Was Leading Business Man In Clarendon Many Years Ago

Funeral services were conducted at the First Baptist church here at 10 a. m. today for H. D. "Buck" Ramsey who died in a San Antonio hospital early Tuesday. Rev. J. Perry King, the pastor, had charge of the services.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Adelia Ramsey of San Antonio; a brother, Forest Ramsey of Ardmore, Oklahoma. Two sisters survive. They are Mrs. J. G. White, Cerulian, Kentucky, and Mrs. Emma Southern of Compton, California. Mrs. Genoah Doshier of Amarillo, widow of Geo. Doshier a former sheriff of this county, is a niece.

As a special mark of respect to the memory of Mr. Ramsey, all three of the Clarendon banks remained closed today from 9:45 a. m. to 12 o'clock.

As a young man, Mr. Ramsey entered politics in Donley in 1902, and was easily elected county treasurer. Later he became a druggist for several years. Successful as a business man, he invested in stock of and later became president of the Donley County State bank.

Boys evidently do not need so many swimming ponds, tours and libraries as they need plain jobs. That may sound crude in this youbring-the-duck age, but recall that practically all the great men of all history were workers. They knew how to sweat. They preferred exercise to physic.

Boys have to have a home environment of the better kind. And when we get to thinking about home, the mind just naturally wonders around to the smokehouse where hangs the hams, and the ash hopper. Lye leached from wood ashes in that hopper and made into home-made soap certainly got the dirt.

This is no ash-hopper age, either. We've gone far beyond that. The old idea of a smokehouse is being woefully neglected so are boys.

Have you noticed the difference in the quality of farmers? Take for instance those who raise stock. Those men were hard-working boys one time. The breeding of high-class stock-cattle and hogs-is no fool's game. There is a hundred angles to stock growing. You have to know back-ground, color, size, quality and a lot of other things.

Women were first assessed a poll tax as a requirement for voting in 1922. Many of them valued the price of a poll tax, \$1.75, more than the privilege of voting 'against' some one, as many alledged their husbands

Then another law came along to require the payment where real estate was owned by husband and wife. Her poll tax was assessed against the real estate just the same as the husband.
