedley, the three Donley County banks have increased approximately 6.6 million in deposits over the same period reported last year. According to the statement of conditions reports of last week, First Bank and Trust Co. of Clarendon shows 28,427 million total deposits for this quarter and 23,647 million last year, up nearly 5 million. While they reported only 13,099 million in 1975.

Donley County State Bank has a total deposit of 15,343 million this year, while only reporting 13,807 last year, that's almost a million and half increase. In 1975 they showed only 7.27 million on deposit.

While the Security State Bank of Hedley shows 3,526 million this year, they had 3,210 million last year, with a little over three hundred thousand dollar increase.

Growth has been in spite of a nation wide recession and depressed farm prices.

## Farmer and weather

Every year at this time the farmer's begin to prepare for harvest. It seems like each year the farming and the pay gets worse. Last year a lot of farmers quit because of inflation and because of our nations economic predicament. Not only does it seem that the government is unwilling to cooperate, but also the weather is unwilling to cooperate with the poor old farmer.

Weather is a major factor in every farmer's life. He has to gamble on the weather every year because it is hard to tell what Old Mother Nature is going to do next.

This year the farmers got off on the wrong foot because many of them were unable to get in the field long enough to get the seed in the ground. Many had to replant as many as three times, and some just gave up.

Normally, if cotton is not sewn before July 4 or 5 it will never make a bale but there are always a few exceptions.

Hail damage is usually the main worry of every farmer. A hail storm can come in and wipe a good stand of cotton out quicker than any other weather condition. When it rains, that cold ice sets the temperature of the soil back temporarily, which keeps the seed from performing normally.

Everyone was worried about the freeze that we got last week, but it will probably not hurt the cotton at all. A good way to check your cotton to see if it is ruined it to take about a nine foot strip in your field and feel of the bales, if there are at least 25 or thirty soft boles your not

## ALCOHOL AND BLOOD PRESSURE

Alcohol is known to have many effects on the human body...perhaps the best known being **intoxication** produced by depression of the central nervous system. In heavy drinkers, liver disease (**cirrhosis**) is a well documented long-term effect of the effect of alcohol on this vital organ. And the relationship between alcohol consumption and stroke due to bursting of vessels in the brain has been suggested by the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism.

The effect of alcohol consumption on one's blood pressure is not as clear. Studies have shown that heavy drinkers have blood pressure readings more than 10mmHg (systolic) higher than nondrinkers. In one study, high blood pressure occurred twice as often in heavy drinkers as compared to nondrinkers. And the type of alcohol beverage consumed seems to affect one's blood pressure. Wine produced the greatest rise in blood pressure followed by beer. Surprising to some, hard liquor and sherry did not affect blood pressure.

But what about the more typical drinker who consumes 1 or 2 drinks daily? It appears that no conclusions can be reached at this time regarding moderate alcohol use and blood pressure.

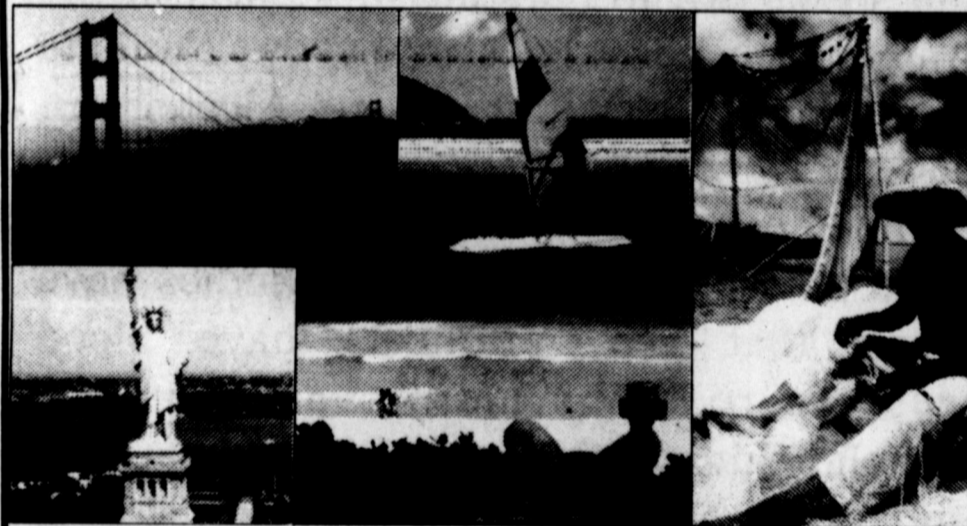

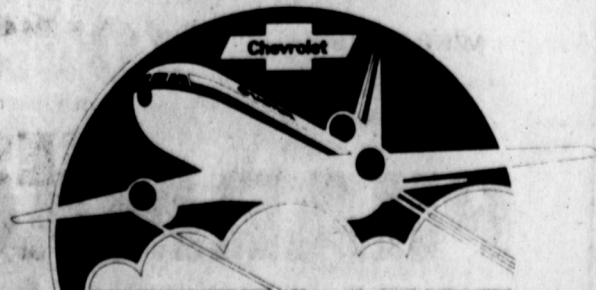

## West Texas Utilities Co. enters gas purchase agreement

West Texas Utilities Co. has entered a gas purchase agreement with Haskell Gathering Co. which could result in lower fuel costs at its Paint Creek Power Station.

WTU has begun taking a small volume of low Btu gas, and is expected to take more when the gathering firm's pipelines are extended to additional wells in Haskell and Throckmorton counties. The Paint Creek plant is on Lake Stamford in southeastern Haskell County.

The gas is cheaper than WTU's main supply, but is of lower quality, according to Walter Meller, WTU's manager of system production.

"Because it is a lower Btu gas, it must be blended with other gas before it can be burned in our boilers," Meller said. "But we are doing everything we can to buy gas where there is a price advantage."

He said WTU is in the process of negotiating for low Btu gas at some of its other power plants. The company's contract with its principle supplier, which was renegotiated this past year, permits WTU to purchase gas from other sources, and WTU does so when it is available. The Company has eight major power plants, all of which burn natural gas as the primary fuel.

## Report on 1982 Democratic convention

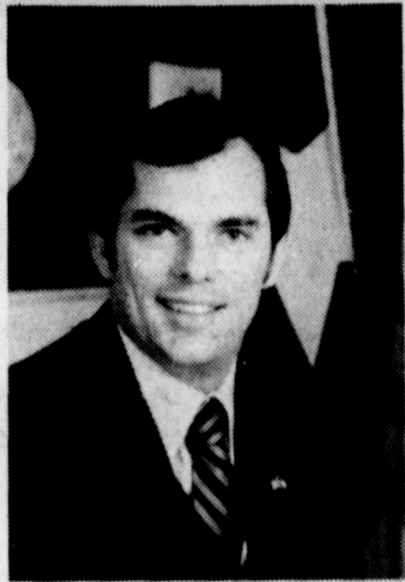

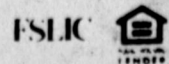

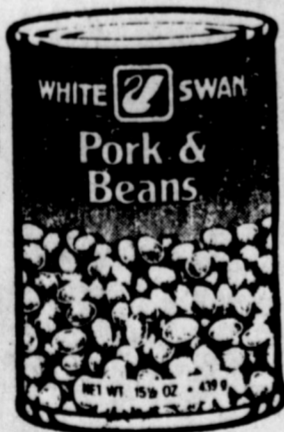
