State Rep. Whaley has toll-free number

State Representative Foster Whaley, Pampa, announced today that a toll-free incoming WATT Line telephone has been installed in his Pampa office. The Watt line will permit any citizen in the 84th Legislative District to call him at no

expense to the caller. The TOLL-FREE NUMBER: 1-800-692-1389.

Permission was granted to Whaley to make this installation because of the large eleven and one-half county district which includes part of the Panhandle, Rolling Plains, and South Plains.

The District covers North rural Lubbock County and includes Reece A.F.B., Shallowater, New Deal, Idalou, and the southern part of Abernathy. Other counties include Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Motley, Briscoe, Hall, Armstrong, Donley, Childress, Collingsworth, and Gray.

Whaley said the new incoming WATT line will mean he can be as accessible to a resident at Reece Air Force base, 200 miles away, as to anyone in Pampa, his home town.

From January 11, 1983.

until early June. Representative Whaley will be in Austin for the 68th Legislative session.

Therefore, it is essential that callers let his Pampa secretary know who is calling, their area code, phone number, and the town from which they are calling. Also, advise Whaley's secretary about the nature of the call.

Jean Högsett, the Pampa secretary, will relay this information to the Austin office if she is unable to get an answer for you.

Albert Johnson retires from Highway Dept.

Albert B. Johnson, Jr. has spent 43 years working on the highways and roads between Amarillo and Estelina. He began this life-time career when he was a strapping youth on May 8, 1938. He was hired as an emergency crew to help re-build the flooded out road around Lelia Lake. The traffic was detoured along the railroad tracks while they worked on the road. "We didn't even think of having 'men working' signs," Johnson said, "because cars drove so slow back then that you could nearly walk and keep up with them."

He took the job because he had been chopping cotton \$1 a day and the Texas Highway Dept. offered 35 cents an hour, a substantial increase. His job was pick and shovel, to level the road, clear it and build a solid road bed from this side of Lelia Lake to Bell Creek by Dougherty Orchards.

Everything was done by hand back then and even up until the '40's. Pick and shovel, load by hand, dig by hand, haul by hand. It would take 24 men to work a road where now only 11 are necessary. There was a motor grader without a front end loader and no cab.

Johnson had much to do

with the building of the new roads and the improvements of the existing highways. After the road bed was rebuilt from the 1938 flood, it was resurfaced with asphalt. All of this was done by hand as well. 55 gallon drums of asphalt were hauled from Amarillo and hand spread, hand flattened and hand rolled. There was no asphalt heater. This project lasted from May 8 until October for just a 5 mile stretch. Now, with the modern machinery 11 men could do the same job in one day or less.

Johnson was laid off for a few months until he was old enough to be officially hired by the state. Then in 1943 he volunteered to go into the Navy. The recruiter in Oklahoma City told him he was eligible to accept the one and only job as equipment operator in the US Seabees. Johnson gladly took that job so he could stay in the kind of work he knew best. Construction. But from 1943 until 1945, Johnson stayed in the states. His most exciting job was working for \$35 extra at the ships store half-soling shoes! He came in as a Petty Officer second class and left the Navy as a Petty Officer First Class.

In 1940, Johnson married Clarendon resident Opal

Opal Housen on March 16. They had a son, Jimmy Johnson born to them December, 1941 and Alice Mae (married Johnny Davis) was born two years later in January, 1943. They now have five grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. Jimmy lives in Midland land.

When Johnson returned to the Texas Highway Dept. in 1945, there was a 20' road paved from here to Hedley. In 1964 a four lane was built between here and Hedley and then in 1964 the work began to pave four lanes from here to Amarillo. During the years, these roads have been resurfaced about eight times.

With a majority of the roads were dirt, the men hand hauled the sand out and refilled it with caliche hand hauled from other areas.

In Sept. 1952, Donley County was taken out of the Amarillo district and that supervisor stayed in Amarillo. Donley belonged now to the District 25 out of Childress and the supervisor lived in Memphis. Johnson was then appointed as "straw boss", or assistant supervisor over about 3-6 people in the warehouses. Then in 1963 his supervisor retired

and Albert Johnson has been District 25 supervisor until December 30, 1982. Jack Eads will now be the new supervisor.

There are about 384 miles of highway to care for in this district. New machinery doesn't call for as many people as it once did, and state funding has decreased as well. But the job has been awfully good to Johnson and he has nothing but praise and thanks for the men he has worked for and with all of these years. When he began there was no such thing as sick leave or vacation pay or retirement. In 1941 he was given retirement benefits and in 1948 the state came through with sick leave and vacation pay.

Working conditions have changed in other ways as well. The old trucks had no heaters at all and the radiators had to be drained each night and hope was maintained during the day that they wouldn't freeze up. When plowing the roads of snow, one man rode on the wheels of the plow to keep them on the road and the other inside an unheated cab. Back then, there were no such things as the goose down and insulated clothing available to a depressed nation. Those snow plows had

to run day and night. "But then, if you couldn't drive the roads, you just didn't get out. Now-a-days," Johnson went on, "it's a necessity that the roads get cleared and people have to be on them."

Snow plowing has some of the worst memories for

Johnson who is a firm believer in staying dry and warm. He recalls in 1940 being stranded three or four nights in the Claude courthouse because of 6-7 feet snow banks. In 1957 and again in

The First Baptist Church of Clarendon will be showing the film "Greater Than Gold", January 9th at 7 p.m. at the Church.

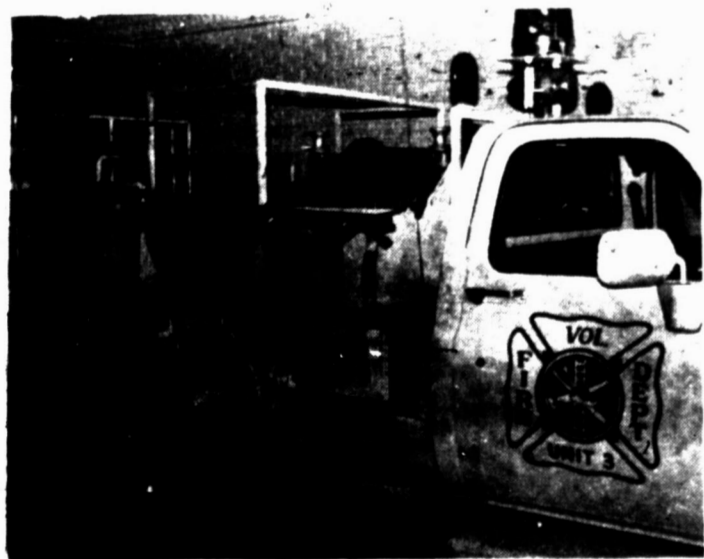

Cotton truck explosion injures five firemen



At 12:20 on Friday, Dec. 31 a cotton truck and trailer loaded with 35 bales of cotton from the Donley County Co-op headed to the Memphis Compress caught on fire. The driver pulled the truck over and left the truck because the flames had already begun to consume the cotton. Cause of the fire was not known. The Texas Highway Dept. was out sanding the highways because of the snow and ice on the roads and called into the fire department to report the fire.

At 12:33 the first gas tank blew a hole at the site, at 12:26 the fire department had finished pumping the water into their pumps in anticipation of the freezing conditions and rolled out of the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department building. Three

vehicles arrived at the scene at 12:35 in spite of the icy road conditions.

The trucks had no sooner stopped when Mark Winsor, Ernie Johnston and Bobby Hoggard jumped off of the truck and began unwinding the hose. Mark stepped toward the burning truck and the second gas tank on the flaming cotton truck ruptured, sending a huge ball of fire toward the fire truck and projecting bits and pieces of flaming bales of cotton all over both firemen and the trucks.

Mark Winsor effectively blocked the other men with his body. Bobby Hoggard reacted quickly by helping put out the fire on Mark, removing flaming and hot cotton stuck to the truck, and moving the fire truck all

within seconds.

Mark Winsor is not wearing any of his fire gear except his boots. His polyester/cotton blend trousers caught fire and melted onto his legs causing second degree burns on both legs from his hips to his knees with a patch of burned area on his stomach. He received second degree burns to both wrists and his face. The worst damage was to his throat and lungs, however, since he had inhaled smoke and flames. The EMT's treated Mark at the site and took him to N.W.T.H. where he was listed in serious condition. However, on the way to the hospital, after Mark began to regain his oxygen and began to come out of his shock, Mark asked for some dominoes so that the long

trip to Amarillo wouldn't be so boring and long and since all of them were back there, they might as well play a game!

Bobby Hoggard received first and second degree burns to his face and had second degree burns to the palms of his hands from extinguishing the flames on his brother fireman, Winsor. Hoggard was wearing his Bunker coat and helmet but didn't have on his gloves. Hoggard was treated at N.W.T.H. and released.

Delbert Robertson received second degree burns to his face and to the back of his right hand. Robertson had on his full fire gear and was pulling on his right glove when the fire blast hit. Only the tips of the fingers on his right hand were not injured.

Ernie Johnston was treated by the EMT at the scene and was seen by Dr. Gilkey the next day. He had first degree burns on the side of his face and the backs of his hands.

Butch Blackburn had minor first degree burns, but he wasn't a fireman on the job.

Pat Robertson remarked that there is a GD available for injured firemen and that will help take care of the injuries for all of the other firemen, but Mark Winsor will need some help with his expenses. Hedley has already set up a fund to help Mark with the medical expenses which will be enor-

mous as he is treated and undergoes therapy, grafting and medication.

The firetruck suffered some minor damages as well. Straps on the side of the truck used when firemen fight grass fires were melted, and some damage to the ladder and fire extinguisher were reported. But the truck is expected to clean up well and with only minor damages.

Pat Robertson reports that Mark is in excellent spirits and would like to see anyone who has a set of dominoes come in his room. He is now in room 403 at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo. Mark's main concern is the fund raising for the Jaws of Life. He sincerely hopes

everyone will continue to support this effort since he has a personal interest in rescuing anyone in danger of being burned.

The Winsor family is grateful for the love, concern and support this community has already given them. Mark said that he won't have to see any of his kids for the next two years because so many people have offered to babysit them. "I thought Hereford was a great community to live in, but I didn't know about great communities until I moved to Clarendon and Donley County!"

Estimated damage to the cotton and trailer was valued at \$15,000, said Donley County Co-op manager Dwayne Strickland.

Pre-Construction meeting for Farm to Market Road 2471 was held December 15, 1982 at the State Department of Highways & Public Transportation in Clarendon.

Mr. Glenn W. McLain, Resident Engineer of the Clarendon Residency and the Wellington Residency, presided over the meeting. Ivan Dement, Inc. has been awarded the contract to extend FM 2471, which is approximately five miles North of Hedley.

Representing the SDHPT were Mr. George R. Wall, Assistant District Engineer of Childress, Hubert Brooks, project engineer of Wellington, and Glenn W. McLain of Wellington. Mr. Don King and Mr. Howard Sliger of Amarillo represented Ivan Dement, Inc. Guests were

Judge W.R. Christal of Donley County, and Buford Holland, Donley County Commissioner over Precinct 4.

Don King, Superintendent for Ivan Dement, Inc., reported the company will be moving equipment in the last week of December. The sequence of work will begin January 3, 1983. Howard Sliger will be Job Superintendent for the project and Hubert Brooks will be project engineer for SDHPT.

F.M. 2471 is located three miles East of North end of FM 1755 and five miles east to FM 2695. Contract estimate for the 5.068 miles is \$559,490 for grading, structures, base and surfacing the new Farm to Market Highway. Don King expects project to be completed in July of 1983.

Health Hints for Today

INFLUENZA is starting to appear in our area. So far, most cases have been limited to the adult population, with very few cases appearing in the school aged children. The symptoms begin with sudden onset of chills, fever, and generalized aching. A severe cough is the most lasting symptom, however.

With bed rest, aspirin and fluids most are over the disease in about four days. The cough will persist for a week longer.

For those of you who have not received your influenza immunization, now is the time to get one. It is recommended for anyone over 65 or anyone with a chronic illness. Avoids crowds whenever possible.

HEPATITIS, TYPE B (Infectious Hepatitis), is becoming more of a problem in our community. Although most cases have been in the young adults, we now have two documented cases in young children. Please tell your children not to drink after another, take a bite of their candy, or share any object which another may have put in their mouth. The symptoms of hepatitis are aching, fever, vomiting (not diarrhea), severe fatigue, and dark urine. Yellow jaundice (yellow eyes and skin) are a late symptom of the illness.

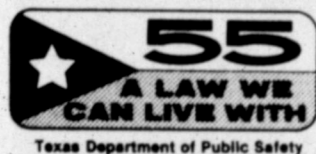

Obituaries

C.J. Douglas

Services for Clyde J. Douglas of Dallas, a pharmacist for 57 years and World War I veteran were held recently in Dudley M. Hughes Jefferson Chapel, with burial in Grove Hill Cemetery.

Douglas died from pneumonia in Stevens Park Osteopathic Hospital. He was 91.

He was born May 21, 1891, in Mart, Tex., but grew up in the Texas Panhandle and graduated from the University of Texas at Galveston in 1915.

He worked briefly as a pharmacist before enlisting in the U.S. Army in 1917. He was transferred to Allentown, Pa., where he was the immediate subordinate of actor Adolph Menjou, who starred in more than 60 movies between 1917 and 1960.

Menjou was placed in charge of entertaining the troops, and Douglas became his assistant. In that capacity he threw silver dollars for sharp-shooter Annie Oakley and had his picture made with Buffalo Bill Cody.

In 1918, he went to Italy, where he saw action at the battle of Bitorio Veneto.

Douglas was discharged in 1919, returned to Clarendon in 1920 and opened the city's Rexall Drug Store the next year. He sold the store in 1946 and moved to Dallas.

He joined Skillerns Drug Co. in 1947 and was a pharmacist for the firm until failing sight forced his retirement in 1972. He worked at Skillerns No. 13 on Jefferson Boulevard for many years.

Survivors include his wife, Ruthie Douglas of Dallas; a son, Jim Douglas of Irving; two stepsons, Richard Cole of Dallas and Kenneth Cole of Garland; a stepdaughter, Betty Ann Adams of Garland; a brother, Lee Douglas of Waxahachie; 16 grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

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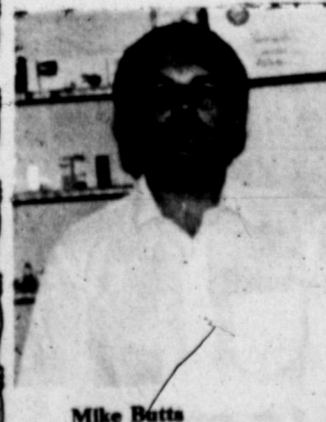

I have a good friend living in California who usually sends me quite a few recipe ideas she has discovered. Ruth Rowe has sent along these ideas.

TURKEY DRUMSTICKS WITH LEMON MARINADE
2 turkey drumsticks
1/2 C olive oil
1/2 C lemon juice

1 tsp oregano
1 tsp basil
1/4 tsp rosemary
2 TBS soy sauce
3-4 cloves garlic, minced

Combine marinade ingredients. Place turkey in a plastic bag, set in bowl. Pour marinade in bag with turkey. Fasten end of bag tightly to force marinade over meat. Let stand in a cool spot for 30 minutes to 2 hours. Remove turkey from bag; place in a shallow baking dish; pour marinade over. Bake at 350 for 1 hour. Baste occasionally during cooking OR barbecue the legs on a grill for 1 hour, basting frequently.

REAL HE-MAN QUICHE

1 deep dish pie shell
1/2 sausage
1 pkg frozen spinach
1 1/2 C half & half
3 eggs
1 C grated cheese.
Spread pie shell with grated cheese. Beat eggs and add half & half with spinach, brown sausage and sprinkle over cheese, pour mix on top and bake at 375 until brown.

Pears are a good winter fruit and can be so versatile. Try this one for a light dessert.

PUDDING AND PEARS

1 1/2 C cold milk
1 C (1/2 pt) sour cream
1 pkg chocolate pudding and pie filling
3 pears, peeled, cored and halved.

You may substitute 1 8-oz container of plain yogurt for sour cream and use 6 canned pear halves, drained from fresh pears.

Combine milk and sour cream in mixing bowl. Add pudding and beat slowly with rotary beater until blended, about 2 minutes. Let stand to set, about 5 minutes then stir until creamy. Arrange pear halves and pudding in individual dessert dishes. Garnish with thawed frozen whipped topping, if desired.

Nuts and carrots are another hearty winter staple



that can be stored for quite awhile and still remain fresh. Everyone has nuts or carrots on hand.

WALNUT-CARROT PARTY SALAD

1 6-oz pkg lemon flavor gelatin
3/4 C hot water
3 TBS lemon juice
1/4 tsp salt
2 C grated carrots
1/4 C sliced pimiento-stuffed green olives
1 1/2 C chopped toasted walnuts
2 3-oz pkg cream cheese, softened

Dissolve gelatin in hot water; stir in lemon juice and salt. Chill until mix thickens slightly. Fold in carrots, olives and walnuts; halfway fill a 6 1/2 C mold and set mold in a bowl of ice water. Beat cream cheese well and gradually blend in remaining gelatin mix. Spoon over the clear layer to fill mold. Chill for several hours or overnight before unmolding. Makes 10 servings.

PERKY PINWHEEL APPETIZERS

1 C shredded American cheese
1/4 C cooked, crumbled bacon
1/4 C butter or oleo
2 TBS sliced 1/8" green onion
7 slices rye bread, crust removed

In small bowl stir together all ingredients except bread. Flatten each bread slice with rolling pin. Spread each bread slice with 1 1/2 TBS butter mix. Roll up jelly-roll fashion beginning with short side. With serrated knife slice each roll into 4 pinwheels; secure each with

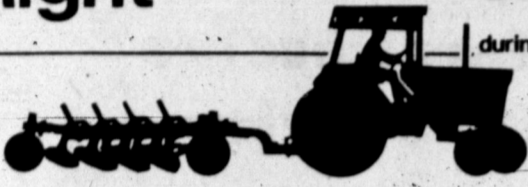

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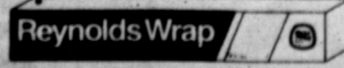

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

French geneticists have long thought that the Limousin represents one of the most direct descendants of the original Bos Primogenis, or prehistoric cattle. In 1967 the first Limousin bull was imported to Canada by a frenchman. This bull was the original Limousin herd sire of North America. 1964, this part of Texas had tremendous snow falls that caused many roads to be closed and unusual efforts to be taken to clear the roads. One bank near Jericho took 12 hours to attempt to clear. They gave up until a snow blower could come down from Pampa. When it was cleared, they discovered a family stuck in their car in the drift. They were all still alive. Snow, ice and the constant melting and refreezing is hardest on roads, he says. That, combined with heavy trucks tear up the road surfaces. But, Johnson reminds us all, "without the trucks and the tremendous taxes they pay, we couldn't have the money this state does to maintain our roads." In 1979 Donley and Hall County received one of the five state-wide awards given to Supervisors for highway beautification. Opal and Albert were sent to the Lady Bird Johnson ranch, fed the famous Barbeque and feted by "a swell person and a great hostess," Lady Bird herself. The winner of the grand prize that year was a man from around Pecos Co. He had nurtured one particular cactus to gargantuan size and whipped South Texas at last. Many times Texas Highway Dept. personnel are on hand to help rescue stranded motorists. Just recently, a THD truck radioed in for a fire truck to put out a burning cotton truck and trailer at Lelia Lake. The worst that Johnson saw was in 1940 a car lost control and ran into a Continental bus burning 28 people inside. He helped direct

traffic around the bus until it was extinguished and hauled off of the road. Accidents? Never happen around Donley Co. For 43 years, there has only been one fatal accident involving a THD vehicle. A man struck a snow plow and fatally injured him and seriously injured his wife. The snow plow driver was uninjured. There have been a few fender-benders, but no accidents involving injury. The worst injury Johnson could think of is fatigue. He sometimes gets so cold, so tired, so exhausted from long hours on the road that he might not even recognize his own child. In fact, this Christmas is a point in case. He and Jack Eads were at the bank taking the payroll when a man stuck out his hand and said "howdy". Johnson shook it and went on in. A woman rushed up and hugged his neck and said "Hello, Dad" and it was his daughter-in-law. It was only then that he realized he had just shook hands with his own son and didn't realize who it was! On Friday, Dec. 30, 70 friends and family members and employees met with a very unhappy A.B. Johnson to recognize his 43 years achievement at his retirement party. "I've been to many retirement parties," Johnson said, "and seen the old boy up there with tears in his eyes and thought he was faking it. Now I know that it just can't be helped. It's real!" "Albert Johnson has been an outstanding employee, an outstanding leader in all of his district and has performed all of his duties in an outstanding manner," said George Wall, the assistant District Engineer for this district at the ceremony. "He has a real knack for doing his work." His loyal and loving employees fondly remarked that he has gone the extra mile for his community and has done many things to benefit both the schools community and it's citizens. Social Security

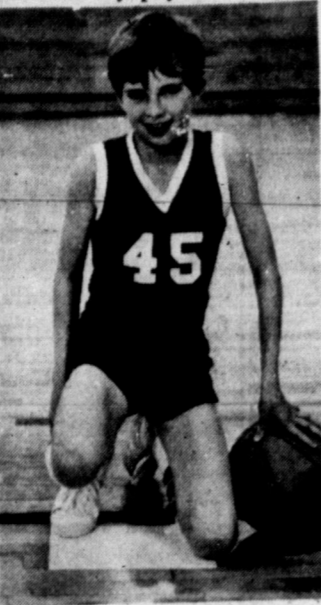
Questions

Q: I started getting Social Security retirement payments this year. I also worked part time and plan to continue working next year. What's the amount a person can earn this year without losing benefits?

A: If you are 65 or 70, or will reach 65 before the end of the year, you can earn \$6,600 in 1983 and get full Social Security benefits. If you are under 65, you can earn \$4,920 in 1983 without losing any benefits. If your earnings go over the annual amount, \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 of earnings above the limit. There is no earnings limit for people 70 and older.

Farmers must pay estimated tax soon

Individuals who earned at least two-thirds of their 1982 gross income from farming have until Monday, January 17, 1983, to make a 1982 declaration of estimated tax and to pay any taxes due.

However, according to the

IRS, farmers who plan to file their 1982 income tax return and to pay the total tax balance by March 1, 1983, are not required to make an estimated tax declaration.

Additional information is available in the free IRS Publication 225, "Farmer's Tax Guide," and Publication 505, "Tax Withholding and Estimated Tax." These publications can be obtained by calling the IRS number listed in the local telephone directory.

The family moved to Hedley and went to work for Clyde Bridges farming. They did this for a while, then they left Hedley and moved between Ashtola and Goodnight. There they worked for J.B. Materson helping him farm. While living there another son El-

bert was born.

Mr. Swearingen died in 1941 and is buried at Goodnight Cemetery. Haskell and Lucille the oldest of the children went to work, at anything they could do, to help their mother keep the family together and going.

Haskell went to the service in 1945 during World War II. By this time most of the children were grown.

Mrs. Swearingen lives with her daughter Lucille and her husband Weldon Leford in Midwest City, Okla. The Lefords have six children and seven grandchildren.
